

<u>Editor's Note:</u> The Board of Nurse Examiners is committed to assisting the state and nation in responding to catastrophic events such as the attack on the World Trade Center. The article below has been prepared by guest contributors and responds to recommendations put forward in the Plan of Action for Texas prepared by the Governor's Task Force on Homeland Security.

Ready Texas Nurses Emergency Response System

In response to a heightened national focus on preparedness for acts of terrorism and potential homeland threats, Governor Rick Perry formed the Governor's Task Force on Homeland Security in October of 2001 to explore a statewide plan of action for Texas. The Texas Nurses Association was invited to represent nursing in that effort. The task force was charged with:

- Assuring preparedness to respond to threats
- Facilitating coordination among federal, state and local agencies
- Assessing the ability of state and local government agencies to respond to threats and effectively provide victims assistance
- Providing recommendations on how to improve Texas's ability to detect and deter and coordinate responses to any terrorist events.

The Work Group on Health and Bioterrorism was one of three subcommittees, and was specifically charged with assessing the medical and public health preparedness and adequacy of response mechanisms in Texas and recommending resources or activities. A number of health care organizations including Texas Nurses Association, Texas Medical Association and Texas Hospital Association presented expert input to the Work Group.

RECOMMENDATIONS

One of the first recommendations to come from the Work Group was that the Governor establish a permanent coordinating council composed of both public and private sector representation from leading health service organizations to develop a plan for early detection and streamlining responses to bioterrorism that avoids duplication of efforts and establishes well defined duties, responsibility and jurisdictional authority. 
The Texas Nurses Association bécame a public partner of this group, prepared nursing's area of responsibility and submitted a plan that was adopted by the Coordinating Council and ultimately by the Governor on January 31, 2002. That plan provides for a nurse emergency response system called Ready Texas Nurses Emergency Response System (Ready Texas Nurses) to support Texas citizens in times of crisis and disaster. The Ready Texas Nurses special focus areas will be:

• Education – to assess and provide through partnerships, education for the nursing workforce to serve effectively in an emergency situation. Conversations with the Red Cross have commenced to provide education across the state.

Change in Prescription Format for Advanced Practice Nurses with Limited Prescriptive Authority

Advanced practice nurses with limited prescriptive authority should be aware that there will be a change in the Texas State Board of Pharmacy's (TSBP's) rule relating to generic substitution. SB 768, passed by the 77th Texas Legislature, required that the TSBP adopt rules relating to the manner in which practitioners indicate dispensing instructions regarding generic substitution on written prescriptions. The current rule (22 TAC §309) requires two signature lines with appropriate dispensing instructions under each line. Beginning June 1, 2002, the two signature line format will be eliminated. The new rule will require a practitioner to indicate "brand necessary" or "brand medically necessary" in the practitioner's own handwriting in order to prohibit generic substitution on a written prescription. Other changes were made concerning prescription format, and dispensing directives issued for verbal and electronic prescription drug orders. It is strongly recommended that advanced practice nurses with limited prescriptive authority review the new requirements outlined in Chapter 309 of the TSBP's Rules. Currently, the new rule is available on the *Texas Register's* web site at http://lamb.sos.state.tx.us/texreg/index.html. The rule appeared in the March 8, 2002 issue under the section on "Adopted Rules."

RNFA Rule Adopted

At the January 2002 meeting, the Board voted to adopt an amendment to Rule 217 by adding Section 217.18, relating to registered nurse first assistants (RNFAs). HB 803, passed in the 77th Legislative Session, amends the Nursing Practice Act by adding Section 301.1525. The section defines a "nurse first assistant" as a registered nurse who is certified in perioperative nursing by an organization recognized by the Board and has completed a nurse first assistant program approved by an organization recognized by the Board. The new section grants the Board authority to develop rules relating to RNFAs. The new rule only applies to RNs who are functioning in the first assistant role. It does not apply to certified surgical technologists or certified first assistants.

Section 217.18 establishes a regulatory definition of registered nurse first assistant consistent with Section 301.1525. As such, it defines "nurse first assistant" as a registered nurse who is certified in perioperative nursing by an organization recognized by the Board and has completed a nurse first assistant program approved by an organization recognized by the Board. The language in the adopted rule is exactly as it appears in Section 301.1525 of the Nursing Practice Act. All RNFAs must hold national certification as a perioperative nurse (CNOR) from the Certification Board Perioperative Nursing (CBPN). Currently, the CBPN is the only organization directly involved in reviewing RNFA education programs. CBPN reviews programs that prepare RNs for the first assisting role and includes programs that meet established criteria on its list of acceptable programs for individuals who desire to sit for the CRNFA certification exam. CBPN has written program acceptance criteria and requires programs to demonstrate compliance through a written application process for initial acceptance. They have also adopted a process for verifying ongoing compliance with acceptance criteria. Therefore, the Board adopted a policy that those RNFAs who have completed a program that is included in CBPN's list of acceptable programs have met the requirement for completion of a "nurse first assistant program approved by an organization recognized by the Board." New Section 217.18 also recognizes that current certification by the Certification Board Perioperative Nursing as a registered nurse first assistant (CRNFA) may be accepted in lieu of completing a first assistant program approved by an organization recognized by the Board. Additionally, the new rule creates a registry for those RNFAs who meet the criteria, reiterates the minimum standards required for all registered nurses practicing in the first assistant role, and recognizes AORN standards for first assisting.

RNs who elect to first assist must meet the requirements established by Section 301.1525 of the Nursing Practice Act and Rule 217.18. RNs who do not meet these requirements may continue to function in either the scrub or circulating roles, but they may not function as first assistants. • **Communication** – to maintain a communication system with the nursing profession during emergency situations utilizing web based, online, e-mail, fax and mail. The communications will maintain clinical best practice updates; present information on early detection or symptoms of nuclear, biological or chemical terrorism and reporting directions; target messages directed toward nurse leadership in inpatient hospital settings, outpatient hospital care, school health, clinics, home health and long-term care facilities; and recruit and process volunteers.

• **Management of Nursing Workforce** – Ready Texas Nurses will provide management of the nursing workforce during emergency situations in the following ways:

- 1. Texas Nurses Association will maintain a database of nurses who have registered with the Ready Texas Nurses data bank, had disaster training and had credentials cleared, and will maintain current contact information. TNA can activate this system in response to the needs of the Texas Department of Health (TDH).
- 2. Toll-free telephone numbers will be used to accept and filter spontaneous nurse volunteers from both within Texas and out-of-state, and assign them as needed and as deemed appropriate by TDH.
- 3. The Ready Texas Nurses can alert key portions of the entire nurse workforce as certain skills are identified and required, i.e., the need for nurses who are knowledgeable and skilled in immunization.

Nurses who want to become part of the Ready Texas Nurses Emergency Response System can log on to <u>www.texasnurses.org</u>, after April 1, 2002, click the Ready Texas Nurses logo and update their profile. They can also complete the questionnaire on the following page, detach the form from the *RN Update* and mail it to the address on the back of the form.

SITUATION ASSUMPTIONS

- Ready Texas Nurses will be activated by appropriate Texas Department of Health contacts to the TNA Executive Director, Clair Jordan, MSN, RN.
- Ready Texas Nurses will be activated when the local supply of nurses is insufficient to meet the depth and breadth of the emergency.
- Nurses employed or on staff at an acute care hospital will first fulfill the responsibilities of their institution disaster plan before volunteering.
- Nurses employed in a local, county or state public health system will first fulfill the responsibilities of their entity before volunteering.

Additional Recommendations to the Governor

Other recommendations to the Governor by the Work Group on Health and Bioterrorism in response to his charges to the Task Force on Homeland Security include:

- Requesting all health licensing organizations and agencies to require licensees to provide business fax numbers and e-mail addresses if available when completing license and registration forms.
- Requesting all health licensing organizations and agencies require licensees to attend at least one hour each year of continuing education on responding to the consequences of an incident of terrorism and reporting of medical events.
- Directing TDH to work in conjunction with the Department of Public Safety Division of Emergency Management and the Centers for Disease Control to review and update plans for quarantine, hospitalization and evacuation procedures in the event of a terrorist attack with due regard to civil liberties.
- Directing TDH to develop a statewide plan that could include public and private health resources to administer mass vaccinations and chemoprophylaxises should they be required.

Hepatitis C Continuing Education Required for License Renewal By Carol Marshall, MSN, RN

Senate Bill 338, Section 2, passed by the 77th Legislative Session, in part amended Subchapter G, Chapter 301, Occupations Code by adding Section 301.304 to the Nursing Practice Act (NPA) related to Hepatitis C continuing education for nurses. House Bill 2650 is the companion bill implementing the same requirement. Subsequent to this legislative action, Rule §216.3 was revised to add this **one-time** Hepatitis C continuing education requirement [§216.3(4)].

As discussed in the January 2002 *RN Update*, RNs in the state of Texas who have licensure <u>renewal</u> dates that fall between 6/1/2002 and 6/1/2004 must acquire at least 2 contact hours of continuing education in Hepatitis C when renewing the license between 6/1/2002-6/1/2004. For both RN's and RN's with advanced practice (APN) recognition from the Board, this requirement may be met through completion of either Type I or Type II approved continuing education activities. The two hour requirement counts as part of the minimum 20 hours of continuing education required of all RNs each biennium. The complete text of the new sections in the Nursing Practice Act and Board Rules may be viewed on the website at <u>www.bne.state.tx.us.</u>

How do I know when to complete the 2-hour Hepatitis C continuing education in order to meet the statutory and rule requirement? The answer depends on when the RN is due to renew his/her license. RNs renewing their license between June 2002 and June 2004 must complete the Hepatitis C requirement prior to the RN's respective renewal date. For instance, RNs renewing their licenses in June 2002 must obtain their 20 hours of CE in the interval between June 2000 through June 2002, therefore are required to obtain 2 hours of Hepatitis C continuing education prior to submitting their June 2002 renewal to the BNE. Nurses renewing prior to June 2, 2002 will have until the next renewal cycle to meet this requirement, i.e., a May 31, 2002 renewal may have until May of 2004 to obtain the two hours of Hepatitis C continuing education.

Additional information on Continuing Education for nurses may be obtained through the BNE web site at <u>www.bne.state.tx.us</u>. Rule 216, <u>Continuing Education</u> (CE) elaborates on CE requirements, and a CE Brochure with similar information is also available under the "Files and Downloads" heading on the BNE home page. The BNE does not offer any Hepatitis C continuing education. Standard providers of nursing continuing education (either Type I or Type II) may be utilized to access acceptable CE offerings. Q: Who is authorized to use the title "Nurse"?

A: There are several requirements in the Nursing Practice Act related to who may be designated as a Registered Nurse (RN) or Graduate Nurse (GN). The use of these titles **or any** title which implies that a person is a licensed RN is limited to those that have been appropriately licensed by the Board of Nurse Examiners (BNE). Further, when engaging in the practice of professional nursing, the practitioner must also know and conform to the requirements in the Nursing Practice Act and the Rules and Regulations Relating to Professional Nurse Education, Licensure and Practice. These may be viewed in their entirety at the Board's web site at: <u>www.bne.state.tx.us</u>.

Sec. 301.351. <u>Designations</u>, of the Nursing Practice Act and Rule 217.10. <u>Restrictions to Use of</u> <u>Designations for Registered Nurse</u> specify that only those persons who hold a current valid license or GN authorization may use the above titles. (For information referring to advanced practice titles please refer to the January 2002 *RN Update*.) Any other person who utilizes these titles **or any** other designation which may tend to mislead or imply that the person is a licensed professional nurse may be subject to prosecution under applicable law. Imposters are a threat to the health and safety of the public. The public relies on the BNE to set and enforce standards of practice in order to ensure that

licensees are competent to practice safely and have met all applicable eligibility and licensing standards in Texas.

When you speak with someone on the phone and they identify themselves as a "nurse" do you really know who you are speaking to and do you really know if they are or are not appropriately licensed? In such circumstances it may be prudent to clarify if you are speaking to a licensed professional nurse. Registered Nurses are obligated to report the unauthorized practice of nursing to the Board [Rule 217.12(25)]. The reporting, investigation and prosecution of imposters can assist in ensuring that the health and welfare of the public is protected.

The Board does not have a list of tasks that are specific to either the scrub or RNFA roles. The Board understands that there are some tasks that are performed by nurses functioning in the scrub role that are included within the scope of practice for RNFAs, such as holding a retractor. When these tasks are properly delegated, the nurse functioning in the scrub role is not considered to be acting as a first assistant. Because scope of practice is dynamic in nature, developing lists of tasks could limit current and future scope of practice for RNs in the operating room who are not RNFAs. The nurse who is not a first assistant, however, must clearly be functioning in the scrub or circulating role Further information regarding the only. definition and scope of practice for the RNFA can be obtained from the following web site: http://www.aorn.org/about/positions/ At this time, the registration rnfa.htm. process for RNFAs is being developed. TAMMY RENE CARNES

Tammy Rene Carnes applied for a position as a Registered Nurse with an OB/ GYN physician's group in Houston, Texas on November 29, 2001. On December 3, 2001, the supervisor contacted the Board office to verify that Ms. Carnes had initiated the reciprocity process. She was told that no application had been received. The supervisor also contacted the California Board to verify licensure and was informed that Ms. Carnes has never held a license to practice in California. Ms. Carnes was not offered a position and the supervisor reported the information to the Board. The information regarding Ms. Carnes was referred to the Houston Police Department.

BRENDAL CHRISTENEE KRAMER

a.k.a.: Brenda Christene Kramer

Brendal Christenee Kramer secured employment as a Scheduling Coordinator, with a hospital in Fort Worth, Texas on May 13, 2001. The position was an RN management position and required an RN license. Ms. Kramer told the facility that she was in the process of getting a Texas license and she claimed to have a current Tennessee license. The facility contacted the Board office after the supervisor became suspicious and began to question Ms. Kramer's credentials. The facility also contacted the Tennessee Board and found that Ms. Kramer has never been licensed to practice in the state of Tennessee. Ms. Kramer was terminated from employment on October 5, 2001 and a report was sent to the Board office. The information regarding the case was sent to the Fort Worth Police Department.

TAMERA BOYD

Tamera Boyd secured employment as a Registered Nurse in January 2001, with an imaging and pain management center in Fort Worth, Texas. Ms. Boyd signed RN after her name and told her employer that she had received a Bachelor Degree in Nursing. The employer contacted the university and was not able to verify that Ms. Boyd graduated from a nursing program. The employer asked Ms. Boyd to bring in her license for verification and Ms. Boyd failed to do so. The company contacted the Board office to verify licensure and they were informed that Ms. Boyd is not licensed in Texas. Ms. Boyd was terminated from employment on March 5, 2001. The information regarding this case was referred to the Fort Worth Police Department.

ROSE DIANE LEGG

Rose Dianne Legg was hired as a certified nurses aide by a nursing home in Friendswood, Texas. Two months after being hired she told the Director of Nursing that she had finished her nursing program and was now a registered nurse. Ms. Legg started signing RN after her name on some of the patients' medical records from October 2000 through December 2000. During a survey visit it was discovered that Ms. Legg was employed and signing RN after her name, however did not have a license to practice in the state of Texas. Ms. Legg had provided an RN license number belonging to someone else. The facility contacted the Board office and they were unable to verify licensure. The facility submitted a report to the Board.
