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Note from the Director

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Indicators of border business activity for the month of July were balanced. Of the twenty four indicators represented, twelve demonstrated an increase and twelve showed a decrease. In addition, for the year-to-date (YTD) figures, twelve indicators were up and one was down. Selected YTD comparisons to 1998 reported by border cities include the following:

- Southbound pedestrian crossings into Mexico were up 3.6 percent. El Paso gained
 12.4 percent, Progreso jumped 8.6 percent, and Ealge Pass increased 4.1 percent.
- Northbound pedestrian crossings into Texas were up 2.3 percent. Roma increased 25.2 percent, Progreso rose 12.0 percent, while Laredo jumped 10.9 percent and Eagle Pass gained 6.3 percent.
- Southbound vehicle crossings were up 5.1 percent. Harlingen rose 20.2 percent, Pharr increased 15.7 percent, Progresso gained 14.9 percent, and McAllen-Hidalgo jumped 12.9 percent.
- Northbound vehicle bridge crossings into Texas were up 8.7 percent. Harlingen jumped 22.4 percent, McAllen-Hidalgo increased 22.3 percent, Presidio gained 15.9 percent and Progreso posted an increase of 15.5 percent YTD.
- Southbound truck shipments into Mexico were up 4.7 percent. Progreso increased 60.0 percent, Eagle Pass was up 47.5 percent and Harlingen rose 21.2 percent.
- Northbound truck shipments into Texas were up 12.0 percent with Pharr increasing 22.0 percent, Rio Grande gained 21.7 percent and Eagle Pass posted a 17.5 percent increase YTD.
- Southbound shipments by rail were up 10.2 percent.
- Northbound shipments by rail were up 22.6 percent.
- Revenues collected by U.S. Customs were down slightly by 1.6 percent YTD.
- Revenues collected by U.S. Bridge operators were up 13.4 percent.
- Building permits issued were up 7.1 percent. Laredo rose 25.5 percent, Harlingen gained 11.0 percent, Brownsville was up 7.1 percent, while Eagle Pass declined 4.7 percent.
- Building permit values were up with a YTD increase of 27.8 percent. Harlingen increased 141.6 percent, McAllen was up 55.3 percent, El Paso rose 36.6 percent and Laredo reported a 13.4 percent increase.
- Total employment was up with 9,161 jobs gained YTD. The average unemployment rate in June 1999 was 9.3 percent for the border.



Southbound pedestrian crossings into Mexico for July were up 10.0 percent compared to June. Del Rio increased 22.7 percent, McAllen-Hidalgo rose 19.7 percent, Progreso gained 19.0 percent, Brownsville jumped 11.5 percent, Laredo up 10.2 percent, and Harlingen increased 9.3 percent. Rio Grande, however, was off 16.8 percent. YTD, total southbound pedestrian crossings into Mexico were up 3.6 percent. El Paso southbound pedestrian crossings, which made up 34.5 percent of all crossings in July, increased 12.4 percent. Laredo, accounting for 27.8 percent of total crossings, was up 4.8 percent and Brownsville, with an 18.4 percent share YTD, was down 6.8 percent.

% Share Pedestrians for July 1999





Del Rio increased 40.8 percent, Rio Grande rose 16.4 percent, Laredo gained 11.7 percent, Roma was up 7.2 percent, Eagle Pass increased 6.3 percent, McAllen-Hidalgo rose 5.4 percent, and Presidio was off 0.1 percent. YTD total northbound pedestrian crossings into Texas were up 2.3 percent. El Paso, accounting for 41.1 percent of northbound crossings, was up 40.8 percent YTD. Laredo, with a 22.6 percent of all northbound crossings, was up 25.7 percent and Brownsville, with 18.4 percent of all northbound pedestrian crossings, gained 16.1 percent in crossings YTD.

Roma fell 46.1 percent, Eagle Pass declined 14.5 percent, Progresso decreased 12.6 percent, and Pharr was down 12.3 percent. Brownsville fell 6.9 percent, and Rio Grande declined 6.0 percent. YTD northbound truck shipments were up

12.0 percent. Laredo, accounting for 62.9 percent of all northbound truck traffic in July, had a 12.1 percent increase YTD. Pharr, with 15.7 percent of all shipments in July, experienced a 22.0 percent increase YTD. Brownsville, with a 12.0 percent of all northbound truck shipments in July, experienced a 3.8 percent decline YTD.



Eagle Pass, accounting for 27.9 percent of all southbound rail shipments, increased 16.8 percent. Brownsville, however, with 11.0 percent of all southbound rail shipments in July, rose 1.9 percent.

Export Rail YTD % Change 98-99





Eagle Pass, accounting for 24.1 percent of all northbound rail shipments in July, was up 16.5 percent and Brownsville, with 3.8 percent of all northbound rail shipments, decreased 14.1 percent YTD.



Total U.S. Customs revenues, for July, for the former District of Laredo, decreased 1.1 percent from June's figures. Progreso was down 42.0 percent, McAllen-Hidalgo decreased 38.3 percent, Del Rio declined 20.8 percent, Brownsville fell 11.5 percent, Rio Grande was down 9.3 percent, and Roma decreased 8.2 percent, Laredo increased 11.0 percent. YTD revenue figures were down

1.6 percent compared to June 1998. Laredo, accounting for 64.5 percent of the former district's revenue in July was up 2.5 percent YTD. McAllen-Hidalgo, with 13.2 percent of total revenues, was down 20.2 percent YTD. Eagle Pass, accounting for 12.1 percent of all revenues, was up 18.8 percent YTD. Brownsville, with 8.4 percent of total revenues in July declined 6.7 percent YTD.









Residential Phones % Change July 98-99









Passenger Arrivals % Change YTD 98-99







% Share July 1999 Inbound Cargo




