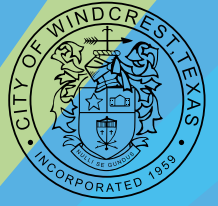

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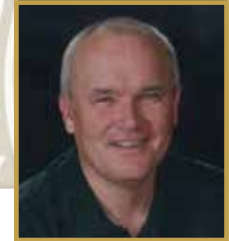
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Mayor's Message

Happy Independence Day! I hope you have an opportunity to rest and relax during the vacation season and most importantly, get a chance to reconnect with those you may have been disconnected with during these trying months of the pandemic.

Strategic Planning

We received the DRAFT of the Strategic Plan at our June 7th, 2021 meeting. We expect to finalize the plan in July. As you might remember, this plan is the result of many hours of work that included the entire City Council and many citizens. We hosted three (3) Focus Group meetings encouraging citizens to offer input in person. We also hosted a survey that could be completed in-person at City Hall or virtually on the internet. The draft plan and the results of the survey are available on our web site and included in the posted agenda for the June 7th, 2021 meeting. Please take the time to look it over. The Council will use this information as we consider the budget we are developing in July and August. While they are too numerous to print in my article, some of MY "take-aways" include the focus on making information more accessible to the public, evaluating our space needs for all of our employees, continuing our focus on public safety, and the importance of our outdoor amenities such as the pool, parks, and other outdoor facilities.

Windcrest Pool

Early in the strategic planning process, we heard from several citizens regarding the pool and the importance of it. We heard your concerns and put it on the agenda for the May 17, 2021, City Council meeting to discuss options. Unfortunately, due to costs and safety concerns, the Windcrest Pool will NOT be open this season. At the May 17th meeting, we received an informative briefing on the pool from the City Engineer and a Pool Design group to give us ideas on cost and options. I encourage you to review the video of the pool briefing – it starts at 1 hour 45 minutes into the meeting.

Windcrest Neighborhood Block Program

Prior to COVID, I discussed a desire to formalize a process to reach out to our neighbors when there are emergencies or just needs. At the June 7th City Council meeting, we gave an update regarding the process. I'm delighted to be on a team that includes Windcrest resident Marcus Yax, Career Firefighter Terrill Woodley, and Volunteer Firefighter William Bauman. We developed a map to identify "blocks" and now we need your help to be a "coordinator" for your block. The Block Coordinator will be asked to reach out to their neighbors to assess their needs during emergencies like the snow/ice event we had in February. They would then communicate back to a City Coordinator that will collect the information so the City can respond as they can. I see this as one more way for the City to identify and help our citizens. We set up an email account for anyone who wants to be a "Block Coordinator." The email is windcrest-neighbor@windcrest-tx.gov. If you have any questions, please call, or email me and I would be happy to discuss this.

Elections

It may seem early to think about elections, but it's not. Windcrest will have three positions on the ballot this November: the Mayor and City Council Places 4 and 5. July 17th is the first day to file for a place, and August 16th is the last. October

4th is the last day to register to vote. Filing information and instructions are available online through the elections webpage or at the City Administration Office at City Hall.

Traffic Light

At the May 17th Council meeting, the Council asked the City Engineer to proceed with planning on a traffic light at the Corner of Crestway and Eaglecrest. We expect it will take approximately two months to complete the design and to bid the contract.

American Recovery Act Funding

We still have very limited information regarding the distribution of the funding from the American Recovery Act. You may remember that we were told that the City would receive approximately \$1.2 million from the legislation. It is IMPORTANT to know that there are stipulations on what that funding can (and can NOT) be used for. As soon as we become aware of the rules, we will discuss it in open session at the City Council meeting and decide on the appropriate use for the funds.

COVID

There are multiple locations providing vaccinations. If you need help with where to go or even a ride, please reach out to me and we will support you as much as possible.

Coffee with the Mayor

I am at Las Palapas on Walzem every Saturday morning beginning at 8:30 a.m. Las Palapas was gracious enough to allow us to use the back room. These discussions have been very informative to me and I hope anyone who wishes will come and let me buy them a cup of coffee. It is very informal; you may come late and leave early as you desire.

On May 7, 2021, City Council passed Ordinance 2021-004(O), permitting certain types of home occupations while mitigating negative effects of burdens to the community by amending Chapter 18, Article II, Section 18-21 Home Occupation and Sections 113-110 and Section 113-5. The ordinance also adopted Article VII of the Zoning Code of the City of Windcrest Code of Ordinances. What does this mean for the community? Why was this amended? Below are a few points of reference to help understand the update to code.

- The Council acknowledged many people are working from home and their work is completely contained within one room or area as they work virtually through the computer. Some business/commercial work may include travel by the property owner/occupier, but no negative external effects of such business/commercial use is felt by the adjoining property owners. Especially in light of the recent COVID-19 pandemic, the Council instructed the City Attorney to make recommendations for an expanded definition, with a heavier focus on simply reducing or eliminating external effects on neighboring property owners, and less on specifically defining existing occupations.
- Within Section 113-381, self-contained home business is defined to be a catchall for home occupations that the City would consider permitting that are contained entirely within the structures on the property and have little to no negative external effects on neighbors. The definition is flexible, so that it adjusts based on changes in technology and does not require the City to constantly update the laundry list of permitted home occupations, which are ever-changing. This definition requires that the occupational use be performed by the person or persons who live on that property and does not allow houses to be used only for a home occupation with no one living at the location.
- Telecommuting or Remote Employment is defined in section 113-381e. In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, many employers are permitting or requiring their employees to work from home. For additional clarity and to prevent confusion, this definition was included to expressly exempt such use from the permits required under this ordinance as such use does not constitute a business in and of itself.
- Section 113-383, adds authorized home occupations **must** register and obtain a business permit from the City. For a complete list of authorized home occupations please refer to Section 113-384. Also refer to Section 113-385 which outlines the criteria home occupations must maintain during the term of use.

The grass in your back alley can easily be forgotten when doing yard work under the Texas heat. As a friendly reminder, please refer to **Chapter 28 – Streets, Sidewalks and Other Public Places** when carrying out your regular upkeep. You and your neighbors are responsible for the greenery in your back alley. Be sure to keep the alley clean and clear.

• **Sec. 28-115. - Responsibility for alley maintenance.**

The owner and the resident of property adjacent to an alley are jointly responsible for maintaining the necessary clearances of alleys and keeping alleys in a passable, sightly and sanitary condition.

As tempting as it is, please refrain from growing bushes or small trees when beautifying the alley. Plants should not restrict access to the alley. Any greenery that can stretch out into the alley will prevent garbage trucks from entering and picking up your trash.

Additionally, do not dump any brush in the alley. You may have to wait for our semi-annual Bulk & Brush Pick-ups if you are unable to haul off tree limbs. Ensure that none of your trees have grown over into the alley. Limbs should be a minimum of 13½ feet off the ground. This will also prevent the garbage trucks from driving through the alleys.

• **Sec. 28-118. - Shrubbery, vegetation and tree height along alleys.**

It shall be unlawful for the owner and occupant of property abutting an alley to permit any shrubbery, other vegetation, brush, or tree limbs to restrict the passageway of any vehicles along alleys. Clearances for tree limbs over alleys cannot be less than 13 feet, six inches.

- Citizens' Patrol are also referred to as "Citizen Observer Patrols," "Community Action Patrols," "Police Auxiliary Citizens Team," "Retired Senior Volunteer Patrol," "Volunteers in Policing," "Volunteers on Patrol," as well as other names.
- The number of individual Citizens' Patrol Volunteers within the United States is estimated to be over 75,000 with groups in every state of the nation.

The Citizens' Patrol Unit is looking for new members. We only request two (2) hours of your time a month devoted to driving around town. You can drive alone or grab a CP partner to ride along with you. We would love to have you join our team. 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PERMITS DEPARTMENT

- Oak Trees may only be cut **July 1st through January 31st.**
- Residents **and** Contractors **MUST PULL A PERMIT** to trim, prune, or cut any oak trees.
- Contractors are required to provide a **valid tree maintenance license.**
- Limbs may cut in sections **NO LONGER THAN 4ft in length.**
- All cuts or wounds must be painted with a latex-based paint **immediately** after being cut/wounded.
- Tree waste must be **disposed of immediately** in a City approved manner.

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Windcrest Volunteer Fire Department

What Has Your Fire Department Been Up To?

There are many things that your Fire Department does on an annual basis. One of those things just came to completion for this year.

Physical fitness is one of the most important aspects of the fire service. Heart disease is the number one killer of firefighters every year. Last year, we decided to enact a required annual physical fitness test. This test is designed to put the firefighters through similar rigors seen on the fireground. The test begins with the firefighters carrying equipment about 50 feet around a cone, then back to the starting point. They then grab a 1 3/4" hose line that is charged with water and drag it 100 feet. They walk back to the starting line and grab a 100-foot section of 5" supply hose and drag it 75 feet to a cone. Once at the cone, they turn around and pull the hose 25 more feet to their position. The firefighters then move to a large tractor tire, and strike the tire 10 times with a sledge hammer. The final station of the agility test is the dummy drag. The firefighters grab a 150-pound dummy and drag it 50 feet, turn around a cone and bring the dummy back to the finish line. The entire course needs to be completed in 5 minutes and 30 seconds. Every one of the applicants who try to get into the Department must successfully pass this course. Then, every year, every member, from the Fire Chief down to the Fire Cadets, must successfully complete the test to continue active service with the department.

Our hope is that the implementation of this test will allow for an increased level of physical fitness and a decreased risk of heart-related injuries.

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A Message From Fire Marshal Zelenak

This month I want to talk about Grilling Safety. There's nothing like outdoor grilling. It's one of the most popular ways to cook food, but a grill placed too close to anything that can burn is a fire hazard. They can be very hot, causing burn injuries. Follow these simple tips and you will be on the way to safe grilling.

- Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings, and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area.
- Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grill and in trays below the grill.
- Never leave your grill unattended.
- Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.

CHARCOAL GRILLS

- If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- When you are finished grilling. Let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

PROPANE GRILLS

- Check the propane cylinder hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year.
- If you smell gas while grilling, immediately get away from the grill and call the Fire Department, **DO NOT MOVE THE GRILL!**
- If the flame goes out while grilling, turn off the grill and propane and wait at least 5 minutes before re-lighting it.

I hope these tips will help you have a safe and enjoyable grilling experience this summer.

As some residents have seen coyotes in our city, they really pose no threat to humans or pets that are on a leash. Coyotes provide a valuable service to us by helping to keep the rodent population in check. We have also seen some foxes in our backyards, in Texas the breeding season begins in February and continues into March. Three to six pups are born in April or May, after a gestation period of about 63 days. Although the pups are born blind and helpless, they grow rapidly and leave the den within a few weeks. They seek shelter in rocky and brushy areas. It is during this period when the adults are most likely to be seen in the open as they search in neighborhoods for food. Their weight can increase from a few ounces at birth to 7 to 12 pounds as an adult.

Remember to vaccinate and register all your pets yearly including the microchip with the City of Windcrest.

The City of Windcrest and the Windcrest Economic Development Corporation have teamed up to create a strategic plan for Windcrest Businesses. This includes soliciting business input, similar to the way the City requested input from residents for the residential strategic plan, which is also currently ongoing. Representatives from the City and the WEDC visited businesses in Windcrest to discuss the Windcrest Strategic Plan Business Survey, hand delivered postcards and posters requesting they be placed in common areas for employees and customers to complete. Postcards were also mailed to all businesses in our community.

What is Strategic Planning?

Strategic planning is a vital tool for communities as it provides measurable objectives that are designed to drive businesses and communities in the right direction.

There are typically 10 steps to a successful Strategic Plan.

1. **Invitations** – On March 16th and April 12th the Windcrest community and businesses were invited to participate in the Strategic Planning Process at the Civic Center. Notifications were posted on social media as well as posters throughout the community.
2. **Establish Focus Groups** – At the meetings, groups were divided into Focus Groups which met regularly during the planning process.
3. **Identify Goals and Objectives** – Both short-term and long-term goals and objectives are identified. In short, what does the City hope to achieve? Next, determine what steps the City will take to accomplish these. Goals need to be realistic and measurable.
4. **Gather Information** – The most up-to-date information is brought to the table to ensure that data used is accurate so that informed decisions are backed up by facts.
5. **Determine your SWOT** – SWOT is an acronym for strengths, weakness, opportunities, and threats which act as a powerful tool during the planning process.
6. **Formulate the Plan** – Once a set of goals is established, begin working on the plan. While developing the plan, consideration on which initiatives will have the greatest impact or which help improve the community are prioritized.
7. **Measurable Goals** – To ensure that the strategic plan is working, determine the best way to measure your progress. With measurable goals improvements are visibly seen.
8. **Surveys** – Citizens and Businesses were provided with links to individual surveys online. Questions were designed to measure facets of community to include: livability, recreation, communication, city services, economic development, and overall quality of life experiences.
9. **Execute Your Strategic Plan** – Once the strategic plan is in place, take the necessary steps to implement it.
10. **Performance Monitoring** – Strategic planning will not be effective unless everyone is doing their part. This requires constant monitoring and tweaking any components that are not leading to satisfactory results.

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Code Compliance & Enforcement

The summer season is upon us. While you're outside enjoying the beautiful weather on a morning walk, tending to your yard or taking an evening stroll through the neighborhood please take the time to enjoy the beautiful yards along the way. Between July 1, 2021 and January 31, 2022 Windcrest residents are permitted to trim low hanging Oak tree branches that are impeding their yard, nearby street signs or even causing a nuisance to their property or their neighbors' property. Please read Ordinance No. 2019.713 Sec 35-4 (a)(b) and Sec 35-3 (a)-(l) paying close attention to (c),(d),(e),(f),(h) and (j) where you will be advised on who can obtain a permit and the specific regulations on trimming your Oak trees.

ORDINANCE NO. 2019- 713(0)

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING CHAPTER 35 - OAK WILT OF THE CITY OF WINDCREST'S CODE OF ORDINANCES TO REGULATE THE MAINTENANCE AND CARE OF OAK TREES, INCLUDING THE PREVENTION OF OAK WILT WITHIN THE CITY AND IMPOSING EDUCATION AND ENFORCEMENT MECHANISMS.

Before trimming your Oak trees, you must obtain a permit from Windcrest City Hall per City Ordinance No. 2019-713 (O) Sec 35-3(c) by contacting Ms. Lindsey Walker in the permits department at (210) 655-0022 Ext. 2430. The permit will cost five dollars and last the entire season (July 1, 2021 through January 31, 2022).

If you decide to trim your own trees, you, the resident, is responsible for identifying trees that are infected with Oak Wilt, which is an incurable and destructive fungal disease of Oaks which makes the foliage wilt and eventually kills the tree and infects surrounding trees. All residents must adhere to CC 2019.713 Sec 35-4 (a)(b) Proper Trimming and Disposal of Oak Trees. The resident is also responsible for hauling the discarded tree branches from their property in a timely manner per Code Compliance.

If you decide to skip the hassle and hire a company to trim your Oak tree, please ensure to hire a certified Arborist who will be responsible for obtaining the permit and providing proof of a valid tree maintenance license at the time of permit request per Sec 35-3(d) of CC 2019.713 (O). The tree trimming company you choose will also be responsible for hauling the discarded branches from your property at the time of service per CC 2019-713 (O) Sec 35-4 (b).

Windcrest Animal Control Task Force

Flea preventative treatments are a year-round must-have for cats AND dogs! Not only are fleas a nuisance to you and your pets, they can carry diseases that can debilitate your furry friends (and in some cases even cause death). A simple way to test if your pet has fleas is to brush over your pet with a paper towel, or part the hair and look at their skin. If you don't find any adult fleas, you'll likely see their feces (also called "flea dirt") which look like small dark specks. Fleas ingested by your pet while grooming may result in tapeworms. If you notice what looks like a piece of white rice moving on their bottom or in their stool. This is a sign of tapeworms, which can be treated with oral medication.

Adult fleas only represent 5% of the flea population, so it's important to have a routine that addresses all the life stages (eggs, larvae, pupae). Monthly topical combo products (like Revolution or AdvantageMulti) can kill up to 98% of fleas in various life stages and also protect pets from ticks, heartworms (carried by mosquitoes), and some intestinal parasites (roundworms, hookworms) too!

Indoor pets are also at risk! Some studies have shown that 1/3 of heartworm infections were in indoor-only pets! Keep your pets healthy and happy - talk to your vet for more info, or join the TxWeACT at our monthly meeting (fourth Tuesday of the month at Cross Roads Church (8102 Midcrown) at 7 p.m. And remember to spay or neuter your pets!!!

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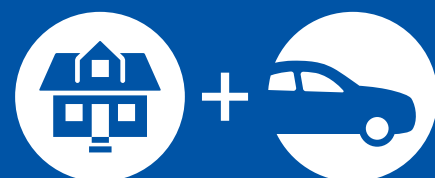
Protect Your Home Against Mosquitoes

Mosquitoes develop in water that stands for more than five days. To reduce the mosquito population around your home and property, eliminate all standing water and debris. Here are some spots where water can collect or where poor maintenance can cause problems.



1. Pool cover that collects water; neglected swimming pool or child's wading pool.
2. Birdbath (change water weekly) and garden pond (stock with fish).
3. Any toy, garden equipment, or container that can hold water.
4. Flat roof with standing water.
5. Clogged rain gutter (home and street).
6. Trash and old tires; Drill drain holes in bottom of tire swings.
7. Tree rot hole, hollow stump, or rain puddle.
8. Missing, damaged, or improperly installed screens.
9. Uncovered boat or boat cover that collects water.
10. Leaky faucet or pet bowl (change water daily).
