COORDINATOR'S ANNUAL REPORT



We made it through one season of mandatory hunter education... however, the trek remains an uphill climb. I hope you, like our hunter education staff, will be up to the challenge!

I would like to commend all of you for the outstanding efforts you've shown in certifying students, gathering supplies and adapting to changes in this ever-expanding effort to increase safe and responsible hunting awareness.

There have been many significant accomplishments in 1989 that are worth reviewing. Perhaps the most notable of these is the jump from 17,432 to 36,708 students certified. This figure represents three times the average level and

brings us to 218,053 students certified since 1972.

A total of 490 new instructors were certified after completing pre-service requirements including eight-hour program orientation/teaching skills workshops conducted by Area Chiefs and/or staff. A total of 71 instructors were reactivated, and 500 went inactive in 1989. By December 31, 1989, we had 2,148 active instructors including "Area Chiefs," volunteers, professional educators and T.P.W.D. employees.

The 1989 breakdown shows a total of 3,715 courses taught in 50,182 hours or 13.5 hours per course. Volunteers and Area Chiefs conducted 2,215 courses, totaling 24,905 hours, certifying 20,316 students; Game Wardens taught 197 courses in 2,254 hours and certified 2,111 students; professional educators instructed 1,303 courses which totaled

23,023 hours and 14,461 students.

A total of 5,782 films and videotapes were used in the 3,715 courses held throughout the state. Debi Davis, the current audio/visual librarian has been feeding the staff your ideas for improvement, especially those suggested by agriculture science teachers who spend eighty or so hours with their students in wildlife and recreation management.

One new development in hunter education is the addition of a video production specialist who will be in charge of producing one new hunter education videotape each year. This person will be soliciting your input whenever the staff identifies you as a key resource person in that field. Naturally, the new videotapes will be educational by format and correspond with the chapters in the new student manual. If you feel you have a particular expertise in which the staff is unaware, please call and let us know so we can plan future video sessions appropriately.

Scotty Oliver, formerly the audio/visual librarian has switched duties and now heads up the shooting range program and other special projects. If you or someone you know is interested in applying for federal shooting range funds, please contact Scotty at 512/389-4572. He also will be assisting the hunter education staff from time to time.

Hunting accidents, as you have reviewed (see attached summary) totaled 78 accidents including 12 fatalities. A significant factor shows more students involved in accidents. This number should fluctuate or increase as we reach

more students with the course. You ask, "why?"

The reality is that hunter education won't eliminate accidents; however, it should prevent many from happening. And, just because someone completes a ten-hour course of instruction, doesn't mean he or she will use the information to his or her advantage.

As you teach a course, remember to use teaching methods which tend to "grab" the students. Get them involved! Only then will they feel the information is purposeful. Help them build a strong foundation in the safe and responsible ways to hunt.

Terry Erwin and I recently attended the national Hunter Education Association conference and brought back with us many useful ideas from states and provinces who have been at this game much longer than Texas. A particularly helpful session was termed "Agency Night" where states and provinces showed off materials they use in their programs. You can bet that Terry and I paid close attention to ideas which could successfully raise our program to higher levels.


Attending the conference had another key advantage since in April of 1991, Texas will host the Hunter Education Association's annual conference in San Antonio right before NRA's annual convention and meetings. The conference is officially slated for April 7-11 and will be held at the Menger Hotel, the site where Teddy Roosevelt first met with the "Rough Riders." I will be asking for assistance from some of you, especially those volunteers in and around the San Antonio area. If you have some time and feel you can contribute to this important affair, please give me a call at 512/389-4568. The conference will serve to heighten awareness for hunter education and is attended by all state and provincial hunter education coordinators. It also should boost the Texas program at a time when we need it most. Those who might be involved will get a chance to show the rest of North America what "Texas Hospitality" is all about.

Along with planning the conference, Terry and I will be busy revising forms to coincide with the new student manual. Terry also is making arrangements for our first "Instructor Recognition Ceremony and Banquet" in January 1991. I will be completing a "Self Evaluation and Planning Guide" to assist us in identifying where we have been, where we are and where we are going. Our overall goal will be to continually improve the program; handling the logistics while enhancing the quality. It is your ideas we need to listen to and implement.

I also will plan on meeting with Area Chiefs and key resource people during a "Hunter Education Round Table" to discuss issues and strategies for the 1991-1996 hunter

education plan.

Remember, any time you have questions or concerns, please call Terry or me so we can plug such items into the plan. Your involvement means successful planning. Without your ideas, the plan will not work. We've come a short way with mandatory hunter education and we still have a ways to go. With the caliber of instructors Texas has, I'm sure the process will be worthwhile!

IMPORTANT INFORMATION

The new Texas hunter education student manual is out. In a recent survey of regional and field offices plus statistical data compiled, there are numerous old manuals in the hands of instructors. We need to stress the importance of using all old manuals before the new ones are ordered.

It will be somewhat difficult in issuing new manuals to instructors, who still have old ones on hand. We want you to satisfy your classes' needs with just one type of manual by

Join efforts with other instructors in your area to combine all old manuals, thereby using them up. Check with your Area Chiefs to see if anyone has contacted them about manuals.

We are working on an outline to go with this new manual to make teaching efforts more successful and easier.

<u>Please</u> notify Austin of class scheduling so we can have this information available. Many times we have calls about a course and could refer that individual to you. Also, notify your Area Chief and the T.P.W.D. nearest office.

GAME WARDENS: If you know of an individual in your community or area, who would make a good instructor, please contact them in a recruiting effort to help teach hunter education. There are many willing individuals out there if we can just locate them. Notify the Austin hunter education staff for anything you need.... applications, game warden interview forms, etc. Thanks for your help.

NRA Excess Liability Insurance Available to Hunter Education Instructors

Washington D.C.-National Rifle Association of America members who are also state-certified hunter education instructors are eligible to purchase \$100,000 excess liability insurance. The total cost is only \$30.00 per year to cover certain hunting, trapping, shooting and teaching activities.

The NRA-sponsored plan is known as "excess" coverage because it is in addition to any other liability insurance in effect. If there is no other plan, it becomes the primary plan.

Information and a brochure is available to explain this plan in detail, including all coverage and limitations. NRA members are invited to contact NRA Insurance Plans, 400 Locust Street, 8th Floor, Des Moines, IA 50398. The Toll Free number is 1-800-365-6062; in Iowa, call collect 515-243-1776.

Regardless of the carrier or coverage a state-certified instructor selects, the NRA urges each to learn more about their potential liability in case an accident occurs.

Dear Terry:

I don't know if you ever get letters from instructors, but I thought I would write and let you know how things are

going.

George and I have taught 2 classes, and really are enjoying it. We are finding, however, that 10 hours is not sufficient to really "teach" the material. With the adults, you can cover the material faster, but with the kids, there is no way.

They have so many questions, and I feel that they deserve

to be answered. The only way you could cover all the material and finish in 10 hours, is to read the lessons word for word from the book, and not have time to discuss, show films, demonstrate, etc. That is one thing we will NOT do. When we took the course, that is the way it was taught, and it was very hard to stay awake, let alone learn anything. We use more lecture, question sessions, videos, etc., trying to make some of the material sink in. So far, we have had only one student who had trouble keeping awake, and I think he just didn't go to bed at night! We have classes in our home in a room we finished last summer specifically for hunter education classes.

Right now, I am attempting to get some response from other instructors on when they will be holding classes. Hopefully we can get together so that we can refer students when we are not having a class.

Like I said, we are really enjoying teaching. I am forever on the lookout for things we can use in class.

TRAINING TIP

TO PROTECT YOUR VOICE:

- Avoid trying to talk over noise as you will probably shout.
- Don't allow smoking during class as this can irritate your throat.
- Gently clear your throat only when necessary.
- Avoid foods high in sugar or butterfat. These tend to make saliva thick and difficult to clear from the throat.
- ◆ Take some celery with you and eat a piece before class or at break. This will help clear your throat.
- Keep a glass of water nearby and use only when "cotton mouth" sets in.







John Dea, Lubbock; the southern half of the Texas panhandle is a large area, and John will help Area Chief Joe Davis, from Lubbock, in covering this region.
