LONE STAR LEGACY WEEKEND

Come on out to the *free* statewide Open House on Lone Star Legacy Weekend! It's all happening on Saturday and Sunday, Oct. 21-22, at every Texas state park, several wildlife management areas (WMA) and some fish hatcheries too. Special events at over 100 locations will celebrate the marvelous array of meadows and hills, rivers and lakes, forests and Gulf shore sands that were set aside to keep the state's natural and cultural heritage alive.

Generations of Texans who have gone before us carefully conserved this legacy. Our forefathers opened the first fish hatchery in 1881, donated land to the public in 1916 that became the forerunner of the state park system and established the first WMA in 1946. Today there are 123 parks, 50 wildlife management areas and seven fish hatcheries.

Sustaining Texas history and outdoor heritage calls for deep commitment across the generations — now it's our turn. While you're enjoying the weekend activities, we hope you will take a moment to learn more about the Lone Star Legacy campaign and find out how you can make a difference by helping preserve this legacy for the future.





- You must keep the paper license to show to the proper authorities (if necessary) when you enter Texas State Parks regardless of whether you enter in a vehicle or on foot, by bicycle, motorcycle, airplane or boat. It is your proof of purchase and not an entry permit.
- If you plan to use more than one vehicle or if you plan to use alternate means of transportation in addition to your vehicle, you will need duplicate gold windshield decals.
