# **Powwow Wow**

Hundreds of Native American dancers, drummers. and artists will converge on Austin Nov. 4 for the 26th annual Austin Powwow. The intertribal event has grown exponentially from its humble beginnings, so much so that last year it relocated to the Austin Expo Center; its 30,000 attendees make it one of the largest single-day powwows in the country. The event brings together approximately 80 tribes—from Texas, of course, but also South Carolina, Oklahoma, Standing Rock, Canada, and Central America—to celebrate their different tribal heritages and histories. # **NO BEANS ABOUT IT**

ERLINGUA IS NO GHOST TOWN the first weekend in November. That's because every year for half a century, the former mining outpost has hosted up to 20,000 chiliheads vying to help crown the year's best chili con carne. It all began in 1967 as a cookoff between two chili aficionados: Wick Fowler of the Chili Appreciation Society International, and H. Allen Smith, a former New Yorker who had published a magazine article titled, "Nobody Knows More About Chili Than I Do." As the legend goes, the two men tied (despite Smith's use of beans in his recipe—an abomination by Texas standards), and so began this annual tradition. Today, hundreds of chili cooks compete all year in order to obtain an invitation to compete in Terlingua Nov. 1-4. The cookoff splintered into two festivals in 1983: the Original Terlingua International Championship Chili Cookoff and the Terlingua International Chili Championship, held concurrently on the same weekend, just a few miles apart, so now—in addition to arguing about who makes

the best bowl of chili—attendees can argue about which cookoff is better. Regulars get in the spirit all week long by camping and enjoying live music nightly. For more information, visit casichili.net and abowlofred.com.

#### **ROUND TOP ROUNDUP**

ROM FIELDS OF RUBBISH to exceptionally curated tents of antique décor, vintage shopping has never been better than it will be this fall in Round Top. More than 100,000 antique hunters from across the country are expected to make their biannual trek to this tiny town as a slew of vendors open up shop, including the Arbor International Antiques & Interior Design Show (arborantiques.com), which will celebrate its 20th anniversary Sept. 20-30; Zapp Hall (zapphall.com), which celebrates 30 years Sept. 29-Oct. 7; the Marburger Farm Antique Show (roundtop-marburger.com), which commemorated its 20th anniversary this past spring and returns Sept. 26-30; and the one that started it all—the Original Round Top Antiques Fair (roundtoptexasantiques.com)—which celebrates a milestone 50-year anniversary Sept. 25-30. #### **SPLASH BASH**

TOT EVERY community can fondly recall the good ol' days when mermaids would swim and play  $\perp$  in the local waters, but **San Marcos** can. Between the 1950s and the 1990s, San Marcos was home to Aquarena Springs, one of Texas' most popular theme parks. Located in Spring Lake at the headwaters of the river, Aquarena Springs' attractions included a submerged theater where the "Aquamaids" (mermaids, some with tails, some without) performed graceful underwater dances and other playful antics. Though the theme park is long gone and Texas State University now operates Spring Lake as a research and educational center, memories of the park and the city's thriving mermaid culture live on because, after a bit of an absence, the mermaids have returned.

On Sept. 2-17, San Marcos celebrates both the fairy-tale history of mermaids and their modern resurgence as the city's symbols with the **SMTX Mermaid Splash**. With a series of family activities, social events, and educational forums on a variety of San Marcos topics, this second annual fete is as much a party for the beautiful San Marcos River as it is an affirmation of the local community and the mermaids who work to protect it through this grassroots movement. The 16-day festival wraps up with its three biggest events—the Mermaid Society Ball on Sept. 15 and the Mermaid Parade and Aqua Faire on Sept. 16. At last year's inaugural Mermaid Society Ball, several hundred guests enjoyed live music, specialty drinks and hors d'oeuvres, and a mermaid swimming around in an enormous fish tank. 
# **MÉXICO MODERNO**

# **CAPTURING THE FLAGS**

HE SIX FLAGS of Texas are well known, but in ▲ Nacogdoches—the oldest town in Texas—three more flags found their way into the history books. The earliest of these lesserknown flags is an emerald banner for the Gutiérrez-Magee Expedition (1812 to 1813), a short-lived army that controlled territory east of San Antonio. The second flag, a red-striped Lone Star flag, represents Dr. James Long and his expedition to Nacogdoches from 1819 to 1821 before he was captured by Spanish troops and killed. And the third flag. carrying the words "Independence, Freedom, and Justice" belongs to the Republic of Fredonia, proclaimed by Texas settler Haden Edwards from 1826 to 1827 following the revocation of a land grant from the Mexican government. For more than two decades, the city has paid homage to its rebellious history with the Nine Flags Festival; the festivities kickoff the holiday season Nov. 12-Dec. 9 with an installation of more than 3 million lights downtown.
