HORSE THEFT AWARENESS AND PREVENTION

Two years ago, legislation provided for TAEX to take a major role in education for horseowners on preventing theft of horses and equipment. In gearing up to meet this initiative, 4 publications, 12 displays and a videotape were developed to help inform and educate horseowners. These resources are available for counties to use in planning and conducting programs that focus on or address theft prevention.

Including Theft Prevention Info At Horse Activities

Horse shows, team ropings, reinings, trail rides, the county 4-H Horse Club meeting, County Extension Horse Committee meetings, are examples of activities where participants can be reached. Resources available:

- Display available from your District office
 - Very high quality, includes color photos and list of contacts.
 - Requires large Downing Board also at District office (it comes in a 4' x 18" tall box and has 6 display panels that fold out).
- ♦ Publications Listed hereafter. Available in large or small quantity from Publications and Supply Distribution at no charge.

Specialized Theft Awareness Programs

Quite a few CEAs have conducted meetings or clinics focused entirely on theft awareness. Resources available:

♦ Consider contacting **Texas & Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association** to secure a field inspector, or maybe even the Director of Brand Inspection, Jody Henderson at (817)332-7064. With the legislation, TSCRA was empowered to handle inspection at those Texas facilities where horses are processed and the meat exported for human consumption. Plus, some of the TSCRA field reps are knowledgeable freeze branders.

- ♦ Call Pete G. Gibbs at (409)845-1562 to get names and numbers for other potential speakers who give presentations or demonstration on:
 - ♦ Electronic ID (microchip implants)
 - ♦ Freeze Branding (traditional)
 - ♦ Alpha-angle code Freeze-Marking
- ♦ Learn about your local veterinarians. Some equine practitioners are current in one or more methods of permanent identification. Co-sponsoring an educational meeting with a reputable vet clinic can be a good way to reach more people.
- ♦ You may want to show the 18 minute videotape and provide handouts.

Permanent ID Clinic

Several counties have organized and held Freeze Branding Clinics, where horseowners bring their horses to be permanently id'ed. Counties that have done these clinics usually end up having different owners bring up to 30 head of horses for freeze branding.

- ♦ Involve your County Clerk's office. A horseowner needs to be sure their brand is not already registered for use by another person.
- ♦ Contact local law enforcement. In some counties, the Sheriff's Association will be willing to co-sponsor and help with the actual clinic.
- ♦ Utilize a reputable freeze branding technician with plenty of experience and a good track record in permanent ID. Again, call if you need names and numbers for resource persons.
- Consider setting up the display and making publications available.

Funding Availability for Theft Awareness & Prevention Education

Your county may be able to get funding in direct support of this educational initiative. Contact Pete Gibbs for details. Funding may be available to assist with:

- Facilities or equipment rental
- Speaker or clinician travel expenses, honoraria

Funds CANNOT be used for food or beverages of any kind.

As you can imagine, there is a little paperwork required. However, contact us here at least one month in advance of your program so that we can help expedite the process.

FEED COMPANY NUTRITION WORKSHOPS

In May and August, two feed companies brought their Territory Managers and Dealer Reps to TAMU for in-depth training in horse nutrition. Cargill sent 32 Territory Managers from 10 states and Consolidated Nutrition L.C. sent 20 from 15 states. This brings the total to 5 major feed companies that have come here for 11 workshops serving 410 Territory Managers. This is significant because not only are the major feed companies looking to TAEX for research-based information, but many companies want to work directly with TAEX in co-sponsoring educational programs.

Each year in Texas, several CEAs work closely with feed companies to co-sponsor and conduct evening meetings for horseowners in the county. This collaboration results in 1) expanded contacts prior to the meeting, 2) funded refreshments or even a meal at the meeting, and quite often 3) a fairly large attendance. While not every co-sponsor opportunity is a good one, many companies do take a very educational-minded approach to these meetings. Sure, the bottom line is to increase horse feed salesthat's understandable. However, many companies believe that having a presence is more effective than hard-sell tactics. More and more, reputable companies want people to get educational information so that they will have the knowledge to make sound, solid purchasing decisions.

TRAIL RIDING AS AN ALTERNATIVE ENTERPRISE FOR RANCHERS AND FARMERS

The May <u>CEA Horse Newsletter</u> discussed the formation of a task force (TAEX, TFB, TSCRA and TETRA) to explore this opportunity. Accomplishments to point are:

<u>Rancher Awareness</u> - 70 persons attended an alternative enterprise workshop at the August Beef Cattle Short Course.

Rancher Trail Ride Guide - A 15-page guide covering considerations, food, costs, ride management, marketing, insurance, release forms, etc. was produced. Copies are available, from this office, for CEAs.

<u>Insurance</u> - The TFB is exploring a unique insurance coverage policy to cover ranchers and farmers conducting rides.

Result Demonstration Rides - 4 rides are planned for the Fall of 1999. The TAEX Dept. of Recreation and Parks will conduct case studies at all rides to quantitate wants and needs of riders. Educational programs will be conducted at all rides. Results will be made available in early 2000. Professional brochures are available from this office or from TETRA.

SUMMER HORSEMANSHIP SCHOOLS 2000

The summer of 99 marked the 27th consecutive year for TAEX Summer Horsemanship Schools. Two-day or three-day long schools were held in 37 different counties, reaching 1,186 youth and adults. Evaluations turned in by counties ranked the schools very high in the majority of cases. Even though this program is not without its shortcomings, it appears that the utilization of college-aged students to teach these hands-on schools is still extremely effective and continues to meet a real need in most counties.

In 2000, we will begin riding with candidates for the Horse Program Assistant positions in mid-January. By mid-March, we will have identified those candidates that we feel are qualified to represent TAEX and work effectively with your county's horse youth and adult leaders.

Attachments 1 and 2 are forms to use in requesting either a two-day or three-day horsemanship school for your county. The costs are the same as 1999. STATEWIDE FALL HORSE JUDGING WORKSHOP

October 9 will be the date for the Statewide Practice Horse Judging Workshop, held at Freeman Arena, Texas A&M. This workshop will be held as a judging practice. Participants will get to judge a variety of halter and performance classes. Critiques will follow. This activity will be the most useful to judges, only if they are accompanied by their county judging team coach or leader.

There will be no official contest tabulation but placings and cuts will be announced.

Coaches can conduct their own tabulation. Counties need to pre-register and pay \$5.00 per participant, by October 1. The fee is \$10.00 per person if you register after October 1. 5TH TEXAS STATE 4-H WORKING COW HORSE CLINIC

The 5th annual cow horse clinic is set for October 12, 13 and 14 in Abilene. Instructor will be Jim Simpson from Phoenix Arizona, a talented horseman with many years experience. To be eligible, adults must be interested or involved in working with 4-Hers at county and district levels. Youth who are 4-H members are also eligible to attend. Cost is only \$85 if your register by October 1 and includes the cattle charges and stalling. Late registration is \$100. STATEWIDE YOUTH REINING CLINIC

The annual Texas State Youth Reining Horse clinic for 4-H members will be held December 18-19 at the Taylor County Expo Center in Abilene, Texas. The cost of the clinic is \$60/4-H member, which includes a stall. Terry Thompson, noted horseman and reining horse trainer, will head up the instruction again this year.

Youth attending must be bonafide 4-H members and bring a horse they want to improve in executing all basic maneuvers. The horse does not have to be a reiner. If under 16, 4-H members must provide their own parental or volunteer supervision. Stalls will be available on Friday, December 17. The clinic will begin at 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, December 18. Topics will be lateral and forward momentum, circles, spins, stops, rollbacks, and lead changes. All participants will receive "hands-on" practice and assistance throughout the clinic. This clinic is a project of the Texas State 4-H Horse Committee. TAMU EQUESTRIAN TEAM GAINS NCAA STATUS

The Horsemen's Equestrian Team at Texas A&M is already well known across the country. They have won at both the regional and national level.

Now, the Department of Athletics will field a Women's Equestrian Team. It will start with financial support to the existing Equestrian Team which is sponsored by the Horsemen's Association in the Department of Animal Science. Eventually, a full-time coach and assistant will be hired. In September of 2000, the Women's Equestrian Team will be a complete component in the Dept. of Athletics with scholarships, NCAA sanction and NCAS rules. This team will be a collaborative program between the Departments of Animal Science and Athletics.
