

Mayor's Message Dan Reese

It is Football season again! We hope for a successful season for all our student athletes! We will light The Windcrest "Candle" to celebrate wins from our Roosevelt Rough Riders!

Budget – The budget is on the agenda to be finalized at the September 19th City Council meeting. The draft budget was on the agenda at every Council meeting after the draft was presented to allow for comment. We held a public hearing on the proposed budget and the Tax Rate on August 15th. This budget meets the needs of our department heads and even allowed for some much-needed Capital expenditures.

Property Tax – Your Council took several actions to keep your Property Tax bill lower. They reduced the tax rate from 0.404306 to 0.39000. In May, the Council voted on a 5% Homestead Exemption property value reduction. We already had a \$15,000 property value reduction for those over 65 years of age. Additionally, the Council continued to use a portion of sales tax to reduce property tax instead of going to the general fund. The sales tax offset reduced my Windcrest tax bill by \$245.83. Yours may be different because of your home's Bexar County Appraisal value.

Windcrest Elections – The deadline has passed to apply to run for a position on the City Council. Places 1 (Currently held by Councilmember Wes Manning) and Place 3 (Currently held by Councilmember Greg Turner) did not have opposition. You will be voting on Place 2, currently held by Councilmember Cindy Stzelecki. Belinda Hill-Herbst applied to run for Place 2 as well. You will also be voting on proposed changes to your Windcrest City Charter. Information regarding these proposed changes is on the City Website and you will get a mailer also. The closest polling place for both early and election day voting will be at our own Takas Park Civic Center at 9610 Jim Seal Dr. If you are qualified to vote by mail, you can apply now. Here are some important dates for the November elections:

- October 24th First day of early voting in person
- November 4th Last day of early voting in person
- November 8th Election Day

Congressional Elections – For those of you who may not know, your US Congressperson will change in November. Windcrest *was* in Congressional District 28 represented by Henry Cuellar. After Redistricting, the City is split. District 21 is to the West of Eaglecrest, and District 35 is to the East of Eaglecrest. District 21 race has Chip Roy (R) facing Claudia

Zapata (D). District 35 race has Greg Casar (D) facing Dan McQueen (R). The District Maps on several web sites do not seem to be updated.

My "Coffee with the Mayor" continues to be extremely helpful for me and those who can participate. Because of an exposure to COVID, I had to cancel two coffees in August. 
PICK UP WILL RUN OCTOBER 3 through OCTOBER 21, 2022.

This service is for **WINDCREST RESIDENTS ONLY**. Brush and bulk collection will be picked up in sections throughout the city.

Refer to the guidelines below to identify the section your

collection will occur in.

Windcrest Fall Bulk and Brush Pick Up



Our Fall bulk and brush collection will begin in SECTION 1.

SECTION 1:

All homes located west of Midcrown are in Section 1. **Curbside service will begin on Monday, October 3, collecting through Friday, October 7.** ALL brush and bulk items to be collected MUST be placed out on the curb NO EARLIER than Friday, September 30, and NO LATER than Sunday, October 2. Collection will only be picked up once in each section. Republic Service WILL NOT return for additional pick-ups or missed pick-ups.

SECTION 2:

All homes located east of Midcrown, south of Crestway, and west of Eaglecrest are in Section 2. **Curbside service will begin on Monday, October 10, collecting through Friday, October 14.** ALL brush and bulk items to be collected MUST be placed out on the curb NO EARLIER than Friday, October 7, and NO LATER than Sunday, October 9. Collection will only be picked up once in each section. Republic Service WILL NOT return for additional collection or missed collections.

SECTION 3:

All homes located north of Crestway and east of Eaglecrest are in Section 3. **Curbside service will begin on Monday, October 17, collecting through Friday, October 21.** ALL brush and bulk items to be collected MUST be placed out on the curb NO EARLIER than Friday, October 14. and NO LATER than Sunday, October 16. Collection will only be picked up once in each section. Republic Service WILL NOT return for additional collection or missed collections.

Refer to the map above to confirm the section your collection will be picked up. **Each section will be serviced ONLY ONCE.** Your collection must be out on the curb by the prescribed date. If your items are not on the curb by your section deadline, your house will be MISSED. THERE WILL NOT BE ANY RETURN VISITS FOR PICK UP. Any materials placed out after your street has been serviced, the homeowner will be responsible for disposing of the materials at the Republic dumpsite and pay their dumping fees.

Need to know what are acceptable collections for this service? Refer to the guidelines listed below. If you have any questions regarding materials not listed below, please contact Republic Services directly at 210-304-2732.

Brush/Bulky Guidelines:

- Limit your brush pile to five (5) cubic yards.
- To determine the cubic yards, take the Length x Width x Height of the pile and divide by 27. (This will equal the cubic yards for example 5ft long by 5ft Wide by 5ft High = 125 divided by 27 equals 4.63 cubic yards.
- Brush must be placed within eight (8) feet of the curb.
- Do not place brush piles in front of parked cars, near fences, trees, mailboxes, beneath overhead wires, low-hanging tree limbs, or on top of gas/water meters.

Accepted Materials: Shrubs, Tree Branches, Woody Vines, Other herbaceous and woody plants, BBQ grills (without compressed gas tanks), Carpeting, Fencing, Furniture, Mattresses, Toilets, Water heaters, Appliances.

Refrigerators, freezers, and a/c window units will be collected only if refrigerant has been removed and the appliance is tagged and certified, indicating removal of refrigerant.

Materials Not Accepted: Household Trash, Construction Debris, Glass (such as doors or Windows), Hazardous Materials (paints, household cleaners), Compressed Gas Tanks, Tires, Televisions, Computers, Waste Oil, Medical Waste, Appliances with refrigerant that has not been removed and certified.





City of Windcrest November 8, 2022 General & Special Charter Election Information

Election time is here.

On November 8, 2022, the City of Windcrest will hold a General Election for City Councilmember Place 1, City Councilmember Place 2, and City Councilmember Place 3. Registered voters will be able to vote early and on voting day at 9310 Jim Seal Dr. at the Takas Park Civic Center. You may refer to the Elections webpage for the early voting calendar.

Additionally, the City of Windcrest is holding a Special Charter Election on proposed amendments to the 2019 City of Windcrest Charter. There is a total of twelve (12) proposed amendments for voter consideration. November 2, 2022, Election Day Calendar

Tuesday, October 11: Last day for submitting voter registration application in time to vote at the election or for requesting transfer of registration in time to vote in new precinct not in the same county and territory.

Monday, October 24: First Day for early voting by personal appearance.

Friday, November 4: Last day for early voting by personal appearance.

A Message From Fire Marshal Zelenak

With Halloween upon us, here are some trick-or-treat safety tips for you and your little monsters.

- When choosing a costume, stay away from long trailing fabric. If your child is wearing a mask, make sure the eye holes are large enough so they can see out.
- Provide children with flashlights to carry for lighting or glow sticks as part of their costume.
- Keep all decorations away from open flames and other heat sources like light bulbs and heaters. Dried flowers, cornstalks and crepe paper catch fire easily.
- Use a battery-operated candle or glow-stick in jack-o-lanterns. If you use a real candle, use extreme caution. Be sure to place lit pumpkins far away from anything that can burn and far enough out of the way of trick-or-treaters, doorsteps, walkways, and yards.
- Tell children to stay away from open flames and be sure they know how to stop, drop, and roll if their clothing catches fire.

Code Compliance & Enforcement By Officer Selena Breland



As I travel through the city, I have seen some areas needing some work, specifically the back yards, alleys and tree branches that hang over our streets. Fall is here and leaves will soon start to fall. Remember, you may blow or sweep your leaves onto the street, just make sure you pick them up. Leaving them on the street is a violation under Section 14-2(b) and (c) / Littering. As we prepare for the holidays, make your properties safe for family and visitors. Help a neighbor clean, it can only help make your property look better.

Remember to lookup when you may put out items for brushbulk pickup in October. Please visit the city website for more information. As we let go of the summer and work our way into the fall. Please make sure you are trimming your low hanging tree branches. 13'6" inches is the minimum height over all roadways.

Even in cooler weather you can still dehydrate, drink plenty of fluids, wear protective clothing and take breaks. While the weather is cooler, do some exterior home repairs by replacing materials or painting as needed. Check with our permits department to see if you need a permit for any repairs or replacements.

Daylight savings time is fast approaching!

Clocks will fall back one hour on November 6, 2022. The Windcrest Fire Department is asking you to check your smoke alarms.

If you did not know:

- · 60% of home fire deaths occur in homes without a working smoke alarm. Change the batteries on your smoke alarms when you change the clock.
- Smoke alarms with non-replaceable 10-year batteries are designed to remain effective for up to 10 years. If the alarm beeps, warning that the battery is low, replace the smoke alarm right away.
- Make sure to always replace your smoke alarm every 10 years. Do not see a date on the back? Replace it!
- Your fire department recommends you install a smoke alarm in every bedroom, outside of bathrooms, near stairwells and on each floor of your home.
- If the audible trouble signal sounds, first check for low batteries. If the battery is low, replace it. If it still sounds, call the fire department.

Fall cleaning is in full swing and we are seeing more animals out and about with and without their owners. We have a leash law. This is to protect your pet from being hit by cars, hurt by dogs dumped within our city limits, and to keep us from finding your pet in the back alleys in someone's trash.

Please keep an updated rabies tags on your dog/cat and updated chip. We want to get them back to you. This helps weed out the strays from the pets that are roaming the streets.

Also with the cooler temps cats are roaming more and kittens are as always being born under shed and in open garages. Windcrest offers a Trap-Neuter-Program. We can loan you a trap and once trapped, take the cat or at least 3lb kitten to get spayed/neutered. The cat will be returned back to that location. Even if you are not the one feeding cats in your area, someone is. We bring them back to their feeding area and help prevent the population from over expanding.

Reminder!!! We have dogs and sometimes cats to adopt or foster!!! If you are looking for a new walking partner or can donate your time to walk the dogs in the kennel, give us a call.



If you do not find any adult fleas, you could see their feces (also called "flea dirt") which look like small dark specks.
