- 5 SECTION 1. Section 663.037, Transportation Code, is amended
- 6 by amending Subsections (e) and (f) and by adding Subsection (g) to

- 8 (e) The director of the Department of Public Safety shall
- 9 adopt standards and specifications that apply to the color, size,
- 10 and mounting position of the flag required under Subsections
- 11 [Subsection] (d)(2) and (g)(2).
- 12 (f) Except as provided by Subsection (g), this [This]
- 13 section does not apply to the operation of an all-terrain vehicle
- 14 that is owned by the state, a county, or a municipality by a person
- who is an authorized operator of the vehicle.
- 16 (g) A peace officer may operate an all-terrain vehicle on a
- 17 public street, road, or highway that is not an interstate or
- 18 <u>limited-access highway only if:</u>
- 19 (1) the transportation is in connection with the
- 20 performance of the officer's official duty;
- 21 (2) the officer attaches to the back of the vehicle on
- 22 top of an eight-foot-long pole a triangular orange flag;
- 23 (3) the vehicle's headlights and taillights are
- 24 illuminated;

1	(4) the officer holds a driver's license, as defined by
2	Section 521.001; and
3	(5) the operation of the all-terrain vehicle does not
4	exceed a distance of 25 miles from the point of origin to the
5	destination.
