
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Texas Nonagricultural Wage and Salary Employment (Seasonally Adjusted)

Total Nonagricultural Employment recorded significant job growth for the third consecutive month, adding 23,500 jobs in April. This increase outpaced the five-year average gain of 14,700 jobs and the ten-year average increase of 13,800 jobs. A total of 74,600 jobs have been added to Total Nonagricultural Employment in Texas since the beginning of this year. The annual growth rate for Total Nonagricultural Employment rose from 2.3 percent in March to 2.4 percent in April, representing an addition of 240,800 jobs since April 2006. The major industry with the largest increase in April 2007 was Professional and Business Services which grew by 11,700 jobs, followed by Leisure and Hospitality which added 5,000 jobs.



Following a gain of 3,600 jobs in March, Professional and Business Services employment increased by 11,700 positions in April. This was the ninth consecutive month of positive employment change and the largest monthly gain since September 2005. The annual growth rate rose from 4.0 percent in March to 5.0 percent in April, bringing the number of positions added in this industry to 61,100 since April 2006. Some of the businesses that make up this major industry are temporary help services and employment placement agencies along with offices of lawyers and tax preparation services. Janitorial services, landscaping services and travel agencies are also part of this industry.

Employment in Leisure and Hospitality gained 5,000 jobs in April following a gain of 3,700 positions in March. This was the largest over-the-month increase since October 2006. Leisure and Hospitality employment has increased in 21 of the past 24 consecutive months. The annual growth rate rose from 4.0 percent in March to 4.2 percent

in April, bringing the number of positions added in this industry to 39,400 since April 2006.

Employment in Government increased by 3,800 jobs in April. This was the strongest April job growth recorded in Government since 1997. The annual growth rate rose from 1.6 percent in March to 1.7 percent in April. Government employment has gained 28,500 jobs since April 2006.

Trade, Transportation and Utilities added 3,600 jobs in April following a substantial gain of 6,400 jobs in March. Over 16,000 jobs have been added to this industry since the beginning of the year. Annual growth rose from a rate of 1.2 percent in March to 1.3 percent in April for a gain of 26,300 jobs since April 2006.

Education and Health Services employment increased by 2,500 jobs in April following a gain of 4,100 jobs in March. This industry has added employment in 25 of the past 27 months. The annual growth rate was 2.0 percent, a drop of two-tenths of a percentage point since March. This industry gained 24,700 positions since April 2006.

Following a loss of 2,500 jobs in March, Other Services' employment increased by 900 positions in April. This was the seventh monthly employment gain in the last nine months. The annual growth rate remained constant at 0.5 percent, representing the addition of 1,900 positions since April 2006. The Other Services industry is composed of 48 business types which include automotive repair along with computer and office machine repair and appliance repair and maintenance. Barber shops, funeral homes and business associations are also listed in this major industry.

Financial Activities employment exhibited its sixth consecutive month of job gains with a modest increase of 400 jobs in April. During 2006, this industry averaged an increase of 1,000 jobs per month and, so far in 2007, this average has been 1,250. The annual growth rate rose slightly from 1.9 percent in March to 2.0 percent in April. A total of 12,200 jobs were added in Financial Activities since April 2006.

Mining employment lost 800 jobs in April following an increase of 1,300 positions in March. This was the first employment decrease posted in Mining since October of 2003 when 700 jobs were shed. The annual growth rate dropped from 12.1 percent in March to 10.2 percent in April, bringing the total number of jobs added since April 2006 to 18,400.







Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) Nonagricultural Wage & Salary Employment (Not Seasonally Adjusted)

Total Nonagricultural Employment in the Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs) increased by 38,700 jobs in April 2007. Since January, the MSAs have added 161,500 positions, and gained 274,500 jobs over the year. Annual employment in the MSAs has remained positive since January 2004. The Sherman-Denison MSA grew by the highest percentage in over-the-month employment at 1.1 percent, representing 500 jobs. The Midland MSA and the Fort Worth-Arlington area followed, each with a 0.9 percent growth rate. The Dallas-Plano-Irving area and the Fort Worth-Arlington area added the largest numbers of jobs with 14,300 and 7,400, respectively.



Leisure and Hospitality employment increased by 16,200 jobs in April, marking the third consecutive month of positive growth across the MSAs. The Dallas-Plano-Irving area and the San Antonio MSA were the top two contributors, each adding 3,500 positions over the month. The Houston-Sugar Land-Baytown MSA added 2,600 jobs over the month. The Fort Worth-Arlington area followed with an increase of 2,200 jobs, along with the Austin-Round Rock MSA which expanded by 1,800 jobs. The Tyler MSA registered the strongest annual growth rate for this industry at 13.6 percent.

Employment in Professional and Business Services increased for the third consecutive month by adding 11,400 jobs in April. Since April 2006, 53,900 jobs have been added with an annual growth rate of 4.7 percent. The Dallas-Plano-Irving area had the highest over-the-month


gain, adding 5,000 jobs, or 1.5 percent. The Fort Worth-Arlington area posted the second highest increase with 2,800 jobs for a rate of 2.9 percent. The Abilene MSA had the highest percentage increase in employment for April with a 4.5 percent gain. The Killeen-Temple-Fort Hood MSA followed closely with a 4.3 percent over-the-month gain, representing 400 jobs.

Government employment continued to grow, recording an increase of 3,200 jobs in April. The Dallas-Plano-Irving area was the major contributor, adding 1,100 jobs, followed by the Houston-Sugar Land-Baytown MSA adding 1,000 jobs in April. The annual growth rate for Government across all MSAs in April was 2.3 percent, up slightly from March's rate of 2.2 percent. A total of 33,600 jobs have been added in Government since April 2006.

Trade, Transportation and Utilities added 3,100 jobs in April. This marks the thirty-eighth consecutive month of over-the-year growth. The San Angelo MSA earned the highest annual growth rate at 3.9 percent, representing 300 jobs. The Fort Worth-Arlington area and the Houston-Sugar Land-Baytown MSA were major contributors to April gains, adding 1,300 and 900 jobs, respectively.

Financial Activities employment added 1,600 jobs in April, the third consecutive month of positive growth. Since January, 5,700 jobs have been added to the MSAs. The Sherman-Denison MSA had the greatest percentage increase in employment at 3.8 percent, representing 100 jobs. However, the Dallas-Plano-Irving area led in actual job increase, adding 1,500 positions. The McAllen-Edinburg-Mission MSA experienced the highest annual growth rate at 9.8 percent, representing 800 jobs. Five MSAs experienced growth rates of 5.7 percent or greater.

Education and Health Services employment in the MSAs increased by 1,500 jobs in April. Since January, the MSAs have added 14,700 positions in this industry. Since April 2006, this industry gained 30,500 jobs across the MSAs. The Texarkana MSA grew by the highest percentage with a 1.1 percent increase, representing 100 jobs. The Dallas-Plano-Irving area added the largest amount with 1,000 jobs. Laredo achieved the highest annual growth rate at 6.9 percent, representing 800 jobs.

Highlights of the Texas Labor Force (Not Seasonally Adjusted)

The Texas unemployment rate dropped three-tenths of a percentage point to 3.9 percent in April 2007. This was the lowest rate since the beginning of the year and the lowest April rate since 1979. The rate dropped by one full percentage point since April of last year's 4.9 percent unemployment rate. The Texas unemployment rate has remained at or below 5.0 percent since August of 2006. The United States' jobless rate slipped to 4.3 percent in April from 4.5 percent in March. The national unemployment rate was two-tenths of a percentage point lower than last year's rate of 4.5 percent.

The number of Texas jobholders increased over the month, an addition of 6,500 employed. The rise brought the state employment total to 11,045,100. This was the second consecutive increase this year coming off a two-month decline in January and February. Since last April, the number of Texas jobholders rose by 197,500. This was the lowest year-over-year employment gain since November 2005.

• Over the month, Texans seeking employment declined by 36,500 to total 451,700 job seekers. Unemployment historically decreases during the month of April by an average of 25,800. The above-average drop in the number of unemployed coupled with a gain in the number of employed was partially responsible for the improved unemployment rate. Since April of last year, unemployment declined by 110,300.

The number of people receiving unemployment benefits in Texas rose by 9,900 to total 70,200 claims in April. Twenty-one Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs) observed claims count increases over the month, while four MSAs realized a decrease in claims. The Amarillo MSA recorded a claims increase of 47.7 percent. The Midland MSA posted a 28.0 percent increase in claims. The Lubbock MSA recorded the largest decline with a 52.6 percent decrease for the month of April.

All of the state's twenty-five MSAs saw a decline in their unemployment rate between March and April 2007. The largest drop was in the Lubbock MSA with six-tenths of a percentage point decline for an April rate of 3.1 percent. The Midland MSA continued to have the lowest MSA unemployment rate in Texas at 2.7 percent.



2004 - 2014 Industry and Occupational Projections Now Available!


The LMCI department is pleased to announce the release of the 2004-2014 employment projections! The new projections can be found on our website (www.tracer2.com) on "The Future" page or from the Data Link section. These projections are a key component in determining the allocation of training dollars in labor markets throughout Texas. Learn which industry is projected to grow and see what the occupational demands will be for the next ten years.

Projections are generated every two years for a ten-year period. The data are used as a primary input in targeting demand occupations and economic planning for Workforce Development Areas (WDAs) and the State of Texas. The process of making employment projections depends on two main ingredients: industry employment and occupational employment within each industry (staffing patterns).



Statewide and WDA industry employment estimates were developed for 2004 and projected to the year 2014. For this period of projections, Texas is expected to see dramatic growth in the industries of Home Health Care Services, Management, Scientific, & Technical Consulting Services, and Office

Administrative Services. The top ten fastest growing industries are all projected to experience growth rates in excess of 41.0 percent.



Each industry has a unique occupational structure. The growth and decline of individual industries impact the growth and decline of occupations needed to staff these industries. Understanding the occupational make-up of an industry is critical when determining the occupational demands for the projection period. Statewide occupational growth is projected to be the greatest in healthcare- and education-related occupations. The top ten fastest growing occupations are projected to experience growth over 43.0 percent, with the fastest reaching 59.0 percent growth.

Users should view the employment estimates as indicators of relative magnitude and probably direction rather than as estimates of absolute values. Therefore, consider these projections a starting point when studying future industry and occupational employment.

"HAPPENINGS AROUND THE STATE"

Nearly 1,000 Employees Expected at New Office

LEWISVILLE, TX (Dallas Business Journal–Bill Hethcock)–Fidelity Investments has leased 160,000 square feet for as many as 1,000 employees in Lewisville in a move that will make the investment services giant one of the city's top employers. The Lewisville jobs are part of an expansion Fidelity promised in Texas, company spokeswoman Anne Crowley said.

The Boston-based company announced plans to invest more than \$200 million in its Texas operations, creating 1,535 new jobs. The company received an \$8.5 million Texas Enterprise Fund grant for the expansion. Fidelity is the largest mutual-fund company in the United States and the nation's No. 1 provider of 401 (k) retirement savings plans.

Semiconductor Company Expanding in Irving

IRVING, TX (Denton Record-Chronicle)—Maxim Integrated Products Inc. announced that it has acquired a wafer fabrication plant in Irving. Maxim's plans for that location are expected to generate 1,000 jobs and \$200 million in capital investment over the next seven years, according to Texas Governor Rick Perry and the Irving Economic Development Partnership.

The Texas Enterprise Fund will grant \$5 million to the California company that already has plants in Dallas and San Antonio, and 7,900 employees

worldwide. The city of Irving and Dallas County are also expected to offer incentives, although details are not final, said Chris Wallace, president and chief executive officer of the Greater Irving-Las Colinas Chamber of Commerce.

Marble Falls to Get First Hospital

MARBLE FALLS, TX (Austin American-Statesman–Mary Ann Roser)–An acute care hospital will be built in Marble Falls, the city's first hospital, which should be completed in 2009. The project will be a partnership of two non-profit health systems, Scott & White and Llano Memorial Healthcare System. Scott & White will manage the hospital and contribute to more than half of the cost. The hospital, when fully operational, is expected to have 120 beds and employ 400 to 500 workers. It will offer major services including full cardiology care, labor and delivery, and trauma services.

Ground Broken for New Manufacturing Plant

LAREDO, TX (Laredo Reporter-News)—Ground has been broken for Eagle Copper Tube, a copper manufacturing plant, in what will be a \$100 million, 500,000-square-foot facility in Laredo. In addition to Grupo IUSA owner Carlos Peralta's investment in the community, the workforce that will be needed at Eagle Copper Tube is expected to provide additional economic benefits. Approximately 260 highly skilled workers will be needed at the plant, which will produce copper tubing for commercial and plumbing uses.


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
