# **CRCG Partner Agency Updates**

#### **Texas Health and Human Services Commission**

#### **Children's Mental Health**

Texas was awarded funds through the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) Pandemic Emergency Assistance Fund that was authorized through the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (H.R. 1319) enacted on March 11, 2021. TANF is providing the funds through Title IV-A of the Social Security Act for states, tribes, and territories to provide non-recurring short-term expenses and benefits to families that have been impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. Funds are available through September 30, 2022. Funds can be used for pandemic-related expenses that occurred beginning April 1, 2021.

Funds will be used for activities that allow eligible households with dependent children to obtain or maintain housing, and include rent and utility assistance, deposits, move-in costs, and other time-limited expenses to help individuals maintain current housing or move quickly into housing.

Local mental and behavioral health authorities and local intellectual and developmental disability authorities will also be able to use this grant for home modifications to make housing accessible for needy families. The lack of accessible housing is a major barrier for families of children with serious emotional disturbance and intellectual and developmental disabilities. Funding home modifications will help stabilize and create safer housing options without uprooting families.

When a family member tests positive for COVID-19, quarantine is required to protect the other members of the family; however, in many situations that is not feasible due to limited space or facilities (e.g., the household has one bathroom). Funds to help a family member with a short-term stay at a hotel can reduce the chances of spreading COVID-19 throughout a family and eliminate the health risk that can result from being in the same house.

### **Texas Community Partner Program**

The Texas Community Partner Program (CPP) provides support to community organizations statewide that partner with Texas Health and Human Services to help Texans apply for and manage their food, cash, and health care assistance online.

Texans can receive help applying for or managing their state benefits from familiar local organizations they know and trust. Hundreds of community partners make up the statewide network that grows each day. Texans can find community partners in their local area by using the search feature located at the top of the Texas CPP website.

# **Texas Department of State Health Services**

### **Children with Special Health Care Needs**

The <u>Children with Special Health Care Needs (CSHCN) Systems Development Group</u> supports population-based services for children with special health care needs relating to the Title V Block Grant and is part of the Maternal and Child Health Section at the Texas Department of State Health Services.

The program partners with <u>community-based contractors around Texas</u> to provide support for families with children and youth with special health care needs and disabilities. Services may include in-home or center-based respite, parent-to-parent connections, educational trainings and workshops, support groups, community recreational activities, and more. Not all services are available in all parts of the state. Case management for families is also available through the Texas Department of State Health Services regional offices.

The program leads two statewide learning collaboratives that meet quarterly by webinar to share knowledge, implementation strategies, and best practices. The meetings are open to everyone interested, including youth and young adults, parents, and providers as well as representatives from local community organizations, hospital and university systems, and health care plans.
