## Dear Sir

I received yours of the 3d & 5th and was pleased to hear from you and contents noticed and according to your request I here enclose to you a statement of collections and Disbursements. And hope you will find satisfactory, as regards Handelin & Pery, they are still in your House. I had no idea of releasing them from their obligation for I intended if they should leave the House they should release it that I did not intend to have anything to do with it until the expiration of their lease -

I am better posted in business matters then to release them now as regards Captain Denny - I [crossed out]

knew nothing about his leaving the rooms, until I received a note that he had done so: I still have his lease. I called upon him a few days since and told him that if he thought he was not able to pay \$40.00 for the rooms from this time on that he could have them for \$30.00 by his paying punctual so he moved in them again yesterday. he has not paid anything since you left except the draft you gave Wells, he does not however feel disposed to pay any rents since he moved out which is exactly

one month. He promises to pay me in a few days for the coming months rent he is certainly a slow [[wash?]] I have a nother hard case who by the by I visit tri weekly regularly and that is Mr Haligan, he is now behind [[hard?]] 2 months I hardly know what to do with him, he still promises

to pay every day. You will notice from the dates in my statement that your tennants have been very backward in paying up their rents. The truth is the times have changed a considerably as regards money matters now those it was Six months ago I scarcely called upon them over twice after [crossed out] before they paid now I have to called upon the best of them from 5 to 20 times before I get it, the fact is money is getting scarce and little or no business, I settled at last with Reichmans yester day. his excuse from time to time for not settling was that the carpenter had not finished ceiling, and then after the ceiling was done he had not got the carpenters bill, had got out of patiance, and so I measured the work my self as I am about as good a hand at that business as any body and the result was that your proposition amounted to \$62.62 this being one half of the cost ----
