# STAYING ONE STEP AHEAD

For risk managers, an important saying to know is: What hasn't happened in 10 years can happen in 10 seconds. Just because an accident has not occurred due to inaccessible emergency exits, for example, doesn't necessarily mean it won't happen. Trying to anticipate the unexpected is something risk managers are having to do more often.

Risk managers can stay one step ahead by keeping up to date on safety issues, new laws and regulations, and court decisions. Inside this issue of *Risk-Tex* is a list of useful Web sites and continuing education courses for risk managers. The page is designed as a pull-out section to be kept next to the computer or somewhere handy for quick reference.

Over the years the risk manager's job has transformed from being technical to more of a managerial role. 
