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Wildlife residents of the Chihuahuan Desert such as mule deer, Mexican black bear, hundreds of species of birds and other critters freely cross the Rio Grande all the time they don't know about the Texas/Mexico international boundary. In December, a brand new exhibit opened at the Barton Warnock Center to interpret the natural history of this vast and sometimes mysterious region we generally refer to as the Big Bend.

The exhibit is called "Una Tierra – One Land" in recognition of the fact that although the border cuts through it, the land for fifty miles north into Texas and fifty miles south into Mexico is unified by a common geology, an arid climate and


identical ecosystems.

One of the more dramatic exhibits depicts an extremely ancient form of wildlife - dinosaurs - that roamed the area during the Cretaceous period 144-65 million years ago. It includes a new painting representing the

landscape of that era and the fossilized wing bones of Quetzalcoatlus northropii, a flying dinosaur. Although Quetzalcoatlus specimens have been found elsewhere, the bones from the Chihuahuan Desert have a wing-spread of 38 to 40 feet and are the largest ones found anywhere.

The Warnock Center is part of the Big Bend Ranch SP complex.

Big Bend Ranch SP is a wide open landscape in the Chihuahuan Desert – perfect for hiking, camping and examining urface geology.

WIND BENEATH OUR WINGS

Bob studied Wildlife Science at Texas A&M and began his career conducting environmental analyses for Exxon. "When I joined Texas Parks and Wildlife in 1979 as a biologist, I expected to do a lot of hunting and fishing but what I have really done is a lot of canoeing," Bob says. "Water resources now receive a great emphasis in resource protection because wildlife habitats, and desert ecosystems particularly, depend on a stable source of good water."

"A great deal of resource protection involves determining how alterations in the natural flow of rivers and streams might diminish wildlife and fisheries habitats. To make those assessments we need detailed maps of land use and water bodies and the best tool for map making today is the Global Positioning System. It uses signals from satellites to fix a position on the ground and then combines that information with aerial photography to create very accurate maps (see page 14). I was part of the development team that brought this space age technology to Parks and Wildlife. That's something I'm really proud of," he says.

In addition to his regular duties, Bob is also the vice president of the United States Canoeing Association. "The San Marcos River is one of my favorites – it's spring fed and pretty — good water — lush vegetation. Teddy Roosevelt said, 'The nation behaves well if it treats the natural resources as assets which it must turn over to the next generation and not impaired in value,' I agree with that sentiment."

San Solomon Ciénega

For millennia, underground water filtering through limestone formations beneath the Chihuahuan Desert has burbled to the surface at San Solomon Springs. It formed a desert marsh land or ciénega. But water use in the past 100 years nearly wiped out this small wetland habitat. Taking action to restore the ecosystem, TPW's Gary Garrett, conservation scientist, and David Riskind, natural resources program director, requested and got cooperation from farmers and citizens who live near Balmorhea SP. Today the ancient desert oasis once again provides a home to redwing blackbirds, diving coots, two endangered species, the Comanche Springs pupfish and the Pecos gambusia as well as Mexican tetra, channel catfish, roundnose minnows, red crayfish, blotched water snakes and softshell turtles. Visitors to Balmorhea SP can view the newly restored San Solomon Ciénega from underwater as well as above-water vantage points.

Texas Birdhouse Day

Many beloved song birds, like the bluebird, are cavity nesting birds but the natural occurrence of hollow trees and other suitable habitat is decreasing in Texas. Happily cavity nesters will set up housekeeping in a manmade birdhouse. The first Saturday in February has been declared Texas Birdhouse Day because it's time to set out new birdhouses and clean out the old ones. Migrating song birds begin arriving around the end of the month and quite a few will return to the same nest box year after year.



The Big Thicket

Prickly Pear Cactus finds a niche in the wild, untamed and dense wilderness called the Big Thicket. It is known as an environmental crossroads where the eastern hardwood forests, the southern coastal wetlands, the western prairies and the arid southwest converge. The region is so biologically diverse that it has been designated as an International Biosphere Reserve by the United Nations Education, Scientific and Cultural Organization, Man and the Biosphere Program.

Once it spread over 3.5 million acres of southeast Texas but today less than 300,000 acres remain. Approximately 90,000 acres are set aside in the Big Thicket National Preserve and other protected areas like Village Creek and Martin Dies, Jr. SP.

Space Age Map Making

Texas has lost a great deal of wetland habitat during the past century – habitat conservation for the next hundred years will increasingly use space age technology to protect marshlands, ponds, estuaries and all the creatures who nest, swim, eat and drink at these water sources.

When the science of placing satellites in orbit became an everyday reality, map making changed radically. Today the satellite based Global Positioning System (GPS) used by the military to pinpoint the location of ships at sea also guides TPW field scientists as they map the occurrence of natural and cultural resources. A technician with a portable, hand-held receiver that is somewhat larger than a cell-phone turns it on to pick up digital signals from satellites circling the earth. "A constellation of 24 satellites dedicated to the GPS send out a stream of digital data that our computers mathematically interpret as points on the earth. These points are added to geo-referenced, digital aerial photographs to create maps, says Kim Ludeke, the Geographic Information Systems laboratory manager. We have completely mapped the lower and upper Texas Gulf Coast using these and other digital technologies. It's crucial to our task of resource protection to know the geography of wetlands in relation to modern land uses."


