Indicators of border business activity for the month of June demonstrated an increase of eleven indicators while eleven indicators decreased. In addition, the year to date (YTD) figures, nine indicators were up and thirteen decreased. Selected 2002 YTD comparisons to 2001 reported by border cities include the following:

- Southbound pedestrian crossings into Mexico were down 9.0 percent. Laredo de creased 2.3 percent, Rio Grande fell 60.3 percent, McAllen registered a decrease of 7.0 percent and El Paso decreased 20.6 percent.
- Northbound pedestrian crossings into Texas were up 4.5 percent. Laredo fell 0.3 percent. El Paso went up 15.7 percent. McAllen marked a decrease of 4.7 percent.
- Southbound vehicle crossings were down 1.5 percent. Brownsville fell 3.0 percent, and Eagle Pass increased 5.1 percent. El Paso went down 18.5 percent and Pharr increased 0.1 percent. Laredo went down 1.2 percent. McAllen increased 3.7 percent.
- Northbound vehicle crossings were down 1.3 percent. Eagle Pass rose 4.7 percent.
 Roma increased 2.9 percent, El Paso went down 13.1 percent, Brownsville gained 8.3 percent and Pharr increased 1.7 percent.
- Southbound truck crossings into Mexico gained 3.5 percent. Eagle Pass went down 14.2 percent. Pharr increased 5.3 percent, and Laredo increased 6.0 percent. Del Rio was up 11.6 percent. Progreso gained 3.5 and Rio Grande decreased 2.7 percent.
- Northbound truck crossings into Texas went up 4.0 percent, Pharr rose 6.1 percent and Eagle Pass posted a 14.1 percent decrease. Brownsville increased 1.9 percent, Laredo climbed 3.1 percent, Del Rio increased 27.4 percent. Rio Grande had a loss of 7.9 percent. Progreso went up 45.0 percent.
- Southbound shipments by rail were up 3.9 percent.
- Northbound shipments by rail were down 3.6 percent.
- Revenues collected by U.S. Customs went down 8.2 percent.
- Revenues collected by U.S. bridge operators were up 3.7 percent.
- Total building permits issued were up 39.0 percent. Laredo fell 1.6 percent, Eagle Pass rose 20.1 percent, while McAllen gained 35.8 percent, and Brownsville registered an increase of 39.9 percent. El Paso showed a 70.6 percent increase.
- Total building permit values increased 19.8 percent. Laredo gained 32.3 percent, and Brownsville rose 5.9 percent. McAllen gained 19.3 percent. El Paso was up 30.1 percent, and Eagle Pass increased 7.2 percent.
- Total employment was down 0.8 percent, with 3,614 jobs lost. The average unemploy ment rate for the border in June 2002 was 9.6 percent.


Mid-Year Figures Show a Drop in U.S.-Mexico Trade

At the midyear point, trade figures showed U.S.-Mexico trade to be below that of last year's for the same period. Although figures for April and May 2002 had exhibited some promise of trade gearing up, June numbers registered a drop. Total U.S.-Mexico trade is still below that of last year's. Total trade dollar value year-to-date was 4.4 percent below last year's volume (See Charts 1A & 1B).

Year-to-date, U.S. exports to Mexico and U.S. imports from Mexico have been down compared to the same period in 2001. Midyear totals marked U.S. exports down 8.7 percent and U.S. imports down 1.1 percent against 2001. (See Charts 2 & 3).


After a slow start in the earlier part of the first quarter, it appeared that U.S.-Mexico trade was looking to post some positive changes, but the June figures in the latter part of the second quarter squelched any possible gains. It is still to early to tell to determine a trend for the remainder of the year. —B. G. Garcia

Chart 1A U.S.-Mexico Trade June 2001 YTD vs. June 2002 YTD





Chart 1B U.S.-Mexico Trade June 2001 YTD vs. June 2002 YTD





Chart 2 U.S. Exports to Mexico June 2001 YTD vs. June 2002 YTD







Southbound pedestrian crossings into Mexico for June were down 6.1 percent. Rio Grande gained 38.5 percent, Brownsville lost 3.2 percent, Eagle Pass was down 7.2 percent, El Paso declined 12.4 percent, and Laredo decreased 7.9 percent. Progreso increased 8.1 percent, and McAllen-Hidalgo went down 6.8 percent. Del Rio rose 5.3 percent. YTD southbound pedestrian crossings into Mexico fell 9.0 percent. El Paso's southbound pedestrian crossings, which made up 28.9 percent of all crossings, decreased 20.6 percent YTD. Laredo, accounting for 27.9 percent of total crossings, lost 2.3 percent YTD. Brownsville, with an 18.6 percent share, decreased 4.2 percent YTD. Progreso, with 10.1 percent share, decreased 1.0 percent. Del Rio, with 0.4 percent, increased 13.9 percent YTD.

% Share Pedestrians for June 2002





Northbound pedestrian crossings into Texas were down 11.0 percent in June. Progreso decreased 53.9 percent, Brownsville was down 2.0 percent, El Paso fell 2.4 percent, and Laredo fell 10.9 percent. YTD northbound pedestrian crossings into Texas were up 4.5 percent. El Paso, accounting for 40.4 percent of northbound crossings, was up 15.7 percent YTD. Laredo, with 23.2 percent of all northbound crossings, was down 0.3 percent YTD. Brownsville, with 14.9 percent of all northbound pedestrian crossings, decreased 2.8 percent over the previous year.

Eagle Pass was down 4.9 percent, Del Rio decreased 3.0 percent, Rio Grande fell 6.5 percent, McAllen-Hidalgo went down 2.8 percent, and Brownsville declined 2.8 percent. Harlingen lost 1.2 percent, and Laredo was down 2.3 percent. YTD southbound vehicle bridge crossings were down 1.5 percent. Laredo,

with 22.3 percent of all southbound traffic, fell 1.2 percent YTD. Brownsville, with 19.3 percent of all southbound vehicle bridge crossings, had a 3.0 percent decrease YTD. El Paso, accounting for 12.0 percent of all southbound vehicle crossings, fell 18.5 percent YTD. McAllen-Hidalgo, with 16.4 percent of all southbound vehicle crossings, experienced a 3.7 percent increase YTD.

Truck crossings into Mexico were down 8.8 percent in June. Harlingen increased 7.8 percent, Del Rio decreased 8.6 percent, and Pharr fell 19.5 percent. Laredo was down 7.1 percent and Brownsville lost 10.7 percent. YTD southbound truck crossings were up 3.5 percent. Laredo, with 64.6 percent of all southbound

crossings, experienced a 6.0 percent increase YTD. Brownsville, with 9.8 percent of all southbound crossings, had a 2.8 percent increase YTD. Pharr, with 12.7 percent, registered a gain of 5.3 percent YTD. Eagle Pass, with 3.6 percent of all truck crossings, fell 14.2 percent YTD.

YTD northbound truck crossings were up 4.0 percent. Laredo, accounting for

47.1 percent of all northbound truck crossings, had a 3.1 percent increase YTD. Pharr, with 13.2 percent of all crossings, experienced a 6.1 percent increase YTD. Brownsville, with 8.3 percent of all northbound truck crossings, experienced a 1.9 percent gain YTD.

Southbound rail shipments into Mexico rose 5.4 percent in June. Brownsville gained 16.5 percent, and Laredo decreased 2.7 percent. Eagle Pass increased 19.9 percent. YTD southbound rail shipments into Mexico from Texas were up 3.9 percent. Laredo which accounted for 57.7 percent of all southbound rail shipments, was up 1.0 percent YTD. Eagle Pass, accounting for 28.9 percent of all southbound rail shipments, increased 11.2 percent YTD. Brownsville, with 13.4 percent of all southbound rail shipments, showed an increase of 1.8 percent YTD.



Northbound rail shipments into Texas decreased 2.9 percent in June. Laredo decreased 3.7 percent, Brownsville lost 16.8 percent, and Eagle Pass gained 7.0 percent. YTD total northbound shipments into Texas from Mexico were down 3.6 percent. Laredo, which accounted for 83.2 percent of all northbound rail shipments, was up 2.1 percent YTD. Eagle Pass, accounting for 13.2 percent of all northbound rail shipments, fell 19.1 percent YTD. Brownsville, with 3.5 percent of all northbound rail shipments, decreased 39.8 percent YTD.







YTD AVG June 01-02







% Unemployed June 01-02







Passenger Arrivals % Change YTD 01-02







% Share June 2002 Inbound Cargo





In June, the Port of Corpus Christi had a 14.7 percent increase in outbound cargo tonnage. Petroleum, which was 75.9 percent of total outbound cargo, gained 7.5 percent. Bulk grain, which accounted for 5.8 percent of cargo, rose 22.8 percent. Dry bulk, which accounted for 11.3 percent of the total outbound cargo for June, increased 24.9 percent. YTD total outbound cargo tonnage was down 7.4 percent.



The Port of Brownsville had a decrease of 26.9 percent total tonnage in June. Break Bulk, which accounted for 54.1 percent of total tonnage declined 21.2 percent from May. Liquid, with 0.6 percent share of June's total tonnage, fell 45.1 percent. Petroleum, which made up 45.1 percent ofthe total cargo for June lost 32.5 percent. YTD figures showed a 25.3 percent increase in total cargo tonnage. Break Bulk tonnage, with 52.2 percent of total tonnage, rose 2.8 percent. Petroleum, with 45.7 percent of total tonnage, increased 65.3 percent. Liquid, with 1.1 percent of total tonnage, increased 24.6 percent.
