Windcrest Neighborhood Block Program

Windcrest is known for taking care of those around us. We have seen it several times during situations like the freeze a year ago February and certainly during COVID. I tried to establish an organized neighborhood awareness system some time ago. Unfortunately, it didn't get off the ground. Per a request from a couple of citizens, I am going to try again. Councilmember Marcus Yax and I have developed a system of "blocks" in our City. The intent is to have one person in each "block" to communicate with their neighbors in time of need so that the city might respond more efficiently. Here are the duties that we envision:

By volunteering to be a "Block Coordinator", we would like you to perform the following tasks:

- Attempt to make contact with each home in your Block and get the following information:
 - Names of the people in each home
 - Best phone number to contact them
 - Any special needs the home occupants might have, particularly in the case of loss of utilities.
 - We fully understand that some home occupants may not want to provide this information. THIS IS STRICTLY VOLUNTARY!
- Keep a record of the information you have collected.

- Make sure that our Emergency Management Coordinator (EMC) (Fire Chief) has the best phone number for the Block Coordinator.
- In the case of emergency or loss of utilities, you might be asked to poll your "Block" to provide status information to the EMC for purposes of identifying areas within the city that need special attention.

TEXT MY GOV – Smart Texting Technology to assist with resident requests/questions

Have you seen the TEXT MYGOV pop-up on the City's website? The City is making it easier for residents to relay information. Have code complaints or animal control issues? Need to ask a question about the fitness class or city services? You can connect to the city by text and can also include a picture upload with information about your concern/question. Simply send a text to 210-660-5332. You can also send a short message with a few words and get your questions and concerns answered through the preset automated messages or communicate directly with a city employee by texting, "Chat," during regular business hours. Note this new system and number is for non-emergency purposes only. Remember to always call 911 for all emergencies.

Interested in receiving notifications on CITY ALERT'S, such as public safety alerts and road closures? Text 91896. You will be automatically enrolled in the CITY ALERT messaging system. The Windcrest Fire Department and Emergency Management Team will be sending out all the emergency alerts through TEXT MY GOV. A Message From Fire Marshal Zelenak

This month I would like to talk about **smoke detectors** and the importance of them.

Every home should have working smoke detectors in every bedroom in the home and in the hallway near the bedroom doors. Smoke detectors have a life of 10 years from the date of manufacture, and they should be replaced once they are 10 years old. The batteries in your smoke detector need to be changed twice a year. When the time change happened in March and November, this is the perfect time to change your batteries. Testing your smoke detectors once a month will help to ensure it will work if needed.

Facts about smoke detectors:

- A residential fire is reported every 86 seconds in the United States, leading to 2,605 deaths in 2018, 11,575 injuries in 2018. An estimated loss of 7.2 billion dollars in property damage and the loss, not including your family memories which are priceless.
- 1 in 4 homes will report a fire in an average lifetime.
- 60% of all home fire deaths, no working smoke detectors were present or were non-operational due to poor maintenance or being outdated.

FIREPLACE SAFETY

There's nothing as cozy as a warm, crackling fire in the fireplace. But without using some simple safety precautions, that fire could turn deadly. Most of these injuries happened to children under five years of age.

House fires can start in fireplaces because of:

- An overloaded fire such as too much wood, paper, etc
- Damage to the fireplace such as missing bricks
- Blocked chimney flues
- Flying sparks
- Items too close to the fireplace catch fire, such as curtains, furniture, etc.

Keep your family safe and warm by following these fireplace safety tips:

- Inspect the fireplace.
- Make sure the protective linings and smoke ducts are clean and in good condition.
- Check to see that the chimney is clear and in good repair.
- If you are installing a factory-made fireplace, it should not be located near any materials that can catch fire easily.
- Have it checked and cleaned as necessary, by a CSIA (Chimney Safety Institute of America) Certified Chimney Sweep. This reduces the risk of fires and carbon monoxide poisonings due to buildup or blockages in the chimneys.
- Keep the top of chimneys clear of tree limbs or debris.
- Install a chimney cap to keep debris and animals out of the chimney.
- Always open the damper before lighting the fire and keep it open until the ashes are cool. This will help prevent the build-up of poisonous gases, such as carbon monoxide.
- Fuel the fire safely. For burning firewood in wood stoves or fireplaces, choose well-seasoned wood that has been dried for at least six months to a year and stored properly.

- Build it right. Place firewood or fire logs in the back of the fireplace on a sturdy grate.
- To start the fire, use a fire lighter.
- Never use gasoline, charcoal lighter or other fuel to light or re-light a fire because the vapors can explode.
- Never keep flammable fuels near a fire. Vapors can travel the length of a room and explode.
- Do not use coal or charcoal in a fireplace because of the danger of carbon monoxide.
- Do not burn trash or gift wrap in the fireplace because certain plastics, foam rubber and other coated materials can cause deadly fumes. Flying sparks could also allow the roof to catch fire.
- Artificial logs are very different from wood logs! Artificial logs are usually made of sawdust and wax and can burn differently. Be sure to read the instructions on the logs and follow them carefully. Use one log at a time and do not add another log until the fire is completely out. Never add an artificial log to a natural wood fire that is already burning. Wait at least two hours before adding an artificial log to a natural log fire because it could cause a flare-up.
- Do not poke artificial logs because the flaming wax could stick to the poker and drop onto the floor or carpet. Poking a log could also cause a flare-up.
- Home rolled newspaper logs should never be soaked in flammable fuels of any kind because of the severe danger of explosion. Soaking the newspaper in water either before rolling or during rolling removes the clay and can provide a better burning log. Stack the logs on end and let them dry for two weeks. When lighting the newspaper logs, use kindling just as you would for a regular fire.
- Do not overload the fireplace. Large fires can lead to overheating of a wall or roof, especially if the fireplace is made of metal.
- Always use a screen around the fireplace to keep sparks from flying out and to protect children and adults.
- Warn children about the danger of fire.
- Do not let them play with fire.
- Keep items such as carpets, pillows, furniture or papers away from the fireplace area.
- At holiday time, make sure the Christmas tree is not close enough to catch fire.
- Always make sure that the fire is completely out before going to bed for the night or when leaving the house.

CITIZEN'S PATROL WINDCREST

If one of your New Year's Resolutions was to increase your activity by walking or biking regularly in our beautiful city, we want to remind you for your safety to not walk or bike in our alleys. Alleys in Windcrest were primarily established to provide for service utilities or refuse collection. The city has an ordinance (Sec. 24-1) that I've included. Walking or biking in the alleys can be dangerous because of the large trucks used by utilities electrical, water, cable, internet or refuse collection. The alleys sometimes have deep ruts because of the weight of the trucks trans versing them after rains. If someone were to fall or have any kind of a medical emergency, it is not likely that anyone would see or hear you to call to get you help. Additionally, the State of Texas has a statue (Sec. 552.006 of the Transportation Code) regarding the use of sidewalks and when no sidewalk is provided. I've included this section as well and for your safety you should always walk on the left side of the roadway or shoulder facing oncoming traffic when a sidewalk is not provided.

Sec. 24-1: Regulation of use of public alleys, drainage ditches and public easements.

- a. Offenses. It shall be unlawful for any person to use public alleys, drainage ditches, public easements and other public facilities for recreation, congregation, skating or other purposes for which the public facility is not intended.
- b. Defenses. It is a defense to prosecution under subsection (a) of this section that:
- 1. The person was using the alley or public easement for ingress and egress to the person's property or to provide or service utilities or refuse collection.
- 2. The person was engaged in construction-related activities in or adjacent to the alley, drainage ditch, public easement or other public facility.
- 3. The person was using the alley, drainage ditch, public easement or other public facility on account of a bona fide emergency not described in subsections (a) and (b) of this section.

Sec. 552.006. USE OF SIDEWALK.

(Transportation Code)

- a. A pedestrian may not walk along and on a roadway if an adjacent sidewalk is provided and is accessible to the pedestrian.
- b. If a sidewalk is not provided, a pedestrian walking along and on a highway shall if possible walk on:
- 1. The left side of the roadway; or
- 2. The shoulder of the highway facing oncoming traffic.
- c. The operator of a vehicle emerging from or entering an alley, building, or private road or driveway shall stop and yield the right-of-way to a pedestrian approaching on a sidewalk extending across the alley, building entrance or exit, road, or driveway.

Code Compliance & Enforcement

Spring is approaching in the next coming months, so get your lawn tools ready for the season. It's a good time to use February weather to do some repairs to any work needed on your property. Just a reminder to also hydrate even in cooler weather when working outdoors. After all, a beautiful yard makes outside entertainment more enjoyable for you, your family, and neighbors. While you're at it, look into doing some painting as needed, repairing or replacing any parts of the house, fence, sheds, or replacing older equipment for lawn maintenance. Remember, if you're replacing a shed, roof, water heater or fence, you need to get a building permit. Check the alley behind your property fence and make sure the grass is cut. All bushes and tree branches need to be cut back to your fence line.

NOTE:

Sec. 28-118. - Shrubbery, vegetation, and tree height along

It shall be unlawful for the owner and occupant of property abutting an alley to permit any shrubbery, other vegetation, brush, or tree limbs to restrict the passageway of any vehicles along alleys. Clearances for tree limbs over alleys cannot be less than 13 feet, six inches.



In December 2022, the WEDC sponsored a "12 Days of Windcrest" contest to gain social media followers. We obtained the help of 12 social media influencers, each with a following ranging from 3,158 to 46.3 thousand followers, to help promote local businesses.

What are Influencers? Influencers are individuals who can sway the sentiments of their online audience in a particular direction regarding a brand, idea, business, or person. These social media gurus increase brand awareness, thereby driving more traffic to a website. The content is then shared, which makes endorsements more persuasive and widespread. According to Google, 74% of consumers rely on social media to influence their purchasing decisions.

Nowadays, word of mouth and peer recommendations are more reliable to customers regarding brands and services. Since it is impossible to directly engage with innumerable potential customers, many businesses utilize social media influencers to help "spread the word." In simple terms, if my friend trusts or recommends a brand, then so will I.

How did it work? The WEDC was fortunate to find Influencers who were happy to help promote Windcrest and waive their fees to help promote our local businesses. Each influencer visited their assigned business and took a video, then posted them asking their followers to "tag" a friend, the business, and the WEDC to be entered into a contest to win a gift certificate. All their posts ran for a week. Many of them also continued to post stories about the Light Up event, helping to bring more attention to Windcrest.

Collaborating businesses for the 12 Days of Windcrest included: Tokyo Express, Arctic Ape, Urban Air, River City School of Massage, Mrs. Kitchen, Thai Chalurn, Pollo Asados Los Nortenos, Fusion Street Tacos, Watershed Car Wash, Smoothie King, Skateland, and The Car Wash Express.

In the two weeks that our "12 Days of Windcrest" promotion ran, we gained a total of 330 new followers.


