W PUBLIC HUNTING OPPORTUNITIES

Texas Parks and Wildlife offers a variety of hunting opportunities through two public hunting systems.

- The \$40 Annual Public Hunting Permit provides nearly year-round hunting on more than 1.4 million acres of land. The increasingly popular dove hunting areas are offered through this system.
- The Public Hunt Drawing System provides opportunities to apply for a wide variety of supervised, drawn hunts including special drawings for both adults and youth hunters.

In addition, TPW offers special hunt package drawings for exotic wildlife and quality native animals on TPW managed lands as well as specially-leased private properties.

W BIG TIME TEXAS HUNTS

Creates new funding for wildlife management and public hunting in Texas through drawings for outstanding hunting packages. The packages include:

- **GRAND SLAM HUNT** – This is a once-in-a-lifetime hunt package containing four separate hunts for desert bighorn sheep, white-tailed deer, pronghorn antelope and mule deer.
- **TEXAS EXOTIC SAFARI** – Offers two types of hunts (primitive weapon and modern firearm package) for a combination of super exotic species on the Mason Mountain Wildlife Management Area.
- **TEXAS WHITETAIL BONANZA** – Ten winners are drawn for 3-5 day guided hunts on ranches randomly assigned to winners.
- **TEXAS WATERFOWL ADVENTURE** – A series of up to four separate hunts, including geese and ducks.
- **TEXAS BIG TIME BIRD HUNT** – Features a series of hunts for the winner and three guests, including a quail, pheasant, dove and turkey hunt.

Once numbering in the millions, Attwater's prairie chickens have disappeared as their habitat has disappeared. They are Texas' most endangered species. The year 2000 count estimated only 50 prairie chickens left in the wild. It must be seeded (or stacked) properly, limed and fertilized correctly, weeded now and then, and harvested in the correct numbers and on an appropriate timetable. CONSERVATION EASEMENT

A perpetual legal agreement between a private property owner and a qualified conservation organization to voluntarily place restrictions on the type and amount of development that may take place on a piece of property and to protect significant natural features including wildlife or wildlife habitat.

“BOBWHITE BRIGADE”

A cooperative effort between Texas A&M Coop. Ext. Service, TPW, NRCS, TWA and Quail Unlimited, the Bobwhite Brigade Wildlife Camps are intensive, 5-day hands-on experiences for high school youth ages 14-17. Participants undergo intensive instruction on quail ecology, natural resource management and leadership development. After graduation, participants return to their local communities and give outreach programs on conservation. “BUCKSKIN BRIGADE”

A cooperative effort between Texas A&M Coop. Ext. Service, TPW, NRCS, TWA and Quail Unlimited, the Buckskin Brigade Wildlife Leadership Camp is an intensive, 5-day hands-on experience for high school youth ages 14-17. “Cadets” undergo intensive instruction on white-tailed deer ecology, natural resource management and leadership development. Upon graduation, the cadets return to their local communities and give outreach programs on conservation. TEXAS PARKS AND WILDLIFE GRANT PROGRAMS

COMMUNITY OUTDOOR OUTREACH PROGRAM (COOP)

Provides grants to local governments and non-profit, non-political organizations. Grant sponsors use funds to introduce under-served persons to the programs and facilities of Texas Parks and Wildlife. Sponsors may use funds to buy outdoor recreation equipment, food, instruction or transportation. For more information, contact: 512-912-7145

LOCAL PARK GRANTS

Grants to communities to develop community parks. For more information, contact: 512-912-7120

RAIL-TRAILS

Rail-trails are multi-purpose public paths created from abandoned railroad corridors. Flat or following a gentle grade, they traverse urban, suburban and rural America. Ideal for many uses, such as bicycling, walking, horseback riding, in-line skating, cross-country skiing and wheelchair recreation. Texas has seven existing rail trails encompassing 184 miles. TPW offers matching grants to fund rail-trail projects. For more information, contact: 512-389-4735

RECREATION TRAIL FUND

Approximately \$2 million is awarded annually to local governments, non-profit organizations and school districts to develop trails open to the public. An 80%-20% matching reimbursement grant. For details and application, contact: 512-389-4737

BOAT RAMP CONSTRUCTION

This program provides a 75% matching grant to local governments for the construction of public boat ramps providing access to public waters. Sponsors must provide the land, legal access, 25% matching share, and accept operation and maintenance responsibility for at least 25 years. The maximum grant per application is \$500,000. Application submission deadlines are January 31st and July 31st each year. Contact: 512-912-7120

INDOOR RECREATION

Eligible projects include facilities related to athletics, arts, nature centers, interpretive space, senior citizen centers, meeting rooms, recreation related equipment, aquatics and fitness rooms. Submission deadline is July 31st each year. For more information, contact: 512-912-7120

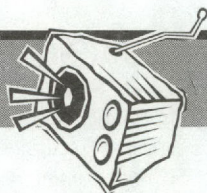

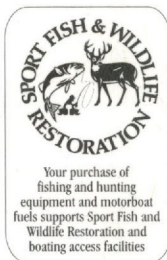
