# A CHRISTMAS STAR IN A WONDERLAND OF LIGHTS

Millions of tiny white lights sparkle along every roof-angle, window and door on Marshall's historic courthouse then radiate out from the city square to every tree, building, fence and house. The Starr Family Home, two blocks from the square, is a plush Victorian home shimmering with white lights on the house and lawn as it takes part in the annual Christmas Wonderland of Lights.

Visitors, coming to glimpse the elegant mansion with its lavish lights, are greeted by a 10-foot tree on the porch and Christmas trees at every front window. Stepping through the front door, they enter the old home's past. The rooms are aglow with candlelight flickering on pine boughs that drape the mahogany banisters. Handmade decorations of ribbon, lace, velvet, pine cones, nuts and berries trim mirrors and mantels creating the warmest of Christmas scenes.



Guided by costumed docents through the enchantment of Victorian elegance, visitors find mistletoe, cedar, holly and magnolia leaves filling the rooms with fragrant potpourris of scents.

"Vacations in my family meant putting gear in the car and going camping," Okie said. "But after college I left that life behind for a big city and a corporate career. Then my own kids got to be camping age and I just wanted to bring them home to Abilene."

"Working here feels perfectly natural," she said, "because my family has held many reunions at this very state park." The park is located south of Abilene near the town of Buffalo Gap, a place that was named for a natural pass through a chain of

hills. Groves of tall native pecan trees sheltered Comanche people long before they sheltered modern campers.

"At one of our recent park events, two little girls got to roast hot dogs outside for the very first time," Okie said. "They loved it! And, I loved it too!

#### **TEXAS STATE PARKS**

State parks got started as a family investment in 1924 when Governor Pat Neff proposed that a land donation from his mother serve as the first park. Mrs. Isabella E. Neff's quiet grove of riverbottom pecan trees, near Waco, became the Mother Neff State Park. Today, along with the Abilene park, it is one of 136 Texas state parks that annually welcome millions of visitors and host some of the world's best family reunions, cookouts, camping trips, bike rides, hikes and swimming-pool belly-flops.


## **MOUNTAIN LION**

Felis concolor

Retiring and shy by nature, and nocturnal by habit, Texas mountains lions are seldom seen by humans. Adult lions, while ranging over an area estimated at 150 to 200 square miles, prefer rocky overhangs in precipitous canyons, escarpments and rimrocks or, if these habitats are not available, dense brush.

Living in remote hills and woods, the mountain lion feeds primarily on white-tailed and mule deer, occasionally taking smaller mammals like javelina and even skunks. About every two years the lioness delivers two or five kittens. These young animals have distinctive spots that gradually fade during the first year as the cat matures into the longbodied, long-tailed, lithe adult.

Although it's a rare event, hikers, hunters and birdwatchers occasionally encounter one of these elusive cats.

# TEXAS OUTDOOR CONNECTIONSM **New On-Line System to Simplify Passport Purchase**

In the coming year, Texas Conservation Passport sales will be automated statewide with a new system called TEXAS OUTDOOR CONNECTION. Small computer terminals, designed to accept credit cards and to sell, not

only Conservation Passports, but also hunting and fishing licenses and stamps are already being tested in 13 locations.

By June 1996 these will be placed in approximately 3000 retail locations such as Wal-Mart, sporting goods stores and convenience stores. You just tell the clerk you want to buy a Conservation Passport, they link to a statewide database, type in your information and print

your license or Passport on the spot!
