



FOREWORD

The <u>Inventory of the County Archives of Texas</u> is one of a number of guides to historical materials prepared throughout the United States by workers on the Historical Records Survey Program of the Work Projects Administration. The publication herewith presented, an inventory of the archives of Gregg County, is number 92 of the Texas series.

The Historical Records Survey Program was undertaken in the winter of 1935-36 for the purpose of providing useful employment to needy unemployed historians, lawyers, teachers, and research and clerical workers. In carrying out this objective, the project was organized to compile inventories of historical materials, particularly the unpublished government documents and records which are basic in the administration of local government, and which provide invaluable data for students of political, economic, and social history. The archival guide herewith presented is intended to meet the requirements of day-to-day administration by the officials of the county, and also the needs of lawyers, businessmen and other citizens who require facts from the public records for the proper conduct of their affairs. The volume is so designed that it can be used by the historian in his research in the unprinted sources in the same way he uses the library card catalog for printed sources.

The inventories produced by the Historical Records Survey Program attempt to do more than give merely a list of records - they attempt further to sketch in the historical background of the county or other unit of government, and to describe precisely and in detail the organization and functions of the government agencies whose records they list. The county, town, and other local inventories for the entire country will, when completed, constitute an encyclopedia of local government as well as a bibliography of local archives.

The successful conclusion of the work of the Historical Records Survey Program, even in a single county, would not be possible without the support of public officials, historical and legal specialists, and many other groups in the community. Their cooperation is gratefully acknowledged.

The Survey Program was organized by Luther H. Evans, who served as Director until March 1, 1940, when he was succeeded by Sargent B. Child, who had been National Field Supervisor since the inauguration of the Survey. The Survey Program operates as a Nation-wide series of locally sponsored projects in the Division of Professional and Service Projects, of which Mrs. Florence Kerr, Assistant Commissioner, is in charge.

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PREFACE

The Texas Historical Records Survey is a unit of the Texas State-wide Records Project which is sponsored by the Bureau of Research in the Social Sciences of The University of Texas, and operates under the Research and Records Section of the Division of Professional and Service Projects of the Work Projects Administration.

The objective of the Survey in Texas is the preparation of complete inventories of the archives of each county, municipality, and other local governmental unit.

This publication, an inventory of the archives of Gregg County, includes, in addition to descriptive entries for each extant records series, a historical sketch of the county and a map of its past and present boundaries; an essay on the present governmental organization and records system, accompanied by a structural chart; a discussion of the conditions under which the records are preserved, accompanied by floor plans of the courthouse; a section devoted to abbreviations and symbols; and a brief statement of the legal status of each office and agency, prefatory to the listing of its records.

The Survey is now engaged in preparing a comprehensive statement of the general law regulating county government, to be entitled County Government in Texas. It is expected that this book will serve as a handbook on the organization, structure, and evolution of county government and records in Texas, and will make it unnecessary to repeat in each inventory information applicable to all counties in the State. The office essays in this inventory are, therefore, limited to the creation of the office and its present status, the manner in which it is filled, the term, and special legislation affecting Gregg County. Pending issuance of the volume on County Government in Texas, it is suggested that the reader consult the County Inventory of Texas, No. 94, Guadalupe County, for more detailed essays than those found in the present inventory.

The Inventory of the County Archives of Texas will, when completed, consist of a separate volume for each county of the State. Each unit of the series is numbered according to the particular county's respective position in the alphabetical list of the 254 counties. Thus, the volume for Gregg County, herewith presented, is No. 92. Units of the Inventory are issued in mimeographed form for free distribution to State and local public officials, public libraries in Texas, and to a limited number of libraries and governmental agencies outside the State. See page 179, this inventory, for a list of the publications of the Texas Historical Records Survey Project.

The records of Gregg County were listed in March 1937, and a verification check was made in April 1940. The volume was compiled and edited in the State office of the Texas Historical Records Survey Project.

The courteous cooperation of the Gregg County officials, for whom this work was done, is acknowledged.

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1. HISTORICAL SKETCH

Gregg County, with Longview the county seat, is in the upper East Texas timbered region. The surface is a rolling to hilly wooded plain, with sandy clay soils predominating except in the river bottoms, where there is alluvial soil. Shortleaf pine, gum, hickory, and oak timbers are found; and there are deposits of oil and gas, lignite, iron ore, and clay. Gregg County is bounded by Upshur County on the north, Harrison on the east, Rusk on the south, and Smith on the west. The Sabine River flows diagonally from west to east across the center of the county and forms a portion of its northeastern boundary. Little Cypress Creek marks part of the western boundary, and Cherokee Bayou a portion of the southern.

The early history of the territory now comprising Gregg County is the history of the various Indian tribes of the region. The group of Indians which inhabited the vicinity of present Gregg County was known as the Hasanai Confederacy, or as the Tejas Indians. These Indians, whose villages were scattered throughout the territory between the Neches and Sabine Rivers, were not markedly hostile to the Spanish or, later, to the Anglo-American settlers. The Spaniards called the Indians and the land they occupied by the single name Tejas. Gradually, this name came to be applied to the entire State.

By the time the Anglo-Americans began to enter Texas in great numbers, about 1825, East Texas was inhabited by many other tribes of Indians, among which were the Shawnees, Kickapoos, Delawares, and Cherokees. These tribes, some of which were hostile toward the whites, had slowly filtered into Texas from their original homes in the United States.

The Cherokees had been moving farther and farther west over a period of years, their migrations always leading to trouble, either with the aboriginal Indians whose lands they appropriated, or with the white people, who refused to see fertile lands closed to Anglo-American settlers by the presence of the Indians. Domination of the Anglo-American, not friction with other Indian tribes, had forced this series of migrations. 3

With such a history, the first group of Cherokees, numbering 60 warriors, crossed the Sabine into the Spanish province of Texas in the winter of 1819-20; others came later. Soon after their arrival in Texas, the Cherokees began to petition the Spanish Government for title to the land between the Trinity and Sabine Rivers, north of the San Antonio-Nacogdoches road. After the Mexican Revolution of 1821 they continued to press their claims at Mexico City. But again they were faced with the problem of the Anglo-American. The land claimed by the Cherokees was granted in 1825 to Frost Thorn, an American, under an empresario contract. Adjoining lands had been granted to Hayden Edwards, also an American empresario. The Indians, however, neither gave up their claims. nor left the lands; and, since Edwards and Thorn both failed as colonizers, the Cherokees remained for a time comparatively undisturbed, still trying to substantiate their claims to the lands they occupied. When the Texas Revolution started, the Texans promised the Cherokees title to their lands if they would either remain neutral during the ensuing war, or help the colonists against the Mexican forces. They remained neutral; but when the war was over, the promised title was not forthcoming. Instead, when Mirabeau B. Lamar became President of the new republic, he decreed their expulsion. The Cherokee Trace, later to become one of the most important routes across Gregg County, was the path of the fleeing Indians. It crossed Gregg County territory near the present site of Longview. 4

Almost colliding with the Cherokees as they left were hundreds of land-hungry Anglo-Americans, rushing in to take possession of the upper East Texas region the Indians had vacated.

The first white man to set foot in East Texas, according to Jose Maria Sanchez, nineteenth century diarist, was Lucas Vasquez de Allon, who explored the Sabine in 1520, marched across the entire province, and died at the hands of the Indians in 1524. But, as the records indicate, Allon was not the forerunner of any large movement of white settlers into upper East Texas, for neither the Spaniards nor the Mexicans settled the region to any considerable degree. It is assumed that the country was unattractive to them, or that the Indians who constituted an effective block to Anglo-American penetration had affected the Spaniards and

Mexicans in like manner. The Latin-Americans, at any rate, were content to allow Nacogdoches to remain their northern outpost in East Texas.

By 1825-30, however, there were a few white settlers in the neighborhood of present Gregg County. Frost Thorn's grant in East Texas included at least the western half of the land now comprised in Gregg County, and he must have introduced a few families into the region before he lost his contract. In 1828 Sanchez recorded in his diary that most of the settlers in East Texas were either Anglo-Americans from the North, or Cherokees, living on lands granted to Frost Thorn.

Sanchez, who wrote his diary as he traveled, recorded his impression of East Texas; and if his description is to be taken as an index to his feelings on the matter, he was not surprised to find few settlers in the region:

The abundance of water makes all of Texas very beautiful, especially in the western part, for although a corresponding beauty is found on the east in its vast and majestic woods, ' this is marred during the most beautiful seasons of the year by the terrible floods caused by the rivers which form horrible marshes and lakes where immense numbers of mosquitoes, ticks, red bugs, gnats, gadflies, etc., breed. They are a pest both day and night, and although they disappear in the winter, the furious northwest winds and the heavy snows allow one to enjoy only fields covered with leafless trees. Valuable woods are found in great abundance and they are used to build houses because there is no stone anywhere. The immense woods, where the sun barely penetrates, consist of oaks of all kinds, pines, sabines, laurel trees, walnuts, plum trees, sugar maples, sasafras, lilac trees, mulberries, and weeping willows. Here only the murmur of the wind as it sways the tree tops, the babbling of the rivulets as they glide along the old tree trunks, the singing of wild birds; and the wailing of the small owls that hoot even at midday, attract the attention of the traveler with their melancholy and unnatural melody. In all the unfrequented places wild bulls and cows, deer, bears, coyotes, wolves, and donkeys are found, all of which flee at the approach of man. 10

By 1835 a few more settlers were venturing north of Nacogdoches, the following persons securing titles in that year to lands in what is now Gregg County: John Walling, Dinsmore Simpson, Francisco Castro, John Matthews, Frost Thorn (who had lost his empresario contract in 1833), Henry Hoover, Eleanor Bradley, Amos Stephens, and Isaac Lee. 11

Prior to the Texas Revolution, present Gregg County was included in the municipality of Nacogdoches. 12 Following the revolution, it fell partly within the limits of Harrison County and partly in Nacogdoches. Later, it was included in Rusk and Upshur Counties. 13 However, despite the fact that present Gregg County was always included in some organized political subdivision, it was not settled to any important extent until the forties, and not extensively until just before its organization as a separate county in 1873.14

Among the earliest families to settle in what is now Gregg County were the Castleberrys, Roddens, Calloways, Harrises, Whites, Pegues; Wyches, Mitchells, Blackburns, Arps, Welborns, Johnsons, Phillipses, Kilgores, and Irwins. Other early families were Sampleses, Killingsworths, and Browns. 15 Some of the first settlements were Camden, Peatown, Danville, and Fredonia, south of the Sabine; Arpville, Killingsworth Community. Pine Tree, and Bethel, north of the river. 16

For years the country was almost entirely an agricultural region. Although the plantation system was established, most of the farms were small ones operated by their owners. Trade with other communities was overland by freight wagons, for the most part, but some cotton was rafted down the Sabine from Camden and Fredonia.17

As the countryside gradually came to be dotted with farms and small villages, the settlers began to attend to the subject of schools and churches for their families. The first school in what is now Gregg County was established at the Killingsworth place about 1850. It was located between Judson and Spring Hill. Shortly afterward, a school was erected in the Pine Tree settlement. This building, still standing, is the oldest in the county. Other early schools were located at Danville and Peatown. Peatown soon came to be noted for its schools and lodges, and as a trading center. During the fifties, the Looney school was established near present Ore City, and, though it was later moved to Gilmer, it continued to be one of the leading schools of the region for many years. 18

The first church of which we have record was established in the Pine Tree community in 1858.19 Most religious services must have been held in private homes or in school buildings, for no records of other early churches in the neighborhood have been found. In 1871 the Methodists built a church in Longview, and in 1873 the Baptists followed their example.20

As new settlers came they naturally followed the well-marked trails, which gradually became important roads through the region. The old Cherokee Trace became a military route from South Texas to Fort Towson on the Red River. Trammel's Trace and the old Caddo Trail also became important roads, as did the Jonesboro Road, established in 1838.

In 1860, on the eve of the Civil War, present Gregg County was still largely an agricultural region. Though there were many more settlers than there had been when Sanchez wrote, and though farms and tiny settlements were sprinkled liberally over the countryside, the neighborhood had changed little since he described it in 1828. After picturing the country as being a continuous forest, with only seven houses between the present sites of Longview and Gladowater, and the same number between Gilmer and the Sabine, an old settler continues as follows:

You could scarcely ride a half dozen miles without disturbing a bunch of deer or turkeys. A vast forest with here and there a little farm. Except Gilmer, there was not a place between Quitman and Marshall that deserved the appellation of village. 22

During the Civil War, the territory now in Gregg County was still included in Rusk and Upshur Counties. Many residents of the region served in the Confederate Army. 23

The Civil War and Reconstruction failed to affect the agricultural countryside and its little villages to any appreciable degree. But in 1871 the Texas and Pacific Railway crossed the Louisiana boundary and entered the territory which is now Gregg County. This was one of the most significant events in the history of East Texas. In 1872, rivaling the mushroom, Longview sprang up. In the same year the railroad continued westward, and Gladewater came into existence. 24

In 1873 the International Railroad, which had started in Robertson County in 1870, reached Longview and continued south to the present site of Kilgore, which came into being while the road was under construction. Thus, in the space of 2 years the region around Longview became one of the most important railroad centers in East Texas, and Longview itself the junction point of two systems which were later extended to the extreme limits of the State on the west and south. 25

The influx of population at the junction of the two railroads gave rise to a movement for the creation of a new county. Colonel B. W. Brown, son of Hitson Brown, one of the early settlers, supported the bill for that purpose in the legislature. 26 An act to create, organize, and define Gregg County was passed on April 12, 1873. The act named the county in "honor of the late General John Gregg."27 According to sworn statements. Colonel Brown named the county for John Gregg, a distinguished lawyer, statesman, and soldier. A member of the Confederate Congress, he became colonel of the Seventh Texas Infantry, was commissioned by President Jefferson Davis, and joined the army in Nacogdoches. He'became a brigadier general, before he died in battle near Fort Harrison, Virginia, on October 7, 1864. 28

The act creating Gregg County appointed John F. Witherspoon, T. A. Harris, William Wilburn, Solomon Awalt, Britton Buttrill, John Page, and

H. G. Williams commissioners to organize the county and to hold an election for county officers and for the selection of a county seat.²⁹

The first election held in Gregg County lasted 4 days, and the following officers, among others, were elected: John F. Witherspoon, county judge; Richard B. Levy, district clerk; and M. L. Durham, sheriff.30

Longview and Awalt (now Greegton) were rival candidates for the county seat. The fact that Longview was the choice carries with it an interesting story. When the town was first laid out, a Texas Pacific engineer remarked that it should be named Longview because of the marvelous view from the hill on which it was to be located. O. H. Methvin, who cwned the hill, offered to donate to the railroad 100 acres of land if the name were chosen. The railroad accepted the land, and the town was named Longview. When the question of a seat of government for Gregg County came to a vote, the railroad's agent wrote Methvin that his company would donate land for a courthouse site in Longview if that town were chosen. This information no doubt influenced the vote. 32

On July 21, 1873, the first term of the county court in Gregg County was held at the chosen county seat. T. D. Campbell was the presiding justice, and Justices J. W. Laurence and J. M. Sparkman were present, as were R. B. Levy, clerk, and M. L. Durham, sheriff. At this session, the court received a bond of certain citizens of Longview to furnish a building suitable for use as a courthouse until permanent quarters could be built. James P. Holloway was appointed to confer with the agent of the Texas and Pacific Railroad at Marshall, concerning a donation of land for a courthouse site. The agent, G. F. Maxer, offered block 9, except lot 8, in Longview. The offer was accepted by the county. Temporarily, court was held in a building situated on lot 1, block 14, on Central Street. Later, the court contracted to rent the second floor of Northcutt & Whaley's hardware store. The reason for the change was that the first building had been declared unsafe as a storage place for public records. 34

On February 11, 1878, plans for a courthouse were tentatively approved. When certain alterations had been made, the plans, prepared by Preston and Ruffini, of Austin, were finally accepted. John McDonald

was awarded the construction contract at \$13,477. 35 On January 16, 1879, the courthouse was formally accepted by the court. 36

With the building of its first courthouse, Gregg County inaugurated a period of progress. By 1882 a third railroad, the Longview and Sabine Valley, passed through the county seat and extended south to Panola County. The 1873 the Alexander Institute was established in Kilgore, and many smaller schools were opened in rural sections of the county. 38

In 1896 the business of the county made it necessary to replace the first courthouse with a new and larger one. The second building was constructed in that year on the site of the old one. 39

Gregg County played no outstanding part in the World War. Almost immediately after the war, in 1919, McFarland, Smith & Glover, of Oklahoma City, among the first to search for new oil fields in Texas, began leasing land in Rusk County. Except for a few acres, the leases they secured were taken to their home city and sold to speculators who did not intend to drill wells. Columbus Marion Joiner, now known as "Dad" Joiner, bought a few of these leases when they were offered for sale in Oklahoma City, and later leased several thousand additional acres. He did not begin to drill, however, until 1925. Joiner drilled three wells before he was successful in bringing in oil in September 1930. 40

Drilling started at once in Gregg County. In Kilgore, 12 miles north of Joiner's activities, the Crim family leased 2,000 acres of farm land to Ed Bateman, who began drilling at once, and in December 1930 brought in a well, the first of many in Gregg County. Within 3 years, 120,000 acres of producing oil sands, approximately 55 miles long and 3 to 9 miles wide, were developed.41

This discovery of oil among the pine trees of East Texas precipitated one of the most frenzied and sustained oil booms that Texas, accustomed to wild and feverish oil development, has yet seen. The very high percentage of producers, out of wells drilled, proved a territory larger than any in the world. Kilgore, at the beginning of the boom, was a tiny

village of 8 storos, 1 cafe, and a motion picture show; within 3 months it had become an incorporated town of over 250 business enterprises. 42 From a small, quiet, countryside village it became almost overnight a place of roaring activity. Its population increased so rapidly that no count could be taken. Producing wells on town site lots made the town a forest of derricks. Nation-wide attention has since been called to this town many times as gushers blew in, caught on fire, and became a menace to the entire city. The same story applies to Gladewater. These two towns, brought suddenly into existence by a railroad-building beom, were as suddenly made into cities by an oil boom. Longview, beyond proven territory and not subject to town site drilling, has a population of approximately 25,000, and is a modern municipality with tall new buildings, paved streets, and beautiful residences. Now the center of oil field supply and equipment industries, it still is the queen city of the county as in the old railroad-building days.

A population chart of Gregg County shows a steady increase from 8,530 in 1880 to 15,778 in 1930. It has been estimated that by 1936 the population totaled about 70,000, and a further increase will be shown in the 1940 Federal census.

Explanation of Map

The act of the legislature creating Gregg County from Upshur County described the boundaries of the new county as follows:

Beginning at the south east corner of Upshur county in the center of Sabine river, thence north to Little Cypress, thence up said Cypress to the mouth of Glade creek, thence up said creek to the road running from Marshall to Gilmer, thence direct to the corner of Rusk and Smith counties on the Sabine river, thence down said river with its meandering to the place of beginning, containing four hundred and twenty square miles; provided, the line of said new county shall not approach nearer than twelve miles of Gilmer. 1

By this act Gregg County included only that portion of her present territory which lies north of the Sabine River. Almost exactly a year after the act of creation, Gregg County was enlarged by the addition of territory south of the Sabine. The new southern boundary was described as follows:


beginning at the south-west corner of the present county of Gregg, and continuing the western boundary line, of said county southward, on the boundary line between the counties of Smith and Rusk, to a point due west from a stake fifteen miles due north from the center of the public square of the town of Henderson, in the county of Rusk; thence due east to said point; thence to a point on the Cherochee bayou, where the road leading from Camden to Henderson crosses said stream; thence north-east by a straight line to the town of Camden, on the Sabine river; thence up said river with its meanderings to the place of beginning. 2


This change is the only one ever specifically authorized by the State Legislature, yet the act of creation itself was phrased in such manner as to necessitate a minor alteration in the Gregg-Upshur line. When this line was surveyed in August 1882, the surveyors reported that the line from the Marshall-Gilmer road to the corner of Rusk and Smith Counties ran within twelve miles of Gilmer; consequently, the line was deflected slightly to the southeast, giving rise to the present angle in the Upshur-Gregg line. Since 1882 the boundaries have remained unchanged.

2. GOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATION AND RECORDS SYSTEM

A. Legal Status and Organization of the County

The Texas county is a political or civil subdivision of the State. It is created to aid, as the agent of the State, in the enforcement and administration of laws, powers, and policies common to the whole State, as contra-distinguished from those of local or municipal concern. In performing State political and governmental functions, the county acts as an integral part of the State and has no existence or sovereignty apart from the State.

But, in order that it may properly perform State functions, a county must acquire and own property, make contracts, incur and discharge debts, and must sometimes sue and be sued; in these matters, it acts in its corporate capacity, and is an entity distinct from the State. It is, therefore, usually classed as a quasi-public corporation. Counties in Texas are made bodies corporate by statute.

The power to create counties is vested in the legislature subject to constitutional limitations as to area and shape, but since the act of creation only gives a name to the county and establishes its boundaries, a county can have no real existence until it is organized. An organized county is one having officers and other agencies for the performance of its functions and for the management of its corporate business independently of any other county.

Gregg County, organized in 1873 by commissioners appointed by the legislature, 7 is, in the general structure of its organization, typical of the Texas county.

Administrative powers of the county are vested in the county commissioners court, which is composed of the county judge and four county commissioners.8 The county clerk is clerk of the court.9 The sheriff of the county is the process officer of the court. 10

The trial courts within the county are the district courts, 11 the county court. 12 and the justice of peace courts. 13

Gregg County has three district courts. They are the district courts of the 71st 14 and 124th 15 districts, and a special district court for the county, 16 which is to expire by limitation January 25, 1943. 17 Each court is presided over by a district judge. 18 One district clerk serves all three courts. 19 The criminal district attorney of the 124th district court has all the duties of district attorney, as well as those of criminal district attorney, and serves all three courts in both capacities. 20 The sheriff of the county is also an officer of each of the courts. 21 Gregg County is in the first administrative judicial district. 22

Gregg County has one county court. Its officers are the county judge, 23 county clerk, 24 sheriff, 25 and the criminal district attorney of the 124th district court, who acts as county attorney. 26

By constitutional provision, each county must be divided into justice precincts--not more than eight nor fewer than four--with a justice of the peace and a constable serving in each. 27 At the last general





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election, in 1938, seven constables and seven justices of the peace were elected in Gregg County. 28

The county clerk serves the county as recorder. 29

The county commissioners court is the tax levy court of the county. 30 It is also the board of tax equalization. 31

Besides those already mentioned, county officers and boards in Gregg County are: The tax assessor-collector; ³² the county treasurer; ³³ the county auditor; ³⁴ the county surveyor; ⁵⁵ the county board of school trustees, composed of five members; ³⁶ the county board of school examiners, composed of two members; ³⁷ the county school superintendent; ³⁸ the county health officer; ³⁹ and the board of managers of the county hospital, the Gregg Memorial Hospital. ⁴⁰

A county officer is so called because he is limited in the exercise of his official powers to the boundaries of the county, but when the character of his office, rather than the territorial extent of his powers, is considered, he is classed as a State officer, for his office is created by State laws and, within the county, he performs functions for the State. 41 He is not, however, considered to be or ever referred to as an officer of the State government; that designation is applied only to an officer who immediately belongs to one of the three constituent branches of the State government and whose powers are coextensive with the limits of the State. 42

B. State Political and Governmental Functions Performed by the County

Among the chief political and governmental functions performed by the State through the county are those that have to do with the calling and the conducting of elections; the levy, assessment, and collection of taxes; the administration of justice; the registration of instruments affecting property titles; the operation of the common free school system; the construction and maintenance of public roads and other public works; and the promotion of social welfare.

(1). Elections

Elections in Texas are of two general kinds: Governmental elections, and primary elections. 43 Since primary elections 44 are essentially party elections, in which county officials participate to a limited extent only, they are not here discussed.

Governmental elections are of two kinds: General and special. A general election is one to fill the offices of incumbents after the full expiration of their terms, and recurs at stated intervals. A special election is one that occurs only when some special occasion or necessity for it arises. Elections for filling unexpired terms of office, or for determining governmental questions are special elections. 45

In Texas, suffrage is extended to every United States citizen who has reached the age of 21 years, has resided in the State for 1 year and 6 months in the county or other election district, has paid his poll tax before the first day of February preceding the election or is exempt from payment of poll taxes, and who is not included in the following exceptions: Idiots and lunatics; felons; soldiers, marines, and seamen of the United States Army or Navy; and paupers supported by the county. If, however, the election involves the expenditure of public money or the creation of public liability, the voter must, in addition, be a property tax payer and must have rendered his property for taxation. 46

Statutes fix the time for the biennial State-wide election, provide for the calling of special elections by designated officers or boards, provide that all elections shall be held for one day only, fix the hours during which the polls must remain open, 47 provide for the division of

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the county into election precincts by the commissioners court, ⁴⁸ and provide for the appointment by the court of election officers in each precinct. ⁴⁹

The constitution provides that voting shall be by ballot. ⁵⁰ Statutes prescribe the form of ballots, both with respect to the printing of candidates' names and the presentation of governmental questions for determination. ⁵¹ The rights of party nominees and of non-partisan or independent candidates to have their names printed upon ballots are likewise subjects of statutory provisions. ⁵² The printed official ballots are furnished to the election officers by the county judge, the county clerk, and the sheriff, who are constituted a county board charged with the duty of furnishing election supplies ⁵³ at county expense. ⁵⁴

Except in the case of absentee voting, 55 a voter must appear at the polling place within the precinct of his residence, during the hours when the polls are open on election day, and offer his vote in person. 56

A voter is excused from presenting his poll tax receipt or certificate of exemption only in the cases specified by the statutes.⁵⁷ When the election judges have determined the voter's qualifications, they give him one of the official ballots, endorsed with the signature of the presiding judge of the election.⁵⁸

In marking his ballot, the voter in Texas expresses his choice by a process of elimination. He "scratches" the names of all candidates except those for whom he desires to vote. If, however, the voter wishes to vote for a person not named on the ballot, he may write the name in the blank space provided for the purpose. The voter in marking his ballot is protected by voting booths, guard rails, and other devices designed to guarantee secrecy of the ballot. 60

Election judges may assist a voter in marking his ballot, if he has physical infirmities, or is over 60 years of age and unable to read and write, but must not suggest "by word or sign or gesture, how such voter shall vote. "61

The voter's marked ballot is returned to the election judges, and if they are satisfied from an inspection of the signature endorsed on it that it is the official ballot furnished the voter, 62 it is deposited in the ballot box. 63 One of the election officers then places the letter "V"64 opposite the name of the voter on the list of qualified voters.65 This list, arranged alphabetically and by precincts, contains the names of persons who have paid the poll tax or have been issued exemption certificates. It is compiled annually in each county by the tax assessorcollector, and furnished to the election officials together with the blank ballots by the election supply board. 66

The election judges must count the ballots and, within 72 hours after the closing of the polls, must make a return of the election results in their respective precincts, showing the number of votes cast for each candidate and issue voted upon. The return is made in triplicate. One copy is lodged with the county judge; another with the county clerk; and the third is retained by the presiding judge of election.67 The election returns from all the precincts are tabulated by the commissioners gourt to determine the results of the election throughout the county. Within 48 hours after the returns have been thus canvassed by the court, the results of the election must be reported to the Secretary of State by the county judge. 69

The canvass of election results made by the commissioners court is the county judge's authority for the issuance of certificates of election to successful candidates for county and precinct offices. 70 The certificate of election is evidence of the holder's right of office unless and until it is invalidated through election contest or judicial proceedings.71

The election results from all the counties of the State are com-. piled by officers of the State government to determine the results of. the election for State and National officers and for the adoption or rejection of constitutional amendments. 72

. Taxation Agree 4 (2). Taxation

In Texas, taxes levied for State purposes are of five general kinds: Ad valorem taxes, occupation taxes, poll taxes, 73 inheritance taxes, 74 and franchise taxes. 75 Ad valorem taxes are of two kinds: Those levied upon physical properties, 76 and those levied upon intangible assets. 77 Occupation taxes are also of two kinds: Direct occupation taxes, fixed by statute at invariable rates; 78 and those determined in amount by taking certain statutory percentages of gross receipts or gross production. 79

Ad valorem taxes, direct occupation taxes, poll taxes, and inheritance taxes are all collected for the State by county officers within their respective counties. 80 Gross receipt and gross production occupation taxes and franchise taxes are paid directly to officers of the State government, 81 and are, therefore, not here discussed.

Taxes levied for county revenue purposes are ad valorem taxes on both physical property and intangible assets, direct occupation taxes, and poll taxes.82

In the raising of revenue through taxation, there are, in general, three procedural steps: Levy, assessment, collection.

State ad valorem taxes on both physical properties and intangibles are levied at rates fixed by a State board composed of the Governor, the State Comptroller, and the State Treasurer, 83 and those for county purposes at rates fixed by the commissioners court. 84 In fixing rates, the State board and the commissioners court are controlled by constitutional and statutory provisions that establish maximum rates. 85 Occupation taxes for county purposes, 86 and poll taxes for both State and

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county purposes⁸⁷ are levied at rates fixed or prescribed by statutes. Inheritance taxes are levied at rates determined by the application of a statutory scale of rates graduated in accordance with fixed units of value into which the total appraised value of the property taxed is divided; the rate increases with every unit of the base.⁸⁸

The assessment of property for taxes involves an official listing of persons and property subject to the tax, and an official valuation of the items of property listed. 89 Poll taxes, whether levied for State or county purposes, 90 and county occupation taxes 91 are collected without assessment.

In the case of ad valorem taxes levied upon intangible assets, both the county assessor-collector and the State intangible tax board enter into the assessing procedure. The State board, composed of the State Comptroller, the Secretary of State, and the Attorney General, determines the total value of all intangible assets in the State subject to the tax and apportions the amount to the counties entitled to share in it. The assessor-collector then enters upon the tax rolls a list of all taxable intangibles in the county, as shown by the State board's findings, and at the value fixed by the board. He then prorates the taxes between State and county. 92

The procedure in assessing inheritance taxes may take either one of two courses: The judge of the county court having jurisdiction of the estate to be taxed is authorized, subject to the approval of the State Comptroller, to appoint two appraisers to determine the value of the taxable property of the estate; or, if the appointment of appraisers is waived by the interested parties, the county judge and the Comptroller may make the appraisement.93 In either event, the county judge calculates the tax due on the property involved, in accordance with its appraised value and the statutory scale of rates. When his calculations have been approved by the Comptroller, the assessment is complete, without action upon the part of the assessor-collector.94

The assessor-collector is the assessing officer in the case of State and county ad valorem taxes levied upon physical properties within the county. 95

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All taxable property within the county must be assessed. Taxable property is all property not expressly exempted by law. 96 The constitution, and statutes enacted in pursuance thereof, specify the kinds and classes of exempt property and limit the extent of allowable exemptions. 97 While property owners are required to render their property for assessment, the assessor-collector must list all property, whether rendered or not. 98

Subject to the approval of the board of equalization, the assessor-collector determines the value of, and the amount of the tax due upon each item of property listed. 99 When the equalization board has approved the lists of taxable property, the assessor-collector prepares the tax roll and makes three exact copies; he sends one copy to the State Comptroller, another to the county clerk for the inspection of the public, and retains one as his authority for proceeding with the collection of taxes as levied and assessed. 1

As a rule, the collection of taxes begins annually on the first day of October. Taxes are payable on or before the last day in December of the year for which they are assessed; but, if one-half of the tax is paid on or before November 30 of the assessment year, the remaining half may be paid on or before June 30 of the following year.4

By virtue of assessment, the State and its subdivisions acquire liens upon all property upon the rolls to secure the payment of their respective taxes. Statutes provide for the seizure and summary sale by the assessor-collector of the personal property of delinquent tax-payers, but lands may be sold only under the decree of the district court after foreclosure of the tax lien. Constitutional and statutory provisions prescribe the terms upon which lands may be redeemed, after sale for delinquent taxes.

The assessor-collector is required to make disbursement of moneys received by him from taxes to accountable officers and depositories.9 Provision is likewise made for the final settlement of his accounts with the State Comptroller. 10

County officers also serve the State in raising revenue through taxation, in some other of its subdivisions, such as common school districts, 11 road bond districts, 12 some independent school districts, 13 and some improvement districts. 14

(3). Administration of Justice

In order that justice may be conveniently administered, trial courts are established within the counties and are invested by the constitution and laws with authority and power to determine causes of action between parties and to carry their judgments into effect. According to the Texas Supreme Court, this authority or power is what is meant by the term jurisdiction as applied to a court. 15

A court thus established within a county usually derives its name from the particular subdivision with whose territorial limits its jurisdiction is coextensive; the district court is so called because its jurisdiction is coextensive with the limits of the judicial district which it serves; the county court, because its jurisdiction is coextensive with the limits of the county; and the justice of the peace court, because its jurisdiction is confined to the limits of the justice precinct. But all such courts are nevertheless State courts, because they are created to administer justice in accordance with State laws; they are established within the counties to bring them close to the people. 16

Original Jurisdiction - Civil

The district courts have original exclusive jurisdiction in: 1) Suits in behalf of the State to recover penalties, forfeitures, and escheats; 2) cases of divorce and dissolution of marriage; 3) suits to recover damages for slander or defamation of character; 4) suits for the trial of title to land and for the enforcement of liens thereon, 17 including suits to foreclose tax liens; 18 5) suits for the trial of the

right of property levied upon by virtue of any writ of execution, sequestration, or attachment, when the property levied on shall be equal to or exceed \$500 in value; 6) contested elections; 19 7) proceedings wherein it is sought to have a child adjudged to be a dependent or neglected child; 20 8) adoption proceedings; 21 9) suits for the partition of real estate between joint owners or claimants; 22 10) suits, complaints, or pleas, without regard to any distinction between law and equity, when the matter in controversy, exclusive of interest, shall be valued at more than \$1,000; 23 and 11) all causes of action with respect to which there are no provisions of the constitution or laws providing the forum of jurisdiction. 24

The original jurisdiction of the district courts is concurrent with that of the county courts in all civil actions and proceedings when the matter in controversy exceeds \$500 and does not exceed \$1,000, exclusive of interest, except those over which the jurisdiction of one or the other of these courts is exclusive. 25

The district courts have jurisdiction to naturalize aliens under Federal laws. Since 1906 they have been the only State courts in Texas having jurisdiction in such cases. Formerly, the county courts were also vested with jurisdiction in naturalization cases. 26

The county court²⁷ has exclusive original civil jurisdiction of:

1) Probate matters; ²⁸ 2) apprenticeships; ²⁹ 3) suits brought under the general condemnation statute regulating the exercise of the power of eminent domain; ³⁰ and 4) all cases when the matter in controversy exceeds \$200 in value, but does not exceed \$500, exclusive of interest. ³¹ The

concurrent jurisdiction of the county and district courts has already been stated.

County judges conduct lunacy hearings. 32 Acts establishing State hospitals for epileptics, 33 tuberculosis victims, 34 and cancer and pellagra victims 55 have conferred upon county judges power to pass upon applications of persons seeking admission to these institutions. County judges are also empowered to pass upon applications for beer licenses. 36

Justices of the peace have original civil jurisdiction of forcible entry and detainer cases, and of all cases when the amount in controversy, exclusive of interest, is \$200 or less, except in cases of which the district and county courts are given exclusive cognizance.³⁷

Original Jurisdiction - Criminal

In a county having no criminal district court, like Gregg County, the district court has exclusive original jurisdiction in all criminal cases of the grade of felony, and in all misdemeanors involving official misconduct. 38 In cases in which it is sought to have a child adjudged to be a delinquent child, the jurisdiction of the district court is concurrent with that of the county court. 39

The county court has original jurisdiction of all misdemeanors, when the fine to be imposed exceeds \$200, except those involving official misconduct. 40 When the fine to be imposed exceeds \$200, its jurisdiction is exclusive, 41 but in misdemeanors cognizable by justices of the peace, its jurisdiction is concurrent with that of the justice courts, 42 and in cases of juvenile delinquency its jurisdiction, as already stated, is concurrent with that of the district courts. 43

Justices of the peace have jurisdiction in criminal cases, concurrent with the county courts, when the fine to be imposed does not exceed \$200. 44 They also have power to punish any party guilty of a contempt by fine not to exceed \$25, or by imprisonment not to exceed 1 day. 45

Appellate Jurisdiction - Civil

The district court has appellate jurisdiction and supervisory control over the county commissioners court, but its appellate jurisdiction over trial courts extends to probate matters only. 46 The county court has appellate jurisdiction in civil cases over which the justices of the peace have original jurisdiction, when the judgment appealed from or the amount in controversy exceeds \$20, exclusive of costs. 47

Generally, appeals in civil cases lie from the county and district courts, when the amount in controversy or the judgment rendered exceeds \$100, exclusive of interest and costs, to the Court of Civil Appeals of the supreme judicial district in which the county is situate. 48 Under the conditions and in the instances specified by constitutional and statutory provisions, cases may be taken by writ of error from the Courts of Civil Appeals to the Supreme Court. The jurisdiction of the Supreme Court extends to questions of law only. 49

Appellate Jurisdiction - Criminal

The county court has appellate jurisdiction in all criminal cases of which justice courts and other inferior courts, such as corporation courts, have original jurisdiction. 50

Appeals in criminal cases originating in the district courts and in the county courts lie to the Court of Criminal Appeals. Cases brought to the county courts on appeal may be further appealed to the Court of Criminal Appeals only if the fine imposed by the county court amounts to \$100 or more; otherwise the decision of the county court is final. 51

(4). Registration of Instruments Affecting Title to Property

Under the registration laws, instruments involving titles to property are recorded. As with other recordings, the preservation of the instruments as evidence is a purpose of these recordings, but there is an additional purpose: That of giving notice and full information of the transactions with which the instruments are concerned by placing their contents within the reach of the public.

Instruments within the contemplation of the registration laws are void as to all creditors and subsequent purchasers for a valuable consideration without actual notice unless they are acknowledged or proved and filed with the county clerk for record. 52

The main body of the registration laws enacted by the first legislature, 53 together with some earlier acts and a number of supplemental and amendatory acts, is the law in force today. 54 The statutes prescribe the formalities involved in the execution and proof of instruments to be observed in order to entitle them to record, 55 the method of recordation, 56 and the books and indexes which are to be kept. 57 They also describe the general nature of the instruments, and specifically mention some of them. 58

County clerks are required to keep a book in which shall be entered in alphabetical order all instruments in proper form deposited with them for record, with a notation of the day and hour of the deposit of the instrument. ⁵⁹ This book, usually labeled "Register of Instruments Filed for Record," ⁶⁰ is used to determine the order of priority in the filing of instruments and the order in which they are to be entered in the record books. ⁶¹ An instrument is deemed to be recorded from the time it is deposited for record. ⁶²

Instruments executed since August 22, 1897, must be in English. To be entitled to record, those in foreign languages executed prior to that date must be accompanied by correct and properly authenticated translations; the translations must be recorded with the instruments. 63

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With some exceptions, such as chattel mortgages, 64 instruments recorded under the registration statutes, together with the acknowledgments, proofs, affidavits, and certificates thereto attached, must be recorded "word for word and letter for letter," 65 in the office of the county clerk of the county where the property is situate, and in well-bound books kept for that purpose. 66

(5). Public Free School System

School Funds

The State permanent school fund, established through appropriations of lands from the public domain, 67 stands today at over \$72,000,000. 68 The principal of the fund, invested under the direction of the State Board of Education, is set apart by the constitution as a permanent endowment for the benefit of the public free schools; only the income flowing from it may be expended for the operation of schools from year to year. 69 The term "permanent school fund" and its synonymous terms "perpetual school fund" and "general school fund" are used to contradistinguish the invested principal of the endowment from the income it produces and other moneys that make up the State available fund, used each year for the support of schools. 70

In addition to the income from the permanent fund, the constitution has appropriated to the annual support of the public free schools one-fourth of the revenue derived from State occupation taxes and \$1 of each State poll tax. The constitution further provides that, if the revenue derived from these sources proves insufficient to keep the schools open for 6 months in any year, there shall be levied and collected a State ad valorem tax to make up the deficiency. Since these three sources of revenue are the constituent sources of the constitutional available school fund, that fund is now sometimes defined as the fund annually set apart with the intent and purpose of furnishing support for the schools for a term of 6 months in each year. 72

Apportionment of the available fund to the counties and independent school districts is made in accordance with their scholastic populations. 73 The per capita apportionment for the school year 1939-40 was \$22. A total of \$347,710 was received by the public free schools in Gregg County.

The constitution also authorizes the legislature to make provision for funds for the annual support of schools to supplement the available fund; in case the available fund proves insufficient to accomplish its purpose, the deficiency may be supplied from the general funds of the State. 75 And out of the general revenue of the State, money may be appropriated to schools without reference to the scholastic population of the county. A notable example of appropriations of this kind is found in acts extending State aid to rural and small-town schools. Under these acts, the State aids schools in sparsely populated areas that cannot be maintained at the average standard afforded by the State system from the per capita apportionment of the available funds and district taxes alone.

Counties also have permanent and available school funds. The county permanent funds have been established largely through State land grant subventions. Since the first of these grants was made in 1839, a total of 4,229,166 acres from the public domain has been granted to the counties for educational purposes. 77 With the exception of 19 counties, established after the exhaustion of the public domain, each county has received from the State 4 leagues of land for the benefit of its schools. 78 The proceeds derived from the sale of the lands have been invested and remain as a permanent endowment; only the income from the fund is available for annual expenditures. The county available fund is apportioned to the common and independent districts of the county in accordance with their scholastic populations. 80 Gregg County's 4 leagues, patented to the county in 1877, 81 were sold in 1907 at \$9.75 per acre, or for a total consideration of \$172,692; and that sum, invested in accordance with law, stands today as a credit to the county's permanent school fund.82

School Districts

The basic unit of the State school system is the school district. School districts in Texas are subdivisions of the State created to aid as its agents in administering and financing its system of schools. They are quasi-public corporations. 83 The common school districts are created with reference to the division of the State into counties, and their distinguishing characteristic is found in their relationship to the county government. 84 But, in addition to the common school districts, there are the independent districts, so called because they are independent of control by county authorities. 85 Only the common school districts are to be discussed here.

The power to divide a county into common school districts is vested in the board of county school trustees. The order of the board making the division must describe each district by metes and bounds, assign to each a number, and must be recorded in the minutes of the board, and also by the county clerk. 86 A district may not be smaller than 9 square miles, 87 but there is no limit upon its maximum size. 88 The boundaries of districts, once created, may be altered by reduction, expansion, rearrangement, or consolidation, and provision is made for the adjustment of bonded indebtedness between districts affected by such changes. 89

Common school districts may levy and collect taxes upon all property in the district for the "further maintenance of public free schools and for the erection and equipment of school buildings." The maximum rate of district taxes is fixed at \$1 on the \$100 valuation. 90 They may also issue bonds for various purposes of school finance, including the purchase, erection, repair, or equipment of school buildings; the purchase of necessary sites for school buildings; and the purchase or construction of teachers' homes. 91

School Officers and Boards

Along with the steady advance toward State support, supervision, and control of the public free school system, and the consequent recognition of public education as a distinct department of the State government, has come recognition also of the necessity for providing full-time officers and educational experts for the administration of the system. The State Department of Education is composed of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, the State Board of Education and its several service divisions. 92 The State Board is composed of nine members appointed by the Governor. 93 The State Superintendent serves the board as its secretary. 94 The general control and management of schools in the counties is entrusted to a county board of school trustees: 95 and in all counties having a scholastic population of 3,000 or more, the immediate supervision of the common free schools is the single duty of an elected county school superintendent; in the smaller counties the county judge serves ex officio as superintendent of schools. 96 More than two-thirds of the counties in Texas, including Gregg County, now have full-time elected superintendents.97

Other school officers and boards are district boards of school trustees, 98 the State Board of School Examiners, 99 county boards of examiners, 1 and attendance officers. 2 County depositories, which perform important functions in matters of school finance, 3 must also be mentioned.

The principal duties of the State Board of Education are to invest and re-invest the principal of the State permanent school fund, 4 to make the annual apportionment of the State available school fund among the counties and the independent school districts, 5 to perform the duties formerly devolved upon the State Textbook Commission, to make such investigations and studies as are necessary to keep them advised at all times of the educational needs of the State, and to make reports of such needs for the enlightenment of the legislature.6

The State Superintendent of Public Instruction is an elective officer. 7 and is charged with the duty of administering the school laws of

the State and of supervising the business administration of the public school system. His is the responsibility of deciding all questions that arise in connection with the internal affairs and management of the public schools. He hears appeals from the rulings and decisions of subordinate school officers. From his decisions, appeal lies to the State Board of Education. 8 As a rule, exhaustion of remedies through these channels of appeal is a condition precedent to the exercise of jurisdiction over such cases by the courts.

The county board of school trustees, composed of five elective members, 10 is an incorporated board and in its corporate capacity may, for school purposes, make contracts, acquire and own property, sue and be sued, and do all other things necessary in the management of the common schools in the counties. Il The county superintendent of schools serves the board as its secretary.12

Among the duties of the county school superintendent, not already mentioned, are those of appointing the members of the county board of school examiners; 13 and of apportioning the county's part of the State available school fund to the common school districts of the county and the county available fund to the common and independent districts.14

Each common school district has its own board of trustees; board members are elected from the district. The district board is also an incorporated body, and within the district, has corporate powers similar to those of the county board. 16 It manages and disburses district school funds, 17 has the management and control of the public school buildings and grounds in the district, determines the number of schools the district is to have and their locations, employs teachers, and passes upon claims made upon district funds. 18 It is empowered to make such reasonable rules and regulations for the governance of the schools of the district as are necessary.19

Governmental Organization and Records System

The county board of school examiners represents the State Board of Examiners in the county in conducting examinations of applicants for teaching positions. The State Board prepares the examination questions and tests, prescribes the rules and regulations in accordance with which the examinations are conducted locally, and passes finally upon the qualifications of applicants.²⁰

In counties having a scholastic population of 3,000 or more, the county board of school trustees is empowered to appoint an attendance officer with power to enforce the compulsory education laws of the State. In the smaller counties, this power is exercised by the county school superintendent and the peace officers of the county and the justice precincts. 21

The county depository serves as the treasurer of the county school funds. 22 Those apportioned to the county from the State available school fund are deposited with the county depository upon the warrant of the State Comptroller, drawn upon the State Treasurer. 23

Fiscal Management

The fiscal management of school funds within the counties and districts involves the control and expenditure of funds after they have been apportioned. Moneys in the State and county available school funds must, for the first 8 months of the school year, be applied exclusively to the payment of teachers' salaries, superintendents' salaries, fees incurred in taking the scholastic census, and interest on such shorttime notes made for the payment of teachers' and superintendents' salaries as fall due before the available funds for the current year come to hand. Local funds derived from district taxes, tuition fees collected from those who are not scholastics of the district, and any surplus which may be left of the available funds may be used for the purposes for which the available funds may be expended, and also for the erection, purchase, rental, or repair of schoolhouses, for the purchase of school sites, school furniture, equipment, and supplies, for the payment of insurance premiums, and for such other purposes as the county board of trustees may determine to be necessary in the operation of the school system. 24

Before common school district bonds may be offered for sale, they must be approved by the Attorney General. 25 Formal acts of issuance,

such as the signing and sealing of the bonds, are performed by the county commissioners court, but the bonds are issued against the credit of the district alone. 26 Bonds are sold under the direction of the district trustees, and must be sold to the highest bidder at not less than par. Proceeds of the bonds are deposited in the county depository, and constitute a fund to be used exclusively for the purpose of the issue 27

Common school district funds are disbursed upon the warrant of the county school superintendent, drawn upon the county depository, 28 or upon the order of the district trustees, approved by the superintendent 29

Classification of Schools

Recognition of the need for a central county board of school trustees came with the development of secondary schools in Texas and the resulting demand for a system under which their curricula and methods could be integrated with those of the elementary schools. In order that Texas school children may, throughout the entire 11 years 30 of public schooling, advance freely from one grade to the next higher without loss of time, the county board of trustees has ample power to classify the schools of the county into elementary schools and high schools. The board's classification of schools must be made in accordance with regulations prescribed by the State Superintendent and with "due regard to schools already located, to the distribution of population, and to the advancement of the students in their studies."31

High schools are of three general classes: Those maintaining at least four grades of work above the seventh grade, those maintaining at least three such higher grades, and those maintaining at least two.32 Provision is made by the school laws for the establishment of high schools in rural areas, as well as in the more thickly populated portions of the county. Rural high school districts are formed by grouping contiguous districts of small scholastic populations in such manner as one would seem spot at dud to

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to combine their resources. The power to form such districts is vested in the county board of school trustees.³³

Curricula and Textbooks

Statutes prescribing courses of study specify subjects of study ranging from the elementary school arts upwards to those suitable to fourth-year high school students. But the prescripts of these statutes are not exclusive, for in the case of elementary schools, other subjects and courses may be agreed upon by the district trustees or prescribed by the State Superintendent, and in the case of high schools, other courses to be taught are prescribed by the State Superintendent. Still other courses may be prescribed by the State Board of Education.

The State Board of Education, before it apportions the available school fund each year, is required to set apart from the fund an amount sufficient to purchase and distribute free textbooks for the use of Texas school children. The State system of uniform free textbooks is financed through these funds, through funds accruing from the sale of "disused books," and from the sale of books by school trustees to individuals and schools. The system is administered under the immediate supervision of the State Textbook Committee, composed of five members appointed by the State Board. It is required that each member of the committee be an "experienced and active educator." 40

Teachers

Before one is authorized to contract to teach in the public free schools of Texas, one must have obtained a teacher's certificate from the State Board of School Examiners. Teachers' certificates in Texas are of three kinds: Elementary certificates, high school certificates, and special certificates. And, in turn, each of these three kinds of certificates is further classified in accordance with the grades to be taught by the certificate-holder. District trustees determine the salaries to be allowed teachers, but in some cases they are controlled by statutes which gauge the amount of salary in accordance with the classification of the teacher's certificate. In addition to certain

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educational qualifications, an applicant for a teacher's certificate must be a citizen of the United States, or have declared intention to become one, and of good moral character. 43

Scholastics

A statute provides that "All children, without regard to color, over six years of age and under eighteen years of age at the beginning of any scholastic year, shall be included in the scholastic census and shall be entitled to the benefit of the public school fund for that year."44 It is also provided that "All available public school funds of this State shall be appropriated in each county for the education alike of white and colored children." While the school laws require that separate schools be maintained for the white and colored races, they also require that "impartial provisions shall be made for both races."45

The duty of making the scholastic census in the common school districts, in accordance with which apportionments of funds are made to the districts, is devolved upon one member of the district trustees in each district, who is named as the census trustee by the county school superintendent. 46 Census returns from the respective districts are made by the census trustees to the county school superintendent and are consolidated by him upon forms furnished by the State Department of Education. These consolidated rolls, one for white children and one for Negro; are prepared in duplicate. The original is filed with the State Superintendent; the duplicate is filed with the county clerk and becomes a permanent record of his office. 47

Compulsory education laws in Texas require school attendance of all children between the ages of 7 and 16, except those expressly exempted or excused, for not less than 120 days in each school year. However, no child is required to attend school for a period longer than the maximum term of the public school in the district in which he resides. The annual period of compulsory attendance begins at the opening of the school term unless otherwise authorized by the district trustees. 48

As a rule, a child must attend a school within his district, but provision is made for the transfer of pupils from district to district and from county to county, where the convenience of scholastics demands it. Transfers are authorized by the county school superintendent, who

at the same time transfers to the district or county gaining the scholastic the per capita apportionment from the State available fund. 49

(6). Construction and Maintenance of County Public Roads

The State system of highways, including sections of highways that were formerly county roads, is under the supervision of the State Highway Commission. 50 This discussion, therefore, is confined to intracounty roads.

The power of the counties to establish and maintain roads is vested in the county commissioners courts. The courts are empowered and directed to "order the laying out and opening of public roads, when necessary," and, subject to certain limitations, to discontinue or alter roads whenever it is deemed expedient. 51

The Gregg County local road law of 1911, as amended in 1913 and 1915, makes each member of the commissioners court the road commissioner of his precinct. As road commissioner, a member of the court has supervision of all work done in laying out, changing, and repairing roads, and in building and repairing bridges within his precinct. The members of the court acting individually as road commissioners, however, are at all times under the direction of the commissioners court. The court has control of all road-building equipment and supplies within the county, and in addition, has wide powers in adopting such plans for road construction and maintenance as are suitable to local conditions. 52

The basic road administrative unit in the Texas county is the road precinct. The commissioners court is required by a general law to divide the county into "convenient road precincts" and to designate each precinct by number. The order making the division, defining the boundaries of the precincts, and giving them their respective numbers, must be recorded in the minutes of the court. Road work in each precinct is done under the immediate supervision of a road overseer appointed for each precinct by the commissioners court. The Gregg County local road law provides that the road overseers shall be under the general supervision of the members of the commissioners court in their capacity as road commissioners. 54

The procedure incident to the laying out of roads may be initiated by the petition of eight freeholders, addressed to the commissioners court, but the court also has authority to open roads of its own motion. 55

Preliminary surveys of new roads are made by a jury of five free-holders appointed by the commissioners court. 56 In making the survey, the jury may be 57 and should be 58 assisted by the county surveyor. The five freeholders, known as the "jury of view," are charged with the duty of laying out roads "to the greatest advantage to the public," and of hearing evidence upon the question of compensation to be allowed landowners whose lands are required for right-of-way purposes. The statutes allow landowners ample opportunity to be heard by the jury in the matter of compensation for lands condemned for road purposes. 59

It is the duty of the commissioners court to classify county roads in accordance with a statute that divides them into three classes. The chief purpose of the classification is to prescribe the minimum width of roads and causeways in each class.

Statutes providing for compulsory service of citizens in the working of roads, under the system generally known as the "plan of working by road hands," are still in force. Frovisions for the working of county convicts upon roads, included in the Gregg County road law and in general laws, are also still in force. But the prevailing system for the construction and maintenance of roads today is the contract system. The commissioners courts have ample powers to let contracts and to employ labor for the construction and maintenance of roads. They likewise have power to acquire road material and equipment through purchase, and to condemn property for rights-of-way and road material.

For the financing of county road systems, the constitution has established the county road and bridge fund. To support this fund the county is authorized to levy an ad valorem tax at the maximum rate of 15 cents on \$100 valuation, 65 and in addition a liberal portion of the revenue

derived from motor vehicle license fees is credited to the fund annually under authority of a statute providing for the apportionment of these fees between the State and the counties.66 Counties are also authorized to finance their road systems through bond issues, and to levy and collect an annual ad valorem tax sufficient to pay the interest on the bonds and to create a sinking fund for their redemption. The limits of the county's bond issuing capacity are fixed by the statutes. 67

Bonds may also be issued by road bond districts, which are created and established for the purpose of issuing bonds for the construction, or to aid in the construction of macadamized, graveled, or paved roads and turnpikes, and for the levy and collection of taxes to pay the interest upon the bonds and to create a sinking fund to redeem them at maturity. A road bond district may comprise a part of the county only, or it may be comprised of two or more counties.68 Funds raised in the road bond districts are usually under the control of the commissioners court, 69 but under some local laws they have been placed under the control of a special road board. 70

(7). Care of the Poor

The care of the poor is an ancient function of government, and from the time of the Republic of Texas, county officers have served in its performance. 71. But the responsibility of the county to care for its indigents extends only to resident paupers. 72

In administering relief to the needy the commissioners court furnishes necessary food, clothing, shelter, and care during sickness, 73 and provides for the burial of paupers. 74 The court may bind the county by any reasonable contract for medical care for indigents. 75 While the court is under no general obligation to furnish hospitalization for the indigent sick, it must give them the benefits of such public hospital facilities as the county affords. 76 The establishment of poor houses and farms may be financed through county bond issues. 77

A person who is too poor to employ counsel, and who makes affidavit to that effect, is guaranteed the benefit of counsel; district and county judges are required, under these circumstances, to appoint counsel. 78

In 1933 Texas amended her constitution to authorize the legislature to issue State bonds and enact laws providing "relief and work relief to needy and distressed people and in relieving the hardships resulting from unemployment." Statutes enacted in pursuance of the amendment provide for the agencies through which such funds and those received from the Federal Government are administered. The same statutes prescribe the duties to be performed by county authorities under the direction of and in cooperation with agencies of the State government. 80

In 1935 the constitution was again amended to authorize the enactment of laws providing for old age assistance. 81 Laws enacted in execution of this amendment also provide for the State and county agencies to administer old age assistance funds. 82

C. Corporate Management and Finance

The county commissioners court, not the county treasurer, is the custodian of the county's funds. 83 It is the treasurer's duty to receive all money belonging to the county, and to pay and apply it under orders of the commissioners court. 84 He may receive deposits only upon the authority of warrants issued by the county clerk in triplicate. Such warrants, known as deposit warrants, state the purpose for which the money is deposited and the fund to which it is to be credited. The treasurer signs all three copies. He retains the original, returns the duplicate to the county clerk for the auditor, and delivers the triplicate to the depositor. The auditor enters upon his books a charge of the deposit against the treasurer and credits the depositor. 85

County moneys are set apart into three general classes of funds: Constitutional funds, statutory funds, and funds established by order of the commissioners court. Constitutional funds are those raised by tax-

ation for purposes expressly designated by the constitution, namely, for general county purposes, for roads and bridges, for the pay of jurors, and for permanent improvements.86 Statutory funds are those set up and classified by statute as follows: 1) Money derived from jury fees, from sales of estrays, and occupation taxes; 2) money appropriated to the county road and bridge fund, except that derived from constitutional taxes; and 3) all money received by the county treasurer, except that belonging to the constitutional funds, to one of the other two statutory funds, or to a fund established by the commissioners court. 87 The commissioners court is authorized to establish such other classes of funds as it may deem proper, 88 and in doing so, may transfer money from statutory funds of the second and third classes, and when there is a surplus, from the first class, 89 but may never transfer money from constitutional funds nor expend for one purpose money appropriated by the constitution to another. 90 All transfers must be made before money standing to the credit of one fund is applied to the payment of claims which have become fixed as a charge against another. 91

Contracts binding the county, as a rule, must be authorized by the formal resolution of the commissioners court, spread upon the minutes of the court. 92 Other county officers are without authority to bind the county in contract, and in the absence of ratification by the court, their contracts are void. 93

Proposed contracts for record books, legal blanks, and stationery, 94 as well as those for "supplies of every kind, road and bridge material, or any other material" for the use of the county or any of its officers or agencies 95 must be submitted to competitive bid. Contracts for the construction of public buildings or for the prosecution and completion of public works of all kinds, authorizing an expenditure in excess of \$2,000, except when they are made under the exigent circumstances of public calamity, may be made only after proposals for such contracts have been submitted to competitive bid. 96

Contracts taking the form of bonds obligating the county or any of its subdivisions may be made only by authority of statutes that observe

constitutional limitations upon the power of a county to lend its credit. and only upon the approval of the qualified voters expressed at the polls. 97 Statutes authorize the issuance of bonds for various purposes, and provide for the manner of their issuance, registration, and sale. 98

While the commissioners court has no authority to issue negotiable. securities to evidence county indebtedness, it does, for certain purposes, have authority to issue non-negotiable interest-bearing county warrants. 99 The power of the commissioners court to issue such warrants is not dependent upon the approval of the voters.1

The commissioners court has the duty of approving all claims against the county. 2 No claim against a county may be sued upon unless it has been presented to the court for allowance, and then only upon the court's refusal to have the claim audited and approved for payment.3 All claims, bills, and accounts must be filed in time to allow the auditor to examine and approve them in advance of the meeting of the commissioners court, and must be approved by him as a condition precedent to the exercise of jurisdiction over them by the court.4

All claims filed must be registered by the county treasurer in his claim register, in the order of presentation; claims presented simultaneously must be registered in accordance with priorities in dates. Claims may not be paid until thus registered, and moreover, must be paid in the order of registration. Registered claims against the county are of three classes: 1) All jury scrip and scrip issued for feeding jurors; 2) all scrip issued under the provisions of the road law or for work done on roads and bridges; and 3) all the general indebtedness of the county; including feeding and guarding prisoners, and paupers' claims. The claim register must show the class to which each claim belongs, the name of the payee, the amount and date of the claim, the date of registration, the claim registration number, the name of the officer, department, or other authority by which the claim was issued, and the service performed giving rise to the claim or any other consideration supporting it.5

The treasurer must not pay money out of the county treasury except in pursuance of a warrant from some officer authorized by law to issue it; and if the treasurer doubts the legality of any warrant pre-

sented, he must withhold payment and report the matter to the commissioners court.6

An accounting and auditing system for counties is provided for by the statutes. The finance ledger, kept by the county auditor, 7 must contain "a full and orderly statement of the condition of the county finances." The ledger is kept under the supervision of the commissioners court, and contains accounts with each officer authorized to receive money or other property for the use of the county. It is at all times subject to the inspection of the public.8 Individual accounts must be kept, and statements, reports, and exhibits must be made by the various officers who handle county money.9

In like manner provision is made for frequent examinations and audits of accounts. 10 The county auditor has general oversight of and continual access to the records of other officers, and must see to the strict enforcement of the law governing county finances. 11 He must examine all reports of collections made to the commissioners court, 12 and must make count of the cash in the hands of the county treasurer and keep account of moneys in the county depository. 13 He must, himself, keep numerous records besides the finance ledger, including a register of warrants issued, and accounts with each appropriation in the county budget. 14 He must make quarterly and annual reports to the commissioners court, reflecting in detail the condition of county finances. 15 Each year he must submit to the commissioners court an estimate of all county revenues and expenditures, together with a budget of all appropriations to be set aside for the expenses of the several departments and institutions of the county.16 Forms used in the county accounting and auditing system are prescribed by the State Comptroller, 17

D. Records System

In general the recording practices followed in Gregg County are in close compliance with registration and recording laws. They include the practice of copying instruments where it is required; the filing of original papers where the originals remain on file as record of their contents: the entry of memorials of official proceedings and transactions

in minute books; the entry of memorials in abstract form, usually in books ruled off in columns with printed column heads; and the entry of memorials on printed forms made up in advance of the presentation of the instruments for record, so that the record is completed by the act of the officer in filling in blank spaces in the form and attaching his certificate of recordation.

Entries in volumes were wholly handwritten in ink, or handwritten on printed forms until 1915, when, with the introduction of loose-leaf binders, typewritten entries appeared in the commissioners court minutes, 18 and in the minutes of the district court. 19 Loose-leaf volumes are now in common use where they are best adapted to the purpose.

The quality of ink and paper used in making the records has been uniformly good; no illegible records have been encountered. As to bindings and coverings on volumes, quality has apparently varied in accordance with the offerings of various printers and binders who from time to time have furnished the county with these supplies.

Indexes are sometimes kept in separate index volumes, and sometimes in the same volume with the record. Indexing generally follows the alphabetical-chronological system. Under this system, the number of index pages that may be needed for a given letter of the alphabet are marked, either upon the top margins or by thumb tabs, with that letter. On a page of the index devoted to the appropriate letter, the surname of the party concerned is entered, followed by his given name or initials. Usually the names of the other parties are set opposite. Some records are indexed by the names of only one party; others, by the names of both or all parties. Entries within the various alphabetical subdivisions are chronological in the order of recording.

In the absence of statute, the right to inspect public records is governed by common law. Under the applicable rule of common law, a person to be entitled to inspect public records as a matter of right has to have some interest with which the record is connected, but by provision of Texas statute, the common law rule has been abrogated with respect to the records of the county clerk. This statute gives to all citizens absolute right at all reasonable times to inspect the clerk's books and papers. But even under the common law, the interest upon which the right of a person to inspect records is predicated need not be a private interest; it exists where the person seeking inspection may, by reason of his relation to the common interest, act as the representative of a common or public right. 20

Statutes designed to protect public records from abuse as well as from malicious destruction or alteration have been enacted; offenses involving malicious abuse are of the grade of felony and are punishable by heavy fine or imprisonment in the penitentiary. 21

3. HOUSING, CARE, AND ACCESSIBILITY OF RECORDS

The Gregg County Courthouse stands in the center of the public square in Longview. It is an imposing edifice of modern American architecture, 111 feet long and 93 feet wide, with a half-basement and three stories. Of stone, concrete, and steel construction, the building is considered completely fireproof. An automatic sprinkler system insures against spread of fire. All walls and ceilings are plastered. In the basement the floors are of concrete; on the other three floors, of composition tile. Ventilation is good throughout the building, and excellent lighting conditions are provided for all offices by electric drop lights with reflectors.

The courthouse faces south, but there are entrances to the first floor on three sides, the south, the east, and the west. Entrances to the basement are on the east and west. Stairways on the east and west connect all floors. There is also an elevator on the west side of the building, which services all floors.

There are four commodious courtrooms in the building: The commissioners courtroom on the first floor; the county courtroom on the second floor; and two large district courtrooms, one on the second floor and one on the third, used by the three district courts of the county. On the second and third floors there are excellent accommodations for district judges, court reporters, jurors, and witnesses. At present some space in the courthouse is being used by local offices of National and State agencies.

The basic records of the county have been well preserved. Present housing conditions are, in general, excellent. All records are protected from soot, dust, and dampness. The records are well arranged and readily accessible to the public. Each office contains ample equipment for housing present records, and space for ordinary expansion for years to come,

The county clerk has in his custody the records of the county and commissioners courts, and those he keeps as recorder of the county. His department consists of a large office on the first floor and a vault in the basement, directly beneath the office and connected with it by a stairway.




Shelving and file boxes in both rooms are of steel construction. The clerk's current records are in his office, and most of his retired records in his vault; but 13 volumes are in the jury dormitory closet on the second floor, and 17 in the tax assessor-collector's office. A few retired records of other officers and agencies are also in the clerk's vault.


The district clerk of the county is clerk of each of the three district courts. His department on the third floor consists of a large main office, a private office, and a vault. Records are located in each of these rooms, in steel cabinets in the main office and in the vault, on steel shelf units in the private office. In a small closet in the private office, records are stacked on wooden shelves. Thirty-three retired volumes and a few disposed of papers of the district courts are in the small closet adjacent to the district judge's office on the west side of the second floor; and scattering records are in the county clerk's vault, the sheriff's storeroom in the basement, the grand jury room on the second floor, and the criminal district attorney's office on the first floor.


Another official having numerous records is the tax assessor-collector. His department consists of two adjoining offices on the first floor, the larger used for the collecting procedure, the smaller for the assessing. Records are kept on steel shelving and in steel file boxes. Scattering tax records found elsewhere in the building include: 419 volumes, 250 bundles, and 10 boxes in the jury dormitory closet; 1 volume in the county clerk's vault; 3 boxes in the sheriff's storeroom; and 4 volumes in the district judge's closet.


Other officials serving the county organization keep comparatively few or no permanent public records. In the county judge's office on the first floor were found two file boxes of requisitions, and two volumes of probate records. The justice of the peace and the constable of precinct 1 have adjoining offices in the basement. Current records of the justice of precinct 1 are in his office and in the constable's office; retired records of the justices of precincts 1, 3, and 7 are located in the county clerk's vault, the sheriff's storeroom, the constable's office, and in a small closet in the basement, beneath the west stairway to the first floor. No records of the constable were found. The criminal district attorney has large offices on the first floor, but the only public record of this official located during the inventory was one volume in the auditor's office. The sheriff keeps his current records in his offices on the first floor and most of his retired records in his basement storeroom, but two volumes of sheriff's records were found in the district clerk's private office, one volume in the county clerk's vault, and one file box in the building custodian's office in the basement. The county treasurer's current records are in his office on the first floor; 12 retired volumes are in the county clerk's vault, 3 in the district judge's closet. All of the county auditor's records are in his office on the first floor except three file boxes, which are in the building custodian's office. The county school superintendent keeps all of his own records and the records of the county board of school trustees in his offices on the second floor. The county surveyor's office in the basement houses all of his records. In the building custodian's office was found one bundle of admission cards to the county hospital.









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Explanatory Notes

Titles of Records. Exact titles of records are written in solid capitals without parentheses. In the absence of titles, descriptive titles have been assigned, which are written in solid capitals and enclosed in parentheses. If a record title is not descriptive of the contents of the record, an assigned explanatory title (or explanatory words), written with initial capitals and enclosed in parentheses, has been added. The current or most recent title of a record is used as the entry title, and title variation is indicated.

Dates. All dates used are inclusive. Missing records are indicated by broken dates.

Quantity. When two or more types of containers are considered in a single entry, the quantity is shown in chronological order, insofar as possible.

Labeling. Figures or letters in parentheses, following the number of volumes, file boxes, or other types of containers, indicate the labeling. If no labeling is indicated, it may be assumed that there is none.

Discontinuance. Where no statement is made that the record was discontinued at the last date shown in the entry, it could not be definitely established that such was the case. Where no comment is made on the absence of prior, subsequent, or intermediate records, no definite information could be obtained.

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Description of Records. The description of the contents of a record applies only to the current or most recent record unless change in contents is actually shown in a record entry.

Indexing. All indexes to records, unless otherwise stated, are self-contained.

Condition of Records. Records are in good condition unless otherwise indicated.

Dimensions. Dimensions are always given in inches, and, therefore, the symbol for inches (") has been omitted.

Location of Records. When all or the majority of the records of an office have a common location, the location is indicated in the last sentence of the office essay instead of in each individual entry.

Cross References. Title-line cross references are used to show the continuity of a record series which has been kept separately for a period of time and with other records for different periods of time. An example is that in entry 13: "Sept. 1873-Apr. 1883 in Minutes of Commissioners Court, entry 1." They are also used in all artificial entries, those set up to cover records which must be shown separately under their proper office even though they are kept in files or records appearing elsewhere in the inventory, as, for example, the title-line cross reference in entry 209, "In Juror's Time Book, vol. A, entry 166," or those set up for a record which is never kept separately but is found in two or more records of miscellaneous content, such as entry 66. In both instances, the description of the master entry shows the title and entry number of the record from which the cross reference is made, as for example, these words in entry 1 do: "Also contains: Minutes of Accounts Allowed, Sept. 1873-Apr. 1883, entry 13." Dates shown in the description of the master entry or entry of miscellaneous content are only for the part or parts of the record contained therein, and are shown only when they vary from those of the master entry.

Separate third paragraph cross references from entry to entry, and see also references with subject headings or subheadings are used to show prior, subsequent, or closely related records which are not parts of the same series.

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I. COUNTY COMMISSIONERS COURT

The functional and corporate affairs of the Texas county have always been administered by a supervisory court. Under laws in force for 3 years following the organization of Gregg County in 1873, the supervisory court, composed of the justices of the peace of the county, was called the county court. The presiding officer of the court was the justice of the peace resident at the county seat. The district clerk was clerk of the court. The first meeting of the county court of Gregg County was held July 21, 1873.

Since 1876 administrative powers of the county have been vested in the county commissioners court, composed of the county judge and four county commissioners, elected at each biennial general election. The county is divided into four commissioners' precincts, and one commissioner is elected in each. The county judge is chosen from the county at large. The county clerk is clerk of the court.

The records of the Gregg County Commissioners Court are located in the office of the county clerk, on the first floor of the courthouse, unless otherwise indicated.

II. COUNTY CLERK AS RECORDER

From 1873, when Gregg County was created, until 1876 the district clerk was ex-officio recorder of the county. The present constitution provides that in each county having a population of 8,000 or more, there shall be elected a county clerk for a term of 2 years and that he shall be the recorder of the county; that in smaller counties, one person may be elected to perform the duties of district clerk and county clerk. Gregg County has elected separate county and district clerks since 1894.

Records kept by the county clerk of Gregg County as recorder are located in his office, on the first floor of the courthouse, unless otherwise indicated.

III. DISTRICT COURTS

The district courts in Texas have always been the superior courts of general original jurisdiction. The jurisdiction of the district courts is discussed elsewhere in this inventory.

Upon its creation in 1873, Gregg County was placed in the 9th judicial district. In 1876 it was transferred to the 7th district; in 1901 to the 4th; 4 and in 1921 to the 71st, in which, with Harrison County, it remains today. In 1931 an additional judicial district embracing Gregg County alone, the 124th district, was created. In 1932 a special district court for Gregg and Rusk Counties was established, but expired by limitation on November 1, 1934. In 1935 a special district court for Gregg County alone was created. The county, therefore, now has three district courts. The special district court, however, is to expire by limitation on January 25, 1943.

Each of these courts is presided over by a district judge. 10 Other officers of the courts are the district clerk of the county, who serves all three courts, 11 the sheriff of the county, 12 and the criminal district attorney of the 124th district, who serves all three courts in all matters, civil and criminal, in which district and criminal district attorneys are required to act under the laws of the State. 13 The district judges are chosen by the qualified voters of the judicial districts. Their term of office is 4 years. 14 The district clerk is chosen at each biennial general election from the county at large. 15

Records of the district courts of Gregg County are located in the main, or outer, office of the district clerk, on the third floor of the courthouse, unless otherwise indicated.

In 1893 the legislature, by local law, deprived the county court of Gregg County of all its jurisdiction except in probate and apprenticeship matters, and in condemnation suits instituted under general law. 2 However, its full jurisdiction was restored in 1895. 3 The jurisdictional powers of the county court under existing laws are discussed elsewhere in this inventory.4 (Industrial Reports), Arr. 28, 1931

The county judge is the judge of the county court. 5 Other officers of the court are the county clerk, who serves as clerk of the court;6 the sheriff, who serves as its attendance and process officer; 7 and the criminal district attorney, 8 acting as county attorney.9

V. JUSTICE OF THE PEACE COURTS

Courts of the justices of the peace were established in Gregg County upon its organization in 1873,1 and have functioned continuously to date. In Texas, these courts have always been the tribunals for the trial of minor civil cases and petit misdemeanors. Their jurisdiction under present law is discussed elsewhere in this inventory. 2 The constable of each justice precinct is the process and attendance officer of the justice court of his precinct. The criminal district attorney of Gregg County represents the State in examining trials and other cases in the justice courts of the county.4

At the last general election, in 1938, seven justices of the peace were elected in Gregg County. 5 Justices are elected in their respective justice precincts, at each biennial general election.6 Justices of the peace have, from time to time, performed other important duties. From the date of the organization of Gregg County until 1876, they constituted the county administrative court, 7 and were the assessors of taxes within their respective precincts.8 Under present law, they hold inquests,9 and are the local registrars of vital statistics in their respective precincts. 10

VI. CRIMINAL DISTRICT ATTORNEY

The State and county have been represented in civil and criminal matters in the courts of Gregg County by State attorneys since the organization of the county. From 1873 to 1876, the State attorney was the district attorney. From 1876 to 1921, apparently both a district and a county attorney were officers of the courts. The act of 1921 transferring Gregg County to the 71st judicial district declared that the county attorney of Gregg County should "have and perform all the duties and prerogatives of a District Attorney in attendance upon the District Court" of the county.

The act of 1931 creating the 124th district court for Gregg County provided for the election of a criminal district attorney to serve both the 71st and 124th district courts in the county, and that pending the next general election, the county attorney should serve as criminal district attorney. Subsequent acts, including the one creating the special district court for Gregg County, have also provided for the election of a criminal district attorney; and that officer now represents the State and county in civil and criminal matters in all the courts of the county. The criminal district attorney is elected at each biennial general election, from the county at large.

VII. SHERIFF

A sheriff was among the officers chosen in the election held in June 1873 to effect the organization of Gregg County, and the office has since been filled continuously. The sheriff is elected at each biennial general election. Until 1902, when the first tax collector was elected in Gregg County, the sheriff served as tax collector. The sheriff is a conservator of the peace, the process officer of the courts and the attendance officer of the county, district, and commissioners courts, the custodian of the jail, and of the courthouse, subject to such regulations as are made by the commissioners court.

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VIII. CONSTABLES

Upon the organization of Gregg County, five constables—one for each justice precinct—were appointed by the county court.¹ Since 1876 constables have been elected in their respective justice precincts at each biennial general election.² At the last general election, in 1938, seven constables were elected in Gregg County.³ Constables are conservators of the peace;⁴ are process officers of all the courts,⁵ executing process, civil and criminal, throughout the county;⁶ and are the attendance officers of the justice courts.²

No records of the constables of Gregg County were inventoried.

IX. TAX ASSESSOR-COLLECTOR

of RELEGIES, Sect. 1, 1955-Dec.

The assessing and collecting functions have been performed in Gregg County by various officers. Upon the organization of the county in July 1873, the five justices of the peace were the assessors in their respective precincts, and the sheriff collected taxes throughout the county. From 1876 until 1934 a county assessor was elected at each biennial general election. From 1876 until 1902, the sheriff served as tax collector. In 1902, having attained the required population of 10,000, Il Gregg County elected a tax collector, and continued to elect one every two years until 1934. At the general election of 1934, and at each subsequent biennial general election the voters of the county elected a tax assessor-collector, in compliance with a constitutional amendment adopted in 1932. XIII. COUNTY BOARD OF SCHOOL TRUSTEES

From the time of the organization of Gregg County to the present, the control and supervision of the public free school system within the county has been vested successively in a board of five school directors, in the commissioners court and the county judge, and in a county board of school trustees. The board of school trustees since its creation in 1911 has had the "general management and control of the public free schools and high schools in each county." The board is composed of five members, one elected from the county at large, and one from each of the four commissioners' precincts. Each member is elected for a term of 2 years. The county school superintendent is secretary of the board.

XV. COUNTY SURVEYOR

A county surveyor was among the officers chosen at the election for the organization of Gregg County in 1873. Since 1876, the office of surveyor has been a constitutional office in each county of the State. The surveyor is elected at each biennial general election. The surveyor plays an important part in establishing boundaries, including county boundaries, and in the laying out of roads and highways. His records are often essential in the deraignment of property titles.

The records of the surveyor of Gregg County are located in his office, in the basement of the courthouse.

XVI. COUNTY HEALTH OFFICER

Prior to the establishment of the office of county physician in 1891, 1 the need for medical care for indigents and prisoners and for the services of physicians in quarantines and other emergencies was met by the occasional employment of physicians by the commissioners court. 2 The office of county physician was abolished, and the office of county health officer was created, in 1909. The county health officer is appointed by the commissioners court for a term of 2 years; the person appointed must be a competent physician. 3 He performs many duties imposed upon him by the health laws of the state and the instructions and regulations of the State Board of Health. 4

No records of the county health officer of Gregg County were inventoried.

XVII. BOARD OF MANAGERS OF COUNTY HOSPITAL

The present Gregg County hospital, the Gregg Memorial Hospital, was established in 1933. The establishment of the hospital was effected through the purchase by the county of the Longview General Hospital. A board of six managers—each appointed by the commissioners court for a term of 2 years—has the general management of the hospital. The chief executive officer of the hospital is the superintendent, who is appointed by the board of managers to serve at its pleasure. The
