
San Antonio Livestock **Exposition Firms Foundation for TAM**

The San Antonio Livestock Exposition (S.A.L.E.) solidified the continued growth and success of the San Antonio Area Texas AgriFood Master Program with a \$43,224 grant to the AgriFood Education Council in San Antonio. R. Keith Martin, Executive Director, Jimmie Ruth Evans, President, and Mary West Traylor of the San Antonio Livestock Exposition Executive Committee presented the 1994-95 grant during an elementary school Ag Fair in April. The

grant is funding a full time Volunteer Coordinator for the San Antonio Area AgriFood Master Program, construction of numerous educational displays about agriculture, volunteer training and area expansion of the TAM program. S.A.L.E. also funded a \$23,350 grant to the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to secure Ag in the Classroom curriculum and Teacher Resource Kits for inner city schools in Bexar County.

Program Expanding Throughout Texas

Begun in San Antonio in 1992, the Texas AgriFood Master Program has now expanded to the Amarillo/ Canyon, Dallas, Austin and Fort Worth metropolitan areas. The goal is to extend the program into the 33 Texas counties with populations of more than 100,000. By 1999 we



hope to have 20 Texas AgriFood Master Programs. County Extension Agents in these counties are providing the leadership for program implementation. The involvement and support of local residents, businesses and organizations is essential for expansion of this educational effort.

In Abilene, County Extension Agent Gary Bomer introduced the Texas AgriFood Master concept to the Taylor County Extension Program Council in November. Preston Sides, County Extension Director for Harris County, has talked with representatives of the Gulf Coast Agribusiness Council, Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo and Harris County Community College Agriculture Department about establishing a TAM program in the Houston Area. The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Speakers Committee has requested a proposal to be discussed this spring.

Down in the *Rio Grande Valley*,
District Extension Director Doyle
Warren, along with County
Extension Agents, Terry Lockamy of
Cameron County, Ruben Saldana of
Willacy County and Brad Cowan of
Hidalgo County are working with
agribusiness presently to establish
an AgriFood Education Council.
Expansion into the *San Angelo* area
in 1995 is also a possibility. County
agent Rex Jones has already worked
with some volunteers to produce
their first elementary school
Agriculture Fair last spring.

TAMs Have Big Plans for the Spring

Capitol—Capitol Area TAMs are gearing up for the Howdy Youth Tours during the Austin Youth Fair in March. Plans are underway to establish the Capitol Area AgriFood Education Council. Dallas-Spring 1995 "Ag Fairs" about production, processing and distribution of food and fiber products are scheduled on campuses of Plano and Dallas ISD's. TAM volunteers have an \$18,000 curriculum enrichment grant from the Dallas Ecological Foundation, American Wild Turkey Foundation and Susan and Ray Merskie. It will be used to bring an interactive computer program entitled "Endangered Species Wildlife Success Stories," into area elementary schools and cross sell Ag in the Classroom and Project Teach curriculum in the process. The computer program was produced by Dr. Billy Higginbotham, Extension Wildlife Specialist of

Overton. On April 22 Dallas TAMs will host hay wagon field tours of agronomic crops for visitors to the Earth Day celebration at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center near Plano. TAM III is scheduled to begin February 6 on Monday evenings from 6–10 pm for eight weeks. Contacts:

San Antonio-TAMS will host Texas Beef Industry Council guided tours. March 23-April 7 at the San Antonio Convention Center. The TBIC display highlights the beef industry from the ranch to the many food and by-products derived from beef cattle. The San Antonio Livestock Exposition's Public Ag Tours, behind the scenes urban adult tours with livestock producers, will for the second year be implemented by the Texas AgriFood Masters. Last year more than 700 attended one of 42 tours during the two week event. Spring events include Earth Day, Texas Children's Festival, S.A. Youth Conference, and Ag Fairs at Schertz and Kindred Elementary schools. The TAM-VIII class will be held Tuesday evenings March 14-May 4, 1995.

Great Accomplishments for 1994

Texas AgriFood Masters accomplished big things in 1994. Here is just a sample:

- → Dallas TAM volunteers hosted about 1,500 on Public Ag Tours during the State Fair of Texas .
- Panhandle area TAMs staffed educational exhibits on pesticides and food safety which reached thousands of consumers and producers attending the Tri-State Fair and the Farmer Stockman Show in Lubbock.
- ◆ The San Antonio AgriFood Master program reached a milestone. More than 100 volunteers from eight San Antonio area counties have taken part in TAM classes I-VII.
- ◆ About 1,180 elementary youth and teachers participated in the fall 1994 TAM Ag Fair events held in Northside and East Central ISDs in San Antonio.
- → San Antonio TAM volunteers distributed 350 Ag in the Classroom Teacher Resource Kits to inner city elementary schools this fall.
