


Texas Nonagricultural Wage and Salary Employment (Seasonally Adjusted) Depository Dallas Public Library

Total Nonagricultural Employment in Texas expanded for the fourteenth consecutive month in October with a gain of 14,700 jobs. Most of the major industry sectors showed employment growth over the month, the largest being an increase of 5,300 jobs in Professional and Business Services. Total Nonagricultural Employment increased by 131,300 positions from October 2004 to October 2005, for an annual growth rate of 1.4 percent.




After an increase of 2,500 jobs in September, employment in Professional and Business Services posted a boost of 5,300 positions in October. This was the largest over-the-month increase since February 2005. As a result, the annual growth rate rose from 1.5 percent in September to 2.0 percent in October. This was the largest over-the-year change since April 2005.

Construction employment posted an over-the-month increase of 1,200 jobs in October, following a gain of 3,100 jobs in September. The annual growth rate was 2.9 percent, maintaining the positive growth trend recorded in the sector over the past eight months. Since October 2004, a total of 15,800 jobs have been added in Construction.

Employment in Trade, Transportation and Utilities (TTU) rebounded from a small decrease in September with a gain of 2,800 jobs in October. Monthly employment in the sector has increased eight times in 2005 and declined only twice. TTU employment has increased by 21,500 jobs over the year, for an annual growth rate of 1.1 percent. Following a gain of 2,100 jobs in September, Financial Activities employment increased by 2,000 positions in October. It was the largest October employment expansion recorded since 1998. Increased hiring by insurance companies in response to damage from Hurricanes Katrina and Rita could have contributed to the boost in employment. As a result, the annual growth rate rose to 1.5 percent for an over-theyear gain of 8,800 jobs. Since the beginning of the year, Financial Activities has added 6,800 jobs.

Employment in Education and Health Services gained 2,300 jobs in October, following an increase of 500 jobs in September. The annual growth rate dropped to 2.2 percent, which is an increase of 25,700 jobs over the year.

Following a gain of 400 positions in September, employment in Leisure and Hospitality increased by 3,400 jobs in October, continuing a fivemonth streak of positive over-the-month change. This was also the largest over the month gain since October 2003. The annual growth rate rose to 1.6 percent from 1.4 percent in September, an increase of 14,200 jobs over the year.



Natural Resources and Mining employment decreased by 500 jobs during the month of October after three consecutive months of job gains. It was only the second monthly decline so far in 2005. Since January, 2,200 positions have been created in Natural Resources and Mining. The annual growth rate improved to 2.3 percent in October, up from 1.9 percent in September, for an over-the-year increase of 3,500 jobs.





Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) Nonagricultural Wage & Salary Employment (Not Seasonally Adjusted)

Total Nonagricultural Employment in the MSAs increased by 17,700 jobs in October, due primarily to seasonal gains in the Government sector. The Dallas-Plano-Irving area posted the largest gain, adding 6,800 jobs, followed by Houston-Baytown-Sugar Land and Austin-Round Rock which added 3,700 and 3,200 jobs, respectively. Most of October's job losses in the Beaumont-Port Arthur MSA were the result of Hurricane Rita, which reduced employment in the area by 6,400 jobs.


Government employment in the MSAs grew by 1.4 percent, or 20,500 jobs over the month, reflective of previous October gains seen over the last decade. The five largest MSAs were responsible for the bulk of the gain, adding 12,400 jobs combined. Most other MSAs recorded slight gains or held steady over the month. The annual growth rate for Government employment in the MSAs rose to 1.7 percent, the highest October annual growth rate for this industry since 2002.

Natural Resources, Mining and Construction grew by 1,400 jobs in October, the ninth consecutive month of employment gains in this industry group. The Houston and Corpus Christi areas led the employment growth, with the Houston-Baytown-Sugar Land MSA posting the largest increase with a gain of 1,700 workers. This industry group has grown by 22,300 positions in the MSAs since October of 2004.


Retail Trade employment grew by 4,300 jobs in October as retailers prepared for the upcoming holiday shopping season. The Dallas-Plano-Irving area added 1,500 Retail Trade jobs in October. The largest drop in Retail Trade employment in October was seen in the Beaumont-Port Arthur MSA, which was related to Hurricane Rita.

Following normal seasonal patterns, employment in the Leisure and Hospitality industry fell by 9,800 jobs in October as amusement parks and other recreation-related businesses reduced staff for the off season. However, the Dallas-Plano-Irving area saw a gain of 1,300 jobs during October, due mostly to the annual State Fair in Dallas.

Employment in Educational and Health Services grew by 3,800 jobs in October, the third month of gains in this industry. Since October 2004, 21,600 jobs have been added across the MSAs. Over the month, the Brownsville-Harlingen MSA added 400 jobs, while the Longview and McAllen-Edinburg-Pharr MSAs added 300 jobs each.

Highlights of the Texas Labor Force (Not Seasonally Adjusted)

The Texas jobless rate fell over the month, dropping to 5.0 percent in October—the lowest since May 2001's rate of 4.5 percent. The rate has fallen by seven-tenths of a percentage point since last October and has remained lower than the previous year's rate for twenty-four consecutive months—a first since April 1997. Nationally, the United States' jobless rate's continued to decline for a third straight month, dipping to 4.6 percent in October. October's rate was the lowest recorded for the nation since May 2001's 4.1 percent. In addition, the U.S. rate was also five-tenths of a percentage point lower than last October's rate of 5.1 percent.

The number of jobholders in Texas rose for a second straight month in October, climbing by 58,000 to 10,742,600. October's addition was the largest for the month since 2003's gain of 62,600. This increase was aided by an increase in demand for seasonal workers as retailers began hiring for the upcoming holiday season.

The number of Texans seeking work declined over the month, dropping by 24,100 to 568,100 job seekers. October's unemployment level was the lowest for the state since October 2001's 567,600. This decrease was aided by the typical August-to-October increase in staff hiring by local schools and universities as they finish adding workers for the current school year. Unemployment has declined by 119,000 job seekers since the beginning of the year.

The number of people receiving unemployment benefits increased over the month, growing by 5,000 to 126,600 in October—the highest level this year. The majority of October's increase can be attributed to an additional 38,000 claims filed by relocated Louisiana residents following Hurricane Katrina. Of the twenty-five MSAs, seventeen saw decreases or no change in their claims levels, while the remaining eight MSAs registered gains. As a result of Hurricane Rita, the Beaumont-Port Arthur MSA saw the largest increase in claims in October, growing by 6,500 over the month. The Dallas-Fort Worth-Arlington MSA reported the largest reduction with 600 fewer claims.

GLOSSARY OF LABOR MARKET TERMS

Actual or Not Seasonally Adjusted - This term is used to describe data series not subject to the seasonal adjustment process. In other words, the effects of regular, or seasonal, patterns have not been removed from these series.

Civilian Labor Force (CLF) - Is that portion of the population age 16 and older who are employed or unemployed. To be considered unemployed, a person has to be not working but willing and able to work and actively seeking work.

Consumer Price Index (CPI) - Is a measure of the average change over time in the prices paid by urban consumers for a market basket of consumer goods and services. The CPI provides a way for consumers to compare what the market basket of goods and services costs this month with what the same market basket cost a month or a year ago.

Current Employment Statistics (CES) - A monthly survey of nonfarm business establishments used to collect wage and salary employment, workers hours, and payroll, by industry and area. It is sometimes known as Nonagricultural Employment.

Employed (Emp) - Persons 16 years and over in the civilian noninstitutional population who, during the reference week, (a) did any work at all (at least 1 hour) as paid employees, worked in their own business, profession, or on their own farm, or worked 15 hours or more as unpaid workers in an enterprise operated by a member of the family, and (b) all those who were not working but who had jobs or businesses from which they were temporarily absent because of vacation, illness, bad weather, childcare problems, maternity or paternity leave, labor-management dispute, job training, or other family or personal reasons, whether or not they were paid for the time off or were seeking other jobs. Each employed person is counted only once, even if he or she holds more than one job.

Local Area Unemployment Statistics (LAUS) - The Federal/State cooperative program which produces employment and unemployment estimates for states and local areas. These estimates are developed by State Employment Security Agencies in accordance with Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) definitions and procedures. Data is used for planning and budgetary purposes as an indication of need for employment and training services programs. Estimates are also used to allocate Federal funds.

Metropolitan Division (MD) - A Metropolitan Statistical Area which contains a single core with a population of 2.5 million or more may be subdivided into smaller groupings of counties referred to as Metropolitan Divisions. Titles of Metropolitan Divisions are typically based on principal city names. Texas has two Metropolitan Divisions, the Dallas-Plano-Irving MD and the Fort Worth-Arlington MD, which combine to form the Dallas-Fort Worth-Arlington MSA.

Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) - A geographic area that contains at least one urbanized area of 50,000 or more population plus adjacent territory that has a high degree of social and economic integration with the core urban area. An MSA in Texas is made up of one or more counties. The U.S. Office of Management and Budget defines metropolitan areas according to published standards that are applied to Census Bureau data. Texas has 25 MSAs and two Metropolitan Divisions (MD).

Seasonally Adjusted (SA) - Seasonal adjustment removes the effects of events that follow a more or less regular pattern each year. These adjustments make it easier to observe the cyclical and other non-seasonal movements in a data series.

Unemployed (Unemp) - Persons 16 years and over who had no employment during the reference week, were available for work, except for temporary illness, and had made specific efforts to find employment sometime during the 4-week period ending with the reference week. Persons who were waiting to be recalled to a job from which they had been laid off need not have been looking for work to be classified as unemployed.

Jet Factory to Create Jobs

GRAND PRAIRIE, Tex (Dallas Business Journal—Margaret Allen)— Hampson Aerospace Inc., whose parent company is United Kingdom-based Hampson Industries P.L.C., expects to hire up to 135 machinists, engineers and assemblers over the next two years. The manufacturing group is investing up to \$7 million for the startup plant in Grand Prairie to make the tail section for the Eclipse 500 Very Light Jet. The Eclipse is a six-seat, twin-engine jet priced far below the cost of traditional business jets.

The workforce at the plant could grow even larger, according to Scott Wargo, general manager of Hampson. "But there's going to be a lot of other work. This will be a big hub in the Hampson aerospace industry," Wargo said. Hampson estimates the average pay at the new factory will be \$45,000, according to Tony Jones, business manager for the economic development department at the city of Grand Prairie.

Toyota Site to Add More Jobs

SAN ANTONIO, Tex (The Wright Review: Texas Business Report)—Onsite suppliers at Toyota Manufacturing in San Antonio expects to employ 4,100 when the production of the Tundra pickup trucks begins in late 2006. The suppliers anticipate employing about 600 more than previously estimated. Three new suppliers have announced they will build facilities at the site. The most recent list of new suppliers include Kautex, Inc., a division of Textron Inc. that makes fuel tanks; MetoKote Corporation, a producer of coatings for automobiles and other products; and Tokai Rika Co. Ltd., a manufacturer of seat belts and other automotive components.

Gas Prices Drop Again

HOUSTON, Tex (AAA Texas)— Texas motorists saw gasoline prices drop for the fifth consecutive week. The statewide average price for a gallon of regular self-serve was \$2.273, down 11 cents from the previous week. The AAA Texas price survey was conducted for the week including November 11. Beaumont had the highest average price at \$2.395, while Corpus Christi had the lowest average price in Texas at \$2.109 a gallon. "Gasoline prices are falling steadily throughout the nation due to reduced demand and rising inventories," said Rose Rougeau, spokesperson for AAA. Prices are expected to decline through the Thanksgiving holiday.

Company Reopens Former Plant

LONGVIEW, Tex (Wright Review: Texas Business Report)—MicroMetl has started production in the former Zimmerman Sign Co. building in Longview. The Indianapolis-based manufacturer of sheet metal components for heating, ventilation, and air conditioning systems already has 45 employees and anticipates hiring more than the 100 employees originally planned. The Longview facility will mainly serve Carrier plants in Tyler and Mexico.
