The Talking Book Program has a new Director. Please welcome Ann Minner!

Ann Minner has been named the new Director of the Texas Talking Book Program (TBP), a division of the Texas State Library and Archives Commission (TSLAC). Minner joins TSLAC from the Austin Public Library system, where she was a former branch manager. Minner brings more than 24 years of experience in library management and youth services in public libraries. She holds an MLIS degree from the University of Texas at Austin, where she was also an Adjunct Assistant Professor of Children's Literature and Information Studies.

"I am so excited to reach out to potential patrons who may not know about the program yet," Minner said. "My team is ready to share this amazing program with even more Texans."

The Talking Book Program is well established throughout the state and nationally, and Minner would like to work to increase the percentage of Texans reached. She said, "We serve patrons of all ages and abilities and the sheer amount and variety of resources and services available to them is astounding. I see infinite potential and possibilities in the staff and partnerships we already have—so it is only a matter of time."

Donations to the Talking Book Program

TBP often receives inquiries from patrons and family members of patrons on how to donate to the Talking Book Program. Donations may be made in memory of someone or to simply express appreciation for the program. Donations and bequests have a tremendous impact on the free library service we provide to Texans who are unable to read standard-print material due to visual, physical, or other reading disabilities. TBP is grateful to receive such gifts, which help us maintain and expand our services.

Follow these guidelines to donate to the Talking Book Program:

• Checks should be made out to the Texas State Library. Credit cards cannot be accepted.

• Write on the memo line of the check that the money is for the Talking Book Program.

• If the donor wishes the donation to be used for a specific purpose, instructions should be included. Otherwise, the money will be used in general support of TBP.

• Mail the donation to: Talking Book Program, P.O. Box 12516, Austin, TX 78711-2516.

Upon receiving a donation, we respond by mailing notice of thanks and a receipt that can be used for tax purposes. Individuals who donate "in memory of" have the option of including the names and addresses of family members so that we can inform them of your gift.

Naming the Talking Book Program as the beneficiary of a charitable bequest is often as simple as adding a few sentences to your will. Before making any kind of gift, you should consult with your attorney or financial advisor. An unrestricted bequest—one that allows us to meet the Talking Book Program's most pressing

iPad ARPA Survey 2022

If not having a device (computer, tablet, or smartphone) is keeping you from being able to use BARD, we would like to help.

In a few months, we will be able to offer a limited number of iPads on loan to our patrons. Our hope is that this will allow more of our patrons to download books and magazines from BARD. Borrowing an iPad will NOT require you to turn in your DTBM or stop receiving books and magazines by mail. You can continue to receive books and magazines by mail and listen to them on your DTBM, while also trying out BARD on the iPad.

Training and technical assistance for using the iPad to download and listen to BARD books and magazines will be available. Also, many patrons have a friend or family member to assist with the download process, and we are happy to assist them as well.

To use BARD, you will need access to the internet, either at home or at another location. Public libraries, coffee shops, and many other public spaces offer free internet access that can be used to download books.
