

Bradley, Fisher and Matthews Continue As Directors Reappointed To GCA Board

Gail G. Bradley, Dr. Frank. M. Fisher, Jr., and James A. "Ossie" Matthews, Jr. have each been reappointed for another two-year term on the Board of Directors for Gulf Coast Waste Disposal Authority. Fisher, the senior of the three, has served on the GCA board since 1979.

In his letter of appointment to Fisher, Harris County Judge Jon Lindsay acknowledged his appreciation for the director's continuing service to the community. "Your willingness to serve in this capacity means a great deal to Commissioners Court and the people of Harris County." A biological researcher by profession, Fisher has worked on such projects as biological responses to pesticides in the Bay Area, and the development of a more complete understanding of the State's wetlands.

Matthews, a resident of Texas City, will be beginning his third term on the GCA Board. "The Commissioners Court and I are pleased that you are willing to continue your tenure on the Board," wrote Galveston County Commissioners Court Judge Ray Holbrook. "We appreciate very much the fine job you have done." Matthews is self employed in Galveston County.

Open House Opens Lab To Guests/Customers

More than 100 GCA customers and other guests recently toured the Authority's new Central Lab at Bayport. It was "work as usual" throughout the facilty as representatives from companies such as Dixie Chemical, Union Carbide and Lyondell were introduced to the Lab's vast array of equipment capable of providing more precise testing and faster reporting than before.

According to Central Lab Manager Jack Wahlstrom, the \$1.45 million complex currently conducts conventional testing in areas such as oxygen demand, nutrients and total suspended solids, as well as routine and low level analysis for heavy metals. Organic analysis is also being done to some degree, as is hazardous waste testing.

"Everyone touring the lab seemed genuinely impressed with what we have here," said Wahlstrom.

"Continued safe and effective treatment depends upon GCA's ability to reliably determine waste material components. With dependable information, practical remedies can be employed to more efficiently treat substances which may be harmful to the environment," he said.

GCA General Manager Dick Brown emphasized the new lab's importance, saying, "The GCA Central Labcratory staff is highly trained in the use of its state-of-the-art equipment. Combining these upper-level skills and equipment, with our quality assurance and control program that is second to none, has provided the industry with dramatically improved analytical capabilities that set new standards for dependability."

A portion of the 10,000 square foot facility is available for future expansion. The Central Lab currently employs 19 chemists and technicians.

40 Acre/Award Winning WWTP Approaches Second Decade

Editor's note: This is the second in a series of general reviews of GCA operations.

In early 1974 a valve was opened and wastewater from Union Carbide Corporation began flowing into a new treatment facility in Texas City. And though originally built to service only Carbide, it wasn't long before other area waste producers began using the services of GCA's 40 Acre wastewater treatment plant (WWTP).

Today 40 Acre provides joint treatment for the waste streams from Union Carbide, Sterling Chemicals, Inc., Monsanto Chemical Company, and miscellaneous sources from the GCA's Campbell Bayou facility, as well as, uncontar-inated rainwater run-off from the Motco site.

"The 40 Acr∈ facility (its name has nothing whatsoever to do with its size) is a simple, extremely effective operation," said manager Lavern≈ Pedersen. "In fact, we have been honored for several years in a row as a recipient of the Gold Award presented by the Association of Metropolitan Sewerage Agencies (AMSA) for facilities which had no National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System permit violations during the calendar year." The last permit violation at the facility occurred in 1984 during the massive Christmas freeze, and that was deemed an "act of God," and therefore no fault of the operation or staff.

This 165 acre WWTP provides both Intermediate and Secondary treatment of waterborne wastes through a series of individual processes, each performing specific actions on the combined waste streams of the plant's customers. "The amount of raw waste we receive for treatment each day is equivalent to that generated by a typical city with a population of 800,000," said Pedersen. The load is staggering, but well within the facility's capabilities he says. The treatment system used at 40 Acre is a modification of the activated sludge system. "Microcrangisms, in the presence of dissolved organic material and oxygen, convert the organics to carbon dioxide, water and more microorganisms.," Pedersen explained. "The microorganisms are allowed to settle from the liquid and are then removed from the system to ultimate disposal.

"We are really proud of the work being done at this facility," said Pedersen. "It's the norm for us to maintain a 90 to 95 percent organics removal rate, and that's an excellent level for any facility!"

GAUA Meeting Sets Attendance Record



- approved a Resolution Authorizing the General Manager to Enter into a Contract with Texas Treasury Safekeeping Trust Company (Texpool) for the Investment of

Gulf Coast Waste Disposal Authority Funds.

- approved a Resolution Adopting an Amended ICMA Retirement Corporation Money Purchase Plan and Trust Agreement.
- awarded bid to Trey Industries in the amount of \$161,000 for B-Plant aeration piping fabrication at the Bayport Facility.
- awarded bid to Trey Industries in the amount of \$57,920 for the installation of B-Plant aeration piping at the Bayport Facility.
- awarded bid to Bell Construction in the amount of \$213,607 for dike liner repairs at the 40-Acre Facility.
- awarded bid to Maxwell Construction Co. in the amount of \$57,345 for improvements to Control Building at the 40-Acre Facility.
- approved the appointment of KPMG Peat Marwick to perform the 1991 audit for GCWDA.
