Mayor's Message



Fiesta! On April 2 we celebrated Fiesta Especial Inclusion 5K and Parade here in our great city. Fiesta events are scheduled through April 10th. It is great to be able to get out and enjoy each other. I am looking forward to many more outdoor activities as we enter the warmer months.

Windcrest Pool - At the February 7th meeting, the Council voted unanimously to hold a Bond election in the amount of 5 million dollars to build a new aquatic center. The Election will be in May and the City will provide more information including potential tax implications to the Citizens before the election. Now that the Bond election has been called, the Council and the City are prohibited from taking an official position for or against the Bond. It is the responsibility of the City to provide information on the project and the cost and you will see that information soon.

Elections – For those of you who voted in the March primary elections you know that Windcrest was not a voting site for the primaries. The locations are decided by Bexar County Elections. We have confirmed that Takas Park will be a voting location for the May Election.

Congressional Representative – During the last Redistricting process, the City of Windcrest was changed from Congressional District 28 to District 21. That means that our current Congregational Representative is Chip Roy. Representative Roy is up for reelection in November. He will be opposed by the winner of the May 24th Democratic Primary Runoff that includes Ricardo Villarreal and Claudia Zapatata.

Fire Chief – The City Council selected Ivan Hernandez as the new Fire Chief for the City of Windcrest. Ivan comes to Windcrest with over 20 years as a Career Firefighter/Paramedic. In addition to being a certified Firefighter, he has experience as an Arson Investigator. We are truly blessed to have Ivan as our Fire Chief and we look forward to him leading our Fire Department to the next level.

Windcrest Cares - Some of you may remember a few years ago when I began a process for citizens to reach out for help. I was recently contacted by a resident to begin that process again. Our citizens care deeply for each other and are willing to help when asked. There are those in our community that need help and we have citizens that are willing to help. These should be small tasks that can be done on a Saturday morning. We have helped in many ways, even a small task of lifting a salt bag to refill a water softener. The City of Windcrest is holding a Special Bond Election in the May 7, 2022 Election. The item on the ballot is Proposition A, for the purpose of designing, acquiring, constructing, and equipping a new aquatic center at Jim Seal and Crestway Drive as part of the City's public park system. City Council approved Ordinance 2022-002(O), calling a bond election authorizing to issue and sell one or more series of general obligation bonds of the City in the aggregate principal amount of not more than \$5 million.

"THE ISSUANCE OF NOT TO EXCEED \$5,000,000 OF CITY OF WINDCREST, TEXAS GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS FOR A NEW AQUATIC CENTER AT JIM SEAL AND CRESTWAY DRIVE, AND THE LEVYING OF A TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF."

What is the estimated cost of Proposition A?

Proposition A is estimated to have a debt tax rate impact of approximately \$0.0294 cents per \$100 Assessed Valuation. A tax rate increase of \$0.0294 cents per \$100 valuation would affect property owners as follows:

Early voting and election day voting will be available at the Takas Park Civic Center, 9310 Jim Seal Dr. Early voting begins Monday, April 25 and ends on Tuesday, May 3, 2022. Election day is Saturday, May 7, 2022. Any registered voter may cast their ballot at any location within Bexar County. 

Windcrest Spring Bulk and Brush Pick Up



THE CITY OF WINDCREST CURBSIDE BRUSH AND BULK PICK UP WILL RUN APRIL 11, 2022, TO APRIL 29, 2022.

This service is for <u>WINDCREST RESIDENTS ONLY</u>. Brush and bulk collection will be picked up in sections throughout the city. For your reference, please refer to the guidelines below to identify the section your collection will occur.

Our Spring bulk and brush collection will begin in SECTION 1.

SECTION 1:

All homes located west of Midcrown are in Section 1. Curb side service will begin on Monday, April 11, collecting through Friday, April 15. ALL brush and bulk items to be collected MUST be placed out on the curb NO EARLIER than Friday, April 8, and NO LATER than Sunday, April 10. Collection will only be picked up once in each section. Republic Service WILL NOT return for additional pick-ups or missed pick-ups due to collection not being placed out by Sunday, April 10. NO EXCEPTIONS.

SECTION 2:

All homes located east of Midcrown, south of Crestway, and west of Eaglecrest are in Section 2. Curb side service will begin on Monday, April 18, collecting through Friday, April 22. ALL brush and bulk items to be collected MUST be placed out on the curb NO EARLIER than Friday, April 15, and NO LATER than Sunday, April 17. Collection will only be picked up once in each section. Republic Service WILL NOT return for additional collection or missed collections due to items not being placed out by Sunday, October 17. NO EXCEPTIONS.

SECTION 3:

All homes located north of Crestway and east of Eaglecrest are in Section 3. Curb side service will begin on Monday, April 25, collecting through Friday, April 29. ALL brush and bulk items to be collected MUST be placed out on the curb NO EARLIER than Friday, April 22. and NO LATER than Sunday, April 24. Collection will only be picked up once in each section. Republic Service WILL NOT return for additional collection or missed collections due to items not being placed out by Sunday, October 24. NO EXCEPTIONS.

Refer to the map above to confirm the section your collection will be picked up. Each section will be serviced ONLY ONCE. Your collection must be out on the curb by the prescribed date. If your items are not on the curb by your section deadline, your house will be MISSED. THERE WILL NOT BE ANY RETURN VISITS FOR PICK UP. Any materials placed out after your street has been serviced, the homeowner will be responsible for disposing of the materials at the Republic dumpsite and pay their dumping fees.

Need to know what are acceptable collection for this service? Refer to the guidelines listed below. Any questions regarding materials not listed below, please contact Republic Services directly at 210-304-2732.

Brush/Bulky Guidelines:

- Limit your brush pile to five (5) cubic yards. If over five (5) cubic yards, it will not be picked up.
- To determine the cubic yards, take the Length x Width x Height of the pile and divide by 27. (This will equal the cubic yards for example 5ft long by 5ft Wide by 5ft High = 125 divided by 27 equals 4.63 cubic yards.
- Brush must be placed within eight (8) feet of the curb.
- Do not place brush piles in front of parked cars, near fences, trees, mailboxes, beneath overhead wires, low-hanging tree limbs, or on top of gas/water meters.

Accepted Materials:

Shrubs, Tree Branches, Woody Vines, Other herbaceous and woody plants, BBQ grills (without compressed gas tanks), Carpeting, Fencing, Furniture, Mattresses, Toilets, Water heaters, Appliances

Refrigerators, freezers, and a/c window units will be collected only if refrigerant has been removed and the appliance is tagged and certified, indicating removal of refrigerant.

Materials Not Accepted:

Household Trash, Construction Debris, Glass (such as doors or Windows), Hazardous Materials (paints, household cleaners), Compressed Gas Tanks, Tires, Televisions, Computers, Waste Oil, Medical Waste, Appliances with refrigerant that has not been removed and certified.

Did you know that the Windcrest Fire Department offers free home safety checks and assists with changing out batteries for your smoke detectors to residents in the City of Windcrest?

Let the fire department assess your:

	Home	evacuation	plan
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- ☐ Frequency of furnace and fireplace cleaning
- ☐ Safe storage of flammable materials
- ☐ Smoke alarm placement
- ☐ Space heaters
- Extension cord use
- Safety practices in kitchens and around water
- Smoking habits
- Other fire hazards

If there are children in the home, the Fire Department will check:

- ☐ Keeping medicines, cleaning fluids and sharp objects in a latched or locked cabinet or drawer
- Using toddler gates at the top and bottom of stairs in homes with a child under 3 years old
- Home fire evacuation plans and fire drills
- ☐ Keeping window blind and drapery cords secured
- ☐ Using safe furniture and toys
- Assessing general safety precautions to prevent accidents and injuries

Spring has sprung and as a result, April brings us the scent of fresh cut grass, National Burrito Day, yellow Daffodils, Easter Lilies, and warm afternoon strolls through the neighborhood while admiring the newly bloomed flower gardens. April also hosts National Peanut butter and Jelly Day; International Autism Awareness Month and Deep-Dish Pizza Day so grab a friend for a picnic in the park.

It is time to clean up and dispose of any unwanted items from inside and outside your homes. The city-wide brush pickup is scheduled to start on April 11th thru April 29th. Check **YOUR** pickup times and plan to maintain the 5x5x5 cubic yard each resident is allotted for bulk pick up. Remember not to block sidewalks and roadways with discarded items and **do not** place items out too early.

Continue to clean your back yards and prepare for those backyard barbecues you have been looking forward to, do not forget about your swimming pool maintenance, and to keep up with the grass on your properties. Trim your bushes away from streets and sidewalks to maintain an obstruction free zone for our walkers and driver's. If you have plans to build on your property, remember to check with our permits office to make sure you get the correct permits and in the proper setbacks.
