

# Texas Nonagricultural Wage and Salary Employment (Seasonally Adjusted)

Total Nonagricultural Employment gained 14,300 jobs in February 2007 for an estimate of 10,178,800. This employment series has surpassed the ten-million mark for the last ten months. Seven of the eleven major industries added employment from January to February with Professional and Business Services gaining the most jobs. A total of 231,200 jobs were added to business payrolls since February 2006, resulting in an annual growth rate of 2.3 percent.



Following an increase of 4,900 jobs in January, Professional and Business Services employment posted a significant gain of 5,500 positions in February. This was the seventh consecutive month of positive employment change. The annual growth rate was 4.3 percent. This industry gained 52,100 positions since February 2006.

Employment in Trade, Transportation, and Utilities grew for the third month in a row, adding 4,400 jobs in February. This increase was significant when compared to the five-year average February increase of 700 jobs and the ten-year average gain of 2,700 jobs. The annual growth rate for February of 1.3 percent was up slightly from the monthago level and represented an annual gain of 25,900 jobs.

Construction employment gained 3,700 jobs in February, after losing 200 jobs in January. Employment in Construction has logged nine monthly increases in the past 12 months. Annual growth registered a rate of 4.4 percent, bringing the total number of jobs added in Construction since February 2006 to 26,100.

Employment in Mining increased by 1,800 jobs in February following a gain of 1,400 positions in January. This industry has added jobs for 40 consecutive months. A total of 20,700 jobs have been added in Mining since last February. The annual growth rate was 11.7 percent and has been above the 10.0 percent level since February 2006.

Following a loss of 700 jobs in January, Other Services employment gained 1,800 positions in February. This was the largest over-themonth change since October 2006. The annual growth rate was 0.9 percent, a gain of six-tenths of a percentage point from January. This industry gained 3,100 positions since February 2006.

Financial Activities employment grew by 1,200 jobs over the month, exceeding the 10-year average February gain of 1,100 positions in this industry. Since February 2006, 12,800 jobs were added in Financial Activities. The annual growth rate remained at 2.1 percent for the second straight month.

Education and Health Services employment increased by 1,200 positions in February. This industry has gained employment in six of the past seven months. The annual growth rate remained unchanged at 1.8 percent in February, a gain of 21,700 jobs since February 2006.

Employment in Leisure and Hospitality lost 100 jobs in February following a gain of 300 positions in January. This was the first decline in employment since July 2006. The annual growth rate was 4.0 percent in February, an increase of 37,200 positions since February 2006.

Employment in Information posted a small loss of 100 jobs in February following a decrease in January. This was the fifth consecutive month for employment loss. The annual growth rate was -1.4 percent in February, a decrease of 3,100 positions since February 2006.

In February, the Manufacturing industry experienced a modest decrease in employment of 200 jobs. This industry has recorded eight months of job growth during the past year. The annual growth rate of 1.5 percent translates to 13,700 jobs added to manufacturing payrolls since February 2006.

Employment in Government lost 4,900 jobs in February. This was the first time since 1990 that a job loss was recorded in February for Government and may turn out to be an anomaly. The annual growth rate was 1.2 percent in February, representing the addition of 21,000 jobs in Government since February 2006.







## Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) Nonagricultural Wage & Salary Employment (Not Seasonally Adjusted)


Total Nonagricultural Employment in the Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs) increased by 64,000 jobs in February 2007. All but one of the MSAs experienced additions to their payrolls over the month. The two MSAs that gained the largest number of jobs in February were the Houston-Sugar Land-Baytown MSA and the Dallas-Plano-Irving area adding 15,600 jobs and 14,200 jobs, respectively. The College Station-Bryan MSA marked the highest percentage of employment growth in February with 4.5 percent, or 4,000 jobs. This was followed by the Odessa MSA growing 1.6 percent, representing 900 positions. Since February of last year, the MSAs have gained 291,000 jobs. All of the MSAs recorded an increase in Total Nonagricultural Employment from February 2006 to February 2007.


Government employment gained 24,000 jobs over the month in the MSAs. Local school districts, community colleges, and universities completed their staffing for the spring semester. The College Station-Bryan MSA had the largest percentage change for February with a seasonal increase in employment of 10.7 percent. The Houston-Sugar Land-Baytown MSA added the most jobs over the month with the majority of the increase showing up in local government education. Since last February, Government employment in the MSAs increased by 1.9 percent. Fourteen of the state's twenty-five MSAs added employment over the year. The Austin-Round Rock MSA had the largest percentage change since last February, adding 4.0 percent in employment. Payroll additions were recorded in Federal, State, and Local Government sectors.

Employment in the Professional and Business Services industry increased by 10,600 jobs in February. This over-the-month increase was larger than the five-year average increase of 8,000 jobs. The Dallas-Plano-Irving area had the highest monthly increase, adding 4,600 jobs for February. The Wichita Falls MSA had the highest percentage increase in employment for the month of February with a 2.7 percent gain and also experienced the highest job growth rate since last February by increasing 18.8 percent in employment. Since last February, the MSAs combined have added 54,100 jobs. This 4.8 percent increase was the second highest February year-over-year increase since 2000. Several MSAs logged significant over-the-year percentage increases in employment.

Leisure and Hospitality employment gained 9,900 jobs in February. The San Antonio MSA and the Houston-Sugar Land-Baytown MSA were major contributors to the February gains adding 2,100, and 1,800 jobs, respectively. Tied for third, the Austin-Round Rock MSA and the Dallas-Plano-Irving area added 1,200 jobs each. Eight MSAs posted over-the-month growth rates of 2.0 percent or more. Over the year, employment in this industry also saw strong growth. Fourteen areas achieved annual growth rates of 4.0 percent or higher. The Tyler MSA ranked highest with an annual growth rate of 14.1 percent or 1,200 jobs. The larger areas of Dallas-Plano-Irving, Houston-Sugar Land-Baytown MSA, and the Austin-Round Rock MSA combined to add 24,500 jobs over the year.

Manufacturing employment within the MSAs increased by 2,800 jobs in February 2007. The Fort Worth-Arlington area experienced the largest over-the-month gain by adding 1,900 jobs. This increase was due to a major durable goods manufacturer rehiring following a short-term lay off. The Dallas-Plano-Irving area and the Austin-Round Rock MSA had payroll additions of 1,000 jobs and 200 jobs, respectively. The Victoria MSA marked the highest annual growth in Manufacturing with a 6.9 percent increase. The Odessa MSA recorded an annual growth of 5.3 percent or a 200 job increase. Nineteen MSAs ended February 2007 with positive annual growth rates.

## Highlights of the Texas Labor Force

(Not Seasonally Adjusted)

The Texas unemployment rate held steady at 4.7 percent in February 2007 and was the lowest February rate since 2001. The current rate was 0.6 percentage points lower than the February 2006 level. The Texas unemployment rate has remained at or below 5.0 percent since August of 2006. The United States' jobless rate slipped to 4.9 percent from 5.0 percent in January. In addition, the February U.S. rate is two-tenths of a percentage point lower than last year's rate of 5.1 percent. This was the third straight month that the Texas not seasonally adjusted unemployment rate has been less than the comparable United States' rate.

The number of Texas jobholders was estimated to be 10,977,100 for February, virtually unchanged from month-ago levels. Since last February, the number of Texas jobholders rose by 228,900. This is the highest February year-over-year employment gain since 1998.

Over the month, Texans seeking employment declined by 3,300 to total 543,200 job seekers. Unemployment historically decreases during the month of February. Since February of last year, unemployment declined by 64,000.

The number of people receiving unemployment benefits in Texas declined by 6,600 to total 82,300 claims in February. Twenty-four Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs) observed claims count decreases over the month, while only one MSA realized an increase in claims. The Sherman-Denison MSA recorded an increase of 4.0 percent in their claims for unemployment benefits. The Longview MSA posted a 30.9 percent decrease in claims, followed by the San Angelo MSA with a 17.4 percent decrease for the month of February. The McAllen-Edinburg-Mission MSA listed a 16.4 percent drop.

Eighteen of the state's twenty-five Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs) either saw no change or a decline in their unemployment rate between January and February 2007. The Midland MSA continued to have the lowest MSA unemployment rate in Texas at 3.2 percent.

#### GLOSSARY OF LABOR MARKET TERMS

**Actual or Not Seasonally Adjusted** - This term is used to describe data series not subject to the seasonal adjustment process. In other words, the effects of regular, or seasonal, patterns have not been removed from these series.

Civilian Labor Force (CLF) - Is that portion of the population age 16 and older who are employed or unemployed. To be considered unemployed, a person has to be not working but willing and able to work and actively seeking work.

Consumer Price Index (CPI) - Is a measure of the average change over time in the prices paid by urban consumers for a market basket of consumer goods and services. The CPI provides a way for consumers to compare what the market basket of goods and services costs this month with what the same market basket cost a month or a year ago.

**Current Employment Statistics (CES)** - A monthly survey of nonfarm business establishments used to collect wage and salary employment, workers hours, and payroll, by industry and area. It is sometimes known as Nonagricultural Employment.

Employed (Emp) - Persons 16 years and over in the civilian noninstitutional population who, during the reference week, (a) did any work at all (at least 1 hour) as paid employees, worked in their own business, profession, or on their own farm, or worked 15 hours or more as unpaid workers in an enterprise operated by a member of the family, and (b) all those who were not working but who had jobs or businesses from which they were temporarily absent because of vacation, illness, bad weather, childcare problems, maternity or paternity leave, labor-management dispute, job training, or other family or personal reasons, whether or not they were paid for the time off or were seeking other jobs. Each employed person is counted only once, even if he or she holds more than one job.

Local Area Unemployment Statistics (LAUS) - The Federal/State cooperative program which produces employment and unemployment

estimates for states and local areas. These estimates are developed by State Employment Security Agencies in accordance with Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) definitions and procedures. Data is used for planning and budgetary purposes as an indication of need for employment and training services programs. Estimates are also used to allocate Federal funds.

Metropolitan Division (MD) - A Metropolitan Statistical Area which contains a single core with a population of 2.5 million or more may be subdivided into smaller groupings of counties referred to as Metropolitan Divisions. Titles of Metropolitan Divisions are typically based on principal city names. Texas has two Metropolitan Divisions, the Dallas-Plano-Irving MD and the Fort Worth-Arlington MD, which combine to form the Dallas-Fort Worth-Arlington MSA.

Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) - A geographic area that contains at least one urbanized area of 50,000 or more population plus adjacent territory that has a high degree of social and economic integration with the core urban area. An MSA in Texas is made up of one or more counties. The U.S. Office of Management and Budget defines metropolitan areas according to published standards that are applied to Census Bureau data. Texas has 25 MSAs and two Metropolitan Divisions (MD).

**Seasonally Adjusted (SA)** - Seasonal adjustment removes the effects of events that follow a more or less regular pattern each year. These adjustments make it easier to observe the cyclical and other non-seasonal movements in a data series.

**Unemployed (Unemp)** - Persons 16 years and over who had no employment during the reference week, were available for work, except for temporary illness, and had made specific efforts to find employment sometime during the 4-week period ending with the reference week. Persons who were waiting to be recalled to a job from which they had been laid off need not have been looking for work to be classified as unemployed.

#### "HAPPENINGS AROUND THE STATE"

#### Banking Center to Bring Jobs to Austin

AUSTIN, TX (Austin American-Statesman-Robert Elder and Shonda Novak)-IndyMac Bancorp Inc., one of the nation's largest mortgage companies and thrifts, is hiring about 300 people for a home loan servicing center in North Austin and could expand the number of jobs to 600 and beyond.

IndyMac is the most recent in a string of California-based financial companies to stake out new ground in Austin. But in doing so, the company made it clear that it wants tax or other subsidies to make a long-term commitment to Central Texas. IndyMac has leased space in the Freescale Semiconductor Inc.'s campus in Northwest Austin. Dale Lazerson, IndyMac's first vice president of corporate real estate, said the company plans to hire 300 people in the next two to three years.

#### Truck Assembly Plant Scheduled for East Texas

JASPER, TX (Beaumont Enterprise)-Tiger Truck officials announced that Jasper will be home to its new truck assembly plant, even while local officials continue to push for added incentives to make the company's stay in Jasper as economically comfortable as possible.

Area officials welcomed the Dallas-based company that will bring an estimated \$18 million in investments and more than 200 jobs to the area in the coming

years. Jasper beat out 33 potential assembly plant sites across Texas and others in Arizona, California, and New Mexico.

#### Construction Begins on Houston Premium Outlets

HOUSTON, TX (Houston Business Journal)-Construction has begun on the 430,000-square-foot Houston Premium Outlets in Cypress. The outlet center, located off of U.S. Highway 290, will house 120 outlet stores and will feature high-quality designer and name brands. Scheduled to open in the spring of 2008, the outlet mall is expected to create about 800 to 1,000 jobs and is projected to generate millions of dollars in sales tax and property tax revenue.

#### Toyota Supplier to Expand to Central Texas

SAN ANTONIO, TX (San Antonio Business Journal)-Toyota Motor Corp. supplier Tasus Corp. announced it will establish its second U.S. manufacturing plant in Central Texas, a move that initially will create about 100 new jobs.

Negotiations are under way with the Bloomington, Ind.-based company on a site for the plant, according to the Greater Austin Chamber of Commerce. Tasus is searching along the Interstate Highway 35 corridor for an initial 40,000 square feet, with eventual plans for 100,000 square feet of space and up to 160 employees.


