

Border Business Indicators

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Note from the Director

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Indicators of border business activity for the month of September were up. Thirteen monthly indicators were up while eleven indicators were down when compared to August. In addition, for the year-to-date (YTD) figures, nineteen indicators were up and four were down. Selected YTD comparisons to 1996 reported by border cities include the following:

- Southbound pedestrian crossings into Mexico were up 29.2 percent. El Paso was up 71.5 percent, McAllen-Hidalgo rose 14.4 percent, Laredo increased 12.7 percent and Brownsville was up 3.0 percent.
- Northbound pedestrian crossings into Texas were down 1.2 percent. McAllen-Hidalgo fell 10.9 percent Brownsville was down 6.7 percent, and Laredo decreased 5.1 percent. However, El Paso increased 5.9 percent.
- Southbound vehicle bridge crossings were up 5.4 percent. El Paso was up 8.1 percent, McAllen-Hidalgo rose 8.0 percent, Brownsville increased 8.0 percent and Laredo was up 4.9 percent.
- Northbound vehicle bridge crossings into Texas were up 2.9 percent with Brownsville increasing 7.5 percent and El Paso gaining 1.9 percent. However, Laredo was down 2.1 percent and McAllen-Hidalgo fell 1.0 percent YTD.
- Southbound truck shipments into Mexico were up 17.7 percent. Laredo increased 25.4 percent and Brownsville rose 14.4 percent while McAllen-Hidalgo decreased 13.3 percent.
- Northbound truck shipments into Texas were up 5.4 percent with Eagle Pass increasing 17.2 percent, Brownsville gained 4.0 percent and Laredo posted a 1.9 percent increase YTD.
- . Southbound shipments by rail were up 18.6 percent.
- . Northbound shipments by rail were down 0.7 percent.
- Revenues collected by U.S. Customs were up 7.3 percent YTD. Revenues collected by U.S. Bridge operators were up 8.1 percent.
- Building permits issued were up 4.6 percent. Brownsville increased by 14.1 percent, McAllen rose 12.0 percent and Laredo was up 10.2 percent.
- Building permit values were up with a YTD increase of 42.8 percent. Brownsville increased 125.5 percent, McAllen was up 58.7 percent, Laredo gained 51.3 percent and Harlingen reported a 37.4 percent increase.
- Total employment was up with 19,290 jobs gained YTD. The average unemployment rate in September 1997 was 10.7 percent, down from the 11.6 percent in September 1996.

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Please note that the data contained in this and all issues of the Border Business Indicators is collected from different government agencies and private sources. Readers should note that different data-collecting agencies use dissimilar, often conflicting, techniques in collecting and compiling the information they publish. Because of this lack of uniformity, comparing different data could result in erroneous conclusions. While we are most grateful to our sources for their cooperation, we cannot assume responsibility for the comparability of the data.



Southbound pedestrian bridge crossings into Mexico for September were down 10.9 percent compared to August. Harlingen decreased 35.0 percent, Rio Grande declined 29.9 percent, Progreso was down 26.9 percent and Del Rio fell 21.3 percent. McAllen-Hidalgo declined 16.3 percent, Laredo was down 13.6 percent, El Paso fell 12.6 percent, Roma decreased 3.4 percent and Brownsville fell 0.4 percent. However, Eagle Pass increased 4.9 percent. YTD, total southbound pedestrian crossings into Texas were up 29.2 percent. El Paso southbound pedestrian crossings, which make up 44.2 percent of all crossings in September were up 71.5 percent. Laredo, accounting for 21.3 percent of all crossings, was up 12.7 percent and Brownsville was up 3.0 percent with 20.2 percent of all crossings YTD.

% Share Pedestrians for September 1997





Northbound pedestrian crossings into Texas were down 9.5 percent in September. Progreso decreased 22.5 percent, Del Rio fell 20.9 percent, Rio Grande declined 20.1 percent, Eagle Pass dipped 19.5 percent and El Paso slid 10.9 percent. McAllen-Hidalgo decreased 10.3 percent, Roma fell 8.0 percent, Laredo declined 5.7 percent and Brownsville slid 5.6 percent. However, Presidio increased 16.0 percent. YTD total northbound pedestrian crossings into Texas were down 1.2 percent. El Paso, accounting for 42.8 percent of all northbound pedestrian crossings in September, was up 5.9 percent YTD. Laredo, with 22.1 percent of all northbound crossings, was down 5.1 percent and Brownsville, with 20.0 percent of all northbound pedestrian crossings, had a 6.7 percent decrease in crossings YTD.

Southbound vehicle bridge crossings into Mexico decreased 5.5 percent in September from August's figures. Harlingen decreased 14.8 percent, Progreso was down 14.2 percent, Roma fell 11.5 percent and Rio Grande declined 11.4 percent. Del Rio and McAllen-Hidalgo both fell 9.7 percent, El Paso was down 8.4 percent, Eagle Pass decreased 8.2 percent, Laredo dipped 5.9 percent and Pharr slid 3.3 percent. However, Brownsville had a 5.9 percent increase. YTD total southbound vehicle bridge crossings were up 5.4 per-

cent. Laredo, with 24.6 percent of all southbound traffic in September, was up 4.9 percent YTD. Brownsville, with 21.1 percent of all southbound vehicle bridge crossings, had an 8.0 percent increase YTD. McAllen-Hidalgo, with 15.3 percent of all southbound vehicle crossings, experienced an 8.0 percent increase YTD. El Paso, accounting for 15.2 percent of all southbound vehicle crossings had an 8.1 percent increase YTD.

Northbound vehicle bridge crossings into Texas for September were down 6.2 percent since August. Progreso was down 15.4 percent, Harlingen fell 14.2 percent, Del Rio decreased 9.8 percent, Presidio declined 8.1 percent, Rio Grande dipped 8.0 percent and Eagle Pass slid 7.6 percent. El Paso was down 7.3 percent, Brownsville registered a 6.1 percent decrease, McAllen-Hidalgo

fell 5.9 percent, Roma slid 2.7 percent and Laredo reported a 2.2 percent decrease. YTD northbound vehicle bridge crossings into Texas were up 2.9 percent. El Paso, with 24.0 percent of all crossings in September was up 1.9 percent YTD. Laredo, with 21.4 percent of all crossings, was down 2.1 percent and Brownsville with 18.2 percent of all crossings, was up 7.5 percent YTD.

Southbound truck shipments into Mexico were up 2.3 percent in September. Rio Grande increased 20.1 percent, Eagle Pass rose 17.5 percent, Brownsville was up 5.8 percent, Del Rio gained 3.7 percent, Laredo registered a 2.2 percent increase, McAllen-Hidalgo rose 1.5 percent and Roma was up 1.4 percent. However, Harlingen posted a 15.6 percent decrease, Progreso fell 3.2 percent and Pharr was down 2.9 percent. YTD, total southbound truck traffic had an

increase of 17.7 percent. Laredo, with 51.5 percent of all south-bound shipments in September, experienced a 25.4 percent increase YTD. Brownsville, with 19.2 percent of all southbound shipments, had a 14.4 percent increase YTD. McAllen-Hidalgo with 8.5 percent of all truck traffic, registered a decrease of 13.3 percent and Pharr, with 7.2 percent of all truck crossings, rose 89.5 percent.

Northbound truck shipments into Texas increased 23.4 percent from August's shipments. Rio Grande increased 44.0 percent, Laredo had an increase of 42.4 percent, Del Rio rose 4.2 percent and Brownsville was up 0.7 percent. However, Falcon showed a 54.5 percent decrease, Progreso was down 33.5 percent, Roma fell 13.7

percent, Eagle Pass dipped 5.6 percent and Pharr declined 0.8 percent. YTD northbound truck shipments were up 5.4 percent. Laredo, accounting for 64.1 percent of all northbound truck traffic in September, had a 1.9 percent increase YTD. Pharr, with 13.3 percent of shipments, experienced a 178.1 percent increase YTD.



Southbound rail shipments into Mexico increased 0.6 percent in September. Eagle Pass was up 10.0 percent. However, El Paso was down 28.2 percent, Brownsville fell 2.3 percent and Laredo decreased 1.7 percent. YTD, total southbound rail shipments into Mexico from Texas were up 18.6 percent. Laredo, which accounts for 60.2 percent of all southbound rail shipments in September, was up 16.2 percent. Eagle Pass, accounting for 28.0 percent of all southbound rail shipments, increased 35.9 percent. Brownsville, with 10.1 percent of all southbound rail shipments in September, rose 27.6 percent YTD.



Northbound rail shipments into Texas decreased 1.7 percent in September. Brownsville registered a 17.7 percent decrease and Laredo fell 5.5 percent. However, Eagle Pass was up 12.6 percent and El Paso posted an increase of 1.9 percent. YTD, total northbound rail shipments into Texas from Mexico were down 0.7 percent. Laredo, which accounts for 60.6 percent of all northbound rail shipments in September, was up 9.0 percent. Eagle Pass, accounting for 30.4 percent of all northbound rail shipments in September, increased 2.7 percent and Brownsville, with 7.7 percent of all northbound rail shipments, decreased 44.6 percent YTD.



Revenues (in U.S. Dollars) Collected by U.S. Customs District of Laredo



Total U.S. Customs revenues for the former District of Laredo increased 4.6 percent from August's figures. Rio Grande increased 78.7 percent, Eagle Pass rose 48.7 percent, Roma gained 23.1 percent, Brownsville was up 14.9 percent, Del Rio rose 7.1 percent and Progreso registered a 6.6 percent increase. However, McAllen-Hidalgo decreased 8.7 percent and Laredo declined 1.1 percent. YTD revenue figures were up 7.3 percent compared to September

1996. Laredo, accounting for 66.8 percent of total District revenues, was up 10.8 percent YTD and McAllen-Hidalgo with 14.1 percent of total revenues, was down 10.1 percent YTD. Brownsville with 8.6 percent of all revenues in September, increased 4.5 percent YTD and Eagle Pass, with 8.5 percent of total revenues in September, increased 20.9 percent.





McAllen-Hidalgo decreased 13.0 percent, Brownsville was down 10.1 percent, Harlingen fell 9.5 percent, Pharr slid 7.1 percent, Del Rio declined 6.8 percent, Laredo posted a decrease of 6.1 percent, Eagle Pass declined 4.3 percent and El Paso was down 3.4 percent. YTD, U.S. bridge operators' revenues were up 8.1 percent. Laredo, accounting for 38.6 percent of total U.S. bridge operator's revenues collected in September, had a 9.6

percent increase YTD. El Paso, accounting for 20.0 percent of total U.S. bridge revenues, increased 6.4 percent YTD. McAllen-Hidalgo, with 11.4 percent of the total bridge revenues, was up 3.2 percent YTD. Brownsville, with 11.4 percent of total U.S. bridge operator's revenues in September, was up 5.1 percent. Also, Eagle Pass with 8.6 percent of total U.S. bridge revenues in September was up 5.5 percent YTD.





Residential Phones % Change September 96-97









Passenger Arrivals % Change YTD 96-97







% Share September 1997 Inbound Cargo




