

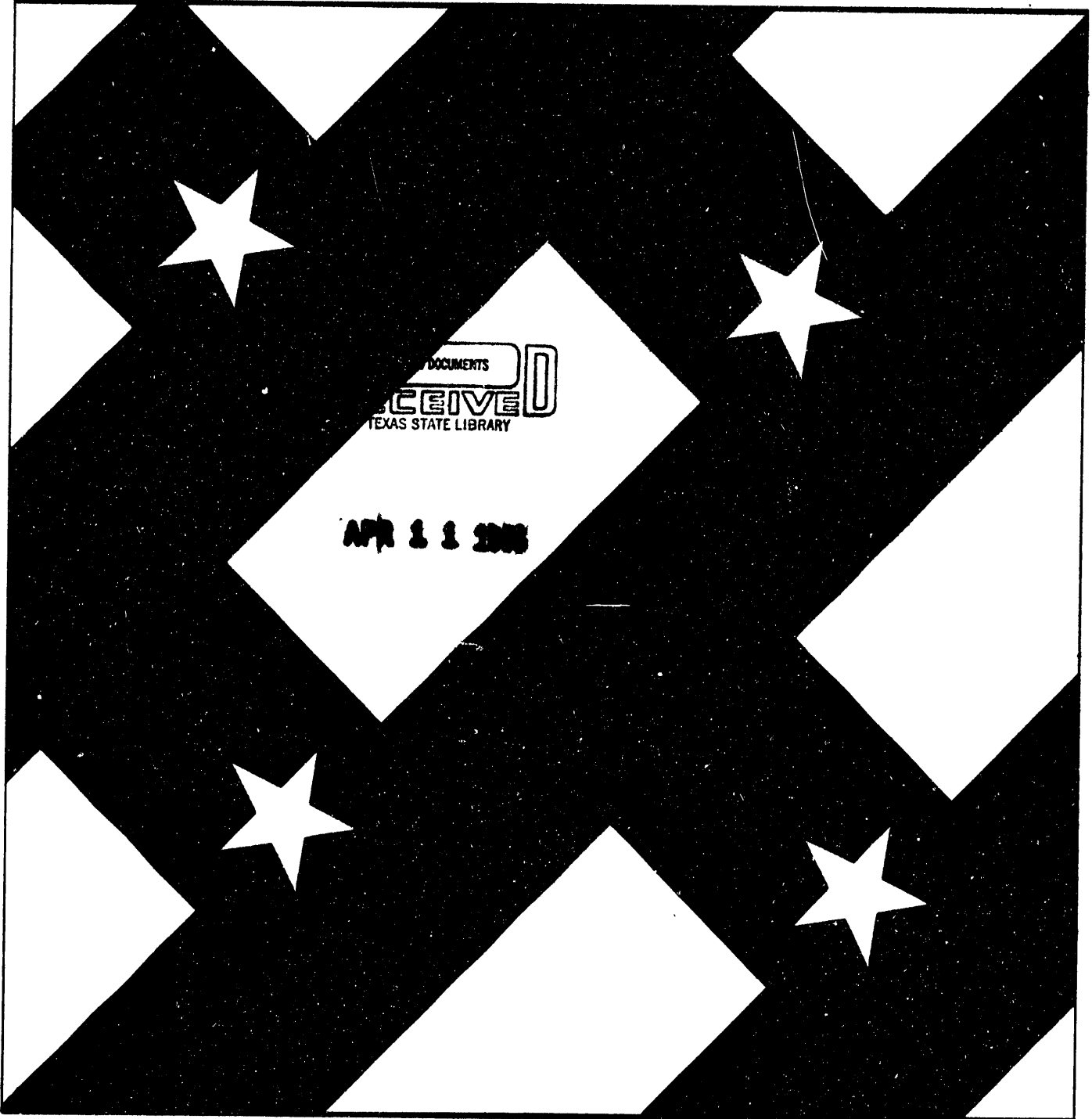

## Texas Register

The *Texas Register* (ISN 0362-4781) is published twice each week at least 100 times a year. Issues will be published on every Tuesday and Friday in 1986 with the exception of June 24, September 2, December 2, and December 30 by the Office of the Secretary of State.

- Attorney General—summaries of requests for opinions, opinions, and open records decisions
- Emergency Rules—rules adopted by state agencies on an emergency basis
- Proposed Rules—rules proposed for adoption
- Withdrawn Rules—rules withdrawn by state agencies from consideration for adoption, or automatically withdrawn by the *Texas Register* six months after proposal publication date
- Adopted Rules—rules adopted following a 30-day public comment period
- Open Meetings—notices of open meetings
- The Legislature—bills submitted to, signed by, and vetoed by the Governor and bills that are submitted to the Governor and enacted without his signature
- In Addition—miscellaneous information required to be published by statute or provided as a public service

Specific explanations on the contents of each section can be found on the beginning page of the section. The division also publishes monthly, quarterly, and annual indexes to aid in researching material published.

**How To Cite:** Material published in the *Texas Register* is referenced by citing the volume in which a document appears, the words "TexReg," and the beginning page number on which that document was published. For example, a document published on page 2402 of Volume 6 (1981) is cited as follows: 6 TexReg 2402.

In order that readers may cite material more easily, page numbers are now written as citations. Example: on page 2, in the lower left-hand corner of the page, would be written: "11 TexReg 2 Issue date," while on the opposite page, page 3, in the lower right-hand corner, would be written "Issue date 11 TexReg 3."

**How To Research:** The public is invited to research rules and information of interest between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. weekdays at the *Texas Register* office, 503E Sam Houston Building, Austin. Material can be found by using *Register* indexes, the *Texas Administrative Code*, rule number, or TRD number.

## Texas Administrative Code

The *Texas Administrative Code* (TAC) is the approved, collected volumes of Texas administrative rules.

**How To Cite:** Under the TAC scheme, each agency rule is designated by a TAC number. For example, in the citation 1 TAC §27.15:

1 indicates the title under which the agency appears in the *Texas Administrative Code*;

TAC stands for the *Texas Administrative Code*;

27.15 is the section number of the rule (27 indicates that the rule is under Chapter 27 of Title 1; 15 represents the individual rule within the chapter).

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# Proposed Rules

Before an agency may permanently adopt a new or amended rule, or repeal an existing rule, a proposal detailing the action must be published in the *Register* at least 30 days before any action may be taken. The 30-day time period gives interested persons an opportunity to review and make oral or written comments on the rule. Also, in the case of substantive rules, a public hearing must be granted if requested by at least 25 persons, a governmental subdivision or agency, or an association having at least 25 members.

**Symbology in proposed amendments.** New language added to an existing rule is indicated by the use of bold text. [Brackets] indicate deletion of existing material within a rule.

## TITLE 22. EXAMINING BOARDS

### Part X. State Board of Morticians

#### Chapter 203. Licensing and Enforcement—Specific Substantive Rules

##### ★22 TAC §203.6

The State Board of Morticians proposes an amendment to §203.6, concerning apprenticeships. The purpose of this amendment is to strengthen training of the apprentice.

John W. Shocklee, executive secretary, has determined that for the first five-year period the proposed section will be in effect there will be no fiscal implications for state or local government or small businesses as a result of enforcing or administering the section.

Mr. Shocklee also has determined that for each year of the first five years the section is in effect the public benefit anticipated as a result of enforcing the section will be to insure the consumer of receiving the most competent service when embalming is requested for a deceased. There is no anticipated economic cost to individuals who are required to comply with the proposed section.

The amendment is proposed under Texas Civil Statutes, Article 4582b, §5, which provide the State Board of Morticians with the authority to promulgate rules and regulations.

##### §203.6. *Apprenticeships.*

(a) Any case report called for in Texas Civil Statutes, Article 4582b, is [are] the responsibility of the apprentice. Penalties for failure to file these case reports will lie against the apprentice.

(b)-(c) (No change.)

(d) An embalmer apprentice shall be required to assist in the embalming of six autopsied remains during the course of the embalming apprenticeship, with the provision that a certificate from mortuary college

stating a number of autopsied cases had been completed during the course of the college program, would count towards the six required cases. However, any autopsied cases completed during the course of mortuary college, would not count towards the sixty cases required to complete the embalmer apprenticeship.

### Part I. Texas Department of Human Services

#### Chapter 47. Primary Home Care

The Texas Department of Human Services proposes new §47.906, and an amendment to §47.2912, concerning primary home care.

Section 47.2912 is amended to delete the ongoing training curriculum and to reduce the number of training hours required for provider agency supervisors. Section 47.906 is added to allow provider agencies to use substitute attendants to perform primary home care tasks. The substitute attendants are exempt from initial orientation by the provider agency supervisor before beginning services to the recipient.

Clifton Martin, associate commissioner for programs, has determined that for the first five-year period the proposed sections will be in effect there will be no fiscal implications for state or local government or small businesses as a re-

sult of enforcing or administering the sections.

Mr. Martin also has determined that for each year of the first five years the sections are in effect the public benefit anticipated as a result of enforcing the sections will be decreased administrative requirements for primary home care providers, thus partially offsetting the revenue lost by providers because of the five percent rate reduction to be in effect July 1, 1986. There is no anticipated economic cost to individuals who are required to comply with the proposed sections.

#### Primary Home Care Overview

##### ★40 TAC §47.906

The new section is proposed under the Human Resources Code, Title 2, Chapters 22 and 32, which authorizes the department to administer public and medical assistance programs.

##### §47.906. *Substitute Attendants.*

(a) Minimum qualifications.

(1) The substitute attendant must meet the requirements in §47.901 of this title (relating to Attendant).

(2) The substitute attendant must meet the requirements in either subparagraph (A) or (B) of this paragraph.

(A) The substitute attendant must be certified as a home health aide.

(B) The substitute attendant must:

(i) have six months experience delivering personal care tasks in family care or primary home care;

(ii) demonstrate competency in providing assistance with personal care tasks to the satisfaction of the provider agency registered nurse; and

(iii) have seven hours of classroom training. Training must be conducted by a registered nurse and must include interpersonal skills for dealing with recipients

and families; provision of personal care tasks; basic nutrition and special dietary needs; and first aid, safety, and emergency procedures.

(b) Services provided. The substitute attendant may be used to:

- (1) provide initial services;
- (2) provide ongoing services; or
- (3) prevent a break in service.

(c) Supervision.

(1) A registered nurse must supervise the substitute attendant in the delivery of services.

(2) The provider agency supervisor is not required to give an initial orientation in the recipient's home to substitute attendants meeting minimum qualifications before services are provided.

(3) Before the substitute attendant goes to the recipient's home, the provider agency supervisor must give him verbal or written instruction concerning:

(A) the needs of the recipient, tasks to be provided, number of hours to be provided each week, and the work schedule to be followed;

(B) essential observation of the recipient's health; and

(C) conditions about which the attendant should notify either the provider agency supervisor or the attending physician. The provider agency supervisor must document verbal instructions.

(4) The provider agency supervisor must conduct and document supervisory home visits for the substitute attendant at least every 60 days to determine if he is performing tasks according to the task assignment plan and to remedy areas of deficiency.

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## Participation Requirements

### ★40 TAC §47.9212

The amendment is proposed under the Human Resources Code, Title 2, Chapters 22 and 32, which authorizes the department to administer public and medical assistance programs.

§47.2912. *Supervisor Training.*

(a) Provider agency supervisors must have at least seven [14] hours of training in the following areas before they assume responsibilities:

(1)-(4) (No change.)

[(b) Provider agency supervisors must have at least six hours of training in one or more of the following areas each quarter. The supervisor must have training in all of the areas during the contracted year.

- [(1) principles of supervision;
- [(2) interpersonal skills for dealing with recipients and families;
- [(3) recipient characteristics and needs;
- [(4) policies and procedures of the contract; and
- [(5) training skills.]

[(b) [(c)] The provider agency must document in the supervisor's personnel records that training was delivered as required.

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## Chapter 48. CCAD

### Eligibility

#### ★40 TAC §§48.2911-48.2914, 48.2918, 48.2920, 48.2921, 48.2928

The Texas Department of Human Services proposes amendments to §§48.2911-48.2914, 48.2918, 48.2920, 48.2921, and 48.2928, concerning eligibility for community care services. The amendments reflect an increase in the required score on the client needs assessment questionnaire. In addition to meeting other eligibility criteria, applicants/clients must score 24 or above to be eligible for family care services, congregate and home-delivered meals, adult foster care, special services to handicapped adults, primary home care services, supervised living services, emergency care, and emergency response services. The proposed amendments also require that applicants/clients need at least six hours of care per week to be eligible for family care and primary home care services. The increase in scores and the hours of care requirement are necessary to target community care services to clients with a greater level of functional disability.

Clifton Martin, associate commissioner for programs, has determined that for the first five-year period the proposed sections will be in effect there will be no fiscal implications as a result of enforcing or administering the sections. The estimated savings to the state are \$639,236 in fiscal year 1986; \$3,795,278 in fiscal

year 1987; \$3,912,457 in fiscal year 1988; \$4,061,130 in fiscal year 1989; and \$4,179,444 in fiscal year 1990. There are no fiscal implications for units of local government or small businesses.

Mr. Martin also has determined that for each year of the first five years the sections are in effect the public benefit anticipated as a result of enforcing the sections will be the provision of community care services to individuals with a greater level of functional disability. There is no anticipated economic cost to individuals who are required to comply with the proposed sections.

The amendments are proposed under the Human Resources Code, Title 2, Chapter 22 and 32, which authorizes the department to administer public and medical assistance programs.

§48.2911. *Family Care.*

(a) Family care applicants/clients are eligible for services if they score at least 24 [23] on the client needs assessment questionnaire. If eligible, an applicant/client may receive one or more of the following services: personal care, household tasks, meal preparation, and escort. The client is eligible for no more than 20 hours of family care services a week.

(b) (No change.)

(c) The applicant must require at least six hours of family care per week. An applicant requiring fewer than six hours per week may be eligible if he scores 30 or above, and family care is essential to provide respite to the caregiver or to enable the applicant to remain in the community.

§48.2912. *Congregate and Home-delivered Meals.* A client must score at least 24 [nine] on the client needs assessment questionnaire to be eligible for congregate or home-delivered meals. [Clients receiving services on August 1, 1984, continue to be eligible for services until August 31, 1985, regardless of their score on the client needs assessment questionnaire.]

§48.2913. *Adult Foster Care.* Clients must score at least 24 [nine] on the client needs assessment questionnaire and have the approval of the CCAD unit supervisor to be eligible for adult foster care. [Clients receiving foster care on August 1, 1984, continue to be eligible for services until August 31, 1985, regardless of their score on the client needs assessment questionnaire.]

**§48.2914. Special Services to Handicapped Adults.** Clients must score at least 24 [nine] on the client needs assessment questionnaire to be eligible for special services to handicapped adults. [Clients receiving services on August 1, 1984, continue to be eligible until August 31, 1985, regardless of their score on the client needs assessment questionnaire.]

**§48.2918. Eligibility for Primary Home Care.** Applicants for primary home care services must meet the following criteria for program eligibility and medical need. The applicant must:

- (1) (No change.)
- (2) score 24 [23] or above on the client needs assessment questionnaire;
- (3)-(5) (No change.)
- (6) require at least six hours of primary home care per week. An applicant requiring fewer than six hours per week may be eligible if he scores 30 or above and primary home care is essential to provide respite care to the caregiver or to enable the applicant to remain in the community.

**§48.2920. Supervised Living Services.**

(a) Eligibility for supervised living services is based on the following criteria:

- (1) (No change.)
- (2) the applicant must score at least 24 [18] points on the client needs assessment questionnaire; and

(3) (No change.)

(b)-(c) (No change.)

[(d) Clients receiving supervised living services on August 1, 1984, continue to be eligible until August 31, 1985, regardless of their score on the client needs assessment questionnaire.]

**§48.2921. Emergency Care.**

(a) Eligibility for emergency care is based on the following criteria:

- (1) (No change.)
- (2) The applicant:
  - (A) (No change.)
  - (B) demonstrates a need for service by scoring at least 24 [18] points on the client needs assessment questionnaire.
- (b)-(d) (No change.)

**§48.2928. Emergency Response Services.**

A client must score at least 24 [nine] on the client needs assessment questionnaire and meet the following requirements to be eligible for emergency response services.

- (1)-(3) (No change.)

# Adopted

## Rules

An agency may take final action on a rule 30 days after a proposal has been published in the *Texas Register*. The rule becomes effective 20 days after the agency files the correct document with the *Texas Register*, unless a later date is specified or unless a federal statute or regulation requires implementation of the action on shorter notice.

If an agency adopts the rule without any changes to the proposed text, only the preamble of the notice and statement of legal authority will be published. If an agency adopts the rule with changes to the proposed text, the proposal will be republished with the changes.

### TITLE 16. ECONOMIC. REGULATION Part IV. Texas Department of Labor and Standards Chapter 69. Manufactured Housing Division General Requirements

#### ★ 16 TAC §69.125

The Texas Department of Labor and Standards adopts an amendment to §69.125, without changes to the proposed text published in the October 8, 1985, issue of the *Texas Register* (10 TexReg 3875).

A combined single limit insurance policy may provide a registered installer with a less expensive insurance policy and still allow for adequate protection for the consumer.

The adoption allows a registered installer to submit to the Manufactured Housing Division, to comply with the insurance requirements, a combined single limit of insurance policy.

No comments were received regarding adoption of the amendment.

The amendment is adopted under Texas Civil Statutes, Article 522f, which provide the Texas Department of Labor and Standards with the authority to adopt rules and regulations and take all action necessary to assure compliance with the intent and purpose of the Texas Manufactured Housing Standards Act and to provide for uniform enforcement of all provisions of the Act.

#### Part I. Texas Department of Human Services Chapter 39. Medical Transportation Transportation Services for Indigent Cancer Patients

#### ★ 40 TAC §39.1001, §39.1002

The Texas Department of Human Services adopts new §39.1001 and §39.1002. Section 39.1001 is adopted with changes to the proposed text published in the February 7, 1986, issue of the *Texas Register* (11 TexReg 695). Wording is changed to clarify that a medical authority actually is a licensed physician. Section 39.1002 is adopted without changes.

The new sections increase benefits and services for cancer patients who are indigent and who are not eligible for Medicaid benefits.

The new sections will function as standards for determining client eligibility for participation in the Transportation Services for Indigent Cancer Patients Program. The new sections apply only to clients residing in Webb, Zapata, Starr, Jim

Hogg, Hidalgo, Cameron, and Willacy counties.

No comments were received regarding adoption of the new sections.

The new sections are adopted under the Human Resources Code, Title 2, Chapters 22 and 32, which authorizes the department to administer public and medical assistance programs.

§39.1001. *Client Eligibility Criteria.* To be determined eligible by the department for participation in the Transportation for Indigent Cancer Patients Program, the applicant:

(1) must provide initial confirmation of cancer diagnosis by a licensed medical physician;

(2) must be medically indigent (at or below 100% of federal poverty guidelines);

(3) must not be eligible for Medicaid;

(4) must be accepted for evaluation or treatment by an intercounty or interregional referral institution capable of providing quality cancer services; and

(5) must reside in Webb, Zapata, Starr, Jim Hogg, Hidalgo, Cameron, or Willacy County.

This agency hereby certifies that the rule as adopted has been reviewed by legal counsel and found to be a valid exercise of the agency's legal authority.

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# Open Meetings

Agencies with statewide jurisdiction must give at least seven days notice before an impending meeting. Institutions of higher education or political subdivisions covering all or part of four or more counties (regional agencies) must post notice at least 72 hours prior to a scheduled meeting time. Some notices may be received too late to be published before the meeting is held, but all notices are published in the *Register*.

**Emergency meetings and agendas.** Any of the governmental entities named above must have notice of an emergency meeting, an emergency revision to an agenda, and the reason for such emergency posted for at least two hours before the meeting is convened. Emergency meeting notices filed by all governmental agencies will be published.

**Posting of open meeting notices.** All notices are posted on the bulletin board outside the Office of the Secretary of State on the first floor of the East Wing in the State Capitol, Austin. These notices may contain more detailed agendas than what is published in the *Register*.
