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CRCG Coordinators: Supporting A More Efficient CRCG

Many CRCGs, urban and rural alike, are exploring the idea of a CRCG Coordinator position to assist in a more efficient operation. The State CRCG Office recently conducted an informal survey of the current six coordinator positions. Questions were asked of the CRCG Coordinators, as well as the CRCG Chairpersons and other CRCG members. Below are the results of this inquiry.

Benefits for supporting CRCG Coordinator position(s) include the following:

- •an effective link to keep agencies focused for the purpose of multi-agency service planning for children and youth.
- •CRCG meetings are more organized, for example, members have the information needed (i.e., consent forms, assessments, background information) to quickly address the barriers to interagency service planning.
- •increased follow up to service planning, resulting in more effective service delivery to children and youth referred to the CRCG.
- •an increase in attendance of the family and necessary agency/group members who need to be represented for a particular staffing.

Responsibilities of CRCG Coordinators may include the following:

Our FINAL FOUR involved the counties of Crosby, Lynn, Hockley, and Cochran. Future players were welcomed June 20, 1995 by Sherri Hammack, State CRCG Project Director. Coach Sherri gave an inspirational message to the budding teams in attendance. Half-time show commentary was a rousing panel discussion provided by Dick Hatfield, Regional Youth Associates; Venida Collins, Muleshoe I.S.D.; Mona Kile, Lubbock Regional Council on Alcohol and Drug Abuse; Dr. Maralyn Billings, Region XVII ESC; and Rebeca Wallace, Lubbock Regional MHMR. Following a morning of orientation and training, individual teams huddled to elect interim team captains and establish meeting sites, dates and times. Great things are expected from the new CRCGs!

Regional XVII ESC's commitment doesn't end with just providing orientation and training. Consultants serve in various roles on all 15 CRCGs throughout the region. With the full support and

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- •serves as a single point of contact for CRCG referrals (obtains information and identify necessary staff.)
- •coordinates and screens CRCG referrals (i.e., assuring the appropriateness of referrals to the CRCG; identifying and contacting the necessary persons who need to attend a particular meeting.) •conducts pre-staffings/mini-
- •conducts pre-staffings/ministaffings prior to full CRCG team consideration.
- •completes CRCG related paperwork (referrals, staffing forms, meeting notification letters, releases of information, meeting minutes, etc.)
- •schedules meeting time and place(i.e., emergency staffings, retreats/workshops for CRCG and Community Managment Team (CMT.)
- •serves as a neutral case manager or service coordinator, especially for particular children and families who do not clearly have a "lead" agency.
- •coordinates resources as specified in an interagency service plan (i.e., coordinate wraparound service programs, providing in-home support, developing funding resources, etc.)
- •serves as a link with CMT, CRCG, city, etc.
- serves as a neutral advocate for children and family.
- •represents CRCG in court.
- •develops compelling reports, such as annual surveys, outcome evaluation reports.
- •provides community education about CRCGs.

So, if you find that you have an increase in the number of CRCG referrals or a need for better coordination and follow through of planning services, you might consider the possibility of a CRCG Coordinator position.

"Your Kids" " My Kids" = Our Kids

The philosophy of the Tarrant County CRCG is that kids staffed at the "Kid's Team" are not "your" kids or "my" kids, but they are all our kids.

It has been my privilege to serve as the Chairperson of the Tarrant County CRCG for the last two years, and I have seen a lot of changes and growth in our CRCG. We, as a community of service providers, have worked and grown together as a team. Everyday efforts are made to examine what can be done differently to improve the way families are served. What works in Tarrant County might not work in other communities because each community is unique.

What makes the Tarrant County CRCG successful? The key word is "willingness." Willingness to:

- ·Share ideas and funds.
- •Try new ways of doing things.
- Put kids' needs first instead of the individual agency's needs.
- •Take responsibility for helping the families as a team instead of individuals/agencies.

What makes the Tarrant County CRCG a unique model?

1. The Tarrant County CRCG has of two components. The

first is the "Parent" CRCG. Members of this group are upper level administrators and have the authority to delegate or remove agency barriers as needed. The second component is the "Kid's Team." The Kid's Team is composed of front line staff who have hands-on knowledge of the youth and their families who are staffed.

2. The Tarrant County Children's Mental Health Plan allocated funds to be used for kids and families determined to be in need of services other than in-home or outpatient treatment. Dispensation of these funds is approved through the staffing process and include therapeutic foster care, short-term residential treatment, expanded day treatment, emergency shelter, respite, etc.

3. The Parent Support Coordinator is playing an important role in our CRCG by coordinating and scheduling the individual staffings. This position also attends staffings in order to help the family feel more comfortable and less anxious before and during the staffing process. 4. The Aftercare Caseworker is also serving a critical role by attending each staffing and initiating the process for all children referred to Waco Center for Youth or other placement centers. This position also travels to placements once a month to update treatment plans and visit with the child. At the time of discharge, aftercare services are coordinated between Waco Center (or other placement), the CRCG, and MHMR.

Finally, I believe that every community is in need of a CRCG and every CRCG has the potential to be successful, if we remember to put the needs of kids and families first.

We, in Tarrant County would like to extend a hearty welcome and invitation to all who are committed to the collaborative work for kids to atttend the CRCG Regional Conference in Fort Worth, October 9 and 10, 1995.



At a recent joint meeting of the State CRCG Team and the State Management Team a new idea was presented that might be useful to local groups. There are occasions when local CRCGs, particularly in rural communities, need essential equipment such as computers, copiers, or other office equipment in order to adequately provide services for the children and families.

One such request was made from a local community in West Texas. They desperately needed a computer. Fortunately, a 386 computer was provided on loan by a state agency with surplus equipment. All such requests might not be so easily solved. But this is an example of the CRCG "can-do" attitude that has yielded success from very difficult situations.
