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# Mayor's Message



As I pen this newsletter article, I am aware that when it is published, the November elections will be behind us. We will have elected a Mayor and Council members for Places 4 and 5. Whatever the outcome, my prayer is that we accept the results and focus on what is best for Windcrest.

Win or lose, it has been an honor to serve as Your Mayor. If I am re-elected, I will have another two years to serve. If I am not re-elected, I will do whatever it takes to make the transition smooth.

In the last two years we have accomplished a lot:

- We focused on street repairs and used not only the Bond funding, but Sales Tax funds and nearly three quarters of a million dollars from our Economic Development Corporation (EDC). Our City Engineer told the Council that we have completed 28% of the road surfaces this year and we will complete 50% of the road repairs/resurface by next year. He estimates 100% completion within 5 to 10 years.
- Using the voter approved Bond funding for Fire Apparatus, we took delivery of a new Fire Engine and a new Ladder Truck. We celebrated delivery of these critical pieces of fire equipment with a "Push In" ceremony on October 9th.
- We renegotiated a new Master Economic Incentive Agreement (MEIA) with Rackspace that will go far in keeping Rackspace in Windcrest and help focus efforts to develop the commercial properties on the site.
- We were able to add additional Police Officer positions to the city. For the first time ever, we added 6 paid firefighters who will be supplemented by our outstanding Volunteer Fire Fighters.
- We accomplished the improvements to personnel and infrastructure without raising the property tax rate. Our Sales tax revenues have increased over 8% and our fund reserve remains over 30%!
- We completed two important plans to direct our future the 2021 Strategic Plan and the 2021 Parks and Recreations Open Space Plan.

### Windcrest Light Up

As I have written in the past, one of our homes was selected to compete in ABC's "Great Christmas Light Fight". John and Brenda Wilson, who live at 405 Waycrest Dr., were filmed and will be one of four families on an episode to be selected to win \$50,000! We will make sure citizens know when the episode will air and we may even make some arrangements for a "Watch Party". This year's theme is "a Kaleidoscope of Color/ 2021:



A Christmas Odyssey". This publicity will certainly bring even more notice to our signature event, so we hope you all will consider "Lighting Up" for 2021!

# How do I pull a Permit?

The Windcrest Permit Division's new process is in full swing! Here is the permitting process, from applying to receiving a permit, broken down into six easy steps:



# Step 1

Residents or contractors submit the permit application through the Self-Service Permitting Center provided by *MyGovernementOnline* (MGO).

# Step 2

The permit application is processed, or reviewed by the Permit Clerk within 24 hours. This is to ensure that all required information is listed and any additional files have been included. Permit fees are then added.

### Step 3

MGO generates an invoice and sends it to the homeowner and the contractor, if one has been hired. This will come from a no-reply email (no-reply@mygovernmentonline.org), as will any further correspondence from MGO.

# Step 4

The resident or contractor may then pay for the permit through the Self-Service Permitting Center. Payment must be made prior to any further review. This obligates contractors to follow through when they submit an application, and ensures that they do a quality job.

# Step 5

The applications are given a final review by the Building Inspector or City Staff. Smaller building projects may take up to 3-5 days to be reviewed by the inspector. Large projects, such as new construction or remodels may take up to 10 days.

Please take into account the review time when planning your next project, otherwise you will be charged the \$175 fee for expedited review.

# Step 6

As soon as the Inspector or Permit Clerk has approved the application and plans, the permit is instantly issued via MGO's no-reply email! A copy of the permit will also be available in the permitting center. If you have any trouble navigating MGO along the way, clicking "Help" the top right corner of the homepage will take you to the Customer Support Guide. It covers creating an account to download the permit and more! Thanks to MGO, obtaining a permit is now easier than ever.

Updates to MGO will be coming soon – taking this Self-Service portal to the next level!



Here are a few other things worthy of mentioning:

- Lock car doors at all times. Always take the keys.
- Don't leave your garage door opener in the car.
- Don't keep valuables in the car such as purses, wallets, lap tops and guns.
- Consider installing a motion sensor light and/or security cameras over the garage doors to light the driveway.
- Keep garage doors down when you are not outside or in your garage.
- If you think someone is following you home, don't go home! Call our dispatcher @ 210-655-2666 and advise them you think you are being followed. Ask them to have a police officer meet you at the station. Chances are, when you pull into the parking lot they will continue on. Still contact the officer and give them the information.

With all the activity going on in your home on Thanksgiving here are a few safety tips: 1. Stay in the kitchen when you are cooking on the stovetop so you can keep an eye on the food. 2. Stay in the home when cooking your turkey and check on it frequently. 3. Keep children away from the stove, the stove will be hot and kids should stay 3 feet away. 4. Make sure kids stay away from hot foods and liquids, the steam or splash from vegetables, gravy or coffee could cause serious burns. 5. Be sure electric cords from electric knives, coffee makers, plate warmer or mixer are not dangling off the counter within easy reach of a child.

# Code Compliance & Enforcement

Happy Thanksgiving Y'all! Nothing is more neighborly than extending a lending hand to a neighbor in need or a polite wave and a warm smile. In the fall I enjoy exchanging recipes with friends over a cup of coffee, a slice of pie and small conversation. I encourage all of you to do the same, try a new recipe, invite an old friend to dinner or deliver a plate to a person in need.

Did you know this time of year is known for the increase of theft and burglary? You can be proactive against crime by increasing your awareness to reduce the odds of becoming a victim, here are a few suggestions that can help: secure all doors to your home and lock your vehicles even when parked in the driveway, place a lock on a gated entrances will deter uninvited Individuals, ensure exterior lights are in good working condition and illuminating the intended area to increase visibility, install motion lights and additional lighting to increase visibility throughout your property as an inexpensive way to deter unwanted visitors. Replace the batteries in your exterior camera system and conduct an inspection of your current security system to help maintain your awareness and aid the police if our assistance is needed. If you have a current alarm system this would be an excellent time to update your alarm permit per Ch. 10 Sec. 49 Alarm System Fees. If you are considering installing a security system, you must obtain a permit with the city of Windcrest before installation per Ch. 10 Sec. 48 Alarm System Permit Required. Please review Ch.10 Sec 51 Duties of a Permit **Holder** if you are a current or new permit holder.

While you're shopping in our community, please remain vigilant by locking your car doors, removing items of value from view, parking in a well-lit area and checking your surroundings before exiting and entering your vehicles. Remember burglaries and thefts can happen during daylight hours, in plain view. As always stay safe, if you need any assistance or want to report a violation of the Windcrest City Code, please contact your Code Enforcement Officer via the Windcrest Police Department Dispatcher at 210-655-2666 or send me an email thru the link provided within code enforcement site located on my page.

TxWeACT would like to encourage residents to be fosters for either dogs or cats. Since our city does not have their own facility to house our stray population, we are in constant need of folks who would be willing to house a dog or cat for a period of time while the city looks for a new home for them. You get all the joy of loving on an animal without the long-term commitment of owning one. Let TxWeACT know or you can contact an animal control officer at City Hall.

### Facts about U.S. Animal Shelters:

The terms "humane society" and "SPCA" are generic, shelters using those names are not part of the ASPCA or The Humane Society of the United States. Currently, no government institution or animal organization is responsible for tabulating national statistics for the animal protection movement. These are national estimates, the figures may vary from state to state.

- Approximately 6.3 million companion animals enter U.S. animal shelters nationwide every year. Of those, approximately 3.1 million are dogs and 3.2 million are cats. We estimate that the number of dogs and cats entering U.S. shelters annually has declined from approximately 7.2 million in 2011. The biggest decline was in dogs (from 3.9 million to 3.1 million).
- Each year, approximately 920,000 shelter animals are euthanized (390,000 dogs and 530,000 cats). The number of dogs and cats euthanized in U.S. shelters annually has declined from approximately 2.6 million in 2011, This decline can be partially explained by an increase in the percentage of animals adopted and an increase in the number of stray animals successfully returned to their owners.
- Approximately 4.1 million shelter animals are adopted each year (2 million dogs and 2.1 million cats).
- Approximately 810,000 animals who enter shelters as strays are returned to their owners. Of those, 710,000 are dogs and 100,000 are cats.

These estimates are based in part on Shelter Animals Count data and other known and estimated sources, 2019.

# Windcrest Mayor Dan Reese "State of the City"

At the September 22nd meeting, Mayor Dan Reese delivered these comments:

"The State of the City" is strong and getting stronger. Even in the face of the COVID pandemic, sales tax revenues are up an average of 8% from last year. The tax rate has stayed the same over the last three years, and property values have increased. Within 5-10 years, 100% of the City's roads will have been

resurfaced or repaired, and we will be constructing a traffic light at the intersection of Crestway Dr. and Eagle Crest Blvd by September 2022. The City Council approved additional police officer positions and six career firefighters to supplement our great Volunteer Fire Department heroes. City staff, council, and citizen volunteers worked together to produce the updated 2021 Strategic Plan, and the Parks and Recreation Commission approved their 2021 Open Space Plan."

# **WEDC YEAR IN REVIEW**

The WEDC has had a whirlwind year during our Fiscal Year 2021 (ended in September 2021). We are celebrating one year at our new modern offices in the Global Windcrest Towers and still saved money compared to previous costs.

Walzem Partners 3, LLC is moving forward on developing a Chipotle restaurant featuring state of the art, "Chipotlane" where customers order through the app and have food delivered to their car. This business is projected to bring in \$30-\$40,000 in new sales tax revenue and approximately \$10,000 in property taxes for Windcrest annually.

A key focus for the Board has been on under-utilized real estate. As retail buildings have become vacant, WEDC focuses on finding a new use and new tenants. The old Walmart building along the access road was empty for many years, but we identified the Goodwill project due to our relationship with broker Jones Lang Lasalle. The building is now under new ownership, with renovations of over \$4 million currently in progress. It will bring 150 high-level jobs to Windcrest. Most importantly, we expect the project to help significantly with revitalizing that area along IH 35.

Another priority for this Board was to use the WEDC funds that had grown in reserves to improve our community. The Board committed to funding street projects as part of the City's Street improvement plan. We selected the segments that met the state law regarding economic development fund use and provided over \$750,000 in funding. The Board completed all street project payments to the city this year.

The Board has overhauled the organization by updating policies and procedures, including the Shared Services Agreement with the City, the Staff and Consultant evaluation process, job descriptions, and our records policy. The local Business Retention and Expansion (BRE) program is well-organized and remains a top priority. The tools are modern and hard-hitting, such as the website, social media, collateral material, and our online business list, which is our most popular tool.

We aggressively promote our tools, and this year, the Board approved four grants through our Store Front and Streetscape Program. This effective program encourages the redevelopment of existing buildings. The Board approved grants for Goodwill, Mrs. Kitchen, Professional Insurance Group LLC (Trutela Insurance), and FIT Tennis Academy. Approximately \$36,000 in grant funds leveraged millions of dollars in new investment in our community.

The Board is committed and involved, and attendance at our meetings is nearly 100%. No project or idea is out of bounds for consideration.

In March, Vice President George Alva volunteered to complete the Basic Economic Development Course (a one-week intensive course). President Jennifer Newman completed the Sales Tax for Economic Development training last month.

We believe the future is bright, and the WEDC can make a significant difference in our community and our citizens' quality of life.


