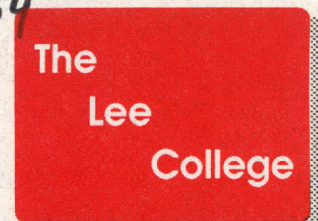

Powell, O'Kuma top faculty

Thomas E. Powell, business instructor and Tom O'Kuma, physics instructor, received awards as outstanding Lee College faculty members during the college's recent employee in-service day.

An anonymous faculty committee chooses recipients of the Excellence in Education awards each year based on criteria that include excellence in teaching and/or counseling, professional and personal integrity, effectiveness in area of responsibility and ability to stimulate enthusiasm for learning. Other criteria are the ability to communicate effectively with colleagues and students, leadership in the development of college programs, sincere concern for students and fellow faculty members and loyalty to Lee College and the community it serves.

Catherine Wahrmond, a former Lee College student and enthusiastic patron of the college, established the Excellence in Education awards, with matching funds from the Exxon Education Foundation. Each award winner receives \$600 for educational or cultural enrichment.

Budget includes pay increase, disability benefit

The Lee College budget, which took effect Sept. 1, includes a step pay increase, plus 2 percent, for employees.

Many employees also received the additional 1 percent pay increase from the state. These "state eligible" employees include all groups except those in the physical plant area, auxiliary employees (food service, bookstore) and employees paid by federal grant funds, according to Steve Evans, dean of financial services.

"The raise given to Lee College employees was among the highest for community colleges in the Gulf Coast area," Evans said. Figuring in the step pay increase, LC employees realized roughly a 4 to 5 percent increase in pay, except for those at the end of the scale. Six other area colleges were planning to grant pay increases of 3.5 to 5 percent. Blinn College planned a 1 percent raise.

The Board of Regents agreed to continue funding long-term disability insurance for each employee, at a cost of 85 cents per \$100 of the employee's monthly salary.

The state of Texas funds "employee only" health insurance under the state employees insurance program the college enters this year.

UFOs real??? Physicist to tell why he thinks so

"Flying Saucers ARE Real!" will be the topic of an illustrated lecture by nuclear physicist Stanton T. Friedman of Canada. The presentation, sponsored by the Lee College Lyceum Committee, is set for 7 p.m. Sept. 24 at Tucker Hall.

Since 1968, Friedman has spoken at more than 600 college campuses and to dozens of professional groups in all 50 U.S. states and nine Canadian provinces. He has made hundreds of appearances on radio and television shows.

Friedman's professional background includes bachelor's and master's degrees

in physics from the University of Chicago and 14 years in development of a variety of advanced nuclear and space systems, such as nuclear airplanes, fission and fusion rockets and nuclear systems for space applications.

Friedman's lecture will cover five large-scale scientific studies, the Majestic-12 documents, Air Force data not generally discussed, crashed and retrieved saucers, saucer landings and earthling abductions by aliens and the probable star system origination of some UFOs.

Friedman may discuss the report of a Dec. 29, 1980, local UFO sighting near Dayton. In that incident, Vickie Landrum, her grandson Colby Landrum, both of Dayton, and former Dayton resident Betty Cash spotted a long cylindrical bright light near Farm Road 1485. The women reported that the object hovered near their car for a period of time, then drifted away, accompanied by 23 military-type helicopters. The trio subsequently experienced severe medical problems, which they attributed to radiation burns.

Symposium to draw national scholars

Scholars and experts from throughout the country are on the roster for Lee College's Oct. 24 symposium, "People, Politics and Power," which will be held at Tucker Hall.

Dr. Kenneth Janda, who holds the Payton S. Wild Chair in Political Science at Northwestern University, Evanston, Ill., will begin the symposium with an address on "The Challenge of American Politics." Janda is senior author of "The Challenge of Democracy," the leading college textbook on American government.

One symposium session, entitled "Money, Ethics and Political Campaigns," will be given by Charles Lewis, executive director of the Center for Public Integrity, head-

quartered in Washington, D.C. Prof. William Earl Maxwell, of the government department of San Antonio College, will convene a panel/audience forum in response to Lewis' presentation.

Dr. Richard Murray, political analyst and professor in the political science department at University of Houston, will preview the outcome of the Nov. 3 U.S. presidential race, as well as races of state and local interest.

Billy Grimsley, LC sociology instructor, will moderate another session of the day-long symposium -- a panel discussion on the topic, "Race and Gender in the Political Process."

Wayne Gray, chairman of the LC Board of Regents, will give a welcome on behalf of the college.

'Baytown Vignettes' off the press

Twenty Lee College honor student essays, many of them prize winners, have been published as a book entitled, "Baytown Vignettes: One Hundred and Fifty Years in the History of a Texas Gulf Coast Community."

The essays represent mini-histories or "slices" from the overall history of Baytown and the area, according to **John Britt** and **Muriel Tyssen**, LC instructors who produced the book. The writings, authored by American Studies students of Britt and Tyssen over a 10-year period, address topics from the days of Texas statehood and the Civil War in Texas to more recent events such as Hurricane Carla in September 1961 and the closing of U.S. Steel's Texas Works during the mid- and late 1980s.

The book is dedicated to Jean Shepherd, former director of the Baytown Historical Museum. Sixteen of the 20 essays won awards in the annual Caldwell Competition for historical writing, sponsored by the Texas State Historical Assn.

"Baytown Vignettes" is on sale for \$12 per copy at the Lee College Bookstore, Baytown Historical Museum and Wallisville Heritage Park. Profits will go to Friends of Lee College.

Panel to oversee sick leave 'bank'

Payroll deduction available to help Foundation, Friends

The Lee College Foundation continues its drive toward a \$1 million corpus to provide LC scholarships. Employees can now help through payroll deductions, according to **Mary Brown**, director of resource development.

Two accounts, one for the LC Foundation and the other for Friends of Lee College, have been established in the LC Business Office, Brown said. Administrators, faculty and staff can arrange payroll deductions by calling **Kathleen Chaffin** at ext. 319. Contributions can be designated for the Foundation, Friends or both.

Participants in the payroll deduction

plan will be eligible to attend the LC Foundation Gala, set for Saturday, Dec. 5 at Goose Creek Country Club, Brown said. Robert L. "Bob" Gillette, longtime civic leader and former LC Foundation chairman, will be the guest of honor.

Nine faculty and staff members have participated in an LC Foundation scholarship fund program in recent years. The foundation will continue to receive these funds under the new program. All contributions are placed in the foundation corpus, which remains invested and untouched.

Scholarships are provided by 85 percent of the interest generated annually by the corpus.

Friends of Lee College, an organization of LC "boosters" from the community, funds instructional and college support needs that cannot be met in the regular LC budget. Annual membership dues are \$25. Additional contributions are encouraged. Friends of Lee College has funded a variety of campus improvements and projects during the past six years.
