



Texas Leads The Nation In Wind Power

AUSTIN – Last summer, myself and other state leaders dedicated to increasing Texas's energy supply and diversification called for the Public Utility Commission (PUC) to undertake steps toward better connecting Texas wind farms to the growing population centers of our state.

The population of Texas is expected to more than double by 2050, and current projections by the Electric Reliability Council of Texas (ERCOT) show that energy generation also may have to double by 2026 to keep up with demand, taking into account a growing population and aging power plants. In anticipation of these growing needs, the PUC is moving forward on plans to connect West Texas and Panhandle wind farms with the state's primary electric grid.

Joining Regulated Industries Committee Chairman Phil King and myself at a Capitol news conference, Railroad Commission Chairman Victor Carrillo said, "The emergence and growth of wind energy is coming at just the right time for Texas, the nation's leader in energy production, population and economic growth. It is critical for Texas to have a strong, vibrant and diversified energy portfolio including oil and natural gas, clean coal, nuclear, wind and other renewables."

Today, Texas leads the nation in wind power. At the end of 2007, about 4,300 megawatts of wind-generated electricity was in service, enough to power about one million Texas homes.

Texas wind energy improves our energy supply and improves our air quality at the same time. Wind has zero emissions, and creates jobs and economic opportunity for rural Texas. The Legislature was right to address wind-related power transmission, and I applaud the Texas Public Utility Commission for their hard work on this issue.

Representative Anderson understands and supports education and the very important role that substitute teachers have in educating our children. Here, Doc undergoes substitute teacher training and certification with Kathy Gentry at the Region XII Educational Service Center headquarters in Waco.

Texas In The Current Economy


Although the economic outlook is grim for many parts of the nation and government budgets have been thrown into chaos, a review of financial and economic structures in Texas reveals a significantly better picture as a whole.

In Fiscal Year 2008, the gross state product grew by 4.1 percent, compared to 1.5 percent for the national economy. Also, in the 12 months preceding September 2008, Texas gained almost 248,000 jobs, more than that of the next highest 14 states combined. Texas's unemployment rate, currently at 5.1 percent, has been lower than the national rate for 21 consecutive months. Home foreclosures in Texas are right now running about 1 in every 1,000, compared to ratios in other states of 1 in every 100 to 200.

Texas's track record of low taxes, no personal income tax, a stronger economy, and a constitutional ban on deficit spending appear to be the key factors in positioning Texas more favorably than most other states when it comes to budget management.

What About Public Retirement Systems - TRS, ERS?

There are two types of funding retirement accounts – defined benefit, and defined contribution. A **defined contribution** is straight-up, get out of it what you put in – plus your interest. These are mostly your 401(k)s, IRAs, and other such investment instruments. If you are a state employee or teacher, your ERS/TRS contributions are a **defined benefit**. That is, your retirement payments are based upon a formula established by the legislature and not directly tied to individual member contributions or stock market performance. Furthermore, these retirement funds are diversified to keep any one sector of underperforming returns from jeopardizing the overall stability of the retirement systems.

ANDERSON PRE-FILES LEGISLATION TO RESTRICT DANGEROUS DRUG

Salvia divinorum is an herb, the leaves of which contain the compound Salvinorin-A – the active agent to induce the high that people experience when they use it. The effects of salvia are usually extreme disorientation, imaginary visions, experiences of alternate realities, and other such symptoms typically associated with hallucinations.

As I've gone around the state at legislative committee hearings and appeared nationally on the Dr. Phil show, two things about this drug are reinforced: 1) people do not realize how popular this drug has gotten amongst our youth; and 2) people are startled that an hallucinogen this powerful is readily available and legal to obtain.

The affects of smoking the extract from this otherwise harmless plant are noticed as soon as 20 to 60 seconds after smoking, and the high can last from a few minutes to up to an hour. Disorientation may be present for as long as 4 hours.

It has been termed by medical researchers as the world's most potent naturally occurring hallucinogen, and is illegal in twelve states. I have filed legislation to make Texas the 13th (HB 126). This drug is dangerous, incapacitating, and serves no medical use whatsoever.

HB 126 calls for a Class A Misdemeanor penalty (fine of up to \$4,000, jail time up to one year, or both) for most cases of people possessing the drug. Penalties increase for larger amounts of the drug possessed.

AGENCIES UP FOR SUNSET REVIEW IN THE 81st LEGISLATURE

In 1977, the Sunset Act became law in Texas, which puts a rotating set of state agencies up for renewal **every 12 years**. If legislation renewing an agency is not passed, the agency automatically "sunsets", or goes out of existence. Oftentimes, an agency's functions will be transferred to or consolidated with another state agency. In the last 30 years, this has happened numerous times — also, several smaller advisory boards and temporary functions have been abolished outright.

The other purpose of the Sunset review process is to look for ways to improve an agency's function through **efficiency and modernization**, eliminating duplication and waste, and making sure that agencies maintain their responsiveness to the Texans they serve. This coming year, **27 agencies** and boards are under Sunset review, including: the Texas Department of Agriculture, the Department of Insurance, the Office of the Public Insurance Counsel, the Department of Public Safety, and the Texas Department of Transportation, among others. I've highlighted some thoughts about two agencies below:


Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT)

The Sunset review of the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) occurred against a backdrop of distrust and frustration with the Department and the demand for more transparency, accountability, and responsiveness. Significant changes are needed to begin this restoration; tweaking the status quo is simply not enough.

Therefore, the Sunset Commission may recommend that the agency be placed under stricter legislative oversight for a four-year period, effectively returning control over transportation policy to the Legislature where it belongs. The key need for this agency is to improve its communications with policymakers and the public.

Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS)

Thanks to Sunset review, this agency will undertake a complete top-to-bottom review of management structure to improve communication, modernize technology systems, and improve the agency's approach to emergency management. One such finding was that the driver license service and functions are under a law enforcement command structure rather than as a business and customer service function. This is just a small example of how management of the agency has far too long operated under circumstances where organizational structures have been isolated from one another. An outside independent review will bring much needed renewal of the agency's purpose and service to all Texans; in fact, the Department is already putting some management reforms into place.



CITY OF WEST GAINS PRESTIGIOUS "MAIN STREET" DESIGNATION

The City of West has been chosen by the Texas Historical Commission as a "Main Street" city for 2009.

The Texas Main Street Program, part of the Texas Historical Commission's Community Heritage Development Division, helps Texas cities revitalize their historic downtowns and neighborhood commercial districts by utilizing preservation and economic development strategies.

The program began in 1981 and is affiliated with the National Trust for Historic Preservation. The Texas Main Street Program is among the most successful downtown revitalization programs in the nation. It has resulted in the private reinvestment of more than \$1.3 billion in Texas downtowns and neighborhood commercial districts, the creation of more than 23,000 jobs and the establishment of more than 5,900 new businesses in Texas.



Are You Ready For Digital Tv Transition?

As many of you may have heard, on February 17, 2009 all full-power broadcast television stations in the United States will stop broadcasting on analog airwaves and begin broadcasting only in digital. The FCC has taken some steps to prepare people for this, but if you still need more information, go to http://www.dtv.gov or call 1-888-CALL FCC (1-888-225-5322).

First, let's review the scenarios where you may need to review how your TV is set up:

- ★ My TV is hooked up to cable or satellite; I plan on keeping it that way
 - > No action needed
- ★ I receive broadcasts directly over the air, but my TV was purchased after March 1, 2007
 - ➤ No action needed all TVs purchased in the United States after that date have the required equipment
- ★ I receive broadcasts over the air; my TV was manufactured between 1984 and 2007
 - ➤ Check with your manufacturer or your owner's manual before buying a converter. Your set may have a built-in digital tuner.
- ★ I receive broadcasts over the air; my TV does not have a built-in converter, or is from before 1984
 - ➤ You will need a converter. The FCC has a \$40 coupon available to help you purchase a converter box, so be sure to contact them at the number above. Prices range greatly depending upon which one you want.


