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Note from the Director

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Indicators of border business activity for the month of September were down. Twelve monthly indicators decreased while eleven increased when compared to August. In addition, for the year-to-date (YTD) figures, fifteen indicators were up and eight were down. Selected YTD comparisons to 1997 reported by border cities include the following:

- Southbound pedestrian crossings into Mexico were up 1.3 percent. Eagle Pass rose 31.8 percent, McAllen-Hidalgo increased 3.1 percent while Laredo was down 0.8 percent and Brownsville declined 4.8 percent.
- Northbound pedestrian crossings into Texas were up 1.6 percent. Eagle Pass rose 9.6 percent, El Paso was up 1.5 percent while Brownsville decreased 1.2 percent and Laredo dipped 0.8 percent.
- Southbound vehicle bridge crossings were up 7.2 percent. Pharr rose 44.8 percent, Brownsville increased 11.3 percent, Laredo gained 4.5 percent and El Paso was up 4.2
- Northbound vehicle bridge crossings into Texas were up 2.7 percent with Laredo increasing 7.5 percent, El Paso gained 2.9 percent, Eagle Pass was up 1.2 percent and McAllen-Hidalgo posted an increase of 1.1 percent YTD.
- Southbound truck shipments into Mexico were up 22.2 percent. Pharr increased 84.9 percent, Brownsville rose 29.7 percent and Laredo gained 21.7 percent.
- Northbound truck shipments into Texas were up 10.8 percent with Eagle Pass increasing 18.4 percent, Laredo gained 15.0 percent and Pharr posted a 8.5 percent increase YTD.
- Southbound shipments by rail were down 1.1 percent.
- Northbound shipments by rail were down 2.4 percent.
- Revenues collected by U.S. Customs were down 9.7 percent YTD. Revenues collected by U.S. Bridge operators were up 14.3 percent.
- Building permits issued were up 19.3 percent. El Paso rose 23.7 percent, Eagle Pass gained 14.2 percent, Brownsville was up 14.0 percent and Laredo increased 11.4 percent.
- Building permit values were down with a YTD decrease of 12.1 percent. Brownsville decreased 34.7 percent, Harlingen was down 27.5 percent, El Paso fell 11.0 percent while Laredo reported a 3.8 percent increase.
- Total employment was up with 10,023 jobs gained YTD. The average unemployment rate in September 1998 was 10.7 percent.

International Trade Through the Port of Hidalgo 1997: An Update

The Texas Center at Texas A&M International University in Laredo recently received more trade information from our various databases for 1997. We were able to correlate two different government databases into one very detailed border database. We would like to take this opportunity to inform you of some of the information we discovered for the Port of Hidalgo.

In 1997, exports through the Port of Hidalgo totaled \$3,255,986,112. Of this, about 96.79% of these exports went via truck or \$3,151,373,025. According to governmental databases, \$82,557,539 or 2.54% were in other modes of transportation. If one adds the percentages together, one can conclude that 99.21% of Hidalgo's exports are accounted for using two different government databases. This 99.21% accountability is as good as it gets in the statistics world.

Of all the exports that passed through the Port of Hidalgo in 1997, the Mexican State of Tamaulipas received the bulk of the goods, about 74.41% of the goods or \$2,422,812,129. What this means is that the Port of Hidalgo is basically a "Maquila Port" meaning exports through Hidalgo feed the cross border maquiladora industry. Mexico D.F. is the next largest recipient of goods crossing from Hidalgo. Mexico D.F. received 4.93% of goods exported through Hidalgo or \$160,482,657. Estado de Mexico is a distant third in goods coming from the Port of Hidalgo. Approximately 3.70% of goods passing southbound through Hidalgo were destined for Estado de Mexico or \$120,346,739.

On the importation side of the house in 1997, imports through the Port of Hidalgo equaled \$4,407,385,755 making Hidalgo a net minus port of entry (net minus means more goods are imported by dollar value than exported). Of the total amount imported by dollar value, about 96.58% of the goods went by truck or \$4,256,818,377. This leaves about 3.42% of goods that were imported through the Port of Hidalgo by some other method of transportation.

The top U.S. state receiving goods after they pass through Hidalgo is the State of Texas which received \$2,919,935,784 of products or 66.25% in 1997. These are probably goods returning to the State of Texas after assembly in some of the estimated 99 maquilas in Reynosa or other maquilas and factories located in the interior of Mexico. The State of Indiana was the next state which received goods through Hidalgo with the dollar value equaling \$517,553,539 or 11.74%. The third highest state which received goods through Hidalgo was the State of Michigan which received \$144,562,992 or 3.28%.

In 1997, it has been estimated that approximately 1,445,351,475 kilograms (1kg = 2.25 lbs) worth of goods were imported through the Port of Hidalgo. The State of Texas received the most cargo by weight with 1,171,040,439 kg or 81.02% of all the weight destined for the United States. The State of Indiana was next on the list concerning weight and received 46,673,247 kg or 3.23% of all the weight destined for the United States in 1997. The State of Minnesota was the third highest state by weight through the Port of Hidalgo with 27,739,687 kg or 1.92%.

The Texas Center at Texas A&M International University expects to receive 1998 trade information in a couple of weeks. Once we have the data compiled, we will be sending updates on trade activity through the Port of Hidalgo. 

Southbound pedestrian bridge crossings into Mexico for September was down 11.4 percent compared to August. Eagle Pass decreased 17.4 percent, Brownsville fell 16.4 percent, Rio Grande was down 15.2 percent and Progreso declined 15.0 percent, Roma slid 14.4 percent, McAllen-Hidalgo dipped 12.9 percent, El Paso decreased 9.0 percent and Laredo fell 8.8 percent. However, Del Rio gained 3.4 percent. YTD, total southbound pedestrian crossings into Texas were up 1.3 percent. El Paso southbound pedestrian crossings, which make up 35.8 percent of all crossings in September rose 2.5 percent. Laredo, accounting for 26.8 percent of all crossings, was down 0.8 percent and Brownsville was down 4.8 percent with 19.1 percent of all crossings YTD.

% Share Pedestrians for September 1998





Northbound pedestrian crossings into Texas were down 11.2 percent in September. Del Rio fell 34.6 percent, Brownsville was down 17.7 percent, Roma decreased 17.6 percent, Rio Grande dipped 17.1 percent, Eagle Pass slid 16.4 percent, Progreso fell 11.7 percent, Laredo was down 10.2 percent, El Paso decreased 8.2 percent, McAllen-Hidalgo slid 7.3 percent and Presidio dropped 0.2 percent. YTD total northbound pedestrian crossings into Texas were up 1.6 percent. El Paso, accounting for 45.1 percent of all northbound pedestrian crossings in September, was up 1.5 percent YTD. Laredo, with 21.1 percent of all northbound crossings, was down 0.8 percent and Brownsville, with 16.1 percent of all northbound pedestrian crossings, had a 1.2 percent decrease in crossings YTD.

Harlingen decreased 16.1 percent, El Paso was down 14.2 percent, Brownsville fell 13.4 percent, Progreso declined 11.3 percent, McAllen-Hidalgo dipped 11.1 percent, Pharr slid 10.4 percent, Roma and Rio Grande decreased 7.6 percent, Eagle Pass was down 6.1 percent and Del Rio dropped 1.6 percent. However, Laredo increased 2.3 percent. YTD total southbound vehicle bridge crossings were up 7.2 per-

cent. Laredo, with 25.8 percent of all southbound traffic in September, was up 4.5 percent YTD. Brownsville, with 19.2 percent of all southbound vehicle bridge crossings, had an 11.3 percent increase YTD. Harlingen registered a 15.5 percent decrease, McAllen-Hidalgo fell 10.0 percent, Brownsville dipped 9.7 percent, El Paso reported a decrease of 8.7 percent, Rio Grande slid 8.4 percent, Eagle Pass was down 8.3 percent, Progreso fell 6.8 percent, Presidio declined 6.6 percent and Roma decreased

3.5 percent. However, Del Rio increased 15.8 percent and Laredo grew 8.7 percent. YTD northbound vehicle bridge crossings into Texas were up 2.7 percent. Laredo with 23.9 percent of all crossings in September was up 7.5 percent YTD. El Paso, with 23.0 percent of all crossings, gained 2.9 percent and Brownsville with 17.1 percent of all crossings, was up 1.2 percent YTD.

Southbound truck shipments into Mexico were up 6.6 percent in September. Progreso increased 87.9 percent, Del Rio gained 18.2 percent, Laredo rose 9.2 percent, Brownsville grew 5.4 percent, Harlingen was up 5.1 percent, Eagle Pass Increased 4.4 percent and Rio Grande gained 3.7 percent. However, Roma fell 8.2 percent, Pharr dipped 4.3 percent and McAllen-Hidalgo decreased 2.0

percent. YTD, Laredo with 51.8 percent of all southbound shipments in September, experienced a 21.7 percent increase. Brownsville, with 19.7 percent of all southbound shipments, had a 29.7 percent increase YTD. Pharr with 10.8 percent of all truck traffic, registered an increase of 84.9 percent and McAllen-Hidalgo, with 3.4 percent of all truck crossings, fell 53.2 percent.

northbound truck shipments were up 10.8 percent. Laredo, accounting for 64.7 percent of all northbound truck traffic in September had a 15.0 percent increase YTD. Pharr, with 13.6 percent of shipments, experienced an 8.5 percent increase YTD. Brownsville, with 11.2 percent of all northbound truck shipments in September, rose 0.1 percent YTD.



Southbound rail shipments into Mexico increased 2.8 percent in September. Brownsville was up 15.9 percent and Laredo increased 3.5 percent. However, Eagle Pass dipped 9.9 percent. YTD, total southbound rail shipments into Mexico from Texas were down 1.1 percent. Laredo, which accounts for 65.3 percent of all southbound rail shipments in September was down 3.6 percent. Eagle Pass, accounting for 17.3 percent of all southbound rail shipments, increased 5.2 percent. Brownsville, with 17.4 percent of all southbound rail shipments in September, rose 0.7 percent YTD.




Import Shipments by Rail into Texas —Number of Rail Cars

YTD, total northbound rail shipments into Texas from Mexico were down 2.4 percent. Laredo, which accounts for 63.1 percent of all northbound rail shipments in September was down 2.3 percent. Eagle Pass, accounting for 30.0 percent of all northbound rail shipments in September, decreased 5.2 percent and Brownsville, with 6.8 percent of all northbound rail shipments, increased 7.4 percent YTD.



Revenues (in U.S. Dollars) Collected by U.S. Bridge Operators







Tourist Visas YTD September 97-98







Residential Phones % Change September 97-98





Employment/Unemployment Rates —Texas Border





Passenger Arrivals % Change YTD 97-98







% Share September 1998 Inbound Cargo




