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CURRENT EMPLOYMENT STATISTICS

Statewide Industry Employment (Seasonally Adjusted)

Total Nonfarm employment rose for the 33rd time in as many months with 26,800 jobs added in November, after a revised increase of 18,600 positions in October. Eight of 11 major industries grew, including six that achieved new series employment highs. Since November 2022, the job count rose by 407,100 as the annual growth

rate held at 3.0 percent. Private sector employment rose by 353,300 positions over the same timeframe as all 11 major industries grew annually for the 26th consecutive period.

Highlights

- Following a revised increase of 7,700 jobs in October, Professional and Business Services employment rose again with 9,900 positions added in November.
- Following a revised increase of 5,200 jobs in October, Private Education and Health Services added another 5,100 in November, which marked an 18th series-high in 20 months.
- The Construction industry job count achieved a new series-high employment level of 821,400 positions with a November gain of 9,200 jobs as the annual growth rate surged to 4.5 percent.





Highlights

- Eighteen of 26 metro areas added jobs over the month in November for a combined employment increase of 15,800. Employment in one MSA was unchanged and seven declined. For the 31st consecutive month, every metro area grew annually. Twenty-four areas met or exceeded February 2020 pre-COVID employment levels as of November 2023.
- Midland MSA employment grew by 700 jobs in November, which equaled a percentage increase of six-tenths of a point and marked the highest monthly growth rate among all metro areas. The area also led in percentage terms at 4.9 percent.
- The Corpus Christi MSA job count reached a new series-high employment level in November with the addition of 900 positions. The area added 3,600 positions annually.
- Waco MSA employment achieved a 25th series-high in 28 months with 600 positions gained in November. The metro added 2,900 positions on an annual basis.



Highlights

- Over the month the Texas seasonally adjusted unemployment rate remained at 4.1 percent, four-tenths of a percentage point higher than the U.S. rate of 3.7 percent.
- The state's seasonally adjusted labor force participation rate was 64.2 percent in November.
- Texas' seasonally adjusted LAUS employment was up 39,700 from last month.
- Summarizing the not seasonally adjusted estimates, the Texas unemployment rate decreased to 3.5 percent in November. This was 0.2 percentage points lower than the unemployment rate in November 2022.



Substate Areas (Not Seasonally Adjusted)

County Highlights

- Unemployment rates varied considerably across counties, ranging from a low of 0.3 percent in Loving County to a high of 8.0 percent in Starr County.
- 86 counties had an unemployment rate of 3.0 percent or less.
- In November 2023, seven counties experienced an increase in their unemployment rates over the month, while 239 counties experienced a decrease and eight experienced no change.
- Zavala County experienced the largest unemployment rate decrease of 2.1 percentage points over the year.
- Over the year, the civilian labor force increased in 237 counties, while 16 counties in the state experienced a decline and one, Garza County, experienced no change.





Highlights

- The unemployment rate for males increased by 0.2 percentage points over the year to a rate of 4.0 percent, while the rate for women increased by 0.4 percentage points to 4.1 percent.
- The veteran unemployment rate decreased over the month by 0.1 percentage points to 3.4 percent in November.
- Individuals with some college education or associate degree had an unemployment rate of 3.3 percent. Those with a bachelor's degree and higher had an unemployment rate of 2.4 percent and those with a high school diploma had a rate of 3.7 percent.
- Of the new entrants into Texas' labor force in November, more were men (37,000) than women (26,100).



- The November Supply/Demand rate was 1.2 unemployed for each advertised vacancy, with a total of 116,676 more unemployed workers than advertised vacancies.



- In 2022, Gulf Coast WDA had the highest employment for this occupation at 5,600 and Dallas WDA had the highest median wage of \$61,527.
- 2020-2030 Projections estimate this occupation will grow 31.0 percent in Texas.

KEY INDICATORS



The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is an index of the variation in prices paid by typical consumers for retail goods and other items.

Highlights

- Dallas-Fort Worth-Arlington CPI annual growth rate increased 0.6 points from the previous reading to 5.2 percent over the year, marking the second consecutive period in which CPI annual growth rate increased from a previous reading.
- Since November 2022, Food increased 5.1 percent while Motor fuel decreased 7.6 percent.


- In November, AHE for Texas employees on private nonfarm payrolls increased by \$1.44 over the year to \$31.88, an increase of 4.7 percent.
- Over the year, Texas AHE increased 7.3 percent in the Goods Producing Sector and 4.0 percent in the Private Service Providing sector.
- U.S. AHE increased by \$1.30 over the year to \$33.99, an increase of 4.0 percent.

KEY INDICATORS



Initial Claims refers to the number of requests for unemployment benefits; a person can file multiple claims. Continued Claims is the number of claimants receiving benefits.


Highlights

- The over-the-year four-week moving average increased 4.5 percent for initial claims and 34.7 percent for continued claims, marking the eleventh over-the-year rate increase for both series in the past twelve months.
- The continued claims monthly moving average decreased by 952 claims over the month to 129,958.

Highlights

- In November, the West Texas Intermediate Spot Price averaged \$77.69, decreasing \$7.95 over the month and \$6.68 over the year.
- Prigram Rig count in Texas declined by 70 rigs over the year and 2 rigs over the month, decreasing to 303 rigs. This marked the seventh consecutive month that rig count has declined.

West Texas Intermediate is a crude oil stream produced in Texas and southern Oklahoma that serves as reference for pricing a number of other streams. Rig Count refers to a weekly census of drilling rigs that are actively exploring for or developing oil or natural gas in the United States and Canada.

GLOSSARY

CURRENT EMPLOYMENT STATISTICS (CES)

- **Nonagricultural Jobs:** The total number of persons on establishment payrolls employed full or part time. Persons on the payroll of more than one establishment are counted in each. Data exclude proprietors, self-employed, unpaid family or volunteer workers, farm workers, and domestic workers. Government employment only covers civilian employees.
- Actual or Not Seasonally Adjusted: Describes data series not subject to the seasonal adjustment process. In other words, the effects of regular, or seasonal, patterns have not been removed from these series.
- <u>Seasonally Adjusted</u>: Effects of regular, or seasonal, patterns of hiring or layoffs (holidays, weather, etc.) have been removed from these series. These adjustments make it easier to observe the cyclical and other non-seasonal movements in a data series.

HELP WANTED ONLINE (HWOL)

- **Supply-Demand Rate:** Ratio measuring the number of unemployed persons per HWOL job openings.
- Middle-Skills Jobs: Jobs requiring more than a high school diploma but less than a four-year degree.

LOCAL AREA UNEMPLOYMENT STATISTICS

- **Employed:** All persons 16 years and over who, during the reference week, (a) did any work (at least one hour) as paid employees, worked on their own business, profession, or on their own farm, or worked 15 hours or more as unpaid family workers, or (b) were not working but who had jobs from which they were temporarily absent. Each employed person is counted only once, even if the person holds more than one job.
- **Unemployed:** All persons aged 16 years and over who had no employment, but were available for work and had made specific efforts to find employment. Includes persons who were waiting to be recalled to jobs from which they had been laid off.
- <u>Civilian Labor Force (CLF)</u>: All persons classified as employed or unemployed.
- **Unemployment Rate:** The unemployed number divided by the civilian labor force number.

OCCUPATIONAL EMPLOYMENT & WAGE STATISTICS (OEWS)

- Mean Wage: The average wage, calculated by summing the wages of all the employees in an occupation and dividing the sum by the number of employees.
- Percentile Wage: The wage below which a certain percentage of employees in an occupation earn. E.g., 25th Percentile Wage: 25 percent of employees in an occupation earn at or below this wage.
- **Median Wage:** A percentile wage boundary demarcating the 50th percentile; half of employees in an occupation earn more than the median wage, and half earn less than the median wage.
- Standard Occupational Classification: A hierarchical taxonomy that assigns a numeric code to an occupation according to tasks performed. This allows narrowly defined occupations to be grouped together at higher levels of aggregation reflecting common functions among similar occupations.

MISCELLANEOUS

- Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA):
 Geographic area containing 1+ urban center with a population of 50,000+, plus adjacent territory with high social/economic integration with the urban center. In Texas, an MSA consists of 1+ counties.
- Metropolitan Division (MD): Smaller areas
 within a large MSA. The MSA must have a
 population of 2.5 million+ to be subdivided into
 Metropolitan Divisions (MDs).
- Metro Area (MA): Refers to either an MSA or MD. Texas has 25 MSAs, including the Dallas-Fort Worth-Arlington MSA, which is subdivided into two MDs.
- Workforce Development Area (WDA): The State of Texas is divided into 28 local workforce development areas.

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
