Mayor's Message



Summer is upon us! In just a few weeks, schools will be out, and it will be time to vacation and visit our friends and loved ones. I reviewed some of my past articles and I was reminded of where we have been in the last few years. In 2020, my article was filled with "Social Distancing", staying safe and efforts being made by all of us to fight through the Pandemic. Last year, we were in a better place but still focusing on staying safe and providing information on the availability of COVID vaccinations. While COVID is not completely behind us, we can focus more on the summer activities we are used to.

Windcrest Bond Election (Aquatic Center) - On April 25th, early voting began for the May 7th Election. While there are other items on the ballot, there is one specifically for Windcrest - the Aquatic Center. The Bond is in the amount of five million dollars for consideration of an Aquatic Center for Windcrest. You received information in the mail on the cost to homeowners based on home value should the bond be approved. Early voting and election day voting sites include our own Civic Center in Takas Park. I hope you all will take the opportunity to vote.

Getting Outside - Our Parks and Recreation Commission has been busy finding ways for us to enjoy the outdoors. Many of you have heard of **Pickleball** and the benefits of participating in this low impact sport. Recognizing the popularity and benefits, our Parks and Recs Commission proposed building Pickleball courts in our city park located in Winnbrook Estates. At the April 4th City Council meeting, the Council approved one Pickleball court to be built and asked our Parks and Recreation Commission to review other sites that might be beneficial to our city.

City of Lights – Another project being considered is upgrading the lights on our famous "Windcrest Candle." The Parks and Recreations Commission is moving forward on a plan to upgrade the lights currently on the Water Tower near the Tennis Courts. This project includes changing to an LED light configuration that would allow us to change colors. This would allow us to not only "Light the Candle" during our Christmas season, Roosevelt High School Football victories (in Roosevelt Colors!), but also celebrate events like the 4th of July and other important dates or events with appropriate colors.

Windcrest Cares – Last month, I posted an email for people to reach out if they needed some assistance. As I have said many times, people within our city would be glad to help our neighbors with small tasks. It is one of the many benefits of being in a small City that cares. Registered voters will be able to cast their election day ballots at any vote center identified on the Bexar County Elections website; the vote center in the Windcrest is Takas Park Civic Center, 9310 Jim Seal Dr., Windcrest, TX 78239, from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. for voting in a special election to consider the following:

Measure A: Shall the City Council of the City of Windcrest, Texas be authorized to issue and sell one or more series of general obligation bonds of the City in the aggregate principal amount of not more than \$5,000,000 for the purpose of designing, acquiring, constructing, and equipping a new aquatic center at Jim Seal and Crestway Drive as part of the City's public park system, including any necessary purchase of land and demolition of the old pool, such bonds to mature serially or otherwise (not more than 40 years from their date) in accordance with law; and any issue or series of said bonds to bear interest at such rate or rates (fixed, floating, variable or otherwise) as may be determined within the discretion of the City Council, provided that such rate of interest shall not exceed the maximum rate per annum authorized by law at the time of the issuance of any issue or series of said bonds; and shall the City Council of the City be authorized to levy and pledge, and cause to be assessed and collected, annual ad valorem taxes, on all taxable property in the City sufficient, without limit as to rate or amount, to pay principal of and interest on the bonds and the cost of any credit agreements executed in connection with the bonds?

What is the estimated cost of Proposition A?

Proposition B is estimated to have a debt tax rate impact of approximately \$0.0294 cents per \$100 Assessed Valuation. A tax rate increase of \$0.0294 cents per \$100 valuation would affect property owners as follows:

What can General Obligation Bonds be used for?

General Obligation Bonds allow the city to pay for major capital investments having a public purpose, such as streets, drainage, public safety facilities, flood control as well as quality of life enhancements related to libraries, parks, community recreation, cultural facilities and elimination of slum and blight. Bonds are sold to investors and the proceeds from the sale of these bonds are used to pay for capital City of Windcrest projects.

Bond funds cannot be used for everyday operating costs for programs such as softball leagues, classes at senior centers, police officers or fire fighters. Such operating expenses are paid for by annual revenue that support the City's General Fund such as property tax revenue, sales tax revenue, and fees for service.

How are funds repaid that are received through the issuance of General Obligation Bonds?

General Obligation Bonds are backed by the full faith and credit of the City of Windcrest, which means the city is obligated to pay back the bonds plus interest by pledging its ad valorem taxing power. As such, the City uses a portion of its property tax revenues to repay the General Obligation Bonds in the form of annual principal and interest payments.

If the bond passes, when will the project begin?

If the citizens of Windcrest vote in favor of Proposition A on May 7, the city will sell the bonds in early 2023. Once the bonds are sold, we estimate that design would begin within 60 days (about 2 months) but only after the appropriate government contracting rules are followed. The project is projected to be completed by Summer of 2023, pending weather and environmental issues.

What is National Police Week?

In 1962, President Kennedy proclaimed May 15 as National Peace Officers Memorial Day and the calendar week in which May 15 falls, as National Police Week. Established by a joint resolution of Congress in 1962, National Police Week pays special recognition to those law enforcement



officers who have lost their lives in the line of duty for the safety and protection of others.

The Memorial Ceremony will be held on Wednesday, May 18, 2022, at 10 am at the Windcrest Civic Center at Takas Park. Mayor Pro Tem Joan Pedrotti will welcome everyone. Saving Heroes Place Co-founders, Tommy and Robbie Capell will be the keynote speakers and Retired SAPD Captain Patrick Murnin will play the bag pipes. Our Honor Guard will present the Colors as well as the Twenty-One Gun Salute. We hope everyone can attend.

As of this writing, April 4th, 2022, in the United States we have had 91 Line of Duty Deaths. Last year we had 597 deaths in the line of duty. Last year as well as year to date, COVID is the largest cause for Officer Line of Duty Deaths. SAVE A LIFE

Accidents happen when you least expect it. When driving to your summer vacation and a car accident happens in front of you, when you are at your favorite fishing spot and your friend has a bad fall, working in an auto body shop or warehouse and a co-worker has a sudden accident, or at the park and a child falls off the top of the play set. Are you prepared to save that friend or child's life?

Uncontrolled bleeding, or hemorrhage, is the number one preventable cause of death from an injury and it does not always happen from being shot or stabbed. STOP THE BLEED is an international training to teach the public how they can save the life of someone who may be suffering from uncontrolled hemorrhage after an accident or assault.



We have a new addition to the Code Enforcement Unit, please welcome Officer Rosales who will be collaborating with Officer Breland to better serve our city. First off, we would like to thank everyone for doing an excellent job in maintaining your property. We ask you to stay on top of this as the growing season is moving forward. Please keep up with lawn, pool, alley, and tree trimming maintenance. If you were not able to get all your bulk trash and brush out on time, please dispose of it properly.

Also check all fencing and gates into your swimming pools. We will be checking swimming pools throughout the city. A dirty pool or unsecured access points leading into a swimming pool may earn you a court summons. Remember, all household trash being disposed of requires a trash can with a sealed lid. Residents are responsible for alley maintenance behind your fence, the city will not maintain this for you. We also inspect backyards to the same standards as the front. When accessing your property from the alley, you must remove your vehicle immediately after you are done loading or unloading. Do not leave them parked in the alley.



Swimming Holes to Visit this Summer

There are tons of local swimming holes in the greater San Antonio. Here is a round-up of a few family favorites:

Hamilton Pool, Dripping Springs

Hands-down, this is the most beautiful place I have ever visited in Texas, Hamilton Pool is a unique natural preserve with waterfalls, the pool, a collapsed grotto, and canyon. Be prepared for a 1/4 mile hike down steep uneven steps to get down to the pool—wear sturdy shoes for the hike down, and bring everything you need with you. You need to make a reservation before visiting at the Travis County Parks website, and can choose a 9-1pm or 2-6pm timeslot.

Blue Hole, Wimberley

A calm, beautiful, spring-fed creek shaded by towering cypress trees in Wimberley. Very kid-friendly. Swing from the rope swings and picnic on the grassy area nearby.

Jacob's Well, Wimberley

Dive in off the rocks and cool off in this artesian spring in Wimberley--the water stays a constant 68 degrees year round. Jacob's Well is believed to be the longest underwater cave in Texas. Note: they no longer allow residents to go SCUBA diving in the 140' cave system below.

Blanco State Park, Blanco

Take a dip, grill it up or relax in the sun at Blanco State Park. Bring a tube, or rent one at the ranger station. There is a rope swing over the deeper area of the water. Fishing is free at one of Texas' most family friendly state parks!

Landa Park, New Braunfels

51 acres with playgrounds, paddleboats, a miniature train, puttputt, and a spring-fed pool, with heritage oaks trees shading much of the park. We usually bring some bread to feed the ducks. A great place to spend the day with your family.

Guadalupe River State Park, Spring Branch

Just a quick drive down Hwy 46, this hidden gem is one of my





family's favorites. Wade in the Guadalupe River, skip rocks, eat a picnic, and enjoy the beautiful view of the limestone cliffs. When you get to the end of the road into the park, take a left, park, and walk down the hill to the water. The water levels can vary greatly depending on how much rainfall we have had, but whether the water is shallow or deep, it is worth the short drive to come wade around in the river.
