Laredo: The Port of Choice by J. Michael Patrick

Following a decade of an unprecedented 30 percent growth per year, U.S.-Mexico trade declined 5.9 percent in 2001. Trade between the two countries is showing signs of turning around however—declining only 0.3 percent in 2002 and growing 4.9 percent in 2003 year-to-date in 2003 (Chart 1). Contributing to the drop in U.S.-Mexico trade have been the sluggish U.S. and Mexican economies, a decline in U.S. industrial production, soft U.S. import demand, and a slowdown in Mexico's maquiladora industry production.

With over 80 percent of Mexico's exports destined for the U.S. market, the slowdown in the U.S. economy has had adverse effects on the Mexican economy, reducing output and employment. Mexico's leading export sector, the maquiladora industry, saw its exports to the U.S. decline roughly 20 percent in 2002, resulting in worker layoffs. With modest to moderate growth forecast for the U.S. and Mexican economies in 2003-2005, U.S.-Mexico trade levels are not expected to return to their peak 2000 levels until 2005-2006.

Notwithstanding the downturn in U.S.-Mexico trade in 2001 and 2002, Laredo remains the port of choice for trade between the two countries. In 2002, the Laredo port of entry accounted for 41.1 percent of all U.S.-Mexico trade, handling more than twice the amount (\$79.4 billion) of its nearest competitor, El Paso (\$38.6 billion) (Table 1).



In addition to being the leading U.S.-Mexico border port of entry, Laredo is the port of choice for Mexico's maquiladora industry. The industry accounts for roughly 50 percent of Mexico's

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exports and 40 percent of its imports. The maguiladora industry is Mexico's leading employment generator and foreign exchange earner. In 2002, roughly 60 percent of Mexico's trade with the U.S. involved maguila industry-related exports and imports. Laredo was the port of choice for maquila products, materials, and supplies in 2002, handling 42.9 percent of total maquila shipments, including transportation equipment (73.7 percent), textile and apparel products (31.6 percent), and electric and electronic products (25.8 percent).

The importance of maquiladora industry to the Laredo port of entry can be seen in the numbers. Transportation equipment, electric and electronics and machinery and tools account for roughly 90.0 percent of the top ten product categories moving through the Laredo port of entry (See Table 2 on back page). These product categories, which account for over 80 percent of Mexico's maquiladora industry output, have experienced production slowdowns since 1996. During the same period, growth

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
Note from the Director

Indicators of border business activity for February 2003 year-to-date (YTD) demonstrated eleven indicators increased and eleven decreased. 2003 YTD comparisons to 2002 reported for the border are listed below:

- Pedestrian bridge crossings into Mexico were down 4.8 percent.
- Pedestrian bridge crossings into Texas were down 5.0 percent.
- Vehicle bridge crossings into Mexico fell 4.4 percent.
- · Vehicle bridge crossings into Texas fell 4.9 percent.
- Truck bridge crossings into Mexico lost 6.1 percent.
- Truck bridge crossings into Texas lost 2.0 percent.
- Rail car bridge crossings into Mexico went up 4.7 percent.
- Rail car bridge crossings into Texas went up 4.5 percent.
- Revenues collected by U.S. Customs increased 26.8 percent.
- Revenues collected by U.S. bridge operators registered a gain of 2.7 percent.
- Tourist Visas issued for entry into Mexico were down 2.1 percent.
- Total employment was up 4.2 percent, with 19,493 jobs gained. The average unemployment rate for the border in February 2003 was 10.0 percent.
- Total building permits issued fell 18.9 percent.
- Total building permit values decreased 17.9 percent.
- Power Connections in service for residential were up 2.6 percent, commercial were up 3.5 percent and industrial were up 22.8 percent.
- Air passenger arrivals were up 1.2 percent, and departures were up 1.2 percent.
- · Total cargo for the Port of Brownsville decreased 16.5 percent.
- Inbound cargo for the Port of Corpus Chrisit went up 9.1 percent, and outbound cargo went down 2.0 percent.

Pedestrians into Texas All Cited Cities Feb. 2002 vs. Feb. 2003: Down **6.2%** (In Millions)



Vehicles into Mexico All Cited Cities Feb. 2002 vs. Feb. 2003: Down **7.9%** (In Millions)



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

Rail Cars into Mexico All Cited Cities Feb. 2002 vs. Feb. 2003: Up **0.8**% (In Thousands)





Customs Revenues for the District of Laredo Feb. 2002 vs. Feb. 2003: Up **41.3**% (In Millions of U.S.\$)





Toursit Visas Issued All Cited Cities Feb. 2002 vs. Feb. 2003: Down 1.9% (In Thousands)
















Air Passenger Activity All Cited Cities Feb. 2002 vs. Feb. 2003 (Arrivals – In Thousands): Up **0.06**%

in truck and rail crossings, and air cargo gross landed weight at the Laredo port of entry also exhibited a general decline.

In addition to being the maquiladora industry's port of choice, Laredo is a leading port for U.S. agricultural exports to Mexico, accounting for nearly 80 percent of U.S. shipments of animal feed and animal and vegetable fats and oils—crude and processed—to Mexico in 2002. The U.S. Department of Commerce uses a 64 product category format (SITC) to classify products moving across U.S. borders. When it comes to U.S.-Mexico trade, Laredo was the number one port of entry for 40 of the 64 categories in terms of total dollar value in 2002. The top ten product categories moving through the Laredo Port in 2001 and 2002 are listed in Table 2.

With the continued growth in U.S.-Mexico trade moving through the Laredo port of entry likely in future years, there are mounting concerns over the adequacy of the port facilities to handle the increase, particularly in terms of the deployment of U.S. Customs personnel. Local officials are working closely with the U.S. Customs to minimize this problem. The placement of federally mandated commercial truck inspection facilities on the border is another issue that will likely affect the flow of trade through the Laredo port in the future. City officials and business sector representatives are working with federal and state officials to resolve this issue.

Laredo is the port of choice for the U.S.-Mexico trade not only because of its strategic location, but, more importantly, because

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of the extensive expertise in international trade found in the community's transportation, warehousing, business services and financial sectors.
