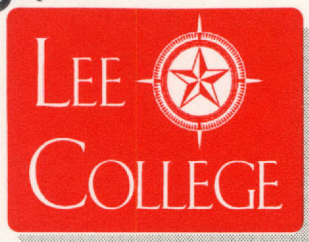

Charitable contributions encouraged

◆ State law now requires Texas colleges and other state entities to include a multitude of approved charities as part of payroll deduction programs. What's good is that state employees can have payroll deductions taken out for most any established charity in the state or nation (previously we did this for United Way only). What's not good is that the cost to administer this new state charitable contributions campaign consumes 15 to 20 cents of every dollar you contribute (with United Way, the agencies get all but about 7 cents of each dollar). Because of the administrative cost of the new state campaign, Dr. Sasser and the college leadership are dropping payroll deduction for charitable contributions and encouraging employees to contribute directly to a charity of their choice, whether it be United Way, another group of charities, a particular charity or non-profit service agency. 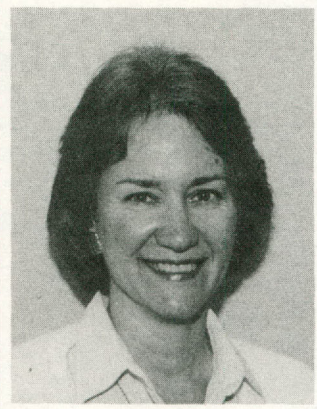

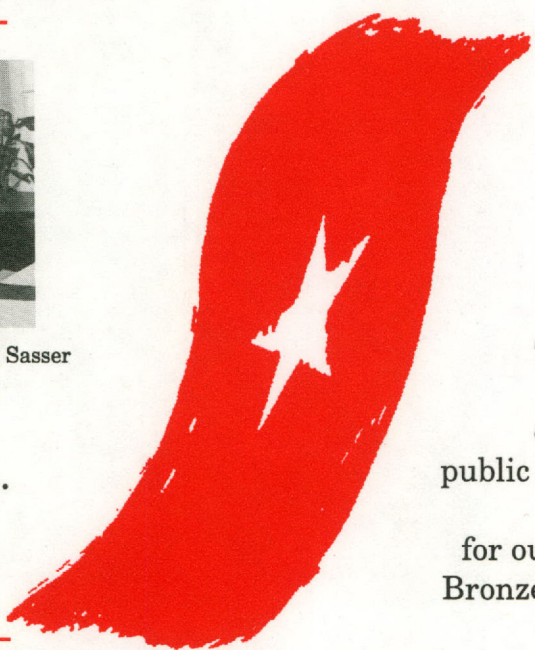
"I ENJOY THE academic atmosphere at Lee College — the conversations with colleagues, also the rewards that come with teaching and helping students."
