



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INTRODUCTION AND ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

Since the formation of Texas' first regional council in January, 1966, the interest of private citizens, public officials, and students of governmental affairs in the progress the Texas regional approach to local problems has spread significantly. As a state which has led the nation in financial, technical, and policy support to voluntary associations of local governments formed to conduct multi-functional regional planning, Texas has seen fit to place its faith in the ability of local elected officials to make sound decisions regarding problems and opportunities which concern the people of its vast regions.

In response to an almost overwhelming number of requests for information concerning regional planning activities in Texas, the Office of the Governor, Division of Planning Coordination, published in August, 1968, a <u>Directory of Councils of Governments and Regional Planning Commissions in Texas</u>, which was the first of its kind in an effort to provide current information on the status of Texas' regional councils, to include their sources of financial support, staffing patterns, program activities, and membership.

Information provided in this publication was supplied in response to a joint questionnaire mailed by the Office of the Governor, Division of Planning Coordination, in cooperation with the National Service to Regional Councils. Data collection period began May 15, 1969, and ended August 15, 1969.





EXPLANATION OF TERMS AND SOURCES

REGIONAL COUNCIL:

As used in this publication, the term "regional council" applies to voluntary associations of local governments, composed of a voting majority of elected officials, and organized legally as Regional Planning Commissions under Article 1011m, Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes. Regional councils are known variously in Texas under names such as "councils of governments," "regional planning commissions," "area councils," and "development councils."

STATE PLANNING REGIONS:

A set of 21 uniform, multi-county regions established by the Governor of Texas in December, 1968, which provides a framework for the coordination of functional planning activities of state agencies and a guide to state and federal agencies in developing regions for the delivery of services. The State Planning Region boundaries are used by the Governor in approving the boundaries of regional councils.

STATE OF TEXAS REGIONAL PLANNING ASSISTANCE GRANTS:


Financial assistance provided annually to regional councils by the State of Texas in general support of their comprehensive planning activities. Provided on a "block-grant" basis, these funds may be used for any legal purpose of the regional council. They must be matched in a like amount of local cash available to the applicant organization. Amendments to Article 1011m, V.A.C.S., effective September 1, 1969, provide a base grant of \$10,000 to each qualifying regional council, plus 5¢ per capita for all population over 100,000. State financial assistance for State Fiscal Year 1969 provided a base grant of 11.5¢ per capita for the first 50,000 population, plus 1¢ per capita for all population over 50,000.

State Funding for Regional Councils, 1968-69 Biennium:

Fiscal Year 1968: \$250,000 Fiscal Year 1969: \$250,000

State Funding for Regional Councils, 1970-71 Biennium:

Fiscal Year 1970: \$600,000 Fiscal Year 1971: \$700,000



SUMMARY OF SELECTED DATA ON REGIONAL COUNCILS IN TEXAS

GENERAL

Since the passage in 1965 of enabling legislation (Art. 1011m, V.A.C.S.) which permitted the establishment of Regional Planning Commissions as voluntary associations of local governments, the concept of interlocal cooperation on a regional basis has become firmly rooted. Current population estimates indicate that 77% of Texas' population is served by regional councils, covering 113 of 254 counties, and including membership of 345 cities, 72 school districts, 41 soil and water conservation districts, and 63 other special purpose districts, public utilities, and citizens organizations. There are presently 20 recognized regional councils in Texas.

MEMBERSHIP

Membership in regional councils in Texas is open to all general purpose governments (cities and counties) within the planning area of a regional council. A notable trend within the past year has been the inclusion by most regional councils of some form of membership for special purpose districts. This has been particularly true for soil and water conservation districts, school districts, and in many regions, river authorities, water districts and hospital districts have been made eligible. Some regional councils have federal agencies and military establishments in advisory roles.

Three regional councils in Texas serve both as regional planning commissions and economic development districts (Brazos Valley Development Council, Deep East Texas Development Council, and Lower Rio Grande Valley Development Council). The South Texas Council of Governments shares a common staff with the Southwest Texas Regional Economic Development District.

REGIONAL POLICY MAKING

Regional councils are normally governed by a general assembly which is composed of all member governments in the organization. These bodies normally meet on an annual or semi-annual basis, and typically meet to choose officers, adopt the annual budget, amend bylaws, and formally approve plans and general policies. The day-to-day operations and policies of the regional council are supervised by an executive committee, which is composed of the organization's officers. In most cases provision is made for additional representation for specific larger units of government, special purpose districts, citizen representatives, and groupings of sparsely-populated counties or small towns.

The executive committee typically hires an executive director and staff, recommends the budget, reviews and approves operational policies, and makes recommendations to the general membership. Due to the flexibility of the enabling legislation, composition of the governing body and of the executive committee may be structured to adapt to local needs.

Most Texas regional councils have a number of advisory committees, task forces and technical groups which draw upon citizen and specialist resources within the region's governments and interest groups.

Seven regional councils currently require 100% elected officials as voting representatives; the other thirteen have included citizens and non-elected employees of local governments. In only one case is a regional council presently below a voting majority of elected officials. The State of Texas requires at least a majority of elected officials on the governing body in order to receive State planning assistance funds.

STATE POLICY

Regional councils have been recognized by the Governor of Texas as the mechanisms for coordination of all local planning and development activities which have regional implications. This has included designation as official review and comment agencies under Section 204 of the Demonstration Cities and Metropolitan Development Act of 1966, and subsequent Directives by the Executive Office of the President and Bureau of the Budget. They are charged with making studies and plans to guide the unified, farreaching development of their areas, elimination of duplication, and promotion of economy and efficiency in coordinated area development. They may make recommendations to their member governments, and may, upon request, assist their members in carrying out those plans.

State policy toward regional councils is reflected in its provision of general support funding and in the recognition by the State of regional councils as preferred applicant agencies for planning in areas such as water quality, criminal justice, and areawide comprehensive health. Recent federal programs which require regional components of state plans have been used by Texas as opportunities to support the comprehensive planning activities of regional councils. This trend is expected to continue.

PROGRAM ACTIVITIES

Program activities in which regional councils are engaged have varied with regional needs and priorities. In the survey questionnaire for this Directory, executive directors of regional councils were asked t to list the program areas which they saw emerging in their regions within the next two years. In over half of the regions, criminal justice planning, water quality and water system planning, comprehensive health planning, regional transportation planning, and housing were cited. Also frequently cited as emerging areas by the directors were: solid waste disposal, parks and open space, regional in-service training for law officers and other public employees, regional services to local governments, small city 701 planning assistance, economic development, uniform building codes, airport impact planning, regional information and computer systems, manpower planning, cooperative purchasing, bi-national planning, and environmental health. Half of the regional councils have underway or completed a published framework of goals, objectives or priorities for operation, and the rest have such a study proposed. Half are involved in various aspects of "human resource" or social planning, citing most frequently model cities, work with community action agencies, federal manpower program coordination,

and regional in-service training. Four regional councils coordinate Resource Conservation and Development Projects sponsored by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, in accordance with state policy.

Although most regional councils in Texas are less than three years old, a number of programs and projects which the councils have completed and recommended have begun to be implemented. All but one regional council have completed a first-year criminal justice planning framework and action program, several have operational regional training schools, half have completed study designs for future activity. Examples of implemented projects include: model clean air ordinances, regional teletype networks, cooperative purchasing, tourism study, community shelter plan, joint solid waste land fills, joint information systems, Model City health planning component, urban beautification, mass transit recommendations, and a skill training institute.

A key function of regional councils is areawide review and comment. Table D indicates that federally-financed projects which exceeded \$660 millions in value were reviewed by Texas' regional councils during the reporting period.

FINANCING

Regional council funding comes from all levels of government. The primary funding base is established through a member dues structure, which is usually determined after the finalization of the annually work program and adoption by the general membership. State sources to date have been the Office of the Governor, which provides annual general support grants, and the Texas Water Quality Board. Major federal sources are the Department of Housing and Urban Development, Economic Development Administration, Farmers' Home Administration, Department of Health, Education and Welfare, and the Department of Justice. Justice Department funds were allocated by the Texas Criminal Justice Council to all qualifying regional councils.

In the past two years, local government and state sources combined have totalled approximately \$3.5 million to regional councils. This compares to approximately \$3.7 million from all federal sources combined, which excludes a \$1.9 million grant to one regional council for a skill training center by the Economic Development Administration. The ratio of federal funds to state and local sources over the past biennium is roughly 50-50.

TRENDS

A number of trends concerning regional councils in Texas have emerged in the past year: Membership has continued to increase, particularly by small towns, rural counties, and soil and water conservation districts. At present, all butthree of Texas' metropolitan areas have been organized; the three remaining areas have the matter under serious consideration. Further, metropolitan-based organizations have begun to recognize the importance of a service role to the governments in the outlying portions of their regions. In respect to staff, the number and level of specialization fields

of staff seems to be in direct proportion to age of the organization and to the type of financial support available. There is an increased concentration upon social issue planning, as well as an expanded effort to involve elected officials, lay citizens, and technical employees of government in the planning process. A significant development has been the continued recognition of regional councils by the State of Texas, through financial support and policy direction.

Since the beginning of 1969, a number of meetings have been held throughout the region to discuss the possibility of forming a regional council. These discussions have included details of proposed organizational bylaws and structure. However, no organization had formed officially at publication time.


In July 1967, the city of Orange and Orange County formed the Orange County Council of Governments (later changed to Sabine-Neches Regional Planning Commission). The organization received a \$4,000 regional planning assistance grant from the State of Texas in July 1968. Although no staff was hired, OCCOG conducted at least one planning study. No response was received to this year's Directory questionnaire. State and federal policies require the entire SMSA to be covered by a single organization before further State grants or any federal planning funds may be granted. Recent discussions have been held among elected city and county officials in Jefferson County concerning formation of a regional council which will satisfy legal requirements. At the time of publication, no organization had been formed.

The Texas Criminal Justice Council allocated \$14,400 in December 1968, for conducting criminal justice planning in the region. On behalf of the elected officials of the major cities and of the two counties, the City of Beaumont accepted the grant. The preliminary study of law enforcement and criminal justice needs was conducted by Lamar State College.

APPENDIX IV

REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION
LAW

ARTICLE 1011m, V.A.C.S., AMENDED (S.B. 547, 61st Texas Legislature)



REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSIONS S. B. 547, 61st Texas Legislature* (Compiled as Article 1011m, VACS)

An Act amending Chapter 570, Acts of the 59th Legislature, 1965 (compiled as Article 101lm, VACS), "Regional Planning Commissions," redefining Commission and region, area, or regional; to provide for a definition of comprehensive development planning process; designating a Regional Planning Commission as a political subdivision of the state; to provide for contracts between such commissions and their member governments; authorizing Regional Planning Commissions to acquire and dispose of property, employ staff, consult with and retain experts, and provide for employee retirement benefits; to provide for state financial assistance; authorizing a governmental unit on a majority vote of its membership qualified in serving to withdraw from a Regional Planning Commission unless agreed to the contrary; to provide for interstate and international cooperation; and declaring an emergency.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Definitions

Section 1.

- A. "City" means any incorporated city, town, or village in the State of Texas.
- B. "Governmental Unit" means any county, city, town, village, authority, district or other political subdivision of the state.
- C. "Commission" means a Regional Planning Commission, Council of Governments or similar regional planning agency created under this Act.
- D. "Region," "Area," or "Regional" means a geographic area consisting of a county or part thereof, two or more adjoining counties or adjoining parts thereof, which have common problems of transportation, water supply, drainage or land use, similar, common or interrelated forms of urban development or concentration, or special problems of agriculture, forestry, conservation or other matters, or any combination thereof. It is the intention of this Act to permit the greatest possible flexibility among the various participating governmental units to organize and establish regions most suitable to the nature of the area problems as they see them.

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E. "Comprehensive Development Planning Process means the process of (1) assessing the needs and resources of an area; (2) formulating goals, objectives, policies and standards to guide its long-range physical, economic, and human resource development; and (3) preparing plans and programs therefor which (a) identify alternative courses of action and the spacial and functional relationships among the activities to be carried out thereunder, (b) specify the appropriate ordering in time of such activities, (c) take into account other relevant factors affecting the achievement of the desired development of the area, (d) provide an overall framework and guide for the preparation of function and project development plans, (e) make recommendations for long-range programming and financing of capital projects and facilities which are of mutual concern to two or more member governments, and (f) make such other recommendations as may be deemed appropriate.

Objectives

Sec. 2. The purpose of this Act is to encourage and permit local units of government to join and cooperate with one another to improve the health, safety and general welfare of their citizens; to plan for the future development of communities, areas, and regions to the end that transportation systems may be more carefully planned; that communities, areas, and regions grow with adequate street, utility, health, educational, recreational, and other essential facilities; that needs of agriculture, business, and industry be recognized; that residential areas provide healthy surroundings for family life; that historical and cultural value be preserved; and that the growth of the communities, areas, and regions is commensurate with and promotive of the efficient and economical use of public funds.

Creation

Sec. 3. Any two or more governmental units may join in the exercise, performance, and cooperation of planning, powers, duties, and functions as provided by law for any or all such governmental units. When two or more such governmental units agree, by ordinance, resolution, rule, order, or other means, to cooperate in regional planning, they may establish a Regional Planning Commission. But nothing in the Act shall be construed to limit the powers of the

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participating governmental units as provided by existing law. The participating governmental units, by appropriate mutual agreement, may establish a Regional Planning Commission for a region designated in such agreement, provided that such region shall consist of territory under their respective jurisdictions, including extraterritorial jurisdictions, if any, but need not include all of the territory of the governmental units participating.

Powers

Sec. 4. Under this Act, a Regional Planning Commission shall be a political subdivision of this state, the general purpose of which is to make studies and plans to guide the unified, far-reaching development of the area, to eliminate duplication, and to promote economy and efficiency in the coordinated development of the area. The Commission may make plans for the development of the area which may include recommendations on major thoroughfares, streets, traffic and transportation studies, bridges, airports, parks, recreation sites, school sites, public utilities, land use, water supply, sanitation facilities, drainage, public buildings, population density, open spaces, and other items relating to the effectuation of the general purpose.

The plans and recommendations of the Commission may be adopted in whole or in part by the respective governing bodies of the cooperating governmental units. The Commission may assist the participating governmental units individually or collectively in carrying out plans or recommendations developed by the Commission. The Commission may assist any participating governmental unit individually in the preparation or effectuation of local planning consistent with the general purposes of this Act.

The Commission may contract with one or more of its member governments to perform any service which that government could, by contract, have any private organization without governmental powers perform, provided that such contract imposes no cost or obligation upon any member government not signatory thereto.

A Commission may purchase, lease or otherwise acquire, hold, sell or otherwise dispose of real and personal property. It may employ such staff, and consult with and retain such experts as it deems necessary. It may provide for retirement benefits for its employees by means of a jointly contributory retirement plan with an agency, firm, or corporation authorized to do business in this state.

Operation

Sec. 5. The cooperating governmental units may through joint agreement determine the number and qualifications of the governing body of the Commission. The joint agreement may provide for the manner of cooperation and the means and methods of the operation of the Commission. The joint agreement may provide a method for the employment of the staff and consultants, the apportionment of the cost and expenses, and the purchase of property and materials. The joint agreement may allow for the addition of other governmental units to the cooperative arrangement.

Funds

Sec. 6.

- (a) A Regional Planning Commission is authorized to apply for, contract for, receive and expend for its purposes any funds or grants from any participating governmental unit or from the State of Texas, federal government or any other source.
- (b) The Commission shall have no power to levy any character of tax whatever. The participating governmental units may appropriate funds to the Commission for the cost and expenses required in the performance of its purposes.
- (c) A Commission which meets the conditions set forth below shall be eligible for state financial assistance of a minimum annual sum equal to Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) plus five cents (\$.05) per capita for all population served over one hundred thousand (100,000). A grant made under this provision shall not exceed local funds available to the recipient agency. The provisions for state financial assistance shall be administered by the governor or such state agency as he may designate. For purposes of administering the provisions of this Act, population shall be based on the latest official estimate acceptable to the governor or such agency as he may designate to administer this Act.

In order to be eligible for state financial assistance, a Commission shall comply with the regulations of the agency responsible for administering this Act and shall:

(1) Offer membership in the Commission to all general purpose governments (counties and incorporated municipalities) included in the area or region;

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(2) Be composed of two or more general purpose governments having a combined population equal to not less than sixty percent (60%) of the total population, and for purposes of this Act the population of the county shall be the population outside any incorporated municipality;

(3) Encompass a geographical area that is economically and geographically interrelated and which forms a logical planning area

or region and includes at least one full county;

(4) Encompass an area or region including not less than twenty-five thousand (25,000) population; and

(5) Be engaged in a comprehensive development planning process.

Interstate Commissions

Sec. 7. With advance approval of the governor, a Commission including a region or area which is contiguous to an area lying in another state may join with any similar commission or planning agency in such areas to form an interstate Regional Planning Commission or may permit the Commission in the contiguous area to participate in the planning functions of a Commission formed pursuant to this Act, and the funds provided under the provisions of Section 6 of this Act may be commingled with the funds provided by the state government having jurisdiction over the contiguous areas.

International Areas

Sec. 8. With advance approval of the governor, a Commission in a region or area contiguous to areas in the Republic of Mexico may expend the funds available under the provisions of Section 6 of this Act in cooperation with agencies of the Republic of Mexico or its constituent states or local governments for planning studies encompassing areas lying both in this state and in contiguous territory of the Republic of Mexico.

Dissolution

Sec. 9. Unless it has been agreed to the contrary, any participating governmental unit may, by a majority vote of its membership qualified in serving, withdraw from its participation in any Regional Planning Commission.

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Emergency

Sec. 10. The urgent necessity to meet the growing governmental problems in Texas by the development of prudent plans and by cooperation among local units of government and between the state and local units of government creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the Constitutional Rule requiring bills to be read on three several days in each House be suspended, and said Rule is hereby suspended; and this Act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and it is so enacted.

Passed the Senate on April 25, 1969, by a viva voca vote; May 27, 1969, Senate concurred in House amendments by a vica

voca vote.

Passed the House on May 24, 1969, with amendments, by a non-record vote.

Approved June 2, 1969.

Effective September 1, 1969.
