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# Note from the Director

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Indicators of border business activity for the month of June demonstrated an increase of nine indicators while thirteen indicators decreased. In addition, year-to-date (YTD) figures, fourteen indicators were up and eight decreased. Selected 2001 YTD comparisons to 2000 reported by border cities include the following:

- Southbound pedestrian crossings into Mexico were down 3.4 percent. Laredo fell
  2.2 percent, Rio Grande jumped 26.7 percent, McAllen registered an increase of
  3.4 percent and El Paso rose 3.4 percent.
- Northbound pedestrian crossings into Texas were up 2.7 percent. Laredo fell 1.7 percent. El Paso went up 1.0 percent. McAllen marked an increase of 35.1 percent.
- Southbound vehicle crossings were down 1.3 percent. Brownsville rose 1.5 percent, and Eagle Pass rose 6.8 percent. El Paso went down 0.3 percent and Pharr increased 0.3 percent. Laredo went up 0.5 percent. McAllen gained 2.1 percent.
- Northbound vehicle crossings were down 1.3 percent. Eagle Pass rose 2.5 percent. Roma increased 2.0 percent, El Paso went down 0.4 percent, Brownsville lost 7.1 percent and Pharr increased 7.7 percent.
- Southbound truck crossings into Mexico were down 4.1 percent. Eagle Pass went down 12.0 percent. Pharr increased 3.0 percent, and Laredo fell 1.6 percent. Del Rio was down 2.0 percent. Progreso gained 8.4 and Rio Grande grew 8.4 percent.
- Northbound truck crossings into Texas went down 7.3 percent, Pharr fell 0.9 percent and Eagle Pass posted a 4.2 percent decrease. Brownsville decreased 21.2 percent, Laredo fell 7.0 percent, Del Rio marked a drop of 6.9 percent. Rio Grande had a gain of 20.2 percent. Progreso went up 44.4 percent.
- Southbound shipments by rail were up 4.1 percent.
- Northbound shipments by rail were up 5.5 percent.
- Revenues collected by U.S. Customs went down by 1.5 percent.
- Revenues collected by U.S. bridge operators were up 4.3 percent.
- Total building permits issued were up 4.7 percent. Laredo rose 19.0 percent, Eagle Pass fell 0.7 percent, while McAllen-Hidalgo dropped 3.3 percent, and Brownsville registered a decrease of 8.9 percent. El Paso showed a 3.7 percent increase.
- Total building permit values increased 19.2 percent. Laredo increased 4.8 percent, and Brownsville fell 19.1 percent. McAllen increased 68.5 percent. El Paso was up 12.0 percent, and Eagle Pass jumped 71.6 percent.
- Total employment was up 2.1 percent, with 9,128 jobs gained. The average unemployment rate in June 2001 was 8.9 percent for the border.

# June Figures Exhibited a Drop in Exports; Drop in Total U.S.-Mexico Trade


June year-to-date figures exhibited a drop in exports thusly affecting the trend of total U.S.-Mexico trade. The June 2001 year-to-date total dollar trade value between the U.S. and Mexico registered \$118.5 billion, a decline of 0.3 percent against the \$118.9 billion posted 2000 year-to-date. As shown in Chart 1, 2001 exports equaled \$52.0 billion, a 2.8 percent drop from last year's trade figures of \$53.5 billion. Conversely, imports continued to register a year-to-date gain of 1.7 percent over the same period last year. Previously, the trend of trade between the two countries had been increasing in both exports and imports.


Chart 2 exhibits the amount of the total dollar value going through the U.S.-Mexico border ports (see Map 1 Below). As shown, exports' dollar value of \$43.6 billion was handled through these border ports — down 3.5 percent compared to June 2000 year-to-date. On the other hand, imports — totaling \$55.2 billion — posted an increase of 3.4 percent over last year. The total dollar value processed by these ports showed a very slight increase from \$98.6 billion in 2000 to \$98.8 billion this year, a gain of 0.2 percent. These ports have processed this year 83.4 percent of the total U.S.-Mexico trade dollar value.

Texas border ports continued to dominate the total trade dollar amount transited between both countries at \$76.5 billion or 77.4 percent of the amount passing through all border ports for this year. (see Chart 3) These ports did experience a drop of 4.7 percent in the dollar value of exports, but did register an increase of 3.2 percent in import dollar value compared to last year's figures. In total dollar value, the ports dropped slightly by 0.5 percent from last year.


In both exports and imports, California, Arizona and New Mexico together handled a smaller portion of this trade, but they logged gains nonetheless (see Chart 3).

With the figures in for the first six months of the year 2001, the down turn in the stock market and the slowing of the U.S. economy appears to have had its affect on U.S.-Mexico trade. Double-digit increases experienced in 2000 have been replaced by slight increases in imports and decreases in exports. The next half of the year will be of great interest as to whether U.S.-Mexico trade maintains a even keel with that of last year or will it begin to show significant drops. In subsequent issues of the *Border Business Indicators*, we will continue to monitor any fluctuations that may occur. —*B. G. Garcia*






Southbound pedestrian crossings into Mexico for June were down 4.4 percent. Rio Grande decreased 42.9 percent, Brownsville fell 2.5 percent, Eagle Pass decreased 8.6 percent, El Paso lost 4.4 percent, and Laredo dropped 7.3 percent. Progreso gained 2.4 percent, and McAllen-Hidalgo was down 4.7 percent. Del Rio fell 6.7 percent. YTD southbound pedestrian crossings into Mexico declined 3.4 percent. El Paso's southbound pedestrian crossings, which made up 27.2 percent of all crossings, increased 3.4 percent YTD. Laredo, accounting for 21.3 percent of total crossings, decreased 2.2 percent YTD. Brownsville, with a 14.6 percent share, increased 3.2 percent YTD. Progreso, with 7.7 percent share, declined 2.3 percent. Del Rio, with 0.3 percent, increased 8.9 percent YTD.





YTD northbound pedestrian crossings into Texas were up 2.7 percent. El Paso, accounting for 36.0 percent of northbound crossings, was up 1.0 percent YTD. Laredo, with 24.3 percent of all northbound crossings, was down 1.7 percent YTD. Brownsville, with 16.7 percent of all northbound pedestrian crossings, increased 2.4 percent over the previous year.

Southbound vehicle bridge crossings into Mexico were down 3.2 percent in June from May's figures. Eagle Pass was down 2.3 percent, Del Rio fell 0.7 percent, Rio Grande gained 15.8 percent, McAllen-Hidalgo decreased 1.7 percent, and Brownsville went down 1.9 percent. Harlingen declined 1.4 percent, and Laredo went down 8.0 percent. YTD southbound vehicle bridge crossings were up 1.3 percent. Laredo, with 22.5 percent of all southbound traffic,

was up 0.5 percent YTD. Brownsville, with 19.6 percent of all southbound vehicle bridge crossings, had a 1.5 percent increase YTD. El Paso, accounting for 14.5 percent of all southbound vehicle crossings, fell 0.3 percent YTD. McAllen-Hidalgo, with 15.5 percent of all southbound vehicle crossings, experienced a 2.1 percent increase YTD.

Roma registered a 5.3 percent decrease, Eagle Pass went down 3.3 percent, Progreso fell 1.6 percent, Brownsville lost 41.2 percent, and McAllen-Hidalgo decreased 1.8 percent. Presidio was down 3.5 percent, and Laredo fell 2.4 percent. YTD northbound vehicle bridge crossings into Texas were down 1.3 percent. El Paso, with 21.1 percent of all crossings, was down 0.4 percent YTD. Laredo, with 19.3 percent of all crossings, fell 2.2 percent YTD. Brownsville, with 16.1 percent of all crossings, declined 7.1 percent YTD.

Laredo was up 7.0 percent and Brownsville declined 1.8 percent. YTD southbound truck crossings were down 4.1 percent. Laredo, with 63.0

percent of all southbound crossings, experienced a 1.6 percent decrease YTD. Brownsville, with a 9.9 percent of all southbound crossings, had a 10.5 percent decrease YTD. Pharr, with 12.5 percent, registered an increase of 3.0 percent YTD. Eagle Pass, with 4.6 percent of all truck crossings, fell 12.0 percent YTD.

YTD northbound truck crossings were down 7.3 percent. Laredo, accounting for 62.1 percent of all northbound truck crossings, had a 7.0 percent decrease YTD. Pharr, with 16.9 percent of all crossings, experienced a 0.9 percent decline YTD. Brownsville, with 11.1 percent of all northbound truck crossings, experienced an 21.2 percent decrease YTD.



Southbound rail shipments into Mexico decreased 8.1 percent in June compared to May. Brownsville fell 25.0 percent, while Laredo declined 5.0 percent. Eagle Pass dropped 5.8 percent. YTD southbound rail shipments into Mexico from Texas were up 4.1 percent. Laredo whichaccounted for 59.4 percent of all southbound rail shipments, was up 1.3 percent YTD. Eagle Pass, accounting for 27.0 percent of all southbound rail shipments, increased 6.5 percent YTD. Brownsville, with 13.5 percent of all southbound rail shipments, showed an increase of 12.9 percent YTD.

#### Export Rail YTD % Change 00-01






Northbound rail shipments into Texas increased 2.6 percent in June. Laredo fell 0.9 percent, Brownsville grew 40.0 percent, and Eagle Pass gained 8.3 percent. YTD total northbound shipments into Texas from Mexico were up 5.5 percent. Laredo, which accounted for 78.6 percent of all northbound rail shipments, were up 15.8 percent YTD. Eagle Pass, accounting for 15.8 percent of all northbound rail shipments, fell 25.3 percent YTD. Brownsville, with 5.7 percent of all northbound rail shipments, decreased 2.5 percent YTD.



Total U.S. Customs revenues, for June, for the former District of Laredo, had a decrease of 6.4 percent from May's figures. 





#### Passenger Arrivals % Change YTD 00-01





#### Passenger Departures % Change YTD 00-01





#### % Share June 2001 Inbound Cargo





#### % Share June 2001 Outbound Cargo




