# Art Car Parade April 10-16

humongous hen. A gaping mouth, showing off a perfect set of pearly whites. A smooth, pinkskinned feline named Wrinkles the Hairless Kitty. These wheeled masterpieces, along with vehicles bedecked in plastic trout, bearded trolls, sprouting mushrooms, and a giant melting ice cream, have all rolled through the city streets as part of Houston's annual Art Car Parade. This year's parade is shaping up to be just as memorable.

About 250 mobile works of art conceived and created by artists, students, youth groups, families, and local organizations snake through downtown Houston during the parade, the highlight of more

than a week of activities organized by the Orange Show Center for Visionary Art.

"We really create a festival atmosphere leading up to the parade start," says Jonathan Beitler, director of communications at the center. "But once it starts, all eyes are on the parade."

The big event traces its roots to 1984, when artist Jackie Harris used \$800 in plastic fruit and paint to transform a 1967 Ford Country Squire station wagon into a mobile ambassador of goodwill for the Orange Show, a nonprofit organization that preserves and promotes folk art. The Fruitmobile inspired a small parade of musical cars two years later and, in 1988, a more formal art car parade. More events, including a fundraising gala, were added over the years.

Today, cars, bicycles, go-carts, and other vehicles from across the country participate, making it the largest celebration of its kind in the world. And the creativity

has no limits: a towering silver contraption named The Auto Disco Dance Bot, by artist Chris Wollard from Tulsa, Oklahoma, makes a return appearance at this year's parade. "It's a 20-foot-tall metal robot that kind of looks like those old 1950s toy robots," Beitler says.

More than 200,000 spectators line downtown streets to watch the rolling party each spring, and more than \$15,000 in prize money is awarded to the best entries in an array of categories, including daily drivers, art cars, lowriders, and bicycles.

Following the kickoff party on April 6, the week of activities gets underway with workshops, film screenings, kids' events, the Art Car Ball, live music. The awards ceremony caps off the week. The parade unfolds April 15, when the line of art cars hits the street starting at 10 a.m. Spectators are encouraged to arrive early.
