Mayor's Message



Happy Independence Day! Once again, we will host an evening parade and celebration – hope to see you all!

Congressional Representative - CORRECTION: For those who read my April article regarding your Congressional representation, I was in error. I thought all Windcrest was moving to Congressional District 21, I was wrong. With the redistricting, the City of Windcrest will be split between two Congressional Districts, 21 and 35. Everyone on the West side of Eaglecrest will be in District 21, those on the East Side of Eaglecrest are in a new Congressional District 35. The district 21 race will be between Chip Roy and Claudia Zapata. The district 35 race will be between Greg Casar and Dan McQueen.

Windcrest Elections: In addition to the National and County elections, Windcrest Citizens will be voting on Places 1, 2 and 3 on our City Council and proposed changes to our City Charter. Our Charter Commission has reviewed the City Charter and will make recommendations to the City Council for consideration in November. Special City Council meetings and public hearings will be scheduled for late July and early August. If you are qualified to vote by mail, you can apply now. Here are some important dates for the November elections:

- Monday, July 25th First Day to file for a position on the City Council
- Monday, August 22nd @ 5pm Last Day to file for a position on the City Council
- Tuesday, October 11th Last day to register to vote for the November election
- Friday, August 26th @ 5pm Last day for a citizen to file as a write-in candidate
- Monday, October 24th First day of early voting for personal appearance
- Friday, November 4th Last day of early voting for personal appearance
- Tuesday, November 8th Election Day

Windcrest Pool: With the defeat of the Bond election for an Aquatic Center, a decision needs to be made regarding that property. We are working with the City Engineer to properly fill in the pool. We have asked our Parks and Recreations Commission to look at options for that land and provide their recommendations to the City Council.

Budget: The City Council did not meet in June, but we will be busy in July getting the budget finalized. We have scheduled Special City Council Budget Workshops for July 13th, 14th, and 15th. These are all open meetings, and we encourage Citizens to participate. The budget process will continue through July. We will publish the tax rate, hold public hearings, and finalize the budget in the month of August.

Roads: In addition to some repairs on interior streets, I hope you have noticed the flashing lights at our school intersections. The project to construct a traffic light at the intersection of Eaglecrest and Crestway is ongoing and should be completed in the August/September time frame.

I am continuing my "Coffee with the Mayor" every Saturday that I am in town. At the request of some of the participants, I am going to invite some special guests to be with us. Please see my Facebook page (Dan Reese, Mayor, City of Windcrest) for updates. We begin at 8:30 at Las Palapas on Walzem. You are welcome to come and go as you please and have coffee on me!

CITY CODE HIGHLIGHTS

On May 16, 2022, the City Council discussed and approved the first reading of Ordinance 2022-013(O), to provide additional property tax relief to homeowners as allowed by law. Due to the increasing property values throughout Bexar County, the Council felt it was in the best interest of the citizens of Windcrest to adopt the said homestead exemption.

On May 23, 2022, City Council approved Ordinance 2022-013(O), an ordinance authorizing a percentage-based exemption from ad valorem taxes on the appraised value of a residence homestead in the amount of five percent (5%) of the appraised value of the individual's residence homestead or a minimum of \$5,000, to be effective for the tax year beginning on January 1, 2022.

Sec. 14-8 Construction Waste Disposal and Receptacles

- (a) Whenever remodeling, demolition, construction, or other activity on a property generates construction waste, the owner is responsible and has the duty to ensure construction waste is properly disposed with no impact from the waste on the property or surrounding properties.
- (b) Whenever the volume of construction waste requires a receptacle for disposal, including a dumpster, disposal bin, or other container required for removal of the waste, the owner shall obtain a permit from the city for such receptacle. Each construction waste receptacle permit shall be limited to an individual property and limited in duration.

Applications, inspections, business registration, and payments are now processed through www.mygovernmentonline.org. Click on Permits & Licensing – Apply Online and Create New Account. Make sure you identify the jurisdiction as WINDCREST.









On November 8, 2022 the City of Windcrest will hold a General Election for City Councilmember Place 1, City Councilmember Place 3, and City Councilmember Place 3. Registered voters will be able to vote early and on voting day at 9310 Jim Seal Dr. at the Takas Park Civic Center.

Mark Your Calendars

Monday, July 25 – Monday, August 22 @ 5 pm: Period to file an application for place on general election ballot.

Sunday, August 28 – Thursday, September 1: Recommended period to conduct drawing for order on names on ballot.

Monday, August 29 @ 5 pm: Last day for ballot or write-in candidate in general election to submit a certificate of withdrawal. (SOS Form 2-33)

Tuesday, October 11: Last day for submitting voter registration application in time to vote at the election or for requesting transfer of registration in time to vote in new precinct not in the same county and territory.

Monday, October 24: First Day for early voting by personal appearance.

Friday, November 4: Last day for early voting by personal appearance.

Code Compliance & Enforcement

We started the summer with decent rain and noticed this past month most property owners have been keeping up with property maintenance; we appreciate all your efforts, keep up the excellent work. While working outside, please remember to hydrate and take frequent breaks. I always say a well-maintained property is an important part of a healthy lifestyle. I highly recommend you check the references on all contractors you use for repairs and make sure you review their permits before they start any project. We have come across contractors without permits and had to stop their work, please check with our city staff if a permit is required. Also, please keep up with the maintenance of your swimming pools, report any violations you see. Inspect your homes and replace or repair rotting wood, broken boards/panels, gutters, fences, and correct rusted metals by painting/treating exposed areas that need painting, protect your investment.

REMINDER: Residential garbage, waste, and refuse placed outside for pickup <u>shall be contained</u> in a durable metal or hardened rubber container, make sure it is a tightly sealed insect and animal proof lid. Trash bags left out can <u>only</u> be used for disposal of leaves, grass trimmings or other items, no food-based products please.

A Message From Fire Marshal Zelenak

I hope everyone is having a wonderful summer. This month I would like to share a few safety points about Pool Safety. There is nothing better than taking a jump in the swimming pool to cool off from the brutal Texas heat. A carefree swim in the pool can turn deadly extremely fast. Please make sure your children are always supervised while in and around the swimming pool. If you have a swimming pool in your backyard it is a great idea to have a fence around the pool with a locking gate to keep your children out of the area when you cannot keep your eyes on them. Installing an alarm on your back door or a door that leads to your pool can alert you when they go outside.

Swimming lessons are a great start to keeping your little swimmer safe, if children are not strong swimmers or young children are playing with older children in the pool. A life jacket is always a smart choice. In the event of a drowning, Knowing CPR and dialing 911 to get Emergency Service Responding are going be your best chance for survival. Please be safe when you or your family are playing in or around water. It only takes 6 inches of water for a child to drown.

PREVENTING OAK WILT ORDINANCE 2019-713(0)





WHAT IS OAK WILT?

Oak wilt is a highly infectious disease caused by a fungus. This fungus damages water-conducting system (or the xylem), meaning the trees cannot get the water and nutrients it needs. It is scread by beetles that carry the fungus spores, and through interconnected roots underground.

KNOW WHEN TO TRIM/PRUNE

You may only trim or prune your oak trees during the months of JULY, AUGUST, SEPTEMBER, OCTOBER, NOVEMBER, DECEMBER, AND JANUARY. This time period is is when transmission of the disease is least likely to spread.





DOING IT RIGHT

Before you trim, review Windcrest City Ordinance No. 2019-713(0).

- Permits must be pulled for any oak tree trimming/maintenance.
- Use clean/sterilized tools EVERY TIME
- Only out sections NO LONGER THAN
 Aft in length
- Paint all the wounds on the trees immediately with a latex-based paint
- Dispose of all the trimmings immediately

PROPER DISPOSAL

Unpainted wounds and the trimmed branches can spread oak wilt. If you hired someone to trim your oak trees, they MUST haul off the trimmed branches. Either grind or chip the trimmed branches, or take the branches to an approved disposal site outside of Windcrest city limits. If you trim or cut down any oak tree on your property, the trimmings must be disposed of properly. No trimming can be left on any City owned property or in the right-of-way. It is important to dispose of the trimming

properly to prevent infections.





EMS Certifications

One of the questions people ask us is the difference in patches on our uniforms. In Texas, there are five distinct types of EMS certifications, and a medical director patch. The first is the Emergency Care Attendant. An Emergency Care Attendant, or ECA for short, is the lowest level of medical certification. This training is designed for first responders that will only be providing basic first aid measures when responding to a call. The next certification is an Emergency Medical Technician or EMT. This level of provider is the most common. It is the entry-level medical training that most firefighters undergo as part of obtaining their certification. In Texas, every career firefighter is required to obtain their medical certification. While there are still a few ECA's around, the majority of firefighters are EMT's. The Advanced Emergency Medical Technician or AEMT undergoes more education and can perform more invasive skills, such as IV's and intubations. The Paramedic and Licensed Paramedic are both capable of performing all the same skills. This level of provider is going to be able to administer pharmacology, perform IV's, perform intubations, combat several different cardiac issues, and more. The only difference between a Paramedic and a Licensed Paramedic is that the Licensed Paramedic has either an associate degree in Paramedicine or similar or holds a bachelor's degree in any discipline. All the EMS practitioners work under the license of a Physician who provides the criteria for what skills can be performed and by whom. A medical director is a Physician who is specialized in Emergency Medicine and has undergone a fellowship as an EMS Medical Director. Here in Windcrest, our Medical Director is Doctor Craig Manifold, DO. Doctor Manifold is also a retired Brigadier General from the US Air Force.









Looking for a new walking partner or couch cuddle buddy. Look no further but to our bulletin board or our website for your new four-legged family friend. Reminder, please chip or keep a collar with a **up-to-date** rabies tag and Windcrest registration on your pet so that your dog or cat, if lost, can get back to you. Many times, a gate is left open, or a hungry cat finds its way to someone else's porch. New residents to Windcrest, please update your microchip information. Many times, a dog without a collar, but chipped is returned if the phone number and address is current.

Lastly, it is HOT! Keep cool water available for your pets. Watch out for the wild animals that are looking for a water source. Consider a fence around your pool or a ramp for them to escape from a watery death. Children and animals are most at risk of an accident in the water when it is hot.

Flea preventative treatments are a year-round must-have for cats AND dogs! Not only are fleas a nuisance to you and your pets, but they can also carry diseases that can debilitate your furry friends (and in some cases even cause death). A simple way to test if your pet has fleas is to brush over your pet with a paper towel, or part the hair and look at their skin. If you do not find any adult fleas, you will see their feces (also called "flea dirt") which look like small dark specks. Fleas ingested by your pet while grooming may result in tapeworms (You may notice what looks like a piece of white rice moving on their bottom or in their stool. This is a sign of tapeworms, which can be treated with oral medication). Adult fleas only represent 5% of the flea population, so it is important to have a routine that addresses all the life stages (eggs, larvae, pupae). Monthly topical combo products (like Revolution or AdvantageMulti) can kill up to 98% of fleas in various life stages and protect pets from ticks, heartworms (carried by mosquitoes), and some intestinal parasites (roundworms, hookworms) too!

Indoor pets are also at risk! Some studies have shown that 1/3 of heartworm infections were in indoor-only pets! Keep your pets healthy and happy - talk to your vet for more info. And remember to spay or neuter your pets!!!!!

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Never Leave Your Child or Pet Alone in a Car



Don't risk your child's life by leaving them in the car alone during hot weather. A child's body can heat up five times faster than an adult's, and even in cooler weather, cars can heat up to dangerous temperatures very quickly. On a mild day, the temperature inside a car can rise 20 degrees above the

outside temperature in just 10 minutes or less! Here are tips to help keep your child safe this summer:

- Make a habit of checking your vehicle before leaving it. Look before you lock!
- Keep a stuffed animal or other objects next to you in the car as a reminder that your child is with you.
- If you ever see a child left alone in a car, call 9-1-1 immediately!

Pets can get dehydrated quickly. Make sure you take precautions to keep your pet safe.

- Give your pet plenty of water when it's hot outdoors. Make sure to fill their water bowl before you leave.
- Make sure they have a shady place to get out of the sun.
- Be careful not to over-exercise your pet. Too much playtime in the hot sun is dangerous for them.
- Hot asphalt and tar can burn sensitive paw pads, walk your pet on grass or dirt when possible.
- Keep your pet indoors when it's extremely hot outside.
- Never leave your pet in a car! Pets can overheat in minutes so don't put them at risk! Leave them home during hot weather.
