American Industrial Properties Report's 1977 Site Seekers' Directory features a twelve-page special Texas supplement – "The Story on Profitable Plant Locations." In addition to copy lauding Texas' many location advantages, the section features advertisements on available industrial sites in many Texas communities.

Amarillo Mayor John Drummond used a special fiberglas shovel to break the ground for the city's newest industry. Construction of the \$26 million Owens-Corning Fiberglas Plant is underway with January 1, 1979, set as target date for production. The plant will employ 500 persons.

Governor Dolph Briscoe has pledged assistance to the city of Big Spring following the closing of Webb Air Force Base. At a meeting with Roger Brown, Big Spring Chamber of Commerce president, Senator Ray Farabee, Representative Mike Ezzell and TIC Executive Director James Harwell. Briscoe directed the Governor Industrial Commission to assist the community in implementing both state and federal programs. President Carter's Economic Adjustment Committee recently announced a program designed to bring economic relief to the area.

Mobil Chemical Company will begin a 40,000 square-foot expansion of its polystyrene foam products plant in Temple early next month. About 25 new jobs will be added to the company's current employment of 410.

Construction will begin in May on General Motors' AC Spark Plug Division's 110,000 square-foot plant in Wichita Falls. Initial employment is estimated at 200 persons with an annual payroll of more than \$1 million. Production is scheduled for early 1978.

Two of the nation's largest retailers plan to convert all their products to metric sizes by 1985. Spokesmen for Sears, Roebuck & Company and Montgomery Ward & Company made the announcement at a metric conference earlier this month.

The Acme Brick Company plant in Garrison is currently undergoing a \$1.1 million expansion and modernization program.

Secretary of Commerce Juanita Kreps will speak at the Fourth Annual International Trade Conference of the Southwest to be held in Dallas May 24–25. The Amarillo Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring its first Domestic Transportation and World Trade Seminar April 27–28 at the Villa Inn Convention Center. The TIC, West Texas State University, Amarillo College, Amarillo Traffic Club and the U.S. Department of Commerce are co-sponsoring the event.

More construction of manufacturing plants is planned for Texas than for any five other states, according to an economist with the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas. Billings Barnard said that over the next three years, an estimated \$2.5 billion will be spent on construction of manufacturing facilities in the state with nearly all counties sharing the expansion.

developer and who has played a significant role in the attraction of one or more industries to his community between July 1, 1976, and June 30, 1977, is eligible to receive the award.

TIDC members may submit one or more nominations and should include the following information:

- 1. Name, title, address, and telephone number of nominee.
- Name and description of the industrial prospect(s) whom the nominee assisted in locating during the period July 1, 1976, through June 30, 1977, and the nature of effort exerted by the nominee to locate the company or companies.
- Description of any obstacles encountered which were significant in terms of locating the company or companies.
- Brief background, or history, of the nominee's industrial development activities in behalf of his community such as positions held, etc.
- 5. Supplemental news stories, etc.
- Name, address, and signature of the TIDC member making the nomination.
- 7. Population category of entry.

# June 1 Is Application Deadline For Industrial Development Institute

June 1 is the application deadline for the 1977 Industrial Development Institute (IDI) and Advanced Symposiums, sponsored by the American Industrial Development Council and The University of Oklahoma.

The IDI is intended as a program of advanced education for individuals pursuing a career related to industrial or economic development and is open to individuals who have either completed a Basic Industrial Development Course or who have at least two years experience in the field of industrial development.

The Institute is open to both members and non-members of AIDC. Applications are approved on the basis of individual qualification.

Graduates of IDI or individuals who have seven or more years experience in industrial development are also eligible to attend the Advanced Symposiums.

This year the topics are "I.D. Financing: Problems & Solutions" (August 8–10) and "Non-Metro Economic Development" (August 10–12).

A \$25 registration fee must accompany all applications. Qualified individuals may register for either one or both symposiums.

#### Plant Locations Up 75%

Texas recorded a healthy increase in new plant locations in the first quarter of 1977, according to the Bureau of Business Research at the University of Texas at Austin.

Fifty-six new plants were announced compared to 32 for the same period last year – a 75 per cent increase.

Plant expansions, however, dropped 7 per cent to 53 from the 57 expansions reported in 1976.

The Dallas-Fort Worth SMSA led the state with 18 new or expanded projects, followed by the Longview SMSA with 15. Houston and San Antonio each reported 12 new or expanded projects, with the latter leading the major cities in new plant announcements.

Bonham, Gonzales and Nacogdoches led the nonmetropolitan communities with two new or expanded plants each.

#### In Memorium

Alf Jernigan, an East Texas leader who contributed much to the area's industrial development, died April 16. He was 47.

A native East Texan, Jernigan served as executive vice president and general manager of the East Texas Chamber of Commerce since 1970. He first joined the staff in 1957 and at one time was manager of the community development department.

He began his career in chamber work in 1952 in his home town of Carthage with the Panola County Chamber of Commerce.

Jernigan was a member of various professional and civic organizations including TIDC, AIDC, SIDC, Council of State Chambers of Commerce, Texas Chamber of Commerce Managers, and the American Chamber of Commerce Executives.

His contributions to the East Texas area and to the entire state did much to make Texas a leader in industrial growth.
