

Overall, 31 City Ordinances were passed by City Council which included a consolidation and revision of the City of Windcrest Code of Ethics; amending the plan and plat approval process; adding a Consent Agenda to the City Council Meeting agendas; and permitting additional illuminated signs for local businesses and nonprofit organizations. The passage of the ordinances falls in line with the promotion of enhancing municipal services toward our overall goal. We have also added a Frequently Ask Questions page to help with questions related to projects, payments, and inspections. For more detailed information related to residential permits required to be pulled please refer to the City of Windcrest Code of Ordinances, Chapter 103, Section 103-58 – Permits.

The Spring community garage sale, along with the brush and bulk pick dates will be scheduled soon. We will be posting dates on the City's webpage and Facebook page by the end of January.

Code Compliance & Enforcement

Let's welcome a new start and a brand-New Year! Now is a good time to look into improving your properties. Continue to keep the beauty of your community. Start by making preparations for the next big event, The Spring Cleaning! While you're at it, look into doing some painting as needed, repairing or replacing any parts of the house, fence, sheds or replacing older equipment for lawn maintenance. Remember, if you're replacing a shed, roof, water heater or fence, you need to get a building permit.

Please also check your part of the alley behind your fence. Trim your low hanging tree branches obstructing your alley/ street. When preparing over the next few months for the city-wide brush pick up in the spring, be ready to discard items you no longer need.

Sec 14-6 – Unsanitary Conditions

Unsightly and unsanitary premises. All premises shall be kept free of filth, carrion, rubbish, brush and any other objectionable, unsightly or unsanitary matter of any kind. Residential garbage, waste and refuse placed outside for pickup shall be stored in a durable metal or hardened rubber container with a tightly sealed insect-proof and animal-proof lid.

Violation, declared nuisance. A violation of the above-mentioned requirements and/or prohibitions is specifically declared to be a nuisance dangerous to the public health.

Beyond Basic Firefighter Certification – Hazardous Materials

One of the greatest dangers that first responders face in today's emergency response environment is the presence of hazardous materials in virtually everything that we do. For instance, a simple motor vehicle accident can be one in which we see fuel spilled on to the ground. Most people, including firefighters, do not take into consideration the environmental impact that can be had from a motor vehicle accident. In Texas, we are fortunate that there is a requirement for firefighters to be trained to both the Hazardous Materials Awareness and the Hazardous Materials Operations levels. When a firefighter completes their fire academy training, they will have received these two levels and be eligible to test for them with the state.

There are some unique opportunities for firefighters to increase their level of response capabilities. Firefighters who have successfully completed their awareness and operations level can take a course to become a Hazardous Materials Technician. Technicians are responsible for performing offensive operations during hazardous materials events. This means, they have the highest likelihood of being directly exposed to one of the chemicals they are combatting. Often times, this work is done in cumbersome gear that increases body heat exponentially. This physically demanding job is one that many firefighters seek out due to its complex nature that requires a great deal of problem solving.

Once a firefighter has obtained certification as a Hazardous Materials Technician, they become eligible to attend a variety of trainings throughout the United States. These courses are funded by the Department of Homeland Security. The cost of training, travel, and a per diem allowance are covered through the federal funding. This allows our responders to receive the best training, at the best facilities.



A Message From Fire Marshal Zelenak

Hope everyone had a safe and wonderful Christmas. As we start a New Year, I would like to share some winter safety information with everyone. The months of January and February are typically the coldest months here is South Texas. Everyone wants a warm and cozy home when it's cold outside.

Safety Tips:

- Have yours homes HVAC units inspected annual by a licensed HVAC Company.
- If your home furnace run on natural gas make sure you have a working carbon monoxide detector in your home.
- If you use space heaters in your home, make sure they are at least 4 feet away from anything that might catch fire. Don't plug your space heater into a power strip, this could overload your power strip and cause a fire. Make sure your space heater has a tip control on it, this shuts the unit off if it's knocked over.

Microchipping and Registering Your Pet is so Important

Although you might not want to think about it, pets do go missing. In fact, more than 100,000 cats and dogs are placed in shelters each year. And plenty of other pets go AWOL too. Thankfully, the microchip registration system ensures that many are



ultimately reunited with their owners. Are you planning on boarding your pet, or do you have a pet-sitter taking care of your cat or dog? Then it's even more important that your pet is microchipped. Indeed, animals are unpredictable, especially when their situation changes

The information in a tiny microchip the size of a grain of rice, located under a pet's skin, can be read using special readers. Animal control, veterinarians and animal shelters have these readers on the premises. The reader will reveal the chip's registration number, with which one can look up the owner's contact information and the missing animal can be returned to its owner.

Dogs and cats over four months of age are required to be registered with the City, you and your pet's safety is of utmost importance to us. Help us by ensuring our database is kept current with owner information and vaccination records.

The biggest benefit of registering, is the increased chance of pet owners being reunited with their dog or cat. The license also is a reminder to renew a pet's rabies vaccination.

Just a reminder of some of our city code for the care of your pets now that old man winter has arrived:

Sec. 6-6. – Care and keeping of dogs and other animals.

- a. No person shall cruelly treat any dog or animal.
- An animal owner shall provide his animal with veterinary care to ensure its health and when needed to prevent suffering.
- c. An animal owner shall provide his animal with humane care and treatment.
- d. Animals shall be protected from extremes of the environment including outside temperatures of heat (85 degrees or above), **cold (32 degrees or below)**, and precipitation; this shall include but not be limited to shade, dog house, lean-to, tent, garage, or inside the owner's house.

Please make sure they are warm and have food!!

Another reminder that San Antonio Feral Cat Coalition is now offering Trap-Neuter-Return classes on-line or a class at their new offices. Please check on their website for more information. If you are feeding a cat or kitten that has wandered into your yard and adopted you, city code requires you to take this class. We are only talking about an hour and a half of your time. These classes have lots of good information about how TNR works and why it is the best program for our community cats. There is also a form you need to fill out with the city that identifies as a TNR caregiver. Call animal control and they can provide you with the form.
