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Note from the Director

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Indicators of border business activity for the month of March were up. All twenty-two monthly indicators were up when compared to February. In addition, for the year-to-date (YTD) figures, seventeen indicators were up and five were down. Selected YTD comparisons to 1997 reported by border cities include the following:

- Southbound pedestrian crossings into Mexico were up 3.4 percent. Eagle Pass rose 40.2 percent, Laredo increased 1.4 percent, Brownsville was up 1.6 percent and El Paso gained 0.1 percent.
- Northbound pedestrian crossings into Texas were up 11.3 percent. Eagle Pass rose 21.7
 percent, Brownsville was up 17.8 percent, El Paso increased 10.4 percent and Laredo
 gained 5.1 percent.
- Southbound vehicle bridge crossings were up 6.6 percent. Pharr rose 45.7 percent, El Paso increased 8.0 percent, Eagle Pass gained 1.3 percent and McAllen-Hidalgo was up 2.6 percent.
- Northbound vehicle bridge crossings into Texas were up 2.7 percent with Eagle Pass increasing 6.8 percent and El Paso gaining 2.9 percent, Laredo was up 5.3 percent and McAllen-Hidalgo posted an increase of 2.1 percent YTD.
- Southbound truck shipments into Mexico were up 28.5 percent. Pharr increased 95.2 percent, Laredo rose 30.5 percent and Brownsville gained 35.8 percent.
- Northbound truck shipments into Texas were up 12.8 percent with Pharr increasing 9.5
 percent, Eagle Pass gained 22.6 percent and Laredo posted a 17.5 percent increase
 YTD.
- Southbound shipments by rail were up 11.9 percent.
- Northbound shipments by rail were down 1.4 percent.
- Revenues collected by U.S. Customs were down 12.3 percent YTD but revenues collected by U.S. Bridge operators were up 14.1 percent.
- Building permits issued were up 12.6 percent. Eagle Pass gained 19.1 percent, Laredo was up 23.3 percent, Brownsville rose 27.3 percent and El Paso increased 11.2 percent.
- Building permit values were down with a YTD decrease of 35.1 percent. Brownsville
 decreased 54.3 percent, Harlingen was down 37.1 percent, McAllen fell 28.6 percent
 and El Paso reported a 13.8 percent decrease.
- Total employment was up with 5,644 jobs gained YTD. The average unemployment rate in March 1998 was 10.4 percent.

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

Southbound pedestrian bridge crossings into Mexico for March was up 6.7 percent compared to February. Del Rio increased 46.3 percent, Brownsville rose 30.1 percent, Roma was up 15.8 percent, El Paso increased 12.9 percent, Eagle Pass grew 11.2 percent and McAllen-Hidalgo increased slightly at 1.8 percent. However, Rio Grande fell 28.1 percent, Laredo decreased 18.3 percent and Harlingen was down 17.2 percent. YTD, total southbound pedestrian crossings into Texas were up 3.4 percent. El Paso southbound pedestrian crossings, which make up 32.1 percent of all crossings in March rose 0.1 percent. Laredo, accounting for 21.9 percent of all crossings, was up 1.4 percent and Brownsville was up 1.6 percent with 28.2 percent of all crossings YTD.

% Share Pedestrians for March 1998





Northbound pedestrian crossings into Texas were up 10.6 percent in March. Presidio rose 24.5 percent, Brownsville was up 19.6 percent, Del Rio increased 19.1 percent and El Paso gained 13.1 percent. Roma rose 9.6 percent, Progreso was up 9.0 percent, Eagle Pass gained a 5.1 percent and Laredo increased 2.9 percent. However, Rio Grande decreased 1.6 percent and McAllen-Hidalgo slid 0.2 percent. YTD total northbound pedestrian crossings into Texas were up 11.3 percent. El Paso, accounting for 38.6 percent of all northbound pedestrian crossings in March, was up 10.4 percent YTD. Laredo, with 18.5 percent of all northbound crossings, was up 5.1 percent and Brownsville, with 21.1 percent of all northbound pedestrian crossings, had a 17.8 percent increase in crossings YTD.

percent of all southbound traffic in March, was up 4.0 percent YTD. Brownsville, with 19.1 percent of all southbound vehicle bridge crossings, had a 7.4 percent increase YTD. El Paso, with 17.6 percent of all southbound vehicle crossings, experienced an 8.0 percent increase YTD. McAllen-Hidalgo, accounting for 15.4 percent of all southbound vehicle crossings had a 2.6 percent increase YTD.




Import Shipments by Rail into Texas —Number of Rail Cars

Eagle Pass, accounting for 27.6 percent of all northbound rail shipments in March, decreased 2.0 percent and Brownsville, with 8.5 percent of all northbound rail shipments, increased 8.5 percent YTD.



Total U.S. Customs revenues for the former District of Laredo increased 23.3 percent from February's figures. McAllen-Hidalgo increased 99.2 percent, Progreso gained 71.5 percent, Rio Grande rose 36.0 percent, Del Rio was up 19.5 percent, Eagle Pass jumped 18.2 percent, Roma gained 12.6 percent, Laredo grew 10.0 percent and Brownsville was up 8.0 percent. YTD revenue figures were

down 12.3 percent compared to March 1997. Laredo, accounting for 61.0 percent of total District revenues, was down 19.9 percent YTD and McAllen-Hidalgo with 17.3 percent of total revenues, was up 5.7 percent YTD. Brownsville with 9.7 percent of all revenues in March decreased 12.6 percent YTD and Eagle Pass, with 9.8 percent of total revenues in March increased 32.4 percent.

Revenues (in U.S. Dollars) Collected by U.S. Bridge Operators





Brownsville showed an increase of 22.5 percent, Pharr increased 20.0 percent, El Paso was up 17.3 percent, McAllen-Hidalgo rose 16.8 percent, Eagle Pass gained 12.9 percent, Laredo increased 11.0 percent, Harlingen was up 8.2 percent, and Del Rio grew 4.8 percent. YTD, U.S. bridge operators' revenues were up 14.1 percent. Laredo, accounting for 35.6 percent of total U.S. bridge operator's revenues collected in March, had a 12.3 percent



Tourist Visas YTD March 97-98







Residential Phones % Change March 97-98









Passenger Arrivals % Change YTD 97-98







% Share March 1998 Inbound Cargo




