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#### Note from the Director

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Indicators of border business activity for the month of April were balanced. Twelve monthly indicators decreased while eleven increased. In addition, for the year-to-date (YTD) figures, seventeen indicators were up and six were down. Selected YTD comparisons to 1998 reported by border cities include the following:

- Southbound pedestrian crossings into Mexico were down 14.7 percent. McAllen-Hidalgo dropped 12.0 percent, Del Rio fell 11.4 percent, Brownsville was off 5.1 percent and Laredo increased 2.2 percent.
- Northbound pedestrian crossings into Texas were down 0.3 percent. Presidio dropped 34.0 percent, Brownsville was off 16.1 percent, while Roma increased 30.5 percent and Progreso rose 13.6 percent.
- Southbound vehicle bridge crossings were up 7.2 percent. Harlingen rose 24.3
  percent, Pharr increased 24.1 percent, Roma gained 14.6 percent, while El Paso
  was down 9.7 percent.
- Northbound vehicle bridge crossings into Texas were up 10.9 percent. Harlingen jumped 28.3 percent, McAllen-Hidalgo increased 23.1 percent, Roma gained 16.4 percent and Presidio posted an increase of 15.9 percent YTD.
- Southbound truck shipments into Mexico were up 2.8 percent. Eagle Pass and Roma increased 32.0 percent, Harlingen rose 26.8 percent and Progreso was up 22.5 percent.
- Northbound truck shipments into Texas were up 11.2 percent with Roma increasing 25.5 percent, Pharr gained 23.0 percent, and Eagle Pass posted an 19.5 percent increase YTD.
- Southbound shipments by rail were up 1.9 percent.
- Northbound shipments by rail were up 17.4 percent.
- Revenues collected by U.S. Customs were down slightly by 1.0 percent YTD.
   Revenues collected by U.S. Bridge operators were up 13.0 percent.
- Building permits issued were up 10.8 percent. El Paso rose 17.1 percent, Brownsville gained 19.8 percent, McAllen-Hidalgo was up 3.3 percent, Laredo was up 2.8 percent, while Eagle Pass declined 3.3 percent.
- Building permit values were up with a YTD increase of 27.8 percent. McAllen increased 82.8 percent, Harlingen was up 53.9 percent, Brownsville rose 23.1 percent and El Paso reported a 20.7 percent increase.
- Total employment was up with 8,293 jobs lost YTD. The average unemployment rate in April 1999 was 8.9 percent for the border.



Southbound pedestrian crossings into Mexico for April were down 14.7 percent compared to March. Progreso declined 52.2 percent, Brownsville fell 26.9 percent, Del Rio was down 19.7 percent, Roma dropped 16.7 percent, Rio Grande was off 11.5 percent, and McAllen-Hidalgo fell 12.0 percent. Laredo, however, increased 4.1 percent. YTD, total southbound pedestrian crossings into Mexico were up 3.1 percent. El Paso southbound pedestrian crossings, which made up 31.7 percent of all crossings in April, increased 13.0 percent. Laredo, accounting for 28.9 percent of total crossings, was down 2.2 percent and Brownsville, with an 18.5 percent share YTD, was down 5.1 percent.

#### % Share Pedestrians for April 1999





Northbound pedestrian crossings into Texas were down 14.5 percent in April. Progreso fell 49.2 percent, Brownsville dropped 22.1 percent, Del Rio fell 16.9 percent, Presidio was down 16.0 percent, McAllen-Hidalgo was off 15.0 percent, Laredo was down 8.1 percent, Rio Grande was off 8.5 percent, and El Paso was down 7.3 percent. YTD total northbound pedestrian crossings into Texas were down 0.3 percent. El Paso, accounting for 42.3 percent of the northbound crossings, was up 1.1 percent YTD. Laredo, with 21.2 percent of all northbound crossings, was up 5.1 percent and Brownsville, with 16.7 percent of all northbound pedestrian crossings, down 16.1 percent in crossings YTD.

Southbound vehicle bridge crossings into Mexico were down 6.9 percent in April from March's figures. Pharr decreased 23.8 percent, Brownsville was down 11.6 percent, Roma dropped 16.1 percent, Progreso fell 10.4 percent, El Paso declined 6.9, Harlingen was off 5.7 percent, Del Rio dropped 2.7 percent, McAllen-Hidalgo fell 3.5 percent, Rio Grande was down 2.8 percent, Laredo dropped 2.1 percent, and Eagle Pass fell 2.3 percent. YTD total southbound vehicle bridge crossings were up 7.2 percent. Laredo,

with 23.1 percent of all southbound traffic in April, was up 5.9 percent YTD. Brownsville, with 18.6 percent of all southbound vehicle bridge crossings, had a 9.9 percent increase, YTD. McAllen-Hidalgo, with 16.4 percent of all southbound vehicle crossings, experienced a 15.2 percent increase YTD. El Paso, accounting for 14.4 percent of all southbound vehicle crossings, fell 9.7 percent decrease YTD.

Progreso registered a 13.7 percent decrease, Harlingen was down 10.2 percent, McAllen-Hidalgo dropped 9.4 percent, Del Rio and El Paso fell 5.5 percent, Laredo was off 5.3 percent, Eagle Pass was off 4.2 percent, Brownsville was down 4.2 percent, Presidio fell 3.8 percent and Roma declined

4.7 percent. YTD northbound vehicle bridge crossings into Texas were up 10.9 percent. El Paso with 23.4 percent of all crossings in April was up 5.8 percent YTD. Laredo, with 20.8 percent of all crossings, was up 9.2 percent and Brownsville with 17.6 percent of all crossings was, up 8.6 percent YTD.

Southbound truck shipments into Mexico were down 8.8 percent in April. Brownsville was down 33.2 percent, Pharr dropped 22.7 percent, Roma fell 11.0 percent, McAllen-Hidalgo dropped 10.0 percent, Progreso was off 8.1 percent, Del Rio declined 7.2 percent and Rio Grande fell 1.8 percent. Laredo dropped 1.0 percent. Harlingen decreased 0.1 percent. YTD southbound truck ship-

ments were up 2.8 percent. Laredo, with 62.0 percent of all southbound shipments in April, experienced a 0.5 percent increase YTD. Brownsville, with a 10.9 percent of all southbound shipments, had a 5.5 percent decrease YTD. Pharr, with 10.6 percent, registered an increase of 12.9 percent, Harlingen with 3.4 percent of all truck crossings, was up 26.8 percent YTD.

April northbound truck shipments into Texas dropped 10.1 percent over March's shipments. Laredo dropped 14.3 percent, Pharr was down 14.0 percent, Eagle Pass fell 12.0 percent, Del Rio dropped 8.1 percent, Progreso fell 8.0 percent, and Roma declined 7.6 percent. Brownsville, however, increased 34.9 percent. YTD northbound truck shipments were up 11.2 percent. Laredo, accounting

for 58.7 percent of all northbound truck traffic in April, had a 9.6 percent increase YTD. Pharr, with 20.1 percent of all shipments in April, experienced a 23.0 percent increase YTD. Brownsville, with a 10.7 percent of all northbound truck shipments in April, experienced a 0.2 percent decline YTD.



Southbound rail shipments into Mexico decreased 0.3 percent in April. Laredo decreased 1.8 percent. Eagle Pass fell 1.4 percent, while Brownsville grew by 10.2 percent. YTD, total southbound rail shipments into Mexico from Texas were up 1.9 percent. Laredo, which accounts for 61.3 percent of all southbound rail shipments in April, was down 1.4 percent YTD. Eagle Pass, accounting for 25.8 percent of all southbound rail shipments, increased 1.6 percent. Brownsville, however, with 12.9 percent of all southbound rail shipments in April, rose 22.3 percent.

### Export Rail YTD % Change 98-99





Northbound rail shipments into Texas increased 4.2 percent in April. Brownsville was up 26.2 percent. Eagle Pass grew 4.0 percent, and Laredo posted a gain of 1.7 percent. YTD, total northbound rail shipments into Texas from Mexico were up 17.4 percent. Laredo, which accounts for 66.7 percent of all northbound rail shipments in April, was up 23.6 percent. Eagle Pass, accounting for 23.9 percent of all northbound rail shipments in April, was up 14.4 percent and Brownsville, with 9.4 percent of all northbound rail shipments, decreased 11.4 percent YTD.



Total U.S. Customs revenues, for April, for the former District of Laredo, increased 24.5 percent from March's figures. Eagle Pass was up 134.0 percent, Rio Grande increased 58.7 percent, Progreso rose 53.4 percent, Brownsville gained 25.4 percent, Roma increased 23.5 percent, Laredo grew 17.3 percent, and McAllen-Hidalgo rose 2.7 percent. Del Rio fell 15.0 percent. YTD revenue figures were down 1.0 percent compared to April 1998. Laredo,

accounting for 63.3 percent of the former district's revenue in April, was up 3.6 percent YTD. McAllen-Hidalgo, with 14.9 percent of total revenues, was down 22.1 percent YTD. Eagle Pass, accounting for 11.2 percent of all revenues, was up 22.3 percent YTD. Brownsville, with 8.8 percent of total revenues in April declined 8.1 percent YTD.




U.S. bridge operators' revenues decreased 8.4 percent in the month of April. Brownsville decreased 23.6 percent, Pharr fell 19.1 percent, El Paso and Laredo dropped 5.7 percent, Del Rio fell 5.3 percent, Eagle Pass was off 4.7 percent. Harlingen fell 4.4 percent and McAllen-Hidalgo dropped 3.8 percent. YTD, U.S. bridge operators' revenues were up 13.0 percent. Laredo, accounting for

38.3 percent of total U.S. bridge operator's revenues collected in April, had a 19.8 percent increase YTD. El Paso, accounting for 17.2 percent of total U.S. bridge revenues, decreased 3.4 percent YTD. McAllen-Hidalgo, accounting for 12.6 percent, was up 13.5 percent YTD. Brownsville, with 10.4 percent of the total bridge revenues in April, was up 4.4 percent YTD.

#### % Share Revenues April 1999





#### **Tourist Visas YTD April 98-99**







#### Residential Phones % Change April 98-99









#### Passenger Arrivals % Change YTD 98-99







#### % Share April 1999 Inbound Cargo




