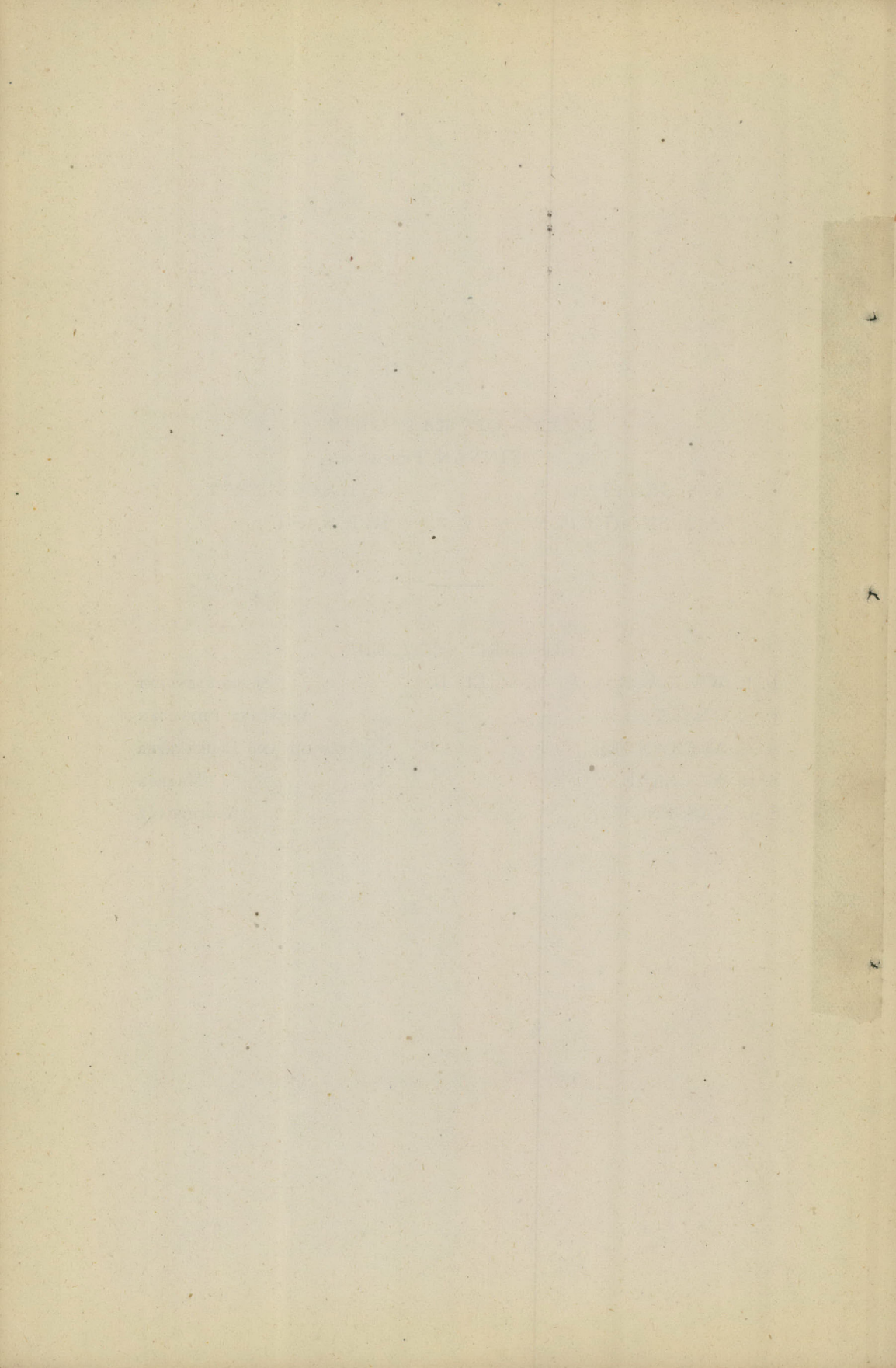

To His Excellency L. S. Ross, Governor of Texas:

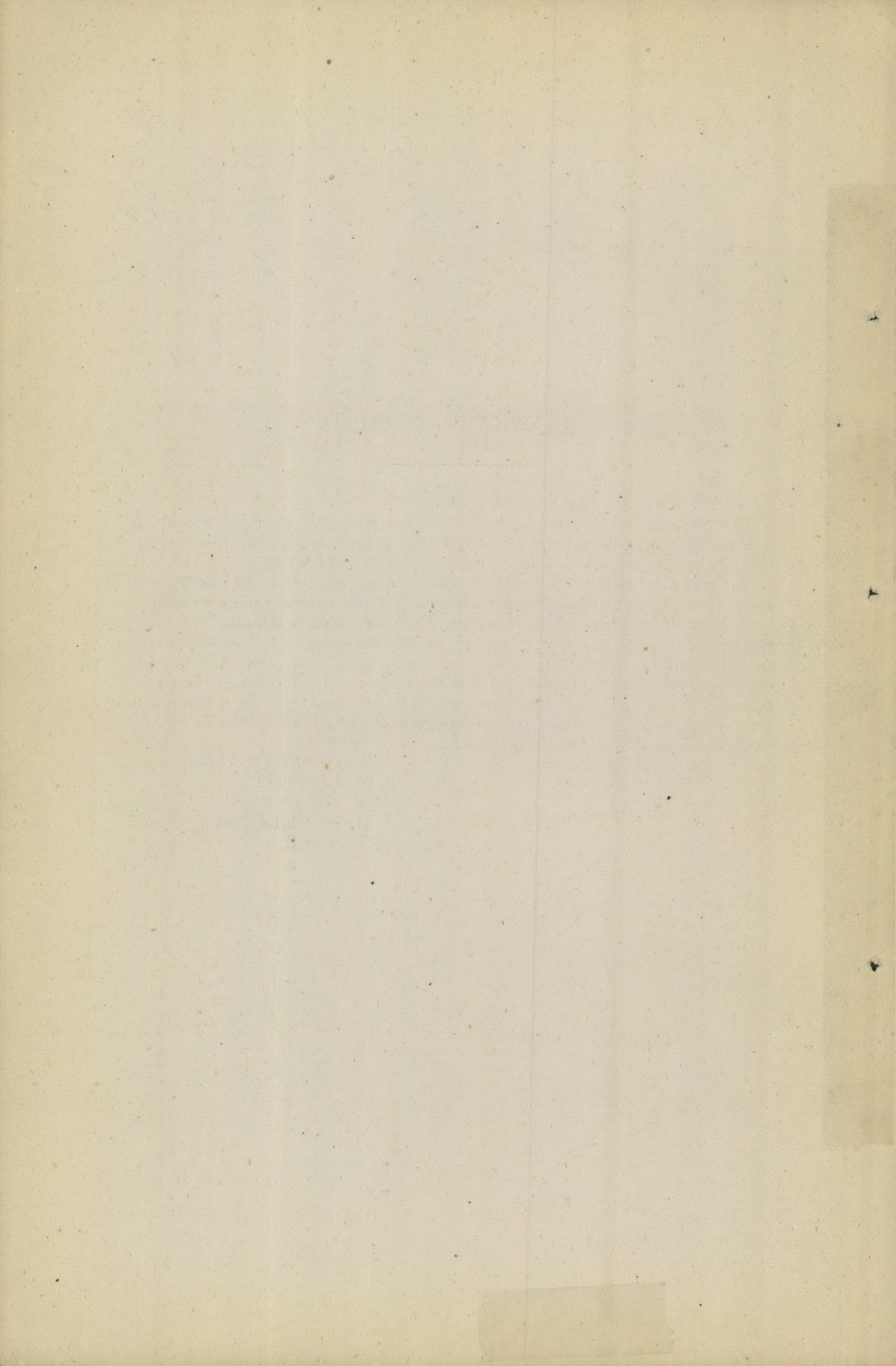
The Superintendent's report accompanying will give your Excellency an account of the inside working and farming operations, etc., of this Institution, for whose welfare we are made in some sort responsible.

The additions to the buildings, provided for and ordered to be constructed by the session of the Legislature, are satisfactorily approaching completion.

A standpipe, to take place of water tower, has been contracted for. Arrangements have also been made to sink an artesian well, the present water facilities being insufficient to supply the want that will be created by the additional number of inmates when the additions now in process of construction are completed; and our experience has convinced us that nothing less than a regular artesian bore, going hundreds and hundreds of feet below the surface, will suffice to meet this demand.
