Lee College and the community will begin registration week for this fall with a patriotic event to kick-off the celebration of the college's 60th year. The event will climax with the official raising of the college's garrison-sized American flag, donated by American Legion Tri-Cities Post 323.

The fun, which begins at 8 p.m. Aug. 23 at Rundell Hall lawn and Bicentennial Park, will also include fireworks, performance by high school bands, singing by area church choirs and

The 20-foot by 38-foot American flag, which will be raised at the end of the event, will be visible atop Lee College's new 100-foot flagpole to motorists entering Baytown via the Fred Hartman Bridge over the Houston Ship Channel.

Registration week will continue Tuesday, Aug. 24, with neighborhood college registration from 5:30-7 p.m. at Liberty High School.

Regular registration in person is set for 10 a.m.-7 p.m. Wednesday and Thursday and 11 a.m.-2 p.m. Saturday, all at the LC gym.

Fall semester classes will begin on Monday, Aug. 30.



## Increased grant monies boost services to students, community

Nearly \$1/2 million in federal grants for 1993-94 will help local students secure an education while helping Lee College meet needs and demands in the community and work place.

Carl Perkins Vocational Education grants awarded to Lee College for the coming year total \$464,300. This amount triples total Perkins monies received by Lee College as recently as two years ago.

"There is no additional cost to the

college or community in the awarding of these grants," noted **Sally Griffith**, Lee College coordinator of special projects. "These funds are awarded every year to Texas colleges and universities. We're glad to be increasing the amount coming to Lee College."

Colleges and universities compete for Perkins grants by submitting written proposals. Of the six proposals submitted by Lee College, five were funded. "Percentage wise, that's excellent," said Dr. Anna Auvenshine, associate program director with federal projects for the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

Of the hundreds of proposals submitted for 1993-94, "we funded 111 grants to 94 institutions. The value totaled \$13,735,057," Auvenshine said. "Some will send in six and not get one funded."

# Faculty excellence awards to Smith, Foster

Noah T. Smith, English instructor and Carolyn F. Foster, biology instructor, received awards as outstanding Lee College faculty members during Lee College commencement.

An anonymous faculty committee chooses recipients of these Excellence in Education awards each year, based on criteria that include excellence in teaching and/or counseling, professional and personal integrity, effectiveness in area of responsibility and ability to stimulate enthusiasm for learning. Other criteria are the ability to communicate effectively with colleagues and students, leadership in the development of college programs, sincere concern for students and fellow faculty members and loyalty to Lee College and the community.

## Event dedicates child care facility

An open house, hosted by Friends of Lee College, recently dedicated the Barney Gray Center, home of child care for LC students and employees.

Special guests at the event included Barney Gray, whose donation made it possible for Lee College to acquire and renovate the center; Merle McKay of Waco, Gray's cousin; and Kim Dugger of Bryan, Merle McKay's daughter whom Gray considers as his "foster granddaughter."

The Barney Gray Center, located at 2 Price Street behind Sterling Municipal Library, accepts children from two weeks of age through fifth grade.

Baytown YMCA, which is statelicensed to provide child care, entered a three-year contract with Lee College and began operating the facility in January. The center accepts children of Lee College employees, as well as the children of LC students.

The annual award to outstanding faculty members was first presented in 1969 to one instructor. In 1977, the procedure was changed to include awards for two instructors or counselors -- one for fewer than 10 years of service at Lee College and one for more than 10 years of service at the college. Each award winner receives \$600 for educational or cultural enrichment.

# Aug. 31 start scheduled for direct deposit

Steve Evans, dean of financial services, is encouraging employees to sign up for direct deposit of their pay. Electronic testing was conducted Aug. 13, with implementation planned for the Aug. 31 pay day.

"With automatic deposit being confidential and safe, there is no fear of your check being lost, stolen or forged," Evans said. "Your money is automatically in your depository account on pay day and is available for immediate use."

Direct deposit will eliminate the need to make special arrangements for pay days when you're out of town, will leave no possibility for your check to be lost or stolen, and will save the time you lose in line at the bank during lunch, according to Evans.

"You will still receive your regular earnings statement reflecting the same payroll information for your records," he noted.

For employees who have not yet signed up for direct deposit, a supply of direct deposit authorization forms is available at the personnel office and payroll office in Rundell Hall, as well as the Huntsville Center office. For more information, call Evans at ext. 316.

In addition to Evans, sick leave bank





Most people who leave messages on voice mail do a pretty good job of speaking slowly enough so you can take in the entire message the first time you hear it. But what if they don't? Or, what if you get distracted while listening? What is the best way to replay the message? Hope you're not doing like your *Courier* editor has been doing -- saving the entire message by

pressing 5, then pressing 5 to replay it. Use these easier ways.

While listening to any message, press 3 to back up five seconds. You can do this as often as necessary to replay parts of the message. Or, to restart the entire message at any time, press 6.
