## HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, The celebration of National Women's History Month in 2 March 2009 provides a fitting opportunity to acknowledge the myriad 3 achievements and immeasurable contributions of American women; and WHEREAS, To raise awareness of women's history in the 4 5 traditional classroom curriculum as well as in the public 6 consciousness, an observance lasting a week began in the late 1970s; the movement spread to numerous cities and counties across 7 8 the country, and by 1987 the National Women's History Project had 9 petitioned Congress to expand the national celebration to the 10 entire month of March; the event continues today as a way of 11 ensuring that the history of women is duly recognized in schools, 12 workplaces, and communities throughout the United States; and

WHEREAS, In recent years, National Women's History Month has sparked a growing interest in rediscovering forgotten events and people that are noteworthy in the history of American women, and such groups as the President's Commission on the Celebration of Women in American History and the Women's Progress Commemorative 18 Commission have recommended programs for teaching women's history and have identified historical sites that are important for preservation; and

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21 WHEREAS, The theme for the 2009 observance of National Women's History Month is "Women Taking the Lead to Save Our Planet," 22 and it honors the individuals who are actively involved in the 23 environmental protection movement at local, state, and national 24
