How to Cite: Material published in the *Texas Register* is referenced by citing the volume in which a document appears, the words "TexReg," and the beginning page number on which that document was published. For example, a document published on page 2402 of Volume 6 (1981) is cited as follows: 6 TexReg 2402.

In Order that readers may cite material more easily page numbers are now written as citations. Example: on page 2 in the lower left-hand corner of the page, would be written: "14 TexReg 2 issue date," while on the opposite page, page 3, in the lower right-hand corner, would be written "issue date 14 TexReg 3"

How to Research: The public is invited to research rules and information; of interest between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. weekdays at the *Texas Register* office, Room 245, James Earl Rudder Building, Austin. Material can be found using *Texas Register* indexes, the *Texas Administrative Code*, sections number, or TRD number.

Texas Administrative Code

The Texas Administrative Code (TAC) is the approved, collected volumes of Texas administrative rules.

How to Cite: Under the TAC scheme, each agency section is designated by a TAC number. For example in the citation 1 TAC §27.15:

1 indicates the title under which the agency appears in the *Texas Administrative Code*; TAC stands for the *Texas Administrative Code*; §27.15 is the section number of rule (27 indicates that the section is under Chapter 27 of Title 1; 15 represents the individual section within the chapter).

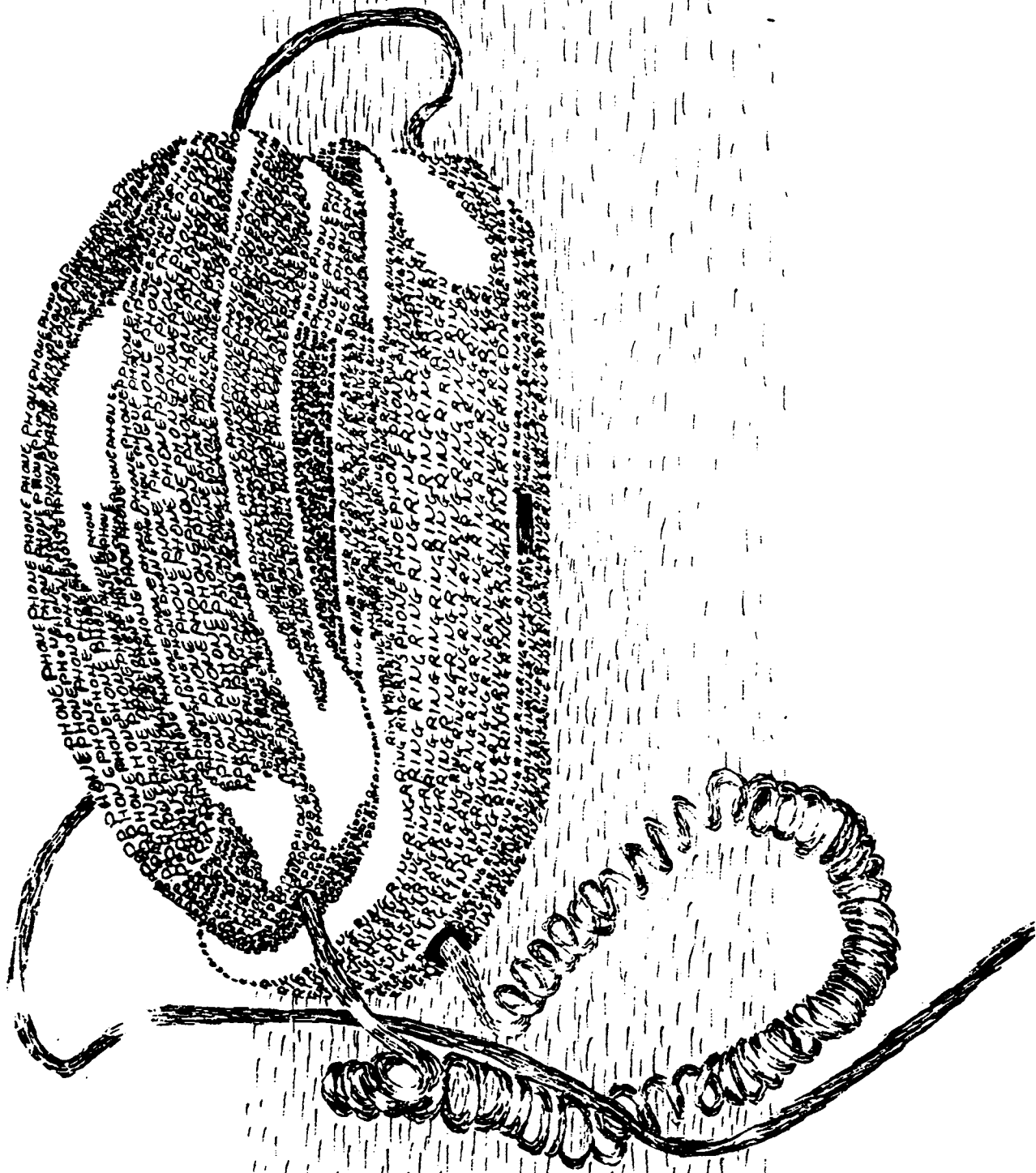

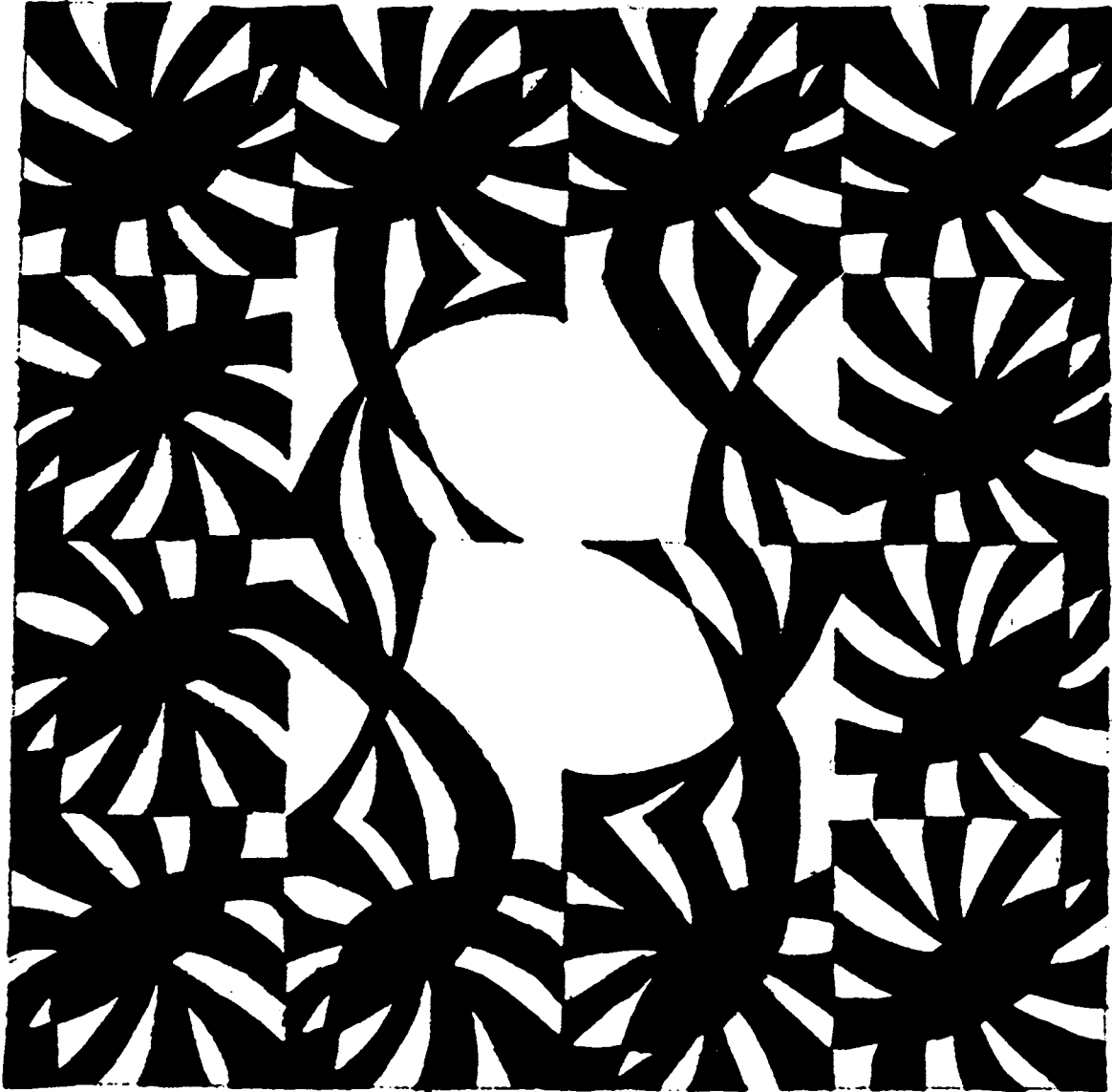

Attorney General

Description of Attorney General submissions. Under provisions set out in the Texas Constitution, the Texas Government Code, Title 4, §402.042 and numerous statutes, the attorney general is authorized to write advisory opinions for state and local officials. These advisory opinions are requested by agencies or officials when they are confronted with unique or unusually difficult legal questions. The attorney general also determines, under authority of the Texas Open Records Act, whether information requested for release from governmental agencies maybe held from public disclosure. Requests for opinions, opinions, and open record decisions are summarized for publication in the *Texas Register*. The Attorney General responds to many requests for opinions and open records decisions with letter opinions. A letter opinion has the same force and effect as a formal Attorney General Opinion, and represents the opinion of the Attorney General unless and until it is modified or overruled by a subsequent letter opinion, a formal Attorney General Opinion, or a decision of a court of record.

Open Records Decisions

ORD-548 (RQ-2138). Request from Ron Lindsey, Commissioner, Texas Department of Human Services, Austin, concerning restrictions on release of client information by the Texas Department of Human Services.

Summary of Decision. The Open Records Act does not authorize the disclosure of any information about individual clients of the Aid to Families with Dependent Children and Medicaid Programs administered by the Texas Department of Human Services. The Human Resources Code, §12.003 and §21.012, in accordance with the United States Code, Title 42, §602(a)(9), forbids disclosure of any such information for purposes not directly connected with the administration of the programs. Therefore, this material is excepted from disclosure by the Open Records Act, §3(a)(1), as information deemed confidential by statutory law.

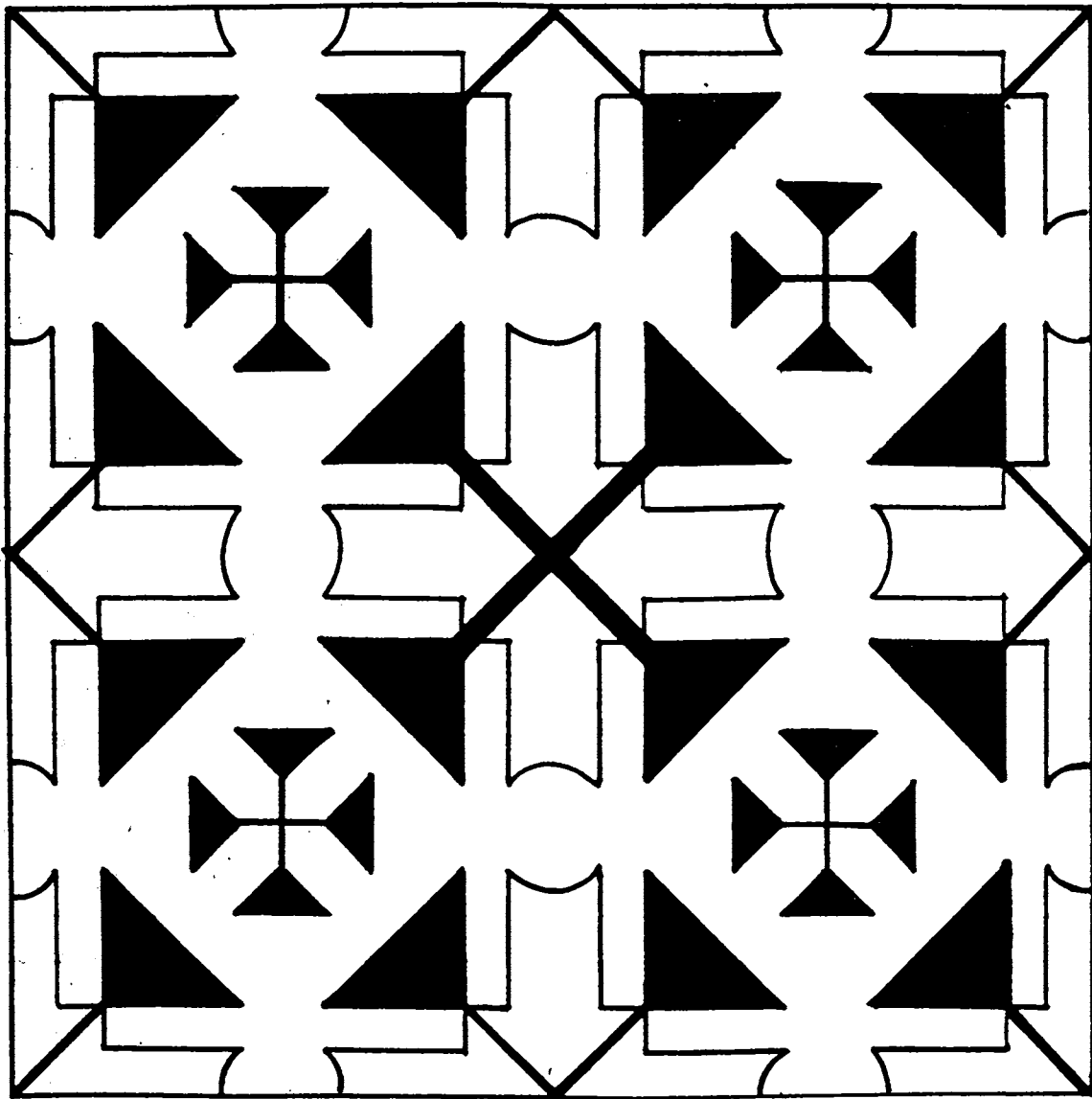

Proposed Sections

Before an agency may permanently adopt a new or amended section, or repeal an existing section, a proposal detailing the action must be published in the *Texas Register* at least 30 days before any action may be taken. The 30-day time period gives interested persons an opportunity to review and make oral or written comments on the section. Also, in the case of substantive sections, a public hearing must be granted if requested by at least 25 persons, a governmental subdivision or agency, or an association having at least 25 members.

Chapter 571. Licensing

Examinations

• 22 TAC §571.3

The State Board of Veterinary Medical Examiners proposes an amendment to §571.3, concerning licensing eligibility for students by restricting participation in the examination for licensure to those students who are within 60 days of completion of their veterinary college education.

Donald B. Wilson, executive director, has determined that for the first five-year period the section is in effect there will be no fiscal implications for state or local government as a result of enforcing or administering the section.

Mr. Wilson also has determined that for each year of the first five years the section is in effect the public benefit anticipated as a result of enforcing the section will not be applicable, as the public is relatively unaffected by this particular proposed section. There will be no effect on small businesses. There is no anticipated economic cost to persons who are required to comply with the section as proposed.

The amendment is proposed under Texas Civil Statutes, Article 7465a, §7(a) which provide the State Board of Veterinary Medical Examiners with the authority to "... make, alter, or amend such rules and regulations as may be necessary or desirable to carry into effect the provisions of this Act."

§571.3. Licensing Examinations Eligibility.

(a) To be eligible to participate in the State Board licensing examinations, applicants must be certified by the dean of the college from which they are expected to graduate that they are in the last 60 [120] days of their veterinary college education and are expected to graduate. In the absence of a diploma or transcript certifying award of the DVM degree, the dean must submit a letter stating the applicant did in fact gradu-

ate before the applicant is eligible to obtain a license, providing all other requirements have been met.

(b) (No change.)

This agency hereby certifies that the proposal has been reviewed by legal counsel and found to be within the agency's authority to adopt.

Subchapter J. Adoption by Reference of State Plans

(Editor's note: The text of the following sections proposed for repeal will not be published. The sections may be examined in the offices of the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation or in the Texas Register office, Room 245, James Earl Rudder Building, 1019 Brazos Street, Austin.)

The Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation (TDMHMR) proposes the repeal of §403.281 and §403.282 concerning the adoption by reference of state plans. The repeal is part of TDMHMR's sunset review process for policies and procedures. The sections that would be repealed were required to be published under Public Laws 94-63 and 96-368, governing the distribution of federal funds to community mental health and mental retardation centers under the categorical grant method. In 1981, these laws were superseded by federal laws requiring the distribution of federal funds for community-based programs using a block grant methodology, and the rules are therefore no longer required.

Leilani Rose, director, office of budget and fiscal services, has determined that for the

first five-year period the sections are in effect there will be no fiscal implications for state or local government as a result of enforcing or administering the sections. There is no anticipated local economic impact.

Karen Hale, director, planning and policy development, has determined that the public benefit will be the removal of outdated rules from Texas Administrative Code. There will be no effect on small businesses. There is no anticipated economic cost to persons who are required to comply with the sections as proposed.

Comments on the proposal may be submitted to Linda Logan, director, Policy Development, Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, P.O. Box 12668, Austin, Texas 78711-2668, within 30 days of publication.

The repeals are proposed under Texas Civil Statutes, Article 5547-202, §2. 11, which provide the Texas Board of Mental Health and Mental Retardation with rulemaking powers.

The Texas Workers' Compensation Commission proposes new §142.19, concerning form interrogatories to be used in contested case hearings that involve issues relating to workers' compensation benefits.

The new section adopts by reference two form interrogatories: claimants interrogatories to the insurance carrier; and carriers interrogatories to claimant. The section provides instructions to both the claimant and the carrier, on the respective interrogatories set applicable to each, and also lists applicable definitions, as used in the section, including definitions of "Act," "carrier," "claimant," "claim injury," "commission," "expert witness," "person," "rule," and "statement." Each set sets forth eleven specific prepared interrogatories, and the instructions that the asking party (either carrier or claimant) mark the questions it wishes the other to answer. Each interrogatory set also provides space for the party to include five other questions of his or her own. A certificate of service must be signed and sent with the answers, as well as an affidavit declaring that the answers are true, correct and complete. Both interrogatory sets require the date of the alleged injury, along with certain identifying information about the party who answers the interrogatories. The interrogatories also inquire into the issues on dis-

pute, allow for each party to list additional issues that may differ from those set forth in the benefit review officer's report, and, if a benefit review conference has not been held, the interrogatories request a listing of the issues in dispute, along with the party's position on each.

In addition to general questions included in both sets of interrogatories, the claimant's interrogatory to the carrier inquires whether any statement that concerns the issues in dispute has been obtained from the claimant, (or from any other individual) and whether photographs, videotapes, or motion pictures of the claimant have been taken since the date of injury, by anyone acting at the request of or on behalf of the carrier. The claimant's interrogatory also asks about a statutory lien against the claimant's benefits, or whether requests to reimburse voluntary advance payments of benefits have been filed with the carrier, and if so, by whom. The same interrogatory asks for the identity of anyone who has knowledge of the issues in dispute, and asks if the carrier knows of any document relating to the disputed issues, and if so, the source, nature, and location of each.

The carrier's interrogatory to the claimant also asks about how the claim injury occurred, the nature and extent of the claim injury, and asks the claimant about prior receipt of any worker's compensation benefits. The claimant is also asked to identify any person against whom the claimant plans to file a claim or lawsuit related to the injury. The claimant is also asked to identify any person who has knowledge of the issues in dispute, as well as any documents relating to the disputed issues.

R. Glenn Looney, manager of planning and analysis, has determined that for the first five-year period the section is in effect there will be no fiscal implications for state or local government as a result of enforcing or administering the section. There is no anticipated impact on employment, locally or statewide as a result of implementing the section.

Mr. Looney also has determined that for each year of the first five years the section is in effect the public benefit anticipated as a result of enforcing the section will be the implementation of the Workers' Compensation Act adopted by recent legislation, and production of all relevant information in contested case hearings. There will be no effect on small businesses. There is no anticipated economic cost to persons who are required to comply with the sections as proposed.

Comments will be accepted for 30 days after publication of this proposal in the *Texas Register*. Section 25.802, concerning definitions, is amended by adding a definition for adopt-a-project. Section 25.806, concerning responsibilities of group and department, is amended by adding the length and period of time a group must adopt a

project. Section 25.807, concerning general limiting conditions and eligibility, is amended by adding language to describe the type of sign to be used during a construction project.

Bob G. Hodge, P.E., chief engineer, maintenance and operations division, has determined that for the first five-year period the sections are in effect there will be no fiscal implications for state or local government as a result of enforcing or administering the sections.

Mr. Hodge has certified that there will be no significant impact on overall employment as a result of enforcing or administering the sections.

Mr. Hodge also has determined that for each year of the first five years the sections are in effect the public benefit anticipated as a result of enforcing the sections will be litter free highways within the limits of a highway construction project. There will be no effect on small businesses. There is no anticipated economic cost to persons who are required to comply with the sections as proposed.

§25.806. Responsibilities of Group and Department.

(a) Groups who desire to participate in the Adopt-a-Highway Program shall be subject to each of the following requirements and responsibilities.

(1)-(4) (No change.)

(5) Each group shall be required to adopt a section that is a minimum of two miles in length, and in the case of a construction project, for the entire length of the project.

(6) Each group shall be required to adopt a section for a minimum period of two years, and in the case of a construction project, to adopt for the entire duration of the project.

(7) -(17) (No change.)

(b) (No change.)

§25.807. General Limiting Conditions and Eligibility. Because of administrative, legislative, and financial constraints, the Adopt-a-Highway Program shall be subject to each of the following.

(1)-(4) (No change.)

(5) Newly installed adopt-a-highway signs shall be no larger than four feet by eight feet or smaller than four feet by four feet and all new installations shall be the least expensive and most [more] effective for each situation, and in the case of construction projects may be placed on skids.

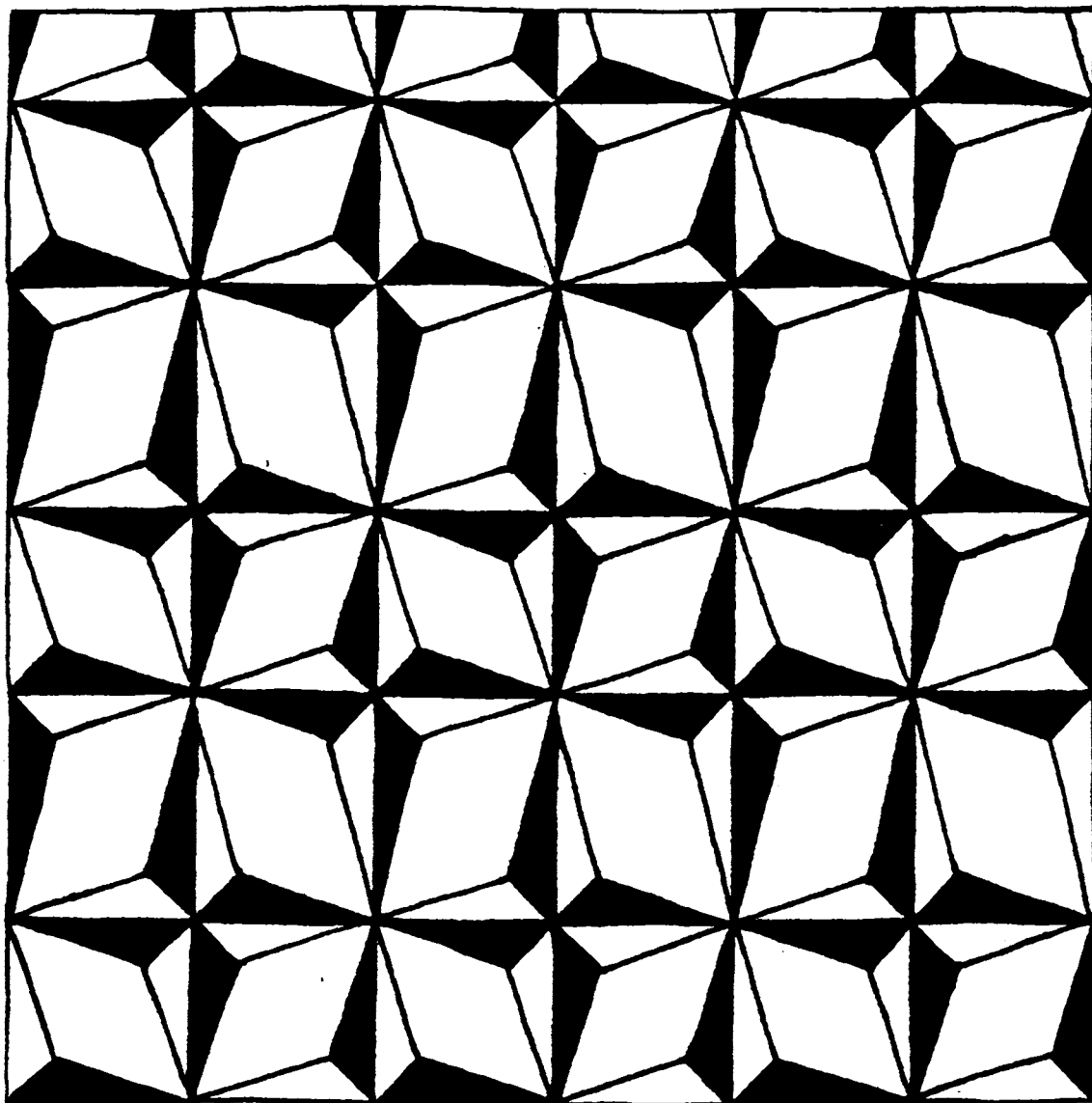

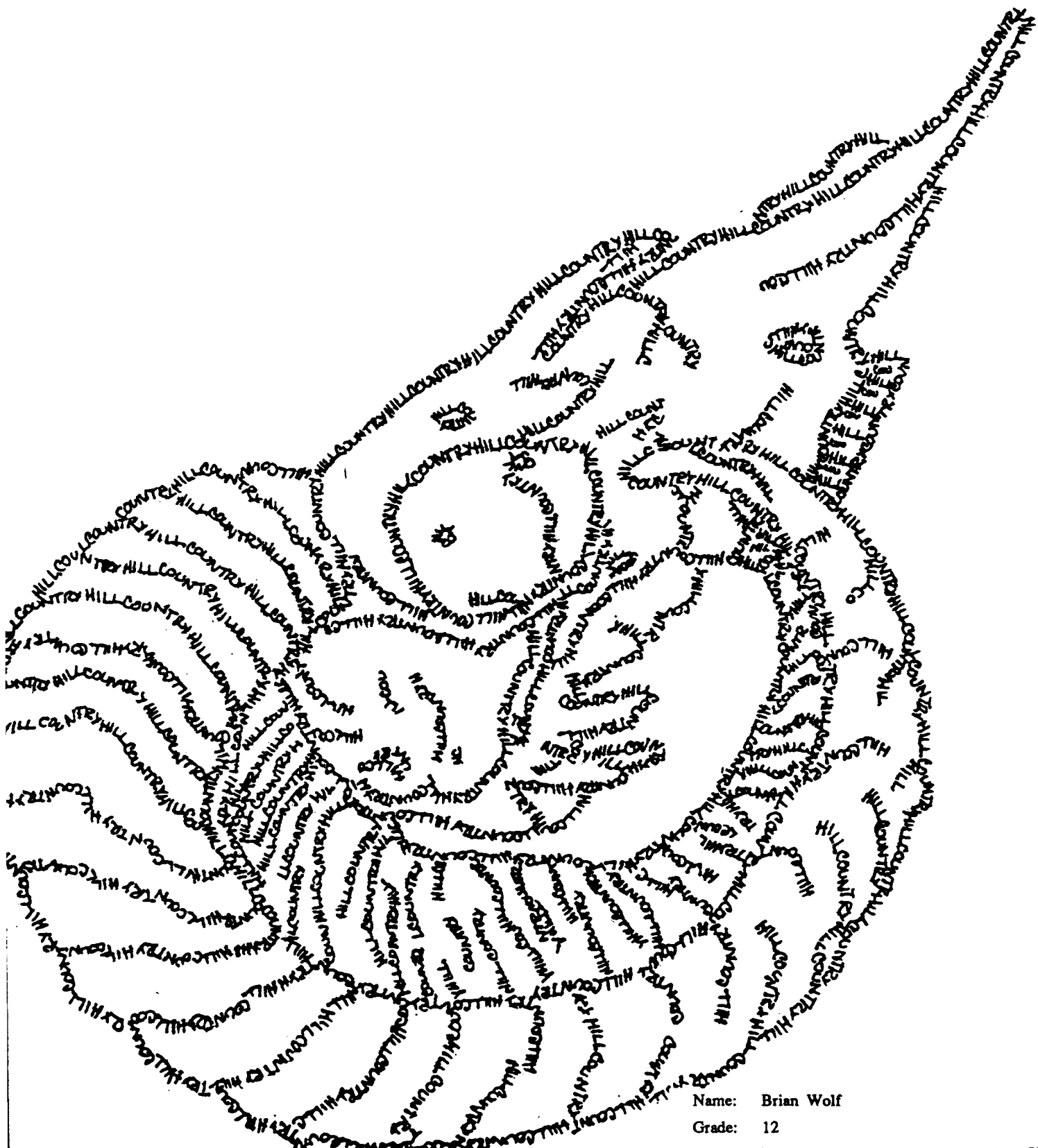
