# Let's Rodeo

hether this is your first rodeo or your 50th, a night at the iconic San Antonio Stock Show and Rodeo can offer some of the most exciting 8 seconds in the sports. As one of the highest-paying rodeos in the industry, with a purse just shy of \$1.5 million, it's

become one of the city's largest annual events, with more than 2 million visitors each year. Built in the late 1940s to house this growing livestock show, the Joe and Harry Freeman Coliseum still hosts the stock show and exhibits today, while the main rodeo event now takes place in the adjacent AT&T Center. Attractions of this 18-day event, Feb. 7-24, include the Texas Wildlife Expo, pony rides, and a Cowboy Boot Camp where kids can learn to lasso and milk a cow. Along with classic rodeo

highlights like mutton bustin', bull riding, steer wrestling, and barrel racing, head to the horse show arena on Feb. 17 to celebrate Hispanic heritage at the rodeo with the Dia de Vaquero ceremony. Weekends at this year's show will feature Rodeo after Dark with food, beverages, and live music until midnight from Thursday to Saturday. Don't miss the Craft Beer Tap Room, now combined with the Wine Garden as a communal gathering area with a new live music venue. *sarodeo.com/tickets* 

LET IT SNOW

Texans don't let a lack of snow get in the way of winter fun. At Pearland's Winterfest, the annual outdoor festival blows in more than 200,000 pounds of snow on Jan. 26, with snow tubing hills and snow play areas in the H-E-B Winter Zone. Family-friendly activities include an exotic petting zoo and pony rides, virtual reality games, winter-themed inflatables, rock climbing, craft vendors, and local food. Celebrating its 23rd year, it's one of the city's largest events, welcoming up to 10,000 attendees to the Pearland Recreation Center & Natatorium each year. Admission is \$10 for children ages 3 to 16, \$5 for ages 17 and older, and free to children 2 and younger. Save \$2 on pre-sale tickets until Jan. 24 with a canned good donation for the Pearland Neighborhood Center. *visitpearland.com*

The path of the butterfly also connects the site of the Dakota Access Pipeline where it crosses the Missouri River at the border of the Standing Rock Nation to the U.S.-Mexico border, but the butterfly itself is indifferent to these artificial borders and conceptual divisions. Apart from the name of the butterfly, the word "monarchs" has another meaning: Monarch signals an acknowledged ruler that is the head of a state or nation, and with that rule, the independence and freedom to rule; sovereignty. In 2013, the

group settled into a permanent home practice facility named "The BloodShed," which hosts four teams: the Hell Marys, the Hotrod Honeys, the Honky Tonk Heartbreakers, and the Hustlers. All-star members from all four teams comprise a fifth team, the Texecutioners, who secured first place in the 2018 WFTDA (Women's Flat Track Derby Association) playoffs in Atlanta. Watch the winning Rollergirls take a victory lap-the 2019 season kicks off in February.
