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

Seminole CANYON STATE HISTORICAL PARK Eternity Etched In Limestone

The thick limestone deposits that dominate the Trans-Pecos landscape developed over two-hundred million years ago when a shallow ocean covered the area. Calcareous seashells, drifting down for eons, were compacted into rock that surfaced in sixty-six million years of geologic uplifting. When the northern Ice Age glaciers melted, great rivers formed from the melt water. Flowing southward they gouged canyons in the limestone and etched shallow caves into the walls.

Paleoindian People, living in the caves, hunted the area 12,000 years ago by stampeding large game animals, like the extinct Ice Age elephants and bison, across the land into narrow clefts and over the edge of sheer cliffs. Piles of broken and butchered bones containing remnants of stone-tipped spears tell archeologists of the heroic hunters.

Archaic period Indians of 9,500 years ago, living in our current dry and warm climatic phase, used yucca, prickly-pear cactus and other desert plants to weave baskets, sandals and mats. They also painted panthers, deer and human figures on the walls of their rock shelters. In the Fate Bell Shelter preserved at Seminole Canyon SHP, the images painted by Lower Pecos People have endured for thousands of years.

The rock art of Seminole Canyon is featured in an episode of Texas Parks & Wildlife television show during the week of September 18 on your local public television station; check local listings for time and date. Shaman and Panther images were recorded in Panther Cave, now accessible by boat only.

Tour Fate Bell Rock Shelter and Pressa Canyon

Guided tours of Fate Bell Shelter are offered twice daily, Wednesday through Sunday at 10 a.m. and 3 p.m.

Escorted hikes to sites in Pressa Canyon can be arranged for visitors over the age of 12 and in good shape. Rugged terrain calls for hiking boots, water, sun protection, long pants, walking sticks, snacks or lunch, and personal items such as field glasses and cameras. The fee is \$15 per person (\$8 for Passport holders). Permits for Pressa Canyon tours must be secured at least two weeks in advance: 1-915-292-4464. WIND BENEATH

Fine-Art Muralist

"Looking at pictographs in a rock shelter can be a confusing experience," Nola said. "The ancient pigments blend into the colors of the limestone walls. Not to mention that the Indian artists very often painted over earlier images."

Recording pictographs involves accurate photo documentation using color charts and metric rulers as well as graphed and measured drawings. But, "my creative challenge lies in finding a mix of tints on my pallet to duplicate the original color variations."

"Artistic interpretation and the scientific vision go together naturally. Stone artifacts look like rocks to most people, but they represent extinct worlds and people to archeologists. In addition to the rock art, I have paintings in state parks all over Texas depicting images from our history such as mastadons, Caddoan Indians and dinosaurs. My largest painting? A 28-foot mural for the Lubbock Lake Landmark SHP showing Apache People around 1700 A. D. I paint on big canvas as a way of putting the viewer in the story."

PEOPLE OF THE LOWER PECOS

Artists working 5,500 years ago used iron ores (ochres), crushed and mixed with animal fats to make red, yellow and black paints. They shredded yucca or sotol leaves and wrapped them with plant fibers to make brushes for painting abstract animal and human figures on the limestone walls.

Sunday a breakfast and sack lunch will be provided. Buses leave at 8 a.m. for Las Cuevas and Manzanillo Canyon rock art sites.



A three-toed theropod was following a herd of nine sauropods and when the sauropods changed direction the theropod followed, closing in on the larger animals. Then one of the three-toed prints was missing from the Trackway. "Paleontologist think the smaller one got a good hold on the rump of the larger one and was literally pulled forward by sheer momentum, in other words forced to hop on one foot," Nola said.



The United Nations, Man and Biosphere program, designates a few special locations for the program when member countries offer nominations to the general council. The host country retains full control of the biosphere. There are now about 311 biosphere reserves world wide...El Cielo is one of them.



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
